FUND MANAGER'S REPORT

AKD INDEX TRACKER FUND PERFORMANCE

AKD Index Tracker Fund posted a return of 30.39% against KSE-100 return of 35.74%. The tracking error of the fund remained within the prescribed range mentioned in the Offering Documents. Despite the above AKDITF was ranked as the 2nd best performing open-end equity fund in FY10.

During the year under review the Fund was re-composed twice, first in October 2009 and subsequently in April 2010. A number of changes were made to reflect the Index. However, the re-composition was intensive in April partially due to introduction of new sector classification by KSE. In the second re-composition, the Investment Committee also expanded the Index coverage of the Fund to meet regulatory requirements. Although, this has increased the liquidity risk of the Fund, the Committee has managed to mitigate the risk by selectively investing more in liquid securities. The focus of the Investment Committee through out the year has been on striving to reduce the tracking error of AKDITF.

The performance of AKDITF shows that once an investor has taken the asset allocation decision to obtain exposure to listed stocks, the Index Tracker Fund is a good, low cost vehicle to invest in without worrying about fund manager strategy, style or competence.

Given the recently attractive broad market valuations with forward PER of less than 8x and price to book of just under 1.5x, along with expected dividend yield of 8%, the Investment Committee believes that exposure to equities may hold investors in good stead over a twelve month investment horizon. True, the full upside potential of equities may be some what capped in the near term due to elevated macro level uncertainties and high interest rates. At the same time, for longer term investors, being completely out from equities may lead to higher opportunity cost than retaining a small exposure to this asset class. It should be noted that over a 20 year period, Pakistan equities have provided a return of over 17% p.a. despite year-on-year volatility as the country went through a series of political and economic crisis. In this regard, keeping some exposure to AKD Index Tracker Fund may prove rewarding.

DISTRIBUTION FOR THE YEAR

The Board has approved a bonus of Rs.1.40 per unit, 22.05% on the opening NAV and 14% of the par value of Rs.10.00 for FY10.

STATEMENT OF COMPLIANCE WITH THE BEST PRACTICES

OF THE CODE OF CORPORATE GOVERNANCE

This statement is being presented by the Board of Directors of AKD Investment Management Limited (Company), the Management Company of the AKD Index Tracker Fund (Fund) to comply with the Code of Corporate Governance as contained in Chapter XI of the listing regulations of the Karachi Stock Exchange for the purpose of establishing a framework of good governance, whereby a listed company is managed in compliance with the best practices of corporate governance.

The Management Company has applied the principles contained in the Code of Corporate Governance as follows:

- 1) The Management Company encourages representation of independent non-executive directors. At present the Board has three independent non-executive directors.
- 2) The directors have confirmed that none of them is serving as a director in more than ten listed companies, including this Company.
- 3) All the resident directors of the Management Company are registered as taxpayers and none of them has defaulted in payment of any loan to a banking company, a DFI or an NBFI or, being member of stock exchange, has been declared as a defaulter by such stock exchange.
- 4) During the year two casual vacancies occurred in the Board which were filled up by the Board within 30 days thereof.
- 5) The Management Company has prepared a 'Statement of Ethics and Business Practices' which has been signed by all the directors and employees of the company.
- 6) The Board has developed a vision and mission statement, overall corporate strategy and significant policies of the Fund. A complete record of particulars of significant policies along with dates on which they were approved or amended has been maintained.
- 7) All the powers of the Board have been duly exercised and decisions on material transactions, including appointment, remuneration and terms and conditions of employment of the Chief Executive Officer (CEO) have been taken by the Board.
- 8) No new appointment of CFO and Company Secretary has been made during the year.
- 9) The meetings of the Board were presided over by the Chairman and, in his absence, by a director elected by the Board for this purpose. Written notices of the Board Meetings along with agenda and working papers were circulated at least seven days before the meetings. The minutes of the meetings were appropriately recorded and circulated.
- 10) The Directors have been provided with the copies of the NBFC (Establishment and Regulation) Rules, 2003, Non-Banking Finance Companies and Notified Entities Regulations, 2008, Companies Ordinance 1984, Listing Regulations, Code of Corporate Governance, Prudential Regulations, Company's Memorandum and Articles of Association and all other relevant rules and regulations and hence are conversant with the relevant laws applicable to the company and the funds and are aware of their duties and responsibilities.
- 11) The Directors' Report for the year ended June 30, 2010 has been prepared in compliance with the requirements of the Code of Corporate Governance and fully describes the salient matters required to be disclosed.

- 12) The financial statements of the Fund were duly signed by the CEO and CFO before approval of the Board.
- 13) The Directors, CEO and executives do not hold any interest in the units of the Fund other than that disclosed in the pattern of unit holding.
- 14) The Management Company has complied with all the corporate and financial reporting framework requirements of the Code.
- 15) The Board has formed an audit committee. It comprises of three members, all of whom are non-executive directors including the Chairman of the committee.
- 16) The meetings of the audit committee were held at least once every quarter prior to approval of interim and final results of the Fund as required by the Code. The terms of reference of the committee have been formed and advised to the committee for compliance.
- 17) The Management Company has outsourced the internal audit function of the Company to M/s Ford Rhodes Sidat Hyder & Co. Chartered Accountants, who are considered suitably qualified and experienced for the purpose and are well conversant with the policies and procedures of the Fund.
- 18) The statutory auditors of the Fund have confirmed that they have been given a satisfactory rating under the quality control review program of the Institute of Chartered Accountants of Pakistan, that they or any of the partners of the firm, their spouses and minor children do not hold units of the Fund and that the firm and all its partners are in compliance with International Federation of Accountants (IFAC) guidelines on code of ethics as adopted by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of Pakistan.
- 19) The statutory auditors or the persons associated with them have not been appointed to provide other services except in accordance with the listing regulations and the auditors have confirmed that they have observed IFAC guidelines in this regard.
- 20) The related party transactions have been placed before the audit committee and approved by the Board of Directors with necessary justification for non arm's length transactions. Majority of the related party transactions of the Fund are governed under the Non-Banking Finance Companies and Notified Entities Regulations, 2008 and the transactions which are not governed under the said regulations are carried at arm's length prices.
- 21) We confirm that all other material principles contained in the Code have been complied with.

NOTES TO AND FORMING PART OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED JUNE 30, 2010

1. LEGAL STATUS AND NATURE OF BUSINESS

- 1.1 AKD Index Tracker Fund (The Fund) was established under a Trust Deed executed between AKD Investment Management Limited (AKDIML) as Asset Management Company and Central Depository Company of Pakistan Limited (CDC) as Trustee. The Trust Deed was executed on May 02, 2007 and was approved by the Securities and Exchange Commission of Pakistan (SECP) on April 12, 2007 in accordance with the Non-Banking Finance Companies (Establishment and Regulation) Rules, 2003 (the NBFC Rules).
- 1.2 The Management Company of the Fund has obtained a license to act as an Asset Management Company under the NBFC Rules from SECP. Registered office of the Management Company is situated at Continental Trade Centre, Block-8, Clifton, Karachi, in the province of Sind.
- **1.3** It is an open-ended mutual fund and is listed on the Karachi Stock Exchange. Its units are offered for public subscription on a continuous basis. The units are transferable and can be redeemed by surrendering the same to the Fund.
- **1.4** The objective of the Fund is to invest in the market according to the weightage prescribed by the Karachi Stock Exchange in KSE-100 index, eliminating specific sector/stock risk, reliance on market timings and Fund Manager's performance.
- 1.5 Title to the assets of the Fund are held in the name of CDC as a trustee of the Fund.
- **1.6** Management Quality rating of 'AM3' has been assigned to Management Company by JCR-VIS Credit Rating Company Limited on September 14, 2010. Due to specialised nature of the Fund, performance ranking of the Fund is not taken, as the comparable benchmark is not available.

2. STATEMENT OF COMPLIANCE

2.1 These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with requirements of Non-Banking Finance Companies and Notified Entities Regulations, 2008 (the NBFC Regulations), Non-Banking Finance Companies (Establishment and Regulation) Rules 2003 (the NBFC Rules), the Trust Deed, the Companies Ordinance, 1984 (the Ordinance), directives issued by the Securities and Exchange Commission of Pakistan (SECP) and approved accounting standards as applicable in Pakistan. Approved accounting standards comprise of such International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRSs) as are notified under the provisions of the Ordinance. Wherever, the requirements of the NBFC Rules, the NBFC Regulations, the Ordinance or directives issued by SECP differ with the requirements of these standards, the requirements of the NBFC Rules, the NBFC Regulations, the Ordinance and the said directives issued by SECP shall prevail.

2.2 Adoption of new International Financial Reporting Standards

IAS 1 (Revised), 'Presentation of financial statements' is effective from July 1, 2009. The revised standard prohibits the presentation of items of income and expenses (i.e., 'nonowner changes in equity') in the statement of changes in equity, requiring 'non-owner changes in equity' to be presented separately from owner changes in equity. All nonowner changes in equity are required to be shown in a performance statement, but entities can choose whether to present one performance statement (the statement of comprehensive income) or two statements (the income statement and statement of comprehensive income). The Fund has applied IAS 1 (revised) from July 1, 2009 and has adopted to present two statements.

The change in presentation has not effected the value of the net assets of the Fund for either the current or any of the prior periods and hence a restated balance sheet has not been presented.

IFRS 8, 'Operating segments' is effective from 1 January 2009. IFRS 8 replaces IAS 14, 'Segment reporting'. The new standard requires a 'management approach', under which segment information is presented on the same basis as that used for internal reporting purposes. The segment information is therefore reported in a manner that is more consistent with the internal reporting provided to the chief operating decision-maker. The Investment Committee of the Management Company has been identified as the chief operating decision-maker, which is responsible for allocating resources and assessing performance of the operating segment.

The Investment Committee is responsible for the Fund's entire portfolio and considers the Fund to have a single operating segment. The Investment Committee asset allocation decisions are based on a single, targeted investment strategy, and the Fund's performance is evaluated on an overall basis.

The internal reporting provided to the Investment Committee for the Fund's assets, liabilities and performance is prepared on a consistent basis with the measurement and recognition principles of IFRSs. The Fund has no assets classified as non-current assets.

The Fund is domiciled in Pakistan. All of the Fund's income is from investments in entities incorporated in Pakistan.

2.3 Standards and Interpretations adopted with no effect on the financial statements

The following new and revised Standards and Interpretations have also been adopted in these financial statements. Their adoption has no significant impact on the amounts reported in these financial statements but may affect the accounting for future transactions or arrangements.

3. BASIS OF PREPARATION

3.1 Accounting convention

These financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, except for investment - available for sale, which are stated at fair value.

3.2 Functional and presentation currency

These financial statements are presented in Pak Rupees, which is the functional and presentation currency of the Fund.

3.3 Critical accounting estimates and judgments

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with approved accounting standards requires the use of certain critical accounting estimates. It also requires the management to exercise its judgment in the process of applying the Fund's accounting policies. Estimates and judgments are continually evaluated and are based on historical experience, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

The significant area where judgments were made by the management in the application of accounting policies relate to classification and measurement of its investment portfolio as disclosed in notes 4.1 and 5 of these financial statements.

4. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

4.1 Investment

All purchases and sale of securities that require delivery within the time frame established by regulation or market convention are recognised at the trade date. Trade date is the date on which the Fund commits to purchase or sell the asset. The management company determines the appropriate classification of the Fund's investment in accordance with the requirement of International Accounting Standard (IAS) 39 'Financial Instruments: Recognition and Measurement', at the time of purchase. Investment of the Fund are categorised as follows:

a) Financial assets at fair value through profit or loss - Held for trading

Investments that are acquired principally for the purpose of generating profit from short-term fluctuations in prices are classified as "fair value through profit or loss - held for trading". These investments are initially recognised at fair value which is the quoted bid price at stock exchange at the date when the Fund commits to purchase the investments and the transaction cost associated with the investments are taken directly to the income statement. Subsequent to initial recognition, these investments are marked to market using the closing market rates and are carried on the statement of assets and liabilities at fair value. The fair value of financial instrument traded in an active market is based on quoted market prices. Net gains and losses arising on changes in fair value of these investments are taken to income statement in the period in which they arise.

b) Available for sale

Available for sale financial assets are non-derivatives that are either designated in this category or are not classified as at fair value through profit or loss, loans and receivable or held to maturity. These financial assets are intended to held for an indefinite period of time which may be sold in response to need for liquidity or changes in prices. These are initially measured at fair value which is the quoted bid price at stock exchange at the date when the Fund commits to purchase the investment plus transaction costs that are directly attributable to the acquisition of the investments. Subsequent to initial recognition, 'available for sale' investments are measured at fair value. Net gains and losses arising on changes in fair values of these investments are taken to equity until the available for sale investment is derecognised. At this time, the cumulative gain or loss previously recognised directly in equity is transferred to the income statement.

4.2 Derecognition

All investments are de-recognised when the rights to receive cash flows from the investments have expired or have been transferred and either (a) the Company has transferred substantially all risks and rewards of ownership or (b) the Company has neither transferred nor retained substantially all risks and rewards of the asset, but has transferred the control of the asset.

4.3 Derivatives Financial Instruments

Derivatives instruments held by the Fund generally comprise of unpaid right letter. These are initially measured at fair value. The fair value of a derivative is based on quoted bid price of Stock Exchange ruling at the balance sheet date. Subsequently, the resultant gain or loss on remeasurement of value of derivative financial instrument is recognised in income statement.

Derivative financial instrument entered into by the Fund do not meet the hedging criteria as defined by International Accounting Standard - 39, Recognition and Measurement of Financial Instrument (IAS-39), consequently hedge accounting is not used by the Fund.

4.4 Issue and redemption of units

Units are issued at the offer price prevalent at the end of the day in which the units are issued. The offer price represents the net asset value of units at the end of the day plus the allowable sales load and such sum shall be adjusted upward to the nearest one paisa. The sales load is payable to the distribution company and the management company as processing fee. Issue of units is recorded on acceptance of application for sale.

Units redeemed are recorded at the redemption price prevailing at the end of the day in which the units are redeemed. The redemption price represents the net assets value at the end of the day and shall be adjusted downwards to the nearest one paisa. Redemption of units is recorded on acceptance of application for redemption.

4.5 Element of income and capital gains included in prices of units sold less those in units redeemed

To prevent the dilution of per unit income and distribution of income already paid out on redemption as dividend, an equalization account called "element of income and capital gains in prices of units sold less those in units redeemed" is created.

The "Element of income and capital gain in prices of units sold less those in units redeemed" account is credited with the amount representing net income and capital gain accounted for in the last announced net assets value and included in the sale proceeds of units. Upon redemption of units, the "element of income and capital gains in prices of units sold less those in units redeemed" account is debited with the amount representing net income and capital gains accounted for in the last announced net asset value and included in the redemption price.

The "Element of income and capital gain in prices of units sold less those in units redeemed" during an accounting period is transferred to the income statement, while the portion of the element of income / (loss) and capital gains / (losses) that relates to unrealized gains / (losses) held by the Fund in unit Holders' Fund is recorded in a separate account and any amount remaining in this reserve account at the end of an accounting period (whether gain or loss) is included in the amount available for distribution to unit holders.

4.6 Payables and accruals

Payables and accruals are carried at cost which is the fair value of the consideration to be paid in the future for the services received, whether billed or not to the Fund.

4.7 Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the Fund has a present legal or constructive obligation as a result of past events and it is probable that an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation and a reliable estimate of the obligation can be made. Provisions are regularly reviewed and adjusted to reflect the current best estimate.

4.8 Net asset value per unit

The net asset value (NAV) per unit as disclosed in the statement of assets and liabilities of the Fund is calculated by dividing the net assets of the Fund by the number of units in issue at the year end.

4.9 Earnings per unit

Earnings per unit (EPU) has not been disclosed as in the opinion of the management determination of weighted average units for calculating EPU is not practicable.

4.10 Taxation

The charge for the current taxation is based on taxable income at the current rates of taxation after taking into account tax credits and tax rebates available, if any.

The Fund has not recognised any amount of deffered tax in these financial statements as the Fund intends to continue availing tax exemption in future years by distributing at least 90% of the accounting income for the year as reduced by capital gain, whether realised or unrealised to its unit holders every year.

4.11 Offsetting financial instruments

Financial assets and liabilities are only off set and the net amount is reported in the statement of assets and liabilities when there is a legally enforceable right to off set the recognised amounts and the Fund intends either to settle on a net basis, or realize the assets and settle the liabilities simultaneously.

4.12 Financial instruments

At the time of initial recognition, all financial assets and financial liabilities are measured at cost, which is the fair value of the consideration given or received for it. Transaction costs are included in the initial measurement of all financial assets and liabilities except for transaction costs incurred for the acquisition of investment classified as 'financial assets at fair value through profit or loss' and transaction costs that may be incurred on disposal which are charged as expense when incurred. The particular recognition method adopted for measurement of fianancial assets and financial liabilities subsequent to the initial recognition is disclosed in the individual policy statement associated with each item.

4.13 Impairment

Financial assets

The carrying amount of the Fund's assets are reviewed at each balance sheet date to determine whether there is any indication of impairment. If such indication exists, the assets recoverable amount is estimated. An impairment loss is recognised whenever the carrying amount of an asset exceeds its recoverable amount. Impairment losses are recognised in the income statement except as described below.

Available - for -sale financial invetsments

For available-for-sale financial investments, the company assesses at each balance sheet date whether there is objective evidence that an investment or a group of investments is impaired. In the case of equity investments classified as available-for-sale, objective evidence would include a significant or prolonged decline in the fair value of the investment below its cost. Where there is evidence of impairment, the cumulative loss - measured as the difference between the acquisition cost and the current fair value, less any impairment loss on that investment previously recognised in the income statement - is removed from equity and recognised in the profit and loss account. Impairment losses on equity investments are not reversed through the income statement; increases in their fair value after impairment are recognised directly in equity.

In the case of debt instruments classified as available-for-sale, impairment is assessed based on the same criteria as financial assets carried at amortised cost. Interest continues to be accrued at the original effective interest rate on the reduced carrying amount of the asset and is recorded as part of 'Interest and similar income'. If, in a subsequent year, the fair value of a debt instrument increases and the increase can be objectively related to an event occurring after the impairment loss was recognised in the income statement, the impairment loss is reversed through the profit and loss account.

4.14 Dividend distributions and appropriations

Dividend distributions and appropriations are recognised as liability in the period in which the distributions and appropriations are approved.

4.15 Revenue recognition

- Gains or losses arising on sale of investments are included in the income statement on the date at which the transaction takes place.
- Dividend income is recognised when the right to receive the dividend is established.
- Markup on bank deposits are recognised on time proportionate basis.
- Gains/ (losses) arising on revaluation of derivatives to the fair values are taken to income statement.

4.16 Cash and cash equivalents

For the purpose of cash flow statement, cash and cash equivalents comprise of balances with the banks in current accounts, saving accounts and other deposits with bank having original maturities of three months or less.

4.17 Preliminary expenses and floatation cost

Preliminary expenses and floatation costs represent expenditure incurred prior to the commencement of operations of the Fund, and are stated at cost less accumulated amortization. These expenses had to be amortized over a period of five years starting from the year 2005-2006, which has been amortized accordingly.

4.18 Conversion costs

Conversion costs represent expenditure incurred in connection with the conversion of AKDITF into an open end scheme and include fees paid to the SECP and other expenses. These costs are amortised over a period of five years begining from the year 2007-2008 as per clause 11.3 of the post conversion trust deed of the scheme.

12. WORKERS WELFARE FUND

Through the Finance Act, 2008 an amendment was made in section 2(f) of the Workers' Welfare Fund Ordinance 1971 (the WWF Ordinance) whereby the definition of 'Industrial Establishment' has been made applicable to any establishment to which West Pakistan Shops and Establishment Ordinance, 1969 applied. The Mutual Funds Association of Pakistan (MUFAP), on behalf of its members filed a constitutional petition in the High Court of Sindh (SHC) praying it to declare the funds are not establishments and as a result are not liable to pay contribution to the WWF. The honorable Court has rejected the petition on the technical grounds and stating that MUFAP is not the aggrieved party in this case and required the aggrieved parties to approach the courts for the said petition. In response, a petition has been filed with the honorable High Court of Sindh by some mutual funds through trustees alongwith few investors. However, subsequent to filing of the petition, the Ministry of Labour and Manpower issued into a letter which states that mutual funds are not liable to WWF. The clarification went on to state that WWF Ordinance 1971 does not have any provisions for the applicability of the WWF on those entities whose income are exempt from income tax under the provision of any law, and West Pakistan Shop and Establishment Ordinance, 1969 is not applicable to any public listed company and any organised financial institutions because they are ruled and governed by separate laws such as mutual funds.

The MUFAP, on behalf of its member AMCs, obtained a legal opinion to assess the implications of the letter issued by the Ministry of Labour and Manpower. The legal opinion, among other things, states that mutual funds are not required to provide for contribution to WWF and earlier provisioning, if any, can be reversed and the terms of the letter suggest that provisioning was neither required nor necessary. Further, opinion suggest that the petition filed with the High Court of Sindh be withdrawn.

However, on prudence basis, the management has made the provision of WWF in these financial statements.

13. CONTINGENCIES AND COMMITMENTS

There are no contingencies and commitments outstanding as at June 30, 2010 and June 30, 2009.

14. REMUNERATION TO MANAGEMENT COMPANY

Under the provisions of the NBFC Regulations, AKDIML is entitled to a remuneration, during the first five years of the Fund, of an amount not exceeding three percent of the average annual net assets of the Fund and thereafter of an amount equal to two percent of such assets of the Fund. AKDIML has charged its remuneration at the rate of 0.75 percent for the current year (2009: 0.75 percent).

19. TAXATION

The Fund is exempt from tax under clause 99 of Part 1 of Second Schedule to the Income Tax Ordinance, 2001 (the Ordinance), subject to the condition that not less than 90% of its accounting income for the year, as reduced by the capital gains whether realised or unrealised, is distributed amongst its unit holders.

The Fund is also exempt from the provisions of Section 113 (minimum tax) under Clause 11 of Part IV of the Second Schedule to the Income Tax Ordinance, 2001.

20. TRANSACTIONS WITH CONNECTED PERSONS / RELATED PARTIES

Connected person include AKD Investment Management Limited, being the asset management company of the Fund, Central Depository Company of Pakistan Limited being the trustee, Aqeel Karim Dhedhi Securities (Private) Limited, AKD Securities Limited, being the associated companies of AKDIML, other collective investment schemes managed by the management company and directors and officers of the management company and their connected persons.

Remuneration payable to the management company and trustee is determined in accordance with the provisions of the NBFC Regulations and Trust Deed respectively.

21. FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS AND RELATED DISCLOSURES

Financial Risk Management

The Fund financial assets comprises of bank balance, available for sale investments and security deposits that arrive directly from their operations. The funds principal financial liabilities comprises of remuneration payable to management company, trustee, annual fee payable to SECP, payable against redemption of units and unclaimed dividend.

The Fund's activities expose it to a variety of financial risks: market risk (including price risk and interest rate risk), credit risk and liquidity risk.

The Fund's overall risk management program seeks to maximize the returns derived for the level of risk to which Fund is exposed and seeks to minimize potential adverse effects on the Funds financial performance.

The management of risk is carried out by the investment manager under policies approved by the Board of Directors. The Board provides written principles for overall risk management, as well as written policies covering specific areas, such as interest rate risk, credit risk, market risk and the investment of excess liquidity etc.

The Fund uses different methods to measure and manage the various types of risks to which it is exposed, these are summarised below:

21.1 Market Risk Management

Market risk is the risk that the fair value or future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in market prices. Market risk comprises three types of risk: currency risk, interest rate risk and other price risk, such as equity risk. Financial instruments affected by market risk include loans and borrowings, deposits, available-for-sale investments, and derivative financial instruments.

a) Currency Risk

Currency risk is the risk that the fair value or future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in foreign exchange rates. The Fund, at present, is not exposed to any currency risk as its operations are geographically restricted to Pakistan and all transactions are carried out in Pak Rupees.

b) Interest Rate Risk Management

Interest rate risk is the risk that the fair value or future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in market interest rates. As the Fund has no significant interest-bearing assets, the Fund's income and operating cash flows are substantially independent of changes in market interest rates. The management company through investment committee monitors the Fund's overall interest rate sensitivity on periodic basis.

Interest Rate Sensitivity

The Fund only asset which exposed to interest rate risk is bank balance amounts to Rs. 1.843 million (2009: Rs 48.299 million), other assets amounts to Rs. 153.530 million (2009:Rs. 172.227 million) is not exposed to any interest rate risk. Further the Fund total liability amount to Rs 4.761 million (2009: Rs 6.054 million) is also not exposed to any interest rate risk.

c) Equity Price Risk Management

The Fund is exposed to equity securities price risk because of investments held by the Fund and classified on the balance sheet as 'available for sale' financial assets. To manage its price risk arising from investments in equity securities, the Fund diversifies its portfolio within the eligible weightage prescribed by the Karachi Stock Exchange in KSE-100 index tracking up to 85%. The Fund's constitutive document / regulations also limit individual equity securities to no more than 10% of net assets of the Fund, or issued capital of the investee company, whichever is lower, and sector exposure limit to 25% of net assets.

In case of 5% increase / decrease in KSE 100 index on June 30, 2010, other components of equity would increase / decrease by Rs. 4.8 million (2009: Rs 6.04 million) as a result of gains / losses on equity securities classified as available for sale.

The analysis is based on the assumption that the equity index had increased / decreased by 5% with all other variables held constant and all the Fund's equity instruments moved according to the historical correlation with the index. This represents management's best estimate of a reasonable possible shift in the KSE 100 Index, having regard to the historical volatility of the index. The composition of the Fund's investment portfolio and the correlation thereof to the KSE 100 index, is expected to change over time. Accordingly, the sensitivity analysis prepared as of June 30, 2010 is not necessarily indicative of the effect on the Fund's net assets of future movements in the level of the KSE 100 Index.

21.2 Credit Risk And Concentration Of Credit Risks

The Fund is exposed to credit risk, which is the risk that a counterparty will be unable to pay amounts in full when they fall due. Credit risk arises from deposits with banks and financial institutions, and credit exposures arising as a result of dividends receivable on equity securities. For banks and financial institutions, only reputed parties are accepted. Credit risk on dividend receivable is minimal due to statutory protection. All transactions in listed securities are settled / paid for upon delivery using the central clearing company. The risk of default is considered minimal due to inherent systematic measures taken therein.

The Company limits its exposure to credit risk by only investing in liquid securities and only with counterparties that have a good credit rating. Given these high credit ratings, management does not expect any counterparty to fail to meet its obligations .

The Fund enters into transactions with diverse credit worthy counter parties thereby mitigating any significant concentration of credit risk.

21.3 Liquidity Risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that an enterprise will encounter difficulty in raising funds to meet commitments associated with financial instruments. The management committee manages liquidity risk by following internal guidelines of the investment committee such as monitoring maturities of financial assets and financial liabiliities and investing in highly liquid financial assets. The Fund is not materially exposed to liquidity risk as all its obligations / commitments are short term in nature and are restricted to the extent of available liquidity and all assets of the Fund are readily disposable in the market.

Liquidity risk sensitivity

Company's contractual maturity for its non-derivative financial liabilities total amounting to Rs 4,761 million is non interest bearing and payable upto three months (2009: 3 months).

21.4 Fair value of financial instruments

Investments are carried at their fair values. The management company is of the view that the fair market value of most of the remaining financial assets and financial liabilities are not significantly different from their carrying values. Fair value is the amount for which an asset could be exchanged, or a liability settled, between knowledgeable willing parties in an arms length transaction other than in a forced or liquidation sale. The carrying values of all financial assets and liabilities reflected in the financial statements approximate their fair values.

The management company is of the view that the fair market value of most of the remaining financial assets and financial liabilities are not significantly different from their carrying values

22. Capital Risk Management

The Fund's capital is represented by redeemable units. They are entitled to dividend and to payment of a proportionate unit based on the Fund's net asset value per unit on the redemption date. The relevant movements are shown on the statement of movement in unit holders' fund. The Fund has no restrictions or specific capital requirements on the subscription and redemption of units. The Fund's objective when managing capital are to safeguard its ability to continue as a going concern in order to provide returns for unit holders and to maintain an optimal fund structure to reduce the cost of the Fund.
