Directors' Report

On behalf of the Board of directors, I am pleased to welcome you to the 13th Annual General Meeting of the company and place before you the audited financial statements and Auditors' report for the year ended June 30, 2011.

General market scenario and future prospects

Worldwide businesses were adversely affected by global economic recession in financial year 2008-2009 and there has been some recovery of economies from the recession in financial year 2009-2010, however, its effect is still far from over. Besides global recession, textile sector in particular facing extremely tough challenges like raw material shortages, rising energy costs, increasing prices of imported inputs, prolonged power cuts and higher inflation. These factors are posing serious threats to textile sector in coming periods. On these fronts the situation is expected to remain uncertain in the future.

Although the company has become profitable in the year under review, the impact of rising input costs has forced the company to implement better cash collection strategy to cope with its liquidity/working capital requirements. The increased costs severely affected the competitiveness in the international as well as local market. The profitably picture does not truly reflect the underlying cash flow crisis. The uncertain gas/electricity situation, which is now three days a week, has led to heavy production losses. The silver lining is that in spite of being cash strapped the production facilities have worked at full capacity all the time. Another positive sign is the reasonable reduction in financial costs despite rising interest rates. Your company was able to reduce its debt by Rs. 149 million during the year under review. This in the face of tight cash flow, and rising costs, is a considerable achievement. However if conditions stay the same there is a good possibility that the current profitability will continue into the coming financial year.

Operational review

Presently the manufacturing facilities of the company are comprised of 253 weaving machines along with towel processing unit and 1152 two for one twisters. These facilities are running at about 95% efficiency and are capable of producing wide range of apparel, home furnishing fabrics and towels. The management is making efforts to capture new export market of apparel, home furnishing fabrics and towels.

The towel manufacturing unit alongwith complete finishing process is operational at 75% efficiency and we are targeting our sales to prominent European and American retailers. Currently our production line is for mid to higher end products.

Operating financial results

The operating financial results of the company for the year ended June 30, 2011 are as under:

The company has registered net sales of Rs. 3,573.505 million (2010: Rs. 2,663.771 million) which is increased by 34.15% against corresponding year. The gross profit of Rs. 423.507 million (2010: Rs. 247.934 million) depicts increase of 70.81%. The operating profit of Rs. 331.858 million (2010: Rs. 220.676 million) shows an increase of about 50.4%. The company has earned before tax profit of Rs. 114.831 million (2010: Loss of Rs. 59.378 million). The net Profit for the year after providing taxation is Rs. 88.648 million (2010: Loss of Rs. 63.153 million).

The significant increase in gross profit and net profit is mainly attributable to better sales mix of products, increase in sale prices, improved capacity utilization in terry towels and effective cost curtailment measures. The significant increase in sales is in line with the company's commitment to year on year growth trend in sales together with the increase in sales prices.



Earning Per Share

The Earning Per Share of the company stands at Rs. 1.49 (2010: Loss Per Share Rs. 1.06).

Qualification in Auditors report to the Members

The auditors in para (a) to their report to the members have drawn attention that The Bank of Punjab has filed a suit against the Company for recovery of its financing and mark up aggregating Rs.494,400,675 whereas the liabilities recorded in the Company's books against the above account is Rs.485,145,080, which is being contested by the Company and the Company has not provided any markup / cost of funds on the outstanding amount as also stated in notes 8.4 and 14.11 to the accounts. Based on the legal opinion, the company feels that, after institution of the suit, a financial institution is only entitled to cost of funds if so awarded by the court in case the suit is decided against the company. The levy of cost of funds and the quantum thereof shall be contingent on passing of the decree and rate prescribed by the State Bank of Pakistan during the period of pendancy of the claim and discharge of decree, if passed by the Bank Court.

Marketing strategy

The manufacturing facilities of the company are running at about 95% efficiency and are capable of producing wide range of apparel, home furnishing fabrics and towels. The management is making efforts to capture new export market of apparel, home furnishing fabrics and towels by targeting our sales to prominent European and American retailers. The recent devaluation of Pak rupees gives competitive edge to us against the neighboring countries. This has created a opportunity and market for the Pakistani weavers and we see a growing demand for towels in near future.

Restructuring/rescheduling of credit facilities

The company has already finalized restructuring/rescheduling of certain portion of its liabilities with its lenders and is in negotiation with other lenders for settlement/adjustment of loans through personal properties of the sponsoring directors to facilitate the cash flow of the company. Consequent to the revised agreed terms with its lenders the company has made payment of Rs. 149 million towards its liabilities during the year under review. Furthermore, another amount of Rs. 105 million has already been paid to the lenders of the company during first quarter ended September 30, 2011 of financial year 2011-12. The management is confident that upon maturity of offered settlement plans to its lenders the company will be able to attain satisfactory level of viability.

These accounts have been prepared on going concern basis since the management is of the view that there are no significant doubts upon the company's ability to continue as a going concern on the ground that the company will be able to achieve satisfactory level of profitability in the future based on the plans drawn up for this purpose and bringing its liability to serviceable levels. It is pertinent to mention here that the company has earned profit after taxation of Rs. 88.648 million during the year under review. The company has already finalized restructuring/rescheduling of certain portion of long term loans with its lenders and is in negotiation with other lenders for settlement/adjustment of long term loans through personal properties of the sponsoring directors to facilitate the cash flow of the company. The management is confident that upon maturity of offered settlement plans to its lenders the company will be able to attain satisfactory level of viability.

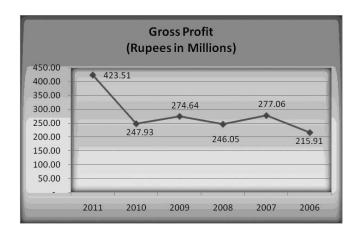


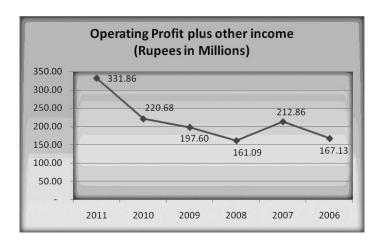


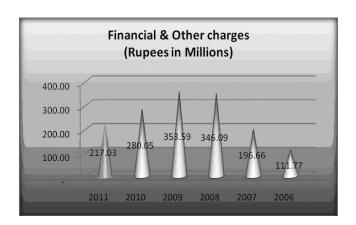


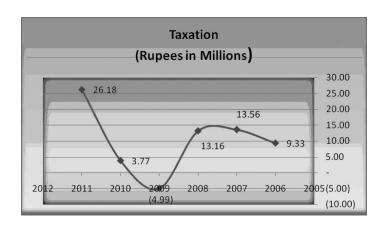




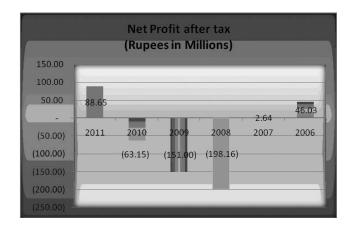


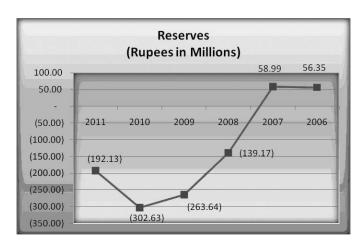


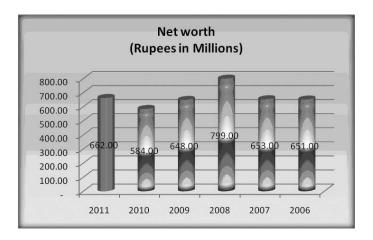


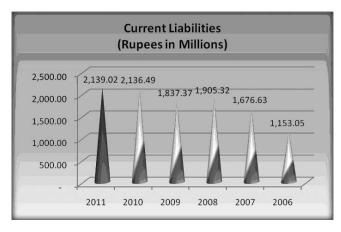


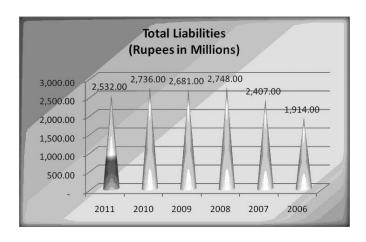


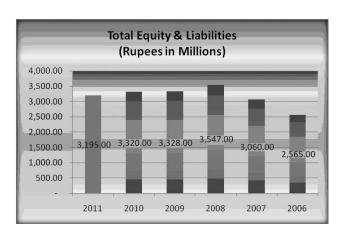




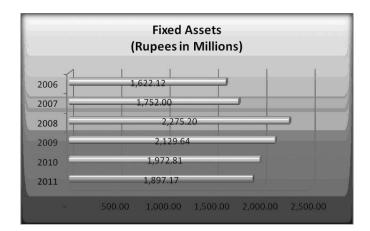


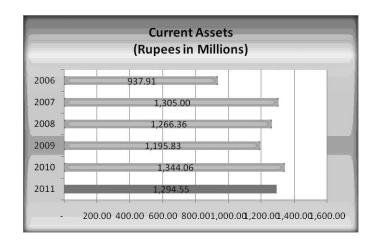


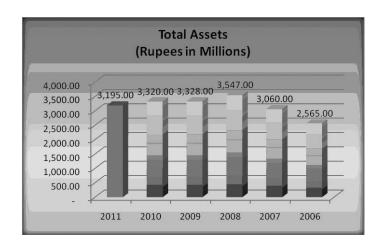


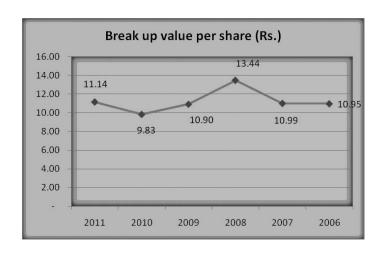


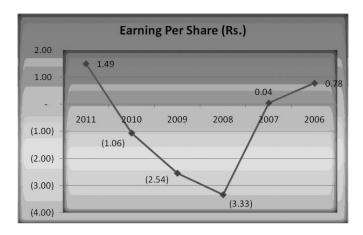


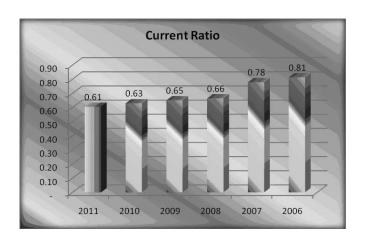














Statement of Compliance with Code of Corporate Governance FOR THE YEAR ENDED JUNE 30, 2011

Written notice of the Board meetings, alongwith agenda and working papers, were circulated at least seven days before the meetings. The minutes of the meeting were appropriately recorded and circulated.
- The Board arranged orientation course for its directors during the period to apprise them of their duties and responsibilities.
- 10. The Board has approved appointment of CFO, Company Secretary and Head of Internal Audit, including their remuneration and terms & conditions of employment, as determined by the CEO.
- 11. The Directors' report for this year has been prepared in compliance with the requirements of the Code and fully describes the salient matters required to be disclosed.
- 12. The financial statements of the company were duly endorsed by CEO and CFO before approval of the Board.
- 13. The directors, CEO and executives do not hold any interest in the shares of the company other than that disclosed in the pattern of shareholding.

- The Board has formed an Audit Committee. It comprises three members, of whom two are non-executive directors.
- 16. The meetings of the Audit Committee were held at least once every quarter prior to approval of interim and final results of the company and as required by the Code. The terms of reference of the Committee have been formed and advised to the committee for compliance.
- 17. The Board has set up an effective internal audit function with suitably qualified and experienced staff, conversant with the policies and procedures of the Company and involved in the internal audit function on a full time basis.

The statutory auditors of the company have confirmed that they have been given a satisfactory rating under the quality control review programme of the Institute of Chartered Accountants of Pakistan, that they or any of the partners of the firm, their spouses and minor children do not hold shares of the Company and that the firm and all its partners are in compliance with International Federation of Accountants (IFAC) guidelines on code of ethics as adopted by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of Pakistan.
- 19. The statutory auditors or the persons associated with them have not been appointed to provide other services except in accordance with the listing regulations and the auditors have confirmed that they have observed IFAC guidelines in this regard.
- 20. We confirm that all other material principles contained in the Code have been complied with.

 - (ii) the expenditure incurred during the year was for the purpose of the Company's business; and
 - (iii) the business conducted, investments made and the expenditure incurred during the year were in accordance with the objects of the Company;
- d) in our opinion and to the best of our information and according to the explanations given to us, the balance sheet, profit and loss account, statement of comprehensive income, cash flow statement and statement of changes in equity together with the notes forming part thereof conform with approved accounting standards as applicable in Pakistan and give the information required by the Companies Ordinance, 1984, in the manner so required and, except for the effects of the matter described in paragraph (a) above, respectively give a true and fair view of the state of the Company's affairs as at June 30, 2011 and of the profit, total comprehensive income, its cash flows and changes in equity for the year then ended; and

These conditions indicate the existence of a material uncertainty which may cast doubt about the Company's ability to continue as a going concern. Our opinion is not qualified in respect of this matter.

Notes to the Accounts

FOR THE YEAR ENDED JUNE 30, 2011

1 LEGAL STATUS AND NATURE OF BUSINESS

- 1.1 Zephyr Textiles Limited (the "Company") was incorporated in Pakistan on February 26, 1999 as a private limited Company under the Companies Ordinance, 1984. Subsequently on October 04, 2004 it was converted into a public limited Company. The Company is principally engaged in the manufacturing, dying and trading of woven cloth which also includes towels. The registered office of the Company is situated at 3rd Floor IEP Building, 97 B/D-1, Gulberg III, Lahore. The shares of the Company are listed on the Karachi and Lahore Stock Exchanges in Pakistan
- 1.2 During the year the Company has earned a profit amounting to Rs. 88.647 million as compared to loss of Rs. 63.153 million for the previous year thereby resulting in accumulated loss of Rs. 192.134 million as at the year end, the Company's current liabilities exceeded its current assets by Rs. 844.469 million (2010: 792.435 million). Continuation of the Company as a going concern is dependent on its ability to attain satisfactory levels of profitability in the future and continuous support of financial institutions by bringing its liabilities to serviceable levels and availability of adequate working capital through continued support from:
 - a) the principal lenders of the Company,
 - b) the sponsors of the Company.

These financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis on the grounds that the Company will be able to achieve satisfactory levels of profitability in the future based on the plans drawn up by the management for this purpose and bringing its liabilities to serviceable levels and availability of adequate working capital from its lenders and sponsors.

The financial statements consequently do not include any adjustment relating to the realization of the assets and liquidation of its liabilities that might be necessary would the Company be unable to continue as a going concer

2 STATEMENT OF COMPLIANCE

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the approved accounting standards as applicable in Pakistan and the requirements of the Companies Ordinance, 1984. Approved accounting standards comprise such International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRS) issued by the International Accounting Standards Board as are notified under the Companies Ordinance, 1984, provisions of and directives issued under the Companies Ordinance, 1984. In case requirements differ, the provisions or directives of the Companies Ordinance, 1984 shall prevail.

3 BASIS OF PREPARATION

3.1 Accounting convention

These financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention as modified by:

- revaluation of certain items of property, plant and equipment
- recognition of certain employee benefits at present value
- 3.2 Accounting standards, amendments and interpretations, which have been effective and adopted by the Company

During the year, certain amendments to existing standards and a new interpretation IFRIC Interpretation 19 Extinguishing Financial Liabilities with Equity Instruments became effective; however, they did not have any material effect on the financial statements of the Company.

3.3 Standards, interpretations and amendments to published approved accounting standards that are not yet effective

The following standards, amendments and interpretations of approved accounting standards are only effective for annual periods beginning from the dates specified below. These standards are either not relevant to the Company's operations or are not expected to have significant impact on the Company's financials statements, other than increased disclosures in certain cases:



- IFRS 9 Financial Instruments: effective for annual periods beginning on or after 1 January 2013.
- FRS 10 Consolidated Financial Statements: effective for annual periods beginning on or after 1 January 2013. This IFRS supersedes the requirements relating to consolidated financial statements in IAS 27 Consolidated and Separate Financial Statements (as amended in 2008) and also supersedes SIC-12 Consolidation Special Purpose Entities.
- IFRS 11 Joint Arrangements: effective for annual periods beginning on or after 1 January 2013. This IFRS supersedes IAS 31 Interests in Joint Ventures and SIC 13 Jointly Controlled Entities Non Monetary Contributions by Venturers.
- IFRS 12 Disclosure of Interests in Other Entities: effective for annual periods beginning on or after 1 January 2013.
- IFRS 13 Fair Value Measurement: effective for annual periods beginning on or after 1 January 2013.
- Amendments to IAS 1 Presentation of Financial Statements: these amendments regarding presentation
 of items of other comprehensive income are effective for annual periods beginning on or after 1
 July 2012.
- IAS 24 Related Party Disclosures (revised 2009): effective for annual periods beginning on or after 1 January 2011.
- IAS 27 Separate Financial Statements (revised 2011): effective for annual periods beginning on or after 1 January 2013.
- IAS 28 Investments in Associates and Joint Ventures (revised 2011): effective for annual periods beginning on or after 1 January 2013.
- Amendments to IFRIC 14 IAS 19 The Limit on a Defined Benefit Asset, Minimum Funding Requirements and their Interaction: effective for annual periods beginning on or after 1 January 2011.

3.4 Functional and presentation currency

These financial statements are presented in Pakistani Rupees which is the Company's functional currency. All financial information presented in Pak Rupees have been rounded to nearest Rupee.

4 SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING ESTIMATES AND JUDGMENTS

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with approved accounting standards requires management to make judgments, estimates and assumptions that affect the application of policies and reported amounts of assets and liabilities, income and expenses. Actual results may differ from these estimates. These estimates and underlying assumptions are recognized in the period in which the estimate is revised and in any future periods affected. Following are the significant estimates and judgments made by the management:

a) Useful life and residual values of property, plant and equipment

The Company reviews the useful lives of property, plant and equipment on a regular basis. Any change in the estimates in the future years might affect the carrying amount of the respective items of property, plant and equipment with a corresponding effect on the depreciation charge and impairment. Revaluation is carried with sufficient regularity to ensure that the carrying amount of assets does not differ materially from the fair value.

b) Staff retirement benefits

Certain actuarial assumptions have been adopted as disclosed in note 5.1 to the financial statements for the valuation of present value of defined benefit obligation. Any changes in these assumptions in future years might affect unrecognized gains and losses in those years.

c) Income taxes

The Company takes into account the current income tax law and decisions taken by appellate authorities. Instances where the Company's view differs from the view taken by the income tax department at the assessment stage and where the Company considers that its view on items of material nature is in accordance with law, the amounts are shown as contingent liabilities.

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d) Stock in trade and store and spares

The Company reviews the net realizable value (NRV) and impairment of stock in trade and stores, spare parts and loose tools to access any diminution in the respecting carrying values and whenever required provisions for NRV impairment is made. The difference is provision, if any is recognized.

5 SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

5.1 Staff retirement benefits

Defined Benefit Plan

The Company operates an unfunded gratuity scheme (defined benefit plan) covering all eligible employees, payable at the cessation of employment. Provisions are made to cover the obligation under the scheme on the basis of actuarial valuations and are charged to income.

The latest actuarial valuation has been carried out as at June 30, 2011, under Projected Unit Credit Method, using the following significant assumptions for valuation of the scheme:

Discount rate
Expected rate of salary increase in future
Average expected remaining working life time of employees
5 years

Actuarial gains and losses related to employees defined benefit plans, exceeding ten percent of the present value of defined benefit obligations as at start of the financial year are recognized in the profit and loss account over the expected average remaining working lives of the employees participating in the plan, otherwise the actuarial gains and losses are not recognized.

The amount recognized in the balance sheet represents the present value of defined benefits obligation adjusted for un-recognized actuarial gains / losses and un-recognized past service cost.

5.2 Property, plant and equipment

-Owned assets

Property, plant and equipment except free hold land, buildings on free - hold land and plant and machinery are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation and impairment, if any. Free - hold land, buildings on free - hold land and plant and machinery are stated at revalued amounts. Capital work in progress is stated at cost less impairment, if any.

Cost of property, plant and equipment consists of historical cost, borrowing costs pertaining to the erection / construction period and other directly attributable costs of bringing the assets to their working condition or for commencement of commercial production.

Depreciation on all the items of property, plant and equipment except for free - hold land is charged to income applying the reducing balance method at the rates specified in note 15.

Depreciation on additions to property, plant and equipment is charged from the month in which asset become available for use, while on disposals depreciation is charged up to the month of disposal.

The assets' residual values and useful lives are reviewed at each financial year end, and adjusted if impact on depreciation is significant.

Gain / loss on disposal of property, plant and equipment are credited or charged to income in the year of disposal. Normal repairs and maintenance are charged to income as and when incurred. Major renewals and improvements are capitalized.

Any surplus arising on revaluation of property, plant and equipment is credited to the surplus on revaluation of property, plant and equipment account. Revaluation is carried with sufficient regularity to ensure that the carrying amount of assets does not differ materially from the fair value. To the extent of incremental depreciation charged on the revalued assets, the related surplus on revaluation of property, plant and equipment (net of deferred tax) is transferred directly to accumulated (loss) / profit.

All expenditure connected with specific assets incurred during installation and construction period are carried under capital work in progress. These are transferred to specific assets as and when these assets are available for use.



- Leased assets

Assets held under finance leases are stated at lower of present value of minimum lease payments under the lease agreement and the fair value of assets acquired on lease. Aggregate amount of related obligations under the lease less finance cost allocated to future payments are shown as liability. The finance cost is calculated at the interest rate implicit in the lease and are charged to income currently.

Depreciation on additions to leased assets is charged from the month in which the leased assets is acquired, capitalized or commencement of commercial production while no depreciation is charged for the month in which leased assets is disposed off.

Assets acquired under finance lease are depreciated over the useful life of the assets applying reducing balance method. Depreciation of leased assets is charged to income.

5.3 Stores, spare parts and loose tools

These are stated at cost using moving average method except goods in transit which are stated at cost comprising invoice value plus other charges paid thereon.

5.4 Stock in trade

Stock-in-trade is valued at lower of cost and net realizable value except waste which is valued at net realizable value. Materials in transit are stated at cost comprising invoice value plus other charges paid thereon.

Cost of major components of stock in trade is determined as follows:-

Raw material

- At weighted average cost

Work in process and finished goods

- At prime cost plus appropriate production overheads determined on weighted average basis.

Net realizable value signifies the estimated selling price in the ordinary course of business less costs necessarily to be incurred to make the sale.

5.5 Financial instruments

Financial assets and liabilities are recognized at the fair value of the consideration given or received at the time when the Company becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument by following the trade date accounting. A financial asset or part thereof is de-recognized when the Company loses control of the contractual rights that comprise the financial asset or part thereof. Such control is deemed to be lost if the Company realizes the rights to the benefits specified in the contracts, the right expires or the Company surrenders those rights. A financial liability or part thereof is de-recognized when it is extinguished i.e. when the obligation specified in the contract is discharged, cancelled or expired. A financial asset and financial liability is offset and the net amount is reported in the balance sheet if the company has a legal enforceable right to set off the transaction and also intends either to settle on a net basis or to realize the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

The particular recognition methods adopted by the Company are disclosed in the individual policy statements associated with each item of financial instruments.

5.6 Loans and advances

These are stated at cost which represents the fair value of the consideration less impairment, if any.

5.7 Trade debts

Trade debts originated by the Company are recognized and carried at original invoice amount less allowance for any uncollectible amounts. An estimate for doubtful debt is made when collection of the full amount is no longer probable. Known bad debts are written off as incurred.

5.8 Trade and other payables

Trade and other payable are carried at cost which is the fair value of the consideration to be paid in future for goods and services received, whether or not billed to the Company.



5.9 Borrowing costs

Borrowing costs directly attributable to the acquisition, construction or production of qualifying assets, which are assets that necessarily take a substantial period of time to get ready for their intended use or sale are added to the cost of those assets, until such time as the assets are substantially ready for their intended use or sale. Investment income earned on the temporary investment of specific borrowings pending their expenditure on qualifying asset is deducted from the borrowing costs eligible for capitalization. All other borrowing costs are recognized in profit and loss account in the period in which they are incurred.

5.10 Foreign currency translation

Transactions in foreign currency are recorded in Pak Rupee at the rate of exchange prevailing on the transaction date. All the assets and liabilities in foreign currencies are translated at exchange rates ruling on the balance sheet date. Exchange differences are dealt with through profit or loss.

5.11 Revenue recognition

Export sales are accounted for on shipment basis. Exchange differences, if any, are adjusted in the period of realization except for adjustments made in accordance with note 5.10 (foreign currency translation) to the financial statements. Local sales are recorded on dispatch of goods to customers.

Export rebates are accounted for on accrual basis. Investment and interest income is recognized on time proportion basis.

Dividend income on ordinary share is recognized when the right to receive dividend has been established. Capital gains or losses arising on sale of investments are taken to income in the period in which they arise.

5.12 Taxation

Provision for current taxation is based on taxable income at current tax rates after considering the rebates and tax credits available, if any.

Deferred taxation is accounted for using the balance sheet liability method in respect of all temporary differences arising from differences between carrying amounts of assets and liabilities in the financial statements and the corresponding tax bases used in the computation of the taxable (loss) / profit. Deferred tax liabilities are recognized for all major taxable temporary differences and deferred tax assets are recognized to the extent that it is probable that taxable profits will be available against which deductible temporary differences, unused tax losses and tax credits can be utilized.

5.13 Impairment

An assessment is made at the balance sheet date to determine whether there is an evidence that a particular asset or class of assets may be impaired. If such evidence exists, the estimated recoverable amount of that asset is determined and any impairment loss is recognized for the difference between recoverable amount and the carrying amount.

5.14 Provisions

A provision is recognized in the financial statements when Company has legal or constructive obligation as a result of a past event and it is probable that an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation and a reliable estimate can be made to the amount of obligation.

5.15 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents are carried in the balance sheet at cost. For the purpose of cash flow statement, cash and cash equivalents comprises cash in hand, demand deposits, other short term highly liquid instruments that are readily convertible to known amount of cash and which are subject to an insignificants risk of change in value and finances under mark-up arrangements. In the balance sheet, finance under mark-up arrangements are included in current liabilities.



5.16 Derivative financial instruments

The Company uses derivative financial instruments such as interest rate swap and cross currency swaps to cover risk associated with interest and exchange rate fluctuations. Such derivative financial instruments are initially recognized at fair value on the date on which a derivative contract is entered into and subsequently measured at fair value. Derivatives are recognized as asset when fair value is positive and as liability when fair value is negative. Any gain or loss arising from change in fair value of derivatives that do not qualify for hedge accounting are taken directly to profit and loss account.

5.17 Investments

Initial measurement

Investments in securities are recognized on a trade - date basis and are initially measured at cost which is the fair value of the consideration given.

Subsequent measurement

Investments at fair value through profit or loss

These are securities, which are either acquired for generating a profit from short term fluctuation in prices or dealer's margin, or are securities included in a portfolio in which a pattern of short term profit taking exists. These investments are measured at subsequent reporting dates at fair value and resulting gains and losses are included in the net profit or loss for the period.

5.18 Related party transactions.

Transactions with related parties are priced on arm's length basis. Prices for these transactions are determined on commercial terms and conditions.

5.19 Off-setting

Financial assets and liabilities are offset and the net amount is reported in the financial statements only when there is legally enforceable right to set off the recognized amount and the Company intends either to settle on a net basis, or to realize the assets and settle the liabilities simultaneously.

8 LONG TERM FINANCING- SECURED

- 8.1 Long term financing was converted into State Bank of Pakistan's Long Term Finance (Export Oriented Project) Scheme during the financial year 2007.
- 8.2 It represents long term financing from commercial banks / financial institutions (stated above) to finance the manufacturing facilities of the Company comprised of weaving machines, towel, power generation unit and allied machineries. Markup is payable along with installment as per schedule stated above. The loans are secured against equitable mortgage charge on land, first pari passu charge on property, plant and equipment of the Company and personal guarantees of the directors of the Company.
- 8.3 The loans from National Bank of Pakistan, Allied Bank Limited and Faysal Bank Limited were rescheduled in April 2010, May 2010 and January 2010 respectively. The rescheduling effect of these loans has been incorporated in the financial statements for the year ended June 30, 2011.
- 8.4 It represents loan from The Bank of Punjab which was restructured in September 2009. The Bank of Punjab has filed a suit for the recovery of amounts due against long term loans amounting to Rs. 257,497,258, short term borrowings amounting to Rs. 200,000,000 and mark up amounting to Rs. 36,903,417 which aggregate to Rs. 494,400,675 whereas the liabilities recorded in the Company's books against the above account is Rs. 485,145,080. Based on the legal opinion, the Company has not accrued any mark up or cost of funds on the said outstanding balances as explained in note 14.11. The whole amount is being reflected in the current liabilities.
- 8.5 All the existing loan facilities from Faysal Bank Limited have been converted into ERF Part II facility amounting to Rs. 115. 397 millions. The rescheduling effect of this loan has been incorporated in the financial statements for the year ended June 30, 2011.
- 8.6 The loan from UBL amounting to Rs. 59,940,000 has been rescheduled during the period in October 2010. The rescheduling effect of this loan has been incorporated in the financial statements for the year ended June 30, 2011.
- 8.7 The short term running finance from UBL has been converted into a new long term demand fiancé. Mark up is payable alongwith installments as per schedule stated above. The loan is secured by first pari passu charge on all present plant and machinery and equitable mortgage of land measuring 68 k and with building both present and future value thereon of PKR 134.00 million of the Company.
- 8.8 The State Bank of Pakistan has fixed the refinance rate to 4.9% p.a., for the borrowers refinance for the period over three years and up to maximum period prescribed under the scheme up to 7.5 years. This scheme was applicable for loans availed up to February 28, 2005 and later up to 2007.

^{13.1} The Company has aggregate sanctioned limit of export refinance facilities (ERF) of Rs.1,146 million out of which Rs.250 million relate to ERF-I facility availed from Faysal Bank Limited and NIB Bank Limited. The aggregate outstanding balance at any given time of this account will remain within sanctioned limit of Rs.1,146 million.

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- 13.2 The company has aggregate post shipment facility amounting Rs. 150 Million availed from NIB Bank Limited and Allied Bank Limited.
- 13.3 All the sanctioned Morabaha loans availed from Faysal Bank Limited were previously converted into ERF-I facility of Rs. 115. 397 million. During the year ERF loan was converted into FAPC loan by Rs. 53 million.
- 13.4 The Company has aggregate sanctioned limit of Running Finance facilities of Rs.320 million from National Bank of Pakistan, Allied Bank Limited, Habib Bank Limited, United Bank Limited and RBS, Faysal Bank Limited and NIB Bank Limited. The aggregate outstanding balance at any given time of this account will remain within sanctioned limit of Rs.320 million.
- 13.5 These facilities are secured against hypothecation of stocks, lien on confirmed export orders, pari passu charge on current assets and personal guarantees of the directors. Morabaha finance is for the purpose of raw material purchases on short term basis.
- 13.6 The short term running finance from UBL has been converted into a new long term demand fiancé. Mark up is payable alongwith installments as per schedule stated above. The loan secured by first pari passu charge on all present plant and machinery and equitable mortgage of land measuring 68 kanal, with building both present and future value thereon of PKR 134.00 million of the Company.
- 13.7 These include short term borrowings from The Bank of Punjab amouting to Rs, 200 million agaisnt which recovery suit has been filed by The Bank of Punjab. Refer note 8.4 and 14.11 for details.

14 CONTINGENCIES AND COMMITMENTS

- 14.1 The Company has filed a recovery suit against the Punjab Cotton Mills Limited for Rs. 5,106,639 along with interest. The suit is pending before the Honorable Civil Judge, Lahore. The Company is hopeful of settlement of the case in its favour.
- 14.2 The Company has filed appeals before the Customs, Excise and Sales Tax Appellate Tribunal, Lahore under section 46(1) of the Sales Tax Act, 1990 for refund of sales tax aggregating Rs. 15,500,885 disallowed by the sales tax department on account of supply of zero rated goods in lieu of Sales Tax General Order NO. 2 2007 (STGO), dated February 6, 2007 and SRO NO. 992(J)/2005 dated September 21, 2005 read with SRO No. 487(J)/2006 dated May 26, 2006. In this regard the Federal Board of Revenue through its letter number C. No. 3 (10) STM/2007 dated 13th January, 2010 issued directions to ensure that all cases on which the said SRO was applied retrospectively should be processed prospectively, as instructed by the High Court and approved by the Supreme Court of Pakistan, thus the cases pertaining to the period before the said SRO shall remain entitled to the refund and the same should be issued to them without any further delay.
- 14.3 M/s. M. J. Industries has filed a case against the Company for declaration for Rs. 544,644. The case is dismissed by the Honorable Civil Judge, Lahore. M/s. M. J. Industries has filed an application for the restoration of the suit.
- 14.4 The Company has filed a recovery suit against the M/s M. J. Industries for Rs. 544,644. The summon and notices have been issued to the defendant and the case is pending due to non appearance of the defendant before the Honorable Civil Judge, Lahore. The Company is hopeful of settlement of the case in its favour.
- 14.5 The Company has filed a recovery suit against the M/s. Amtex Limited for Rs. 2,916,762. The case is fixed for final order by Honorable Judge, high Court, Lahore. The Company is hopeful of settlement of the case in its favour.
- 14.6 M/s. Sitara Textiles has filed a suit against the Company for recovery of damages against non performance of contract no. LO417 for supply of fabric. According to legal confirmation status, suit is pending for framing of issues.
- 14.7 Muhammad Sajid (the plaintiff) has filed a suit for permanent injunctions and declaration against interfering the possession of plaintiff property by pretending that the suit property has been purchased by Zephyr Textiles Limited (the defendant) through registered sales deed bearing distavez no. 2775 dated 01-09-2010, whereas the purchased property of the defendant is separate and different from the suit property of the plantiff. The case is pending for framing of issues.
- 14.8 The Company has filed a suit against M/s. Sitara Textiles Limited for financial loss, cost of sales loss, loss of business and loss due to breach of contract for Rs. 37.67 million. Company is hopeful of settlement of the case in its favour.



- 14.9 The Company has filed a suit against M/s. Nazeer Autos etc. for possession with permanent injunctions of property purchased by the Company, situated at Aik Moria Pull, Lahore. The case is pending for written statements and the Company is hopeful for settlement in its favour.
- 14.10 The Company had preferred appeal before the Commissioner (Appeals) II, Lahore assailing the ex-parte order passed in terms of Section 161/205 of the Income Tax Ordinance, 2001. The order had burdened the Company with the tax demand of Rs. 44.180 million. The Commissioner has set aside the order for denovo proceedings.
- 14.11 "The Bank of Punjab has instituted a suit for the recovery of amounts aggregating Rs. 494.400 million bearing C.O.S 8/2011. The Company has also instituted leave application in the aforesaid suit. Based on the legal opinion, the Company feels that, after institution of the suit, a financial institution is only entitled to cost of funds if so awarded by the Court in any decree which may be passed by the Court. Therefore, the Company has not accrued any cost of funds/interest on the said outstanding balance.

36.1 Financial risk factors

The Company has exposures to the following risks from its use of financial instruments:

Credit risk

Liquidity risk

Market risk (Currency risk, Other price risk and Interest rate risk)

The Board of Directors has overall responsibility for the establishment and oversight of Company's risk management framework. The Board is also responsible for developing and monitoring the Company's risk management policies.

Concentration and management of credit risk

Credit risk represents the accounting loss that would be recognized at the reporting date if counter parties fail completely to perform as contracted.

Credit risk from cash and cash equivalents, derivative financial instruments and deposits with banks and financial institution, as well as credit exposures to customers, including trade receivables and committed transactions. Out of total financial assets of Rs. 442.178 million (2010: Rs. 420.818 million), the financial assets that are subject to credit risk amounted to Rs. 439.173 million (2010: Rs.417.519 million).

For trade receivables, internal risk assessments process determines the credit quality of the customer, taking into account its financial position, past experience and other factors. Individual risk limits are set based on internal and external ratings in accordance with the limits set by the management. The utilization of credit limit is regularly monitored. Accordingly, the credit risk is minimal and the Company also believes that it is not exposed to major concentration of credit risk.

Concentration of the credit risk arises when the number of counter parties engaged in similar business activities or have similar economic features that would cause their abilities to meet contractual obligation to be similarly effected by the changes in economic, political or other conditions. The Company believes that it is not exposed to major concentration risk.

The Company monitors the credit quality of the financial assets with reference to the historical performance of such assets and available external credit ratings. The carrying value of financial assets which are neither past due nor impaired are as under:

36.2 Capital risk management

"The Company's objectives when managing capital are to safeguard the entity's ability to continue as a going concern, so that it can continue to provide adequate returns for shareholders and benefits for other stakeholders; and to maintain a strong capital base to support the sustained development of its businesses.

The Company manages its capital structure which comprises capital and reserves by monitoring return on net assets and makes adjustments to it in the light of changes in economic conditions. In order to maintain or adjust the capital structure, the Company may adjust the amount of dividend paid to shareholders, appropriation of amounts to capital reserves or/and issue new shares, as the case may be."



Consistent with others in the industry, the Company manages its capital risk by monitoring its debt levels and liquid assets and keeping in view future investment requirements and expectations of the shareholders. Debt is calculated as total borrowings ("long term financing" and "short term borrowings" as shown in the balance sheet). Total capital comprises shareholders' equity as shown in the balance sheet under "share capital and reserves" and net debt.
