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## INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT TO THE UNIT HOLDERS

#### REPORT ON THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of First Habib Income Fund (the Fund), which comprise the statement of assets and liabilities as at 30 June 2012 and the related statements of income, comprehensive income, distribution, cash flows and movement in unit holders' fund for the year then ended, and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory notes.

#### Management's responsibility for the financial statements

The Management Company of the Fund is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these inancial statements in accordance with the requirements of the Trust Deed, the Non-Banking Finance Companies (Establishment and Regulation) Rules, 2003 (the NBFC Rules), the Non-Banking Finance Companies and Notified Entitles Regulations) 2008 (the NBFC Regulations) and approved accounting standards as applicable in Pakistan. This responsibility includes: designing, implementing and maintaining internal centrol relevant to the preparation and rain presentation of financial statements that are from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error; selecting and applying appropriate accounting policies; and malking accounting estimates that are reasonable in the ricrumstances.

#### Auditors' responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards as applicable in Pasitian. Those standards require that we comply with ethical requirements and plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance whether the financial statements are free from material misstatements.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditors' judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, in making those risks assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

#### Opinion

In our opinion, the financial statements give a true and fair view of the state of the Fund's affairs as at 30 June 2012 and of Its financial performance, cash flows and transactions for the year then ended in accordance with approved accounting standards as applicable in Pakistan.

#### Other matters

The financial statements of the Fund for the year ended 30 June 2011 were audited by another firm of Chartered Accountants, whose report dated 6 October 2011 expressed an unqualified opinion thereon.

## 1. LEGAL STATUS AND NATURE OF BUSINESS

First Hahib Income Fund (the "Fund") was established under a Trust Deed executed between Habib Asset Management Limited (HAML), as Management Company and Central Depository Company of Pakistan Limited (CDC) as Trastee. The Trust Deed was executed on 8 September 2066 and was approved by the Securities and Exchange Commission of Pakistan (ESCP) on 3 August 2006 under Rule 67 of the Non-Banking Finance Companies (Eschildement and Regulation) Rules, 2010 (19BFC Rules).

The Management Company of the Fund has been licensed to undertake Asset Management Services as Non Banking. Finance Company under the NBFC Rules by the SECP. The registered office of the Management Company is situated at Imperial Court Building, Dr. Ziaudida Almonel Road Karachi, Pakistan.

The Fund is an open-end mutual fund and is listed on the Lahore Stock Exchange. Units are offered for public subscription on a continuous basis. Units are transferable and can be redeemed by surrendering them to the Fund at the option of the unit holder.

The Fund has been formed to provide reasonable rate of return consistent with reasonable concern for safety of principal amount to the unit holders, along with facility to join or leave the fund at their convenience. The management team would seek to enhance returns through active portfolio management using efficiency stools.

Pakistan Credit Rating Agency (PACRA) has assigned asset management rating of 'AM3 -' and "AA-(f)' to the Management Company and the Fund respectively.

The Fund invests in a diversified portfolio of term finance certificates, government securities, corporate debt securities, certificates of investments, term deposit receipts, continuous funding system and other money market instruments (including the clean placements). The Fund has been categorised as income scheme.

Title of the assets of the Fund are held in the name of CDC as a trustee of the Fund.

## 2. STATEMENT OF COMPLIANCE

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with approved accounting standards as applicable in Pakiann. Approved accounting standards comprise of mole International Financial Reporting Standards (IPRS) inseed by the International Accounting Standards Board as are notified under the Companies Ordinance, 1984, provisions of and directives Issued under the Companies Ordinance, 1984, requirements of Trust Dead, requirements of Non Busking Finance Companies and Nortified Standards (Establishment and Regulation) Rules, 2003 and Non-Busking Finance Companies and Nortified Entities Regulations, 2008. In east, requirements differ, the provisions and discretive of Companies Ordinance 1984, the requirements of Toust deed, Non Busking Finance Companies (Establishment and Regulation) Rules, 2003 and Non-Busking Finance Companies and Moetified Entities Regulations, 2008 shall presuit

#### 3. BASIS OF MEASUREMENT

These financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention except for investments and derivatives which are accounted for as stated in notes 4.2 and 4.3.

These financial statements have been presented in Pakistan Rupees which is the functional and presentation currency of the Fund.

#### SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The accounting policies adopted in the preparation of these financial statements have been consistently applied except as described in notes 4.1 and 4.7.

#### 4.1 New and amended standards and interpretations

During the year, following amendments, interpretations and improvements to the accounting standards became

- IFRS 7 Financial Instruments: Disclosures (Amendment)
- IAS 24 Related Party Disclosures (Revised)
- IFRIC 14 Prepayments of a Minimum Funding Requirement (Amendment)

In May 2010, International Accounting Standards Board (IASB) issued amendments to various standards primarily with a view to removing inconsistencies and clarifying wording. These improvements are listed below:

- IFRS 7 Financial Instruments: Disclosures Clarification of disclosures
- IAS 1 Presentation of Financial Statements Clarification of statement of changes in equity
- IAS 34 Interim Financial Reporting Significant events and transactions
- IFRIC 13 Customer Loyalty Programmes Fair value of award credits

The adoption of the above standards, amendments, interpretations and improvements did not have any material effect on the financial statements of the Fund.

#### 4.2 Financial instruments

The Fund classifles its financial instruments in the following categories:

a) Financial instruments at fair value through profit or loss

An instrument is classified at fair value through profit or loss if it is held-for-trading or is designated as such upon initial recognition. Financial instruments are designated at fair value through profit or loss if the Fund manages such investments and makes purchase and sale decisions based on their fair value in accordance with the Fund's documented risk management or investment strategy.

Financial assets which are acquired principally for the purpose of generating profit from short term price fluctuation or are part of the portfolio in which there is recent actual pattern of short term profit taking are classified as held for trading or a derivative.

Financial instruments at fair value through profit or loss are measured at fair value, and changes therein are recognised in Income Statement,

#### b) Available-for-sale

Available for sale financial assets are non-derivative that are either designated in this category or not classified in any other category.

## c) Loans and receivables originated by the enterprise

Loans and receivables are non-derivative financial assets with fixed or determinable payments that are not quoted in an active market, other than those classified by the Fund as 'at fair value through profit or loss' or 'available for sale'.

### d) Financial liabilities

Financial liabilities, other than those 'at fair value through profit or loss', are measured at amortised cost using the effective yield method.

#### Recognition

The Fund recognises financial assets and financial liabilities on the date it becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

All purchases and sales of securities that require delivery within the time frame established by regulation or market convention such as "T+2" purchases and sales are recognised at the trade date. Trade date is the date on which the Fund commits to purchase or set life assets.

Financial liabilities are not recognised unless one of the parties has performed its part of the contract or the contract is a derivative contract.

#### Measurement

Financial instruments measured initially as fair value (transaction price) plus, in case of a financial instrument and the control of the con

#### Basis of valuation of Term Finance Certificates (TFC's) / Debt Securities

The Fund's investment in term finance certificates and sukuk certificates are revuloed at the year end rates quoted by Mental Fund Association of Pakistan (MUFAP) in accordance with the circular no. I dated 6 January 2009. Further Circular no. 1 has provided the discretion to the asset management company to apply the mark up' mark down (within the available limits as prescribed in that circular) to the non-traded debt securities for their valuation. Application of discretionary mark up' mark down shall be approved by the Investment Committee (with proper written justification) and shall be reported on the same day to the Board of Directors (of AMC), MUFAP, SECP and the Trustees. The decision in relation to application of the discretionary mark up' mark down shall be radified by the Board of the AMC in the next meeting. Accordingly, the Fund has valued certain non-traded debt securities by spoohing the discretion which has been approved by the Board.

### Basis of valuation of Government Securities

The investment of the Fund in government securities are valued at their fair values (determined by reference to the quotations obtained from the PKRV rate sheet on the Reuters page), based on the remaining tenor of the security.

#### Impairment

A financial asset is assessed of each reporting date to determine whether there is any objective evidence that it is impaired. In case of investment in term finance certificates and other deht securities, the objective evidence of impairment is determined in accordance with the provisioning criteria for non-performing debt securities specified by the Securities and Exchange Commission of Pakistan (SECP) vide its Circular no. 1 of 2009 dated to Sanuary 2009 and the provisioning criteria / policy for non-performing exposures approved by the Board of Directors of the management company in accordance with the requirements of SECP communicated vide its Circular no. 13 of 2009 dated 4 May 2009.

The Fund's policy for provision against impaired debt securities essentially is the same as prescribed by the Securities and Exchange Commission of Polistant (SCEP) in its circular no. 16 (2009). However, provision in excess of the minimum requirements as prescribed by the SECP can be made by the Investment Committee after considering the absentive soldience of impairment.

In respect of the exposures other than those described by the said circular, it shall artininium follow the time hands as determined by the Board of Directors of the Measurement Company and as it mentioned in the Fund's provision policy, Fund the through the Company of the Co

In respect of other financial assets, at each balance sheet date an assessment is carried out to determine whether there is any objective evidence of impairment. The Financial assets are considered to be impaired if objective evidence indicates that one or more events have bad a negative effect on the estimated future cash flows of the asset individually significant financial assets are tested for impairment on an individual basis. The remaining financial assets are assets of collectively in account that that is utilized reself in the factoristics.

Impairment losses are recognised in the income statement currently.

#### Derecognition

The Fund derecognises a financial asset when the contractual right to the cash flows from the financial asset expires or it transfers the financial asset and the transfer qualifies for deregionition in accordance with International Accounting Standard 39-Financial Instruments; Recognition and Measurement.

A financial liability is derecognised when the obligation specified in the contract is discharged, cancelled or expired.

#### Offsetting of financial instruments

Financial assets and liabilities are offset and the net amount reported in the Statement of Assets and Liabilities when there is a legally enforceable right to set off the recognized amounts and there is an intention to settle on a net basis, or to realise the assets and settle the liabilities simultaneously.

#### 4.3 Derivative financial instruments

Derivative instruments that are held by the Fund primarily comprise of futures contracts in the capital market and see classified in held for trading investments, subcategory under investment at fair value through profit or loss. These are measured initially and of each subsequent measurement at their fair values which is calculated as being the set difference between the contract price and the closing price reported on the primary exchange of the futures contract. #### 4.5 Unit holders' fund

Unit holders' fund representing the units issued by the Fund, is carried at the net assets value representing the investors' right to a residual interest in the Fund's assets.

## 4.6 Issue and redemption of units

Units issued are recorded at the net assets value, determined by the Management Company for the applications received during business hours on that day. Allotment of units is recorded on acceptance of application and units are issued upon realization of the proceeds in the Fund's bank account.

Units redeemed are recorded at the net assets value, applicable on units for which the management company receives redemption applications during business hours on that day. Redemption of units is recorded on acceptance of application for redemption.

#### 4.7 Element of income / (loss) and capital gains / (losses) included in prices of units issued less those in units redeemed

An equalisation account called the element of income / (loss) and capital gains / (losses) included in prices of units issued less those in units redeemed is created, in order to prevent the dilution of per unit income and distribution of income already read out on redeemation.

During the year, the Fund has revised the method of computation of the Element. As per revised method, the Element is arrived at by comparing the unit prices with opening Ex - NAV at the beginning of the financial year. The Element zo computed is recognised in the income statement except to the extent that the amount represented by surrealised appreciation I distinutation arising on available for sale securities is included in distribution statement. Previously, the fruit uses to calculate the Element by comparing unit prices with the face value of the units.

The revised methodology, in opinion of the management, would ensure that the continuing unit holders' share of undistributed income remains unchanged on issue and redemption of units. Since the element is at equalisation account between income for the period and undistributed income, the change did not have any impact on Pet Asset Value (NAV) of the Fund. Half the methodology not been changed, the net income for the year ended June 30, 2012 would have been lower by Rs.141,362.

#### 4.8 Net asset value - per unit

The net asset value per unit disclosed in the Statement of Assets and Liabilities is calculated by dividing the net assets of the Fund by the number of units in issue at the year end.

#### 4.9 Taxation

The income of the Fund is exempt from income tax under clause 99 of Part I of the Second Schodule to the Income Tax Ordinance, 2001 subject to the condition that not less than ninety percent of its accounting income of that year, as reduced by explatal gains, whether realised or unrealised, is distributed amongst the Fund's unit bolders.

The Fund intends to continue availing the tax exemption in future years by distributing at least ninety percent of its accounting income for the year as reduced by capital gains, whether realised or unrealised, to its unit holders every year. Accordingly, no tax liability or deferred tax has been recognised in these financial statements.

### 4.10 Revenue recognition

- Gains / (losses) arising on sale of investments are included in the Income Statement on the date 'at which the transaction takes place.
- Unrealised gains / (losses) arising on revaluation of investments classified as financial assets at fair value through profit or loss are included in the Income Statement in the period in which they arise.
- Unrealised gains / (losses) arising on the revaluation of derivatives to fair value are taken to the Income Statement in the period in which they arise.
- Income on reverse repurchase transactions, continuous funding system, term finance certificates, clean placements and government securities is recognised on no accrual basis using the effective interest rate method.
- Profit on bank deposit is recognised on time proportion basis taking in to account effective yield.
- Element of income / (loss) and capital gains / (losses) included in prices of units issued less those in units redeemed is included in the Income Statement on the date of issue and redemption of units.



#### 4.11 Expenses

All expenses including management fee, trustee fee and annual for of SECP are recognised in the income statement on an account basis.

#### 4.12 Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the Fund has a present legal or constructive obligation as a result of past events and it is probable that an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation and a reliable estimate of the obligation can be made. Provisions are regularly reviewed and adjusted to reflect the current best estimate.

#### 4.13 Preliminary expenses and floatation costs

Preliminary expenses and floatation costs represent expenditure incurred up to the close of Initial Public Offer (IPO) period of the Fund. These costs are being senortised over a period of five years commencing from 2 June 2007 as per the Trust Deed of the Fund.

### 4.14 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise of bank balances and term deposits receipts maturing with in three months. Cash equivalents are short term highly lequid investments that are readily convertible to home monutes of each, are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value, and are held for the purpose of meeting short term cash commitments rather than for investments and other purposes.

#### 4.15 Other assets

Other assets are stated at cost less impairment losses, if any.

#### 4.16 Dividend distributions and appropriations

Dividends distributions (including boxus units) decised subsequent to the balance sheet date are recorded in the period in which the distributions are approved. As per Regulation 63 of the Non Banking Finance Companies and Notified Entities Regulations, 2008, the Fund is required to distribute 90% of the set accounting income, excluding unrealised capital gains, to the unit holders.

### 5. ACCOUNTING ESTIMATES AND JUDGMENTS

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with approved accounting standards as applicable in Pakistan requires management to make judgments, estimates and assumptions that affect the application of policies and reported amount of assets and liabilities, income and expenses. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and various other factors that are believed to be reacounts under the circumstances, the results of which form basis of making the judgments about the carrying values of assets and liabilities that are realily not appeared thom other sources. Actual results may differ from those sectionates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognized in the period in which the estimate is revised if the revision affects only that period, or in the period of its revision and future periods if the revision affects both current and future periods.

Judgments made by the management in the application of approved accounting standards, as applicable in Pakistan, that have significant effect on the financial statements and estimates with a significant risk of material judgment are discussed below:

#### Classification and fair value of investments

The Management Company has determined hir value of investments classified as 'at fair value through prefit or loss' by using rates quoted by Muthal Fland Association of Pakistan (MUFAP) in accordance with the circular no.1 dated 6. January. 2009. Further Circular no.1 has provided the discretion to the asset management company to apply the mark up mark chown (within the available limits as prescribed in that circular) to the non-traded debt securities for their valuation (refer not no. 4.2). Fair value estimates are made at a specific point in time, based on market conditions and information about the financial instruments. These estimates are subjective in nature and involve uncertainties and matter of judgements (e.g. valuation, interest rates, etc.) and therefore, can not be determined with precision.

#### Impairment of Investment

The Fund determines that investments are impaired when there has been a significant or prolonged decline in the fair value below its cost. The determination of what is significant or prolonged requires adaptement. In making this judgment, the Fund evaluates among other factors, the normal volatility in prices. In addition the impairment may be appropriate when there is an evidence of deterioration in the financial health of the invested industry and sector appropriate when differ and the difference could be mattered.

Other assets

Judgement is also involved in assessing the realisability of assets balances.

8.1.1.1 These term finance certificates (TFCs) are secured by first pari passu charge over all the present and future fixed assets of the company including land, building, plant and machinery with 25% margin.

These TFCs were classified as non-performing from 2 August 2009 by the Fund as the borrower could not pay the scheduled installments since 18 July 2009. The TFCs were restructured on 28 December 2010. However, the company was unable to pay quantetly installments due on 31 March and 30 June 2011 amounting to Rs. 16.822 million. Full provision amounting to Rs. 16.822 million has been made against these TFCs in accordance with provisioning policy of the Fund and circular 1 of 2009 dated 6 January 2009.

8.1.1.2 These Term Finance Certificates (TFCs) are secured by way of first exclusive charge on specific leases including lease rental and receivables against these leases with 25% margin.

The TFCs were restructured second time on 5.6 December 2011 and the company delayed in the payment of second restructured institutions to five TFCs. Therefore, the TFCs is classified as non performing by MUFAP as a 30 June 2012. The management has made a provision of Rs. 5.271 million in accordance with the provisioning policy of the fund and circular 01 of 2009 dated 05 January 2009.

The Management Company has charged its remuneration at the rate of one and a half percent per annum for the current year in accordance with the Trust Deed.

12.2 During the current year, an amount of Rs. 3.193 million (June 2011; Rs. Nil) was charged on account of sales tax on management fee levied through Sindh Sales Tax on Services Act, 2011.

## 15. WORKERS' WELFARE FUND

Through the Finance Act, 2008, an amendment was made in section 2(f) of the Worker's Welfare Fund Ordinance, 1971 (the WWF Ordinance) whereby the definition of Industrial Establishment has been made applicable to any establishment to which West Pakistan Shops and Establishment Amendment of Continuone, 1908 applicable to any establishment to which West Pakistan Shops and Establishment Ordinance, 1908 applies As a result of this amendment, it is alleged that all Collective Investment Scheme (CISOS) rentral, funds whose income exceeds Ro.5 million in a tax year have been brought within the zoope of the WWF Ordinance thus rendering them liable to pay contribution to WWF at the rate of two percent of their accounting or translate income, whichever is higher. In this regard, a constitutional petition has been filed by certain CISs through their trustees in the Honorable High Court of Sindh (the Court), challenging ble amelicability of WWF to the CISs, which is proming adjudication.

In August 2011, the Lahore High Court issued a judgment in response to a pelition in similar case whereby the amendments introduced in WWF Ordinance through Finance Acts, 2006 and 2008 have been declared unconstitutional and therefore struck down.

As the matter relating to levy of WWF is currently pending in the Court, the Management Company, as a matter of abundant caution, has decided to retain and continue with the provision for WWF announting to R. 1.1.851 million (30 June 2011; Rs. 9.246 million) in these financial statements. Had the provision not been made, the net asset value of the Fund would be higher by Rs 1.17 per unit (30 June 2011; Rs.0.92 per unit).

### 21. TAXATION

The Fund's income is exempt from Income Tax as per clause (99) of part I of the Second Schedule of the Income Tax Ordinance, 2001 subject to the condition that not less than 90% of the accounting income for the year as reduced by capital gains whether realised or unrealised is distributed amongst the unit holders. The Fund is also exempt from the provisions of section 113 (minimum tax) under clause II of Part IV of the Second Schedule to the Income Tax Ordinance, 2001.

No provision for taxation has been made in these financial statements as the Fund subsequent to the yearend, together with the interim distribution, distributed more than 90% of the accounting income for the year to avail exemption from tax as mentioned above. Details of distribution made are given in note 29 to these financial statements.

#### TRANSACTIONS WITH CONNECTED PERSONS 22.

## 23. FINANCIAL RISK MANAGEMENT

#### Introduction and overview

The Fund has exposure to following risks from its use of financial instruments:

- Credit Risk
- Liquidity Risk
- Market Risk

This note presents information about the Fund's exposure to each of the above risks, the Fund's objectives, policies and processes for measuring and managing risk, and the Fund's management of capital.

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### Risk management framework

The Fund's objective in managing risk is the creation and protection of unit holders' value. Risk is inherent in the Fund's activities, but it is managed through monitoring and controlling activities which are primarily set up based on limits established by the management company, Fund's constitutive documents and the regulations and directives of the SECP. These limits reflect the business strategy and market environment of the Fund as well as the level of the risk that Fund is willing to accept. The Board of Directors of the management company supervises the overall risk management approach within the Fund.

The Fund invests in a diversified portfolio of term finance certificates, government securities, corporate debt securities, certificates of investments, term deposit receipts, continuous funding system and other money market instruments (including the clean placements). Such investments are subject to varying decrees of risk.

The management of these risks is carried out by the Investment Committee (IC) under the policies and procedures approved by the Board, IC is constituted by the Board of Directors of the Management Company, IC is responsible to devise the investment strategy and manage the investment portfolio of the Fund in accordance with the limits prescribed and restrictions imposed in the Non-Banking Finance Companies and Notified Entities Regulations, 2008, Rules, and Constitutive Documents of the Fund in addition to the Fund's internal risk management policies.

### 23.1 Credit risk

Credit risk is the risk that a counterparty to a financial instrument will fail to discharge an obligation or commitment that it has entered into with the Fund, resulting in a financial loss to the Fund. At the yearend it arises principally from bank balances, investment in debt securities, income recievables and deposits.

Management of credit risk

The Fund's policy is to enter into financial contracts in accordance with the investment guidelines approved by the Investment Committee, its Trust Deed, the requirements of NBFC rules and regulations and guidelines given by SECF from time to time.

Credit risk is managed and controlled by the management company of the Fund in the following manner:

- Where the investment committee makes an investment decision, the credit rating and credit worthiness of the issuer is taken into account along with the financial background so as to minimise the risk of default.
- Investment transactions are carried out with a large number of brokers, whose credit rating is taken into account so as to minimise the risk of default and transactions are settled or paid for only upon delivery.
- The risk of counterparty exposure due to failed trades causing a loss to the Fund is mitigated by a periodic review of trade reports, credit ratings and financial statements on a regular basis. In addition, the investment Committee approves the trading of securities of entities with credit ratings approved by external rating agencies.

## Concentration of credit risk

Concentration of credit risk exists when changes in economic or industry factors affect groups of counterparties whose aggregate credit exposure is significant in relation to the Fund's total credit exposure. Around 67:92% of the Funds financial assets are in Government Securities which are not exposed to credit risk while the remaining portfolio of financial assets is broadly diversified and transactions are entered into with diverse credit-worthy counterparties thereby mitigating any significant concentrations of credit risk.

### Past due and impaired assets

None of the financial assets of the Fund are past due / impaired except as disclosed in notes 8.2.1. Movement in provision against impaired debts is given in the note 8.2.

#### Settlement risk

The Fund's activities may give rise to risk at the time of settlement of transactions. Settlement risk is the risk of loss due to the failure of an entity to honour its obligations to deliver cash, securities or other assets as contractually agreed.

For the vast majority of transactions the Fund mitigates this risk by conducting settlements through a broker to ensure that a trade is settled only when both parties have fulfilled their contractual settlement obligations.

## 23.2 Liquidity risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that the Fund will encounter difficulty in meeting obligations arising from its financial liabilities that are settled by delivering cash or another financial asset, or that such obligation will have to be settled in a manner disadvantageous to the Fund.

The Fund is exposed to cash redemptions of its units on a regular basis. Units are redeemable at the holder's option based on the Fund's net asset value per unit at the time of redemption calculated in accordance with the Fund's constitutive document and guidelines laid down by Securities and Exchange Commission of Pakistan (SECP).

## Management of Liquidity Risk

The Fund's policy is to manage this risk by investing majority of its assets in investments that are traded in an active market and can be readily disposed. The Fund invests primarily in marketable securities and other financial instruments, which under normal market conditions are readily convertible to cash. As a result, the Fund may be able to liquidate quickly its investments in these instruments at an amount close to their fair value to meet its liquidity requirement.

The Fund has the ability to borrow, with prior approval of trustee, for meeting redemption requests. The maximum amount available to the Fund from borrowings is limited to the extent of 15% of total assets at the time of borrowing with repayment with in 90 days of such borrowings. No such borrowings have arisen during the year.

In order to manage the Fund's overall liquidity, the Fund also has the ability to withhold daily redemption requests in excess of ten percent of the units in issue and such requests would be treated as redemption requests qualifying for being processed on the next business day. Such procedure would continue until the outstanding redemption requests come down to a level below ten percent of the units then in issue. The Fund did not withhold any redemptions during the year.

### Maturity analysis of financial liabilities

The table below analyses the Fund's financial liabilities into relevant maturity groupings based on the remaining period at the balance sheet date to the contractual maturity date. The amounts in the table are the contractual undiscounted cash flows.

## 23.3 Market risk

Market risk is the risk that the Fund's income or value of the financial instrument may fluctuate as a result of changes in market interest rates or the market price of securities due to a change in credit rating of the issuer or the instrument, change in market sentiments, speculative activities, supply and depended of securities and liquidity in the market.

### Management of market risks

The Management Company manages market risk by monitoring exposure on marketable securities by following the internal risk management policies and investment guidelines approved by the Investment Committee of Management Company and regulations laid down by the Securities and Exchange Commission of Pakistan (SECP). The maximum risk resulting from financial instruments equals their fair value.

Market risk comprises of three types of risk: currency risk, interest rate risk and other price risk. Fund is exposed to interest rate risk only.

#### Interest rate risk

Interest rate risk is the risk that the fair value or future each flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in market interest rates. Majority of the interest rate exposure arises on investment in Government Securities, certain Term Finance Certificates, Term Deposit Receipts. Certificate of Investments, clean placements and profit and loss sharing bank balances. The Fund carries an mix of fixed and floating rate financial instruments. Turnetly the exposure in fixed rate instruments is in Government securities and Term finance certificates. To enhance the earning potential of the Fund, the Fund invests in variable rate instruments as most of the instruments currently variable or a regular basis and alters the portfolio mix of fixed and floating rate securities. Other risk management procedures are the same as those mentioned in the credit risk management.

## a) Cash flow Sensitivity analysis for variable rate instruments

In case of change of 100 basis points in KIBOR on 30 June 2012, the net assets of the Fund would have been lower/higher by Rs 1.064 million (2011: Rs. 0.032 million) with consequential effect on net income for the year. The analysis assumes that all other variables remain constant.

## b) Fair value Sensitivity analysis for fixed rate instruments

As at 30 June 2012, investment in Government Securities and one term finance certificate carry fixed interest rate that exposes the Fund to fair value interest rate risk. In case of 100 basis points increase; / decrease in PKRV on 30 June 2012, the net assets of the Fund would have been lower higher by Rs.1.088 million (2011: Rs. 3.134 million) with consequential effect on net income for the year. The analysis assumes that all other variables remain constant.

The composition of the Fund's investment portfolio, KIBOR rates and yield matrix calculated by MUFAP is expected to change over time. Accordingly, the sensitivity analysis prepared as of 30 June 2012 is not necessarily indicative of the effect on the Fund's net assets of future movements in interest rates.

## 23.4 Unit Holders' Fund risk management

Management's objective when managing unit holders' funds is to safe guard the Fund's ability to continue as a going concern so that it can continue to provide optimum returns to its unit holders' and to ensure reasonable safety of unit holders' funds.

The Management Company manages Fund's investment portfolio and other assets by monitoring return on net assets and makes adjustments to it in the light of changes in markets' conditions. The unit holders' funds structure depends on the issuance and redemption of units.

## 24. FAIR VALUE OF FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS

The Fund's accounting policy on fair value measurements is discussed in note 4.2.

## Fair Value Hierarchy

The Fund measures fair values using the following fair value hierarchy that reflects the significance of the inputs used in making the measurements:

Level 1: Fair value measurements using quoted prices (unadjusted) in active markets for identical assets or liabilities.

Level 2: Fair value measurements using inputs other than quoted prices included within Level 1 that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly (i.e. as prices) or indirectly (i.e. derived from prices).

Level 3: Fair value measurements using inputs for the asset or liability that are not based on observable market data (i.e. unobservable inputs).

#### REPORT ON THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of First Habib Stock Fund (the Fund), which comprise that statement of a seasts and liabilities as at 30 June 2012 and the related statements of income, comprehensive income, distribution, cash flows and movement in unit holders' fund for the year then ended, and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory notes.

#### Management's responsibility for the financial statements

The Management Company of the Fund is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with the requirements of the Trust Deed, the Non-Banking Finance Companies (Establishment and Requiation) Rules, 2003 (the NBFC Rules), the Non-Banking Finance Companies and Notified Entitles Regulations 2008 (the NBFC Regulations) and approved accounting standards as applicable in Pakistan. #### 1. LEGAL STATUS AND NATURE OF BUSINESS

First Habib Stock Fund (the "Fund") was citablished under a Trust Deed executed between Habib Asset Management Limited (HAML) as Management Company and Central Depository Company of Pakistan Limited (CDC) as Trustee. The Trust Deed was executed on 21 August 2008 and was approved by the Securities and Exchange Commission of Pakistan (SECP) on 11 August 2008 under Rule 67 of the Non-Banking Finance Companies (Establishment and Regulation) Rules, 2001 (SIPE Rules).

The Management Company of the Fand has been licensed to undertake Asset Management Services as Non Banking Finance Company under the NBFC Rules by the SECP. The registered office of the management company is situated at Imperial Court Building, Dr. Ziauddin Ahmed Road Kareth; Pakistan.

The Fund is an open-end mutual fund and is listed on the Lahore Stock Exchange. Units are offered for public subscription on a continuous basis. Units are transferable and can be redeemed by surrendering them to the Fund at the option of the unit holder.

Pakistan Credit Rating Agency (PACRA) has assigned asset management rating of 'AM3 -' to the Management Company and a performance ranking of 'MFR 2-Star' to the Fund.

The Fund has been formed to provide reasonable rate of return consistent with reasonable concern for sufety of principal amount to the unit holders, along with facility to join or leave the fund at their convenience. The management team would seek to enhance returns through active portfolio management using efficiency tools.

The policy of the fund is to invest in equity securities of listed companies, cash and near cash instrument. The Fund has been categorized as equity scheme.

Title of the assets of the Fund are held in the name of CDC as a trustee of the Fund.

#### 2. STATEMENT OF COMPLIANCE

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with approved accounting standards as applicable in Pakistina. Approved accounting standards comprise of such Intensational Financial Reporting Standards (IFRS) issued by the Intensational Accounting Standards Board as are notified under the Companies Ordinance, 1944, provisions of and directives issued under the Companies Ordinance, 1984, requirements of Non Barking Finance Companies (Establishment and Regulation) Rules, 2003 and Non-Barking Finance Companies (Establishment and Regulations) 1984, the requirements of Trust deep, Non Barking Finance Companies (Establishment and Regulation) Rules, 2003 and Non-Barking Finance Companies Ordinance 1984, the requirements of Trust deep, Non Barking Finance Companies (Establishment and Regulation) Rules, 2003, and Non - Barking Finance Companies and Notified Entities Regulation, 2008 Shall prevail.

#### 3. BASIS OF MEASUREMENT

These financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, except that investments classified as 'at fair value through profit or loss' which are measured at fair value.

These financial statements are presented in Pakistani Rupees which is the functional and presentation currency of the Fund and rounded to the nearest thousand rupees.

#### 4. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The accounting policies adopted in the preparation of these financial statements have been consistently applied except as described in notes 4.1 and 4.5.

#### 4.1 New and amended standards and interpretations

During the year, following amendments, interpretations and improvements to the accounting standards became effective:

- · IFRS 7 Financial Instruments: Disclosures (Amendment)
- IAS 24 Related Party Disclosures (Revised)
- IFRIC 14 Prepayments of a Minimum Funding Requirement (Amendment)

In May 2010, International Accounting Standards Board (IASB) issued amendments to various standards primarily with a view to removing inconsistencies and clarifying wording. These improvements are listed below:

- IFRS 7 Financial Instruments: Disclosures Clarification of disclosures
- IAS 1 Presentation of Financial Statements Clarification of statement of changes in equity
- IAS 34 Interim Financial Reporting Significant events and transactions
- IFRIC 13 Customer Loyalty Programmes Fair value of award credits

The adoption of the above standards, amendments, interpretations and improvements did not have any material effect on the financial statements of the Fund.

#### 4.2 Financial instruments

The Fund classifies its financial instruments in the following categories:

a) Financial instruments at fair value through profit or loss

An instrument is classified at fair value through profit or loss if it is held-for-trading or is designated as such upon initial recognition. Financial instruments are designated at fair value through profit or loss if the Fund manager such investments and makes purchase and sale decisions based on their fair value in accordance with the Fund's documented risk management or investment strategy.

Financial assets which are acquired principally for the purpose of generating profit from short term price fluctuation or are part of the portfolio in which there is recent actual pattern of short term profit taking are classified as held for trading or a derivative.

Financial instruments at fair value through profit or loss are measured at fair value, and changes therein are recognised in Income Statement.

#### b) Available-for-sale

Available for sale financial assets are non-derivative that are either designated in this category or not classified in any other category.

#### c) Loans and receivables originated by the enterprise

Loans and receivables are non-derivative financial assets with fixed or determinable payments that are not quoted in an active market, other than those classified by the Fund as fair value through profit or loss or available for sale.

#### d) Financial liabilities

Financial liabilities, other than those at fair value through profit or loss, are measured at amortised cost using the effective yield method.

#### Recognition

The Fund recognises financial assets and financial liabilities on the date it becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

All purchases and sales of securities that require delivery within the time frame established by regulation or market convention such as 'T+2' purchases and sales are recognised at the trade date. Trade date is the date on which the Fund commits to purchase or sell the assets.

Financial liabilities are not recognised unless one of the parties has performed its part of the contract or the contract is a derivative contract.

#### Measurement

Financial instruments are measured initially at fair value (transaction price) plus, in case of a financial instrument on at "fair value through profit or loos', transaction costs that are directly artiributable to the acquisition or interest of the financial instrument. Transaction costs on financial instrument at fair value through profit or loss are expensed out immediately.

Subsequent to initial recognition, financial instruments classified as at 'fair value through profit or loss' and divisible for sale' are measured at fair value. Gains or losses arising, from changes in the fair value of financial asset 'at fair value through profit or loss' are recognised in the locome Statement. Changes in the fair value of financial instruments classified as 'available-for-sale' are recognised in Statement of Competensive Income until derecognised or impaired, when the accumulated adjustments recognised in Unit Holders' Fund are included in the Income Statement.

#### Fair value measurement principles

The fair value of a security listed on a stock exchange is valued at its last sale price on such exchange on the date on which it is valued or if such exchange is not open on such date, then at its last sale price on the next precising date on which is such exchange was open and if no sale is reported for such date the security is valued at an amount neither higher than the closing asked or rise nor lower than the closing is did nrice.

#### Basis of valuation of Government Securities

The investment of the Fund in government securities are valued at their fair values (determined by reference to the quotations obtained from the PKRV rate sheet on the Reuters page), based on the remaining tenor of the security.

#### Impairment

A financial asset is assessed at each balance sheet date to determine whether there is any objective evidence that it is impaired. A financial assets is considered to be impaired if objective evidence indicates that one or more events have had a negative effect on the estimated future cash flows of the asset.

Individually significant financial assets are tested for impairment on an individual basis. The remaining financial assets are assessed collectively in groups that share similar credit risk characteristics. All impairment losses are recognised in profit and loss acount.

#### Derecognition

The Fund derecognises a financial asset when the contractual right to the cash flows from the financial asset expires or it transfers the financial asset and the transfer qualifies for deregonition in accordance with international Accounting Standard 39: Financial Internments; Recognition and Measurement.

A financial liability is derecognised when the obligation specified in the contract is discharged, cancelled or expired.

#### Offsetting of financial instruments

Financial assets and liabilities are offset and the net amount reported in the Statement of Assets and Liabilities when there is a legally enforceable right to set off the recognised amounts and there is an intention to settle on a not basis, or to realize the assets and settle the liabilities simultaneously.

#### 4.3 Unit holders' fund

Unit holders' fund representing the units issued by the Fund, is carried at the redemption amount representing the investors' right to a residual interest in the Fund's assets.

#### 4.4 Issue and redemption of units

Units issued are recorded at the offer price, determined by the Fund, applicable for the day on which fund(s) have been realised in the bunk account. The offer price represents the net asset value per unit as of the close of the business day plus the allowable asks load (if any).

Units redeemed are recorded at the redemption price, applicable on the units for which the Fund receives redemption applications during business boars of that day. The redemption applications during business boars of that day. The redemption price represents the net asset value prunit as of the close of the business day less the allowable purchase load (if any). Redemption of units is recorded on acceptance of application for redemption.

# 4.5 Element of income / (loss) and capital gains / (losses) included in prices of units issued less those in units redeemed

An equalisation account called the element of income / (loss) and capital gains / (losses) included in prices of units issued less those in units redeemed is created, in order to prevent the dilution of per unit income and distribution of income already paid out on redemption.

During the year, the Fund has revised the method of computation of the Element, As per revised method, the Element is arrived at by comparing the unit prices with opening Ex. NAVA at the beginning of the financial year. The Element so computed it recognised in the income statement except to the extent that the amount represented by unrealized appreciation / diministion arising on available for sale securities is included in sincibusion statement. Previously, the Fund used to calculate the Element by comparing unit prices with the face value of the units.

The revised methodology, in opinion of the management, would ensure that the continuing unit holders' share of undistributed income remains unchanged on issue and redemption of units. Since the element is an equalisation account between income for the period and undistributed incomes, the change did not have any impact on Net Asset Value (NAV) of the Fund. Had the methodology not been changed, the net income and total comprehensive income for the year ended 30 June 2012 would have been lower by Re 2,882.

### 4.6 Net asset value - per unit

The net asset value per unit disclosed in the Statement of Assets and Liabilities is calculated by dividing the net assets of the Fund by the number of units in issue at the year end.

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### 4.7 Taxation

The income of the Fund is exempt from income tax under clause 99 of Part I of the Second Schedule to the lincome Iax Ordinance, 2001 subject to the condition that not less than ninety percent of its accounting income of that year, as reduced by capital gains, whether realised or unrealised, is distributed amongst the Fund's unit holders.

The Fund intends to continue availing the tax exemption in future years by distributing at least ninety percent of its accounting income for the year as reduced by capital gains, whether realised or unesalised, to its unit holders every year. Accordingly, no tax lishely or deferred to the abs been recognized in these financial statements.

### 4.8 Revenue recognition

- Gains / (losses) arising on sale of investments are included in the Income Statement on the date 'st which the transaction takes place.
- Unrealised gains / (losses) arising on revaluation of investments classified as financial assets at fair value through profit or loss are included in the Income Statement in the period in which they arise.
- Income on government securities is recognised on an accrual basis using the effective interest rate method.
- Profit on bank deposit is recognised on time proportion basis taking in to account effective yield.
- Dividend income is recognised when the right to receive the dividend is established.
- Net element of income / (loss) and capital gains / (losses) included in prices of units issued less those in
  units redeemed is included in the Income Statement on the date of issue and redemption of units.

### 4.9 Expenses

All expenses including management fee, trustee fee and annual fee of SECP are recognised in the Income Statement on an accrual basis.

### 4.10 Provisions

Provisions are recognized in the statement of assets and liabilities when the Fund has a present, legal or constructive obligation as a result of past events and it is probable that an outflow of resources embodying connomic hearths will be required to settle the obligation and a reliable estimate of the obligation can be made. Provisions are regularly reviewed and adjusted to reflect the current best estimate.

### 4.11 Preliminary expenses and floatation costs

Preliminary expenses and floatation costs represent expenditure incurred up to the close of Initial Public Offer (IPO) period of the Fund. These costs are being amortised over a period of five years commencing from 10 October 2009 as per the Trust Deed of the Fund.

### 4.12 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise of bank balances. Cash equivalents are short term highly liquid investments that are readily convertible to known amounts of each, are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value, and are held for the purpose of meeting after term cash commitments rather than for investments and other purposes.



#### 4.13 Other assets

Other assets are stated at cost less impairment losses, if any

### 4.14 Dividend (including bonus units)

Dividend distributions (including the beaus units) declared subsequent to the balance sheet date are recorded in the period in which the distributions are approved. As per regulation 63 of Non - Banking Finance Companies and Notified Entities Regulations 2008, the Fund is required to distribute ninety percent of the net accounting income, excluding unrealised capital gain, to the unit holders.

### 5. ACCOUNTING ESTIMATES AND JUDGMENTS

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with approved accounting standards, as applicable in Pakistan, requires management to make judgments, estimates and assumptions that affect the application of policies and the reported amounts of assets, laishlikes, income and expenses. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and various other factors that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances, the results of which form the basis of making the judgments about the currying values of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised if the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods if the revision affects only current and future periods.

In particular, information about significant areas of estimation uncertainty and critical judgements in applying accounting policies that have most significant effect on the amounts recognised in the financial statements are given below:

Classification and fair value of investments

The Management Company has determined fair value of investments classified as 'at fair value through profit or loss' based on the clossing market prices prevailing at the day end. The Management Company is of the view that fair market value of most of the remaining financial assets and liabilities are not significantly different form their carrying values since assets and liabilities are essentially short-term in nature.

Impairment of investment

The Fund determines that investments are impaired when there has been a significant or prolonged decline in the fair value below its cort. The determination of what is significant or prolonged requires judgement. In addition the impairment may be appropriate when there is evidence of deterioration in the financial health of the investment industry and sector performance, changes in technology and operational financial cash flows. In making this judgement, the Fund evaluates among other factors, the normal volatifity in prices.

#### WORKER'S WELFARE FUND

Through the Finance Act, 2008, an amendment was made in section 2(f) of the Workers' Welfare Fund Ordinance, 1971 (the WWF Ordinance) whereby the definition of Industrial Establishment has been made applicable to any establishment to which West Pakistan Shops and Establishment Ordinance, 1969 applies. As a result of this amendment, it is alleged that all Collective Investment Schemes (CISs) / mutual funds whose income exceeds Rs.0.5 million in a tax year have been brought within the scope of the WWF Ordinance thus rendering them liable to pay contribution to WWF at the rate of two percent of their accounting or taxable income, whichever is higher. In this resert, a constitutional petition has been filed by certain CISs through their trustees in the Honorable High Court of Sindh (the Court), challenging the applicability of WWF to the CISs, which is pending adjudication.

In August 2011, the Lahore High Court issued a judgment in response to a petition in similar case whereby the amendments introduced in WWF Ordinance through Finance Acts, 2006 and 2008 have been declared unconstitutional and therefore struck down.

As the matter relating to levy of WWF is currently pending in the Court, the Management Company, as a matter of abundant caution, has decided to retain and continue with the provision for WWF amounting to Rs. 511,564 (30 June 2011: Rs. 429.910) in these financial statements. Had the provision not been made, the net asset value of the Fund would be higher by Rs 0.47 per unit (30 June 2011: Rs.0.39 per unit).

#### EARNINGS PER UNIT

Earnings per unit (EPU) for the year ended 30 June 2012 has not been disclosed as in the opinion of the management, determination of weighted average units for calculating EPU is not practicable.

The Fund's income is exempt from Income Tax as per clause (99) of part I of the Second Schedule of the Income Tax Ordinance, 2001 subject to the condition that not less than 90% of the accounting income for the year as reduced by capital gains whether realised or unrealised is distributed amongst the unit holders. The Fund is also exempt from the provisions of section 113 (minimum tax) under clause II of Part IV of the Second Schedule to the Income Tax Ordinance, 2001.

No provision for taxation has been made in these financial statements as the Fund subsequent to the year-end, together with the interim distribution, distributed more than 90% of the accounting income for the year to avail exemption from tax as mentioned above. Details of distribution made are given in note 30 to these financial statements.

### 23. RISK MANAGEMENT

Introduction and overview

The Fund has exposure to following risks from its use of financial instruments:

- Credit Risk
- Liquidity Risk
- Market Risk

This note presents information about the Fund's exposure to each of the above risks, the Fund's objectives, policies and processes for measuring and managing risk, and the Fund's management of capital.

### Risk management framework

The Fund's objective in managing risk is the creation and protection of unit holders' value. Risk is inherent in the Fund's activities, but it is managed through monitoring and controlling activities which are primarily set up based on limits entibilished by the management company. Funds's constitutive documents and the regulations and describers of the SECP. Those limits reflect the business strategy and market environment of the Fund as well as the level of the risk that Fund is willing to accept. The Board of Directions of the management company upervises the overall risk management approach within the Fund.

The Fund primarily invests in shares of listed companies and near each instruments. Such investments are subject to varying degrees of risk.

The management of those risks is carried out by the Investment Committee (IC) under the policies and procedures approved by the Board K. Is constituted by the Board of Devotors of the Management Company. K: is respossible to devote the investment position of the Fund in accordance with the limit prescribed and retrictions imposed in the Non-Banking Finance Companies and Notified Entities Regulations, 2008, Rules, and Constitutive Documents of the Fund indiation to the Fund indiation to the Fund interface in Amagement policies.

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#### 23.1 Credit risk

Credit risk is the risk that a counterparty to a financial instrument will fail to discharge an obligation or commitment that it has entered into with the Fund, resulting in a financial loss to the Fund. At the yearend it arises principally from bank balances, dividend and income recievables, recievable against sale of investments and deposits etc.

#### Management of credit risk

The Fund's policy is to enter into financial contracts in accordance with the investment guidelines approved by the Investment Committee, its Trust Deed, the requirements of NBFC rules and regulations and guidelines given by SECP from time to time.

Credit risk is managed and controlled by the management company of the Fund in the following manner:

- Where the investment committee makes an investment decision, the credit rating and credit worthiness of the issuer is taken into account along with the financial background so as to minimise the risk of default.
- Investment transactions are carried out with a large number of brokers, whose credit rating is taken into account so as to minimise the risk of default and transactions are settled or paid for only upon delivery.
- The risk of counterparty exposure due to failed trades causing a loss to the Fund is mitigated by a
  periodic review of trade reports, credit ratings and financial statements on a regular basis, in addition,
  the investment Committee approves the trading of securities of entities with credit ratings approved by
  external rating agencies.

### Exposure to credit risk

Concentration of credit risk

Concentration is the relative sensitivity of the Fund's performance to developments affecting a particular industry or geographical location. Concentration of risks arise when a number of financial instruments or contracts are entered into with the same counterparty, or where a number of counterparties are engaged in similar business activities, or activities in the same geographic region, or have similar economic features that would cause their ability to meet contractual obligations to be similarly affected by changes in economic, political or other conditions. The Fund's portfolio of financial assets is broadly diversified and transactions are entered into with diverse credit worthy counterparties thereby mitigating any similicant concentration of credit risk.

Past due and impaired assets

None of the financial assets of the Fund are past due / impaired.

Settlement risk

The Fund's activities may give rise to risk at the time of settlement of transactions. Settlement risk is the risk of loss due to the failure of an entity to honour its obligations to deliver cash, securities or other assets as contractually agreed.

For the vast majority of transactions the Fund mitigates this risk by conducting settlements through a broker to ensure that a trade is settled only when both parties have fulfilled their contractual settlement obligations.

#### 23.2 Liquidity risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that the Fund will encounter difficulty in meeting obligations arising from its financial liabilities that are settled by delivering cash or another financial asset, or that such obligation will have to be settled in a manner disadvantageous to the Fund.

The Fund is exposed to cash redemptions of its units on a regular basis. Units are redeemable at the holder's option based on the Fund's net asset value per unit at the time of redemption calculated in accordance with the Fund's constitutive document and guidelines laid down by Securities and Exchange Commission of Pakistan (SECP).

Management of Liquidity Risk

The Fund's policy is to manage this risk by investing majority of its assets in investments that are traded in an active market and can be readily disposed. The Fund invests primarily in marketable securities and other financial instruments, which under normal market conditions are readily convertible to cash. As a result, the Fund may be able to liquidate quickly its investments in these instruments at an amount close to their fair value to meet its liquidity requirement. The present settlement system is a T+2 system, which means that proceeds from sales (to pay off redemptions) of holdings will be received on the second day after the sale, while redemptions have to be paid within a period of six days from the date of the redemption request.

The Fund has the ability to borrow, with prior approval of trustee, for meeting redemption requests. The maximum amount available to the Fund from borrowings is limited to the extent of 15% of total assets at the time of borrowing with repayment with in 90 days of such borrowings. No such borrowings have arisen during the year.

In order to manage the Fund's overall liquidity, the Fund also has the ability to withhold daily redemption requests in excess of ten percent of the units in issue and such requests would be treated as redemption requests qualifying for being processed on the next business day. Such procedure would continue until the outstanding redemption requests come down to a level below ten percent of the units then in issue. The Fund did not withhold any redemptions during the year.

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#### 23.3 Market risk

Market risk is the risk that the Fund's income or value of the financial instrument may fluctuate as a result of changes in market interest rates or the market price of securities due to a change in credit rating of the issuer or the instrument, change in market sentiments, speculative activities, supply and demand of securities and liquidity in the market.

Management of Market Risk

The Management Company manages market risk by monitoring exposure on marketable securities by following the internal risk management policies and investment guidelines approved by the Investment Committee and regulations laid down by the Securities and Exchange Commission of Pakistan (SECP). The maximum risk resulting from financial instruments equals their fair value.

Market risk comprises of three types of risk: currency risk, interest rate risk and other price risk. The Fund is exposed to interest rate and other price risk only.

Interest rate risk

Interest rate risk is the risk that the fair value or future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in market interest rates.

A change of 100 basis points in interest rates at year end would increase / decrease the profit for the year and unit holders' fund by Rs. 0.341 million. The analysis assumes that all other variables remain constant.

#### Other price risk

Other price risk is the risk of unfavourable changes in the fair value of equity securities and units of mutual funds as a result of changes in the levels of respective indices and the value of individual securities. This arises from the investment held by the Fund for which prices in the fitnut are uncertain. The Fund's policy is to manage price risk through diversification and selection of securities within specified limits set by internal risk management guidelines.

- The Fund manages this risk by limiting its investment exposure in the following ways:
  - 10% of NAV or index weight of a single security, subject to a maximum limit of 15%,
  - whichever is higher.
  - higher of 30% of NAV or index weight of a single stock exchange sector, subject to a
  - maximum limit of 35% of NAV.

A summary analysis of local investments by industry sector, the percentage in relation to Fund's assets is presented in note \$1 to these financial statements. ### 23.4 Unit Holders' Fund risk management

Management's objective when managing unit holders' funds is to safe guard the Fund's ability to continue as a going concern so that it can continue to provide optimum returns to its unit holders' and to ensure reasonable safety of unit holders' funds.

The Management Company manages Fund's investment portfolio and other assets by monitoring return on net assets and makes adjustments to it in the light of changes in markets' conditions. The unit holders' funds structure depends on the issuance and redemption of units.

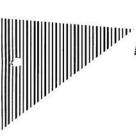

# 1. LEGAL STATUS AND NATURE OF BUSINESS

First Habib Cash Fund ( the "Fund") was established under a Trust Deed executed between Habib Asset management Limited (HAML) as Management Company and Central Depository Company of Pakistas Limited (CDC) as Trustee. The Trust Deed was executed on 14 July 2010 and was approved by the Securities and Companies and Noterlife Continues (SECP) on 13 July 2010 and Regulatopm 44 of the Non-Banking Finance Companies and Noterlifed Entities Regulations, 2008 (NDFC Regulations).

The Management Company of the Fund has been licensed to undertake Asset Management Serviors as Non Backing Finance Company under the MEPIC Rules by the SECP. The registered office of the Management Company is islaused at Imperial Coper Building, Dr. Zimadifa Ahmed Roan Karachi, Pakistan.

The Fund is an open-end mutual fund and is listed on the Labore Stock Exchange. Units are offered for public subscription on a continuous basis. Units are transferable and can be redeemed by surrendering them to the Fund at the option of the unit holder.

The Fund has been formed to provide reasonable rate of return consistent with reasonable concern for safety of principal amount to the unit holders, along with facility to join or leave the fund at their convenience. The management team would seek to enhance returns through active portfolio management using efficiency tools.

Pakistan Credit Rating Agency (PACRA) has assigned asset management rating of 'AM3 -' to the Management Company and ICR-VIS has assigned flund stability rating of 'AA+' to the Fund.

The Fund has been categorized as an Open -End Money Market Scheme as per the criteria laid down by the Securities and Exchange Commission of Pakistan (SECP) for categorisation of Collective Investment Schemes (CIS).

The objective of the Fund is to earn competitive returns from a portfolio of low risk short term duration assets while maintaining high level of liquidity through a blend assets of money market and sovereign debt instruments. The Fund, in the with its investment objective, invests primarily in treasury bills, government accurities and cash and near cash instruments. The Fund has been custoperized as money market achone.

Title of the assets of the fund are held in name of CDC as trustee of fund.

## STATEMENT OF COMPLIANCE

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These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with approved accounting standards as applicable in Pakistan. Approved accounting standards comprise of such International Financial Reporting Standards (FRS) issued by the International Accounting Standards Bened as are notified under the Companies Ordinance, 1994, requirements of the Standards of the Companies Ordinance, 1994, requirements of Test Deed, Basking Finance Companies (Establishment and Regulation) Rules, 2003 and Northern Companies (Establishment and Regulation) Rules, 2003 and Northern Companies (Establishment and France Ordinance 1994, the requirements of Trust deed, Northern Benking Finance Companies (Companies (Establishment and Regulation) Rules, 2003 and Nort-Bunking Finance Companies and Notified Establishment and Regulation Rules, 2003 and Nort-Bunking Finance Companies and Notified Establish Regulations, 2009 shall previous and Regulation Rules, 2003 and Nort-Bunking Finance Companies and Notified Establish Regulations, 2009 shall previous and Nortified Establish Regulations.

#### 3. BASIS OF MEASUREMENT

These financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, except that investments classified as at fair value through profit or loss' are measured at fair value.

These financial statements are presented in Pak Rupers which is the functional and presentation currency of the Fund and rounded to the nearest thousand rupers.

# 4. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The principal accounting policies adopted and applied by the Fund in the preparation of these financial statements are set out below:

# 4.1 New and amended standards and interpretations

During the year, following amendments, interpretations and improvements to the accounting standards became effective:

- IFRS 7 Financial Instruments: Disclosures (Amendment)
- IAS 24 Related Party Disclosures (Revised)
- IFRIC 14 Prepayments of a Minimum Funding Requirement (Amendment)

In May 2010, International Accounting Standards Board (IASB) issued amendments to various standards primarily with a view to removing inconsistencies and clarifying wording. These improvements are listed below:

The adoption of the above standards, amendments, interpretations and improvements did not have any material effect on the financial statements of the Fund.

## 4.2 Financial instruments

The Fund classifies its financial instruments in the following categories:

# a) Financial instruments at fair value through profit or loss

An instrument is classified at fair value through profit or loss if it is held-for-trading or is designated as such upon initial recognition. Financial instruments are designated at fair value through profit or loss if the Fund manages such investments and makes purchase and said educisions based on their fair value in accordance with the Fund's documented risk management or investment strategy.

Financial assets which are acquired principally for the purpose of generating profit from short term price fluctuation or are part of the portfolio in which there is recent actual pattern of short term profit taking are classified as held for trading or a derivative.

Financial instruments at fair value through profit or loss are measured at fair value, and changes therein are recognised in Income Statement.

# b) Available-for-sale

Available for sale financial assets are non-derivative that are either designated in this category or not classified in any other casegory.

# Loans and receivables originated by the enterprise

Loans and receivables are non-derivative financial assets with fixed or determinable payments that are not quoted in an active market, other than those classified by the Fund as fair value through profit or loss or a

# d) Financial liabilities

Financial liabilities, other than those at fair value through profit or loss, are measured at amortised cost using the effective yield method.

#### Recognition

The Fund recognises financial assets and financial liabilities on the date it becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

All regular way of purchases and sales of investments are recognised on the trade date i.e. the date the Fund commits to purchase / sell the investments

Financial liabilities are not recognised unless one of the parties has performed its part of the contract or the contract is a derivative contract.

#### Measurement

Financial instruments are measured initially at fair value (transaction price) plus, in case of a financial instrument not at 'fair value through profit or loss', transaction costs that are directly attributable to the acquisition of size of the financial instrument. Transaction costs on financial instrument at fair value through profit or loss are expensed out immediately.

Subsequent to initial recognition, financial instruments classified as at 'fair value through profit or loss' and 'ivailable for sale' are measured at fair value. Gains or losses arising, from changes in the fair value of the financial assets 'it fair value through profit or loss' are recognised in the Income Statement. Changes in the fair value of financial instruments classified as 'available-for-sale' are recognised in Statement of Comprehensive Income until developments of impaired, when the accumulated adjustments recognised in Unit Holders' Fund are included in the Income Statement.

# Basis of valuation of Government Securities

The investment of the Fund in government securities are valued at their fair values (determined by reference to the quotations obtained from the FRRV rate stoet on the Reuters page), based on the remaining tenor of the security.

#### Derecognition

The Fund derecognises a financial asset when the contractual right to the cash flows from the financial asset expires or it transfers the financial asset and the transfer qualifies for derecognition in accordance with International Accounting Standard 39: Financial Instruments, Recognition and Measurement

A financial liability is derecognised when the obligation specified in the contract is discharged, cancelled or expired.

# Offsetting of financial instruments

Financial assets and liabilities are offset and the net amount reported in the Statement of Assets and Liabilities when there is a legally enforceable right to set off the recognised amounts and there is an intention to settle on a net basis, or to realise the assets and settle the liabilities simultaneously.

#### 4.3 Unit holders' fund

Unit holders' fund representing the units issued by the Fund, is carried at the redemption amount representing the investors' right to a residual interest in the Fund's assets.

# 4.4 Issue and redemption of units

Units issued are recorded at the net assets value, determined by the Fund, applicable for the day on which fund(s) have been realised in the bank account.

Units redeemed are recorded at the net assets value, applicable on units for which the management company receives redemption applications during business hours on that day. Redemption of units is recorded on acceptance of application for redemption.

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# 4.5 Element of income / (loss) and capital gains / (losses) included in prices of units issued less those in units redeemed

An equalisation account called the element of income / (loss) and capital gains / (losses) included in prices of units issued less those in units redeemed is created, in order to prevent the dilution of per unit income and distribution of income already naid out on redeemption.

During the year, the Fund has revised the method of computation of the Element. As per revised method, the Element is arrived at by competing the unit prices with opening Ex-NAV at the beginning of the financial year. The Element so computed is recognised in the income statement except to the actient that the amount representable by unrealized appreciation of diministration arriago on available for sale securities is included in distribution statement. Previously, the Fund used to calculate the Element by comporting unit prices with the fixe value of the units.

The revised methodology, in opinion of the management, would ensure that the continuing unit holders' share of undistributed income remains unchanged on issue and redemption of units. Since the element is an equalisation account between income for the period and undistributed income, the change did not have any impact on Net Asset Value (NAV) of the Fund. Had the methodology not been changed, the net income and total comprehensive income for the year eneeds June 30, 2012 would have been higher by RA4451.

#### 4.6 Net asset value - per unit

The net asset value per unit disclosed in the Statement of Assets and Liabilities is calculated by dividing the net assets of the Fund by the number of units in issue at the period end.

#### 4.7 Taxation

The income of the Fund is exempt from income tax under clause 99 of Part I of the Second Schedule to the Income Tax Ordinance, 2001 subject to the condition that not less than ninely percent of its accounting income of that year, as reduced by capital gains, whether realised or unrealized, is distributed amongst the Fund's unit holders.

The Fund intends to swall tax exemption by distributing at least ninety percent of its accounting income for the period as reduced by capital gains, whether realised or unrealised, to its unit holders. Accordingly, no tax liability or deferred tax has been recognised in these financial statements.

#### 4.8 Revenue recognition

- Gains / (losses) arising on sale of investments are included in the Income Statement on the date at which
  the transaction takes place.
- Unrealised gains / (losses) arising on revaluation of investments classified as financial assets at fair value through profit or loss are included in the Income Statement in the period in which they arise.
- Income on reverse repurchase transactions, clean placements and government securities is recognised on an
  accrual basis using the effective interest rate method.
- Profit on bank deposit is recognised on time proportion basis taking in to account effective yield.
- Element of income / (loss) and capital gains / (losses) included in prices of units issued less those in units redeemed is included in the Income Statement on the date of issue and redemption of units.

## 4.9 Expenses

All expenses including management fee, trustee fee and annual fee of SECP are recognised in the Income Statement on an accrual basis.

#### 4.10 Provisions

Provisions are recognized when the Fund has a present, legal or constructive obligation as a result of past events and it is probable that and outflow of resources embodying exonomic benefits will be required to settle the obligation and a reliable estimate of the obligation can be made. Provisions are regularly reviewed and adjusted to reflect the current best estimate.

#### 4.11 Preliminary expenses and floatation costs

Preliminary expenses and floatation costs represent expenditure incurred up to the close of Initial Public Offer (IPO) period of the Fund. These costs are being amortised over a period of five years commencing from 10 Mar 2011 as per the Trust Deed of the Fund.

#### 4.12 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise of bank balances. Cash equivalents are short term highly liquid investments that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash, are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value, and are held for the purpose of meeting short term cash commitments rather than for investments and other purposes.

#### 4.13 Other assets

Other assets are stated at cost less impairment losses, if any.

#### 4.14 Dividend (including bonus units)

Dividend distributions (including the bonus units) declared subsequent to the balance sheet date are recorded in the period in which the distributions are approved. As per regulation 63 of NBFC Regulations, the Fund is required to distribute ninety percent of the net accounting income, excluding unrealised capital gain, to the unit bolders.

#### 5. ACCOUNTING ESTIMATES AND JUDGMENTS

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with approved accounting standards as applicable in Pakistan requires management to make judgments, estimates and assumptions that affect the application of policies and reported amount of assists and liabilities, juctomes and expenses. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and various other factors that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances, the results of which form basis of making the judgments about the carrying values of assets and liabilities that are readily not apparent from other sources. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognized in the period in which the estimate is revised if the revision affects only that period, or in the period of its revision and future periods if the revision effects both current and future periods.

Judgments made by the management in the application of approved accounting standards, as applicable in Pakistan, that have significant effect on the financial statements and estimates with a significant risk of material judgment are discussed below:

Classification and fair value of investments

The Management Company has determined this value of investments classified as in fair value through profit or loss by using questions from active market. Fair value estimates are made at a specific point in time, based on market conditions and information about financial instruments. These estimates are subjective in nature and in love uncertainties and matter of judgement (e.g. Valuation, interest rates, etc.) and therefore can not be determined with precision.

Other assets

Judgement is also involved in assessing the realisability of other asset balances.

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# 16. WORKERS WELFARE FUND

Through the Finance Act, 2008, an amendment was made in section 2(f) of the Workers' Welfare Fund Ordinance, 1971 (the WWF Ordinance) whereby the definition of 'Industrial Establishmens' has been made applicable to any establishment to which West Pakistan Shops and Establishment Ordinance, 1969 applies. As a result of this amendment, it is alleged that all Collective Investment Schemes (CISs) / mutual funds whose income exceeds Rs.0.5 million in a tax year have been brought within the scope of the WWF Ordinance thus rendering them liable to pay contribution to WWF at the rate of two percent of their accounting or taxable income, whichever is higher. In this regard, a constitutional petition has been filed by certain CISs through their trustees in the Honorable High Court of Sindh (the Court), challenging the applicability of WWF to the CISs, which is pending adjudication.

In August 2011, the Lahore High Court issued a judgment in response to a petition in similar case whereby the amendments introduced in WWF Ordinance through Finance Acts, 2006 and 2008 have been declared unconstitutional and therefore struck down.

As the matter relating to levy of WWF is currently pending in the Court, the Management Company, as a matter of abundant caution, has decided to retain and continue with the provision for WWF amounting to Rs. 3,316,890 (30 June 2011: Rs. 399,337) in these financial statements. Had the provision not been made, the net asset value of the Fund would be higher by Rs 0.165 per unit (30 June 2011: Rs.0.072 per unit).

#### 74 RISK MANAGEMENT

#### Introduction and overview

The Fund has exposure to following risks from its use of financial instruments.

- Credit Risk
- Liquidity Risk - Market Risk

This note presents information about the Fund's exposure to each of the above risks, the Fund's objectives, policies and processes for measuring and managing risk, and the Fund's management of capital.

# Risk management framework

The Fund's objective in managing risk is the creation and protection of unit holders' value. Risk is inherent in the Fund's activities, but it is managed through monitoring and controlling activities which are primarily set up based on limits established by the management company, Fund's constitutive documents and the regulations and directives of the SECP. These limits reflect the business strategy and market environment of the Fund as well as the level of the risk that Fund is willing to accept. The Board of Directors of the management company supervises the overall risk management approach

The management of these risks is carried out by the Investment Committee (IC) under the policies and procedures approved by the Board. IC is constituted by the Board of Directors of the Management Company. IC is responsible to devise the investment strategy and manage the investment portfolio of the Fund in accordance with the limits prescribed and restrictions imposed in the Non-Banking Finance Companies and Notified Entities Regulations, 2008, Rules, and Constitutive Documents of the Fund in addition to the Fund's internal risk management policies.

#### 24.1 Credit risk

Credit risk is the risk that a counterparty to a financial instrument will fail to discharge an obligation or commitment that it has entered into with the Fund, resulting in a financial loss to the Fund. At the period-end it arises principally from bank balances income receivable, and peopsyments etc.

## Management of credit risk

The Fund's policy is to enter into financial contracts in accordance with the investment guidelines approved by the Investment Committee, its Trust Deed, the requirements of NBFC rules and regulations and guidelines given by SECP from

Credit risk is managed and controlled by the management company of the Fund in the following manner:

- Where the investment committee makes an investment decision, the credit rating and credit worthiness of the issuer is taken into account along with the financial background so as to minimise the risk of default.
- Investment transactions are carried out with a large number of brokers, whose credit rating is taken into account so as to minimise the risk of default and transactions are settled or paid for only upon delivery.
- The risk of counterparty exposure due to failed trades causing a loss to the Fund is mitigated by a periodic review of trade reports, credit ratings and financial statements on a regular basis. In addition, the investment Committee approves the trading of securities of entities with credit ratings approved by external rating agencies.

#### Exposure to credit risk

In summary, compared to the maximum amount included in statement of assets and liabilities, the maximum exposure to

Concentration of credit rick

Concentation is the relative sensitivity of the Fund's performance to developments affecting a particular industry or geographical location. Concentration of risks rate when a number of financial instruments or contract are entered time with the same constripacty, or where a number of counterprints are engaged in miniate business activities, or activities in the same geographic region, or have similar economic features that would cause their ability to meet contractual ebligations to be similarly affected by changes in economic, political or order conditions. The Fund's portfolio of financial assist broadly deversified and transactions are entered into with diverse credit worthy counterparties thereby mitigating any significant occontractions of credit risks.

Past due and impaired assets

None of the financial assets of the Fund are past due / impaired.

Settlement risk

The Fund's activities may give rise to risk at the time of settlement of transactions. Settlement risk is the risk of loss due to the failure of an entity to honour its obligations to deliver cash, securities or other assets as contractually agreed.

For the vast majority of transactions the Fund mitigates this risk by conducting settlements through a broker to ensure that a trade is settled only when both parties have fulfilled their contractual settlement obligations.

#### 24.2 Liquidity risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that the Fund will encounter difficulty in meeting obligations arising from its financial liabilities that are settled by delivering each or another financial asset, or that such obligation will have to be settled in a manner disadvantageous to the Fund.

The Fund is exposed to eath redemptions of its units on a regular basis. Units are redeemable at the holder's option based on the Fund's net asset value per unit at the time of redemption calculated in accordance with the Fund's constitutive document and guidelines laid down by Securicies and Exchange Commission of Packstant (SECP).

Management of Liquidity Risk

The Fund's policy is to minange this risk by inverting majority of its assets in investments that are maded in an active market, and can be readily disposed. The Fund invests primarily in marketable recurities and other financial instruments, which under normal market conditions are readily convertible to cash. As a result, the Fund may be able to liquidate quickly its investments in these instruments at an amount close to their flar value to meet its ilquidity requirement.

The Fund has the ability to borrow, with prior approval of trustee, for meeting redemption requests. The maximum amount available to the Fund from borrowings is limited to the extent of 15% of total assets at the time of borrowing No such borrowings. No such borrowings have entered during the period.

In order to manage the Fund's overall liquidity, the Fund also has the ability to withhold daily redemption requests in excess of ten percent of the units in issue and such requests would be treated as redemption requests qualifying for being processed on the next business day. Such procedure would continue until the outstanding redemption requests come down to a level below ten percent of the units then in issue. The Fund did not withhold any redemptione during the year.

#### 24.3 Market risk

Market risk is the risk that the value of the financial instrument may fluctuate as a result of changes in market interest rates or the market price of securities due to a change in credit rating of the issues or the instrument, change in market sentiments, speculative activities, supply and demand of securities and liquidity in the market.

#### Management of Market Risk

The Management Company manages market risk by monitoring exposure on marketable securities by following the internal risk managements policies and investment guidelines approved by the Investment Committee and regulations laid down by the Securities and Exchange Commission of Pakistan (SECP).

Market risk comprises of three types of risk: currency risk, interest rate risk and other price risk. The Fund is exposed to interest rate risk only.

#### 24.3.1 Interest rate risk

Interest rate risk is the risk that the fair value or future each flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in market interest rates. Majority of the interest rate exposure arises on investment in Government Securities, sharing bank balances. Currently the exposure in fixed rate instruments is in Government securities Other risk management procedures are the same as those mentioned in the credit risk management.

#### 24.4 Unit Holders' Fund risk management

Management's objective when managing unit holders' funds is to safe guard the Fund's ability to continue as a going concern so that it can continue to provide optimum returns to its unit holders' and to ensure reasonable safety of unit holders' funds.

The Management Company manages Fund's investment portfolio and other assets by monitoring return on net assets and makes adjustments to it in the light of changes in markets' conditions. The unit holders' funds structure depends on the issuance and redemption of units.

#### 25. Fair value of financial instruments

The Fund's accounting policy on fair value measurements is discussed in note 4.2.

#### Fair Value Hierarchy

The Fund measures fair values using the following fair value hierarchy that reflects the significance of the inputs used in making the measurements:

Level 1: Fair value measurements using quoted price (unadjusted) in an active market for identical assets or liabilities.

Level 2: Fair value measurements using inputs other than quoted prices included within level 1 that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly (i.e. as prices) or indirectly (i.e. derived from prices).

Level 3: Fair value measurement using inputs for the asset or liability that are not based on observable market data (i.e. unobservable inputs).

As at 30 June 2012, all the investments were categorised in level 2.
