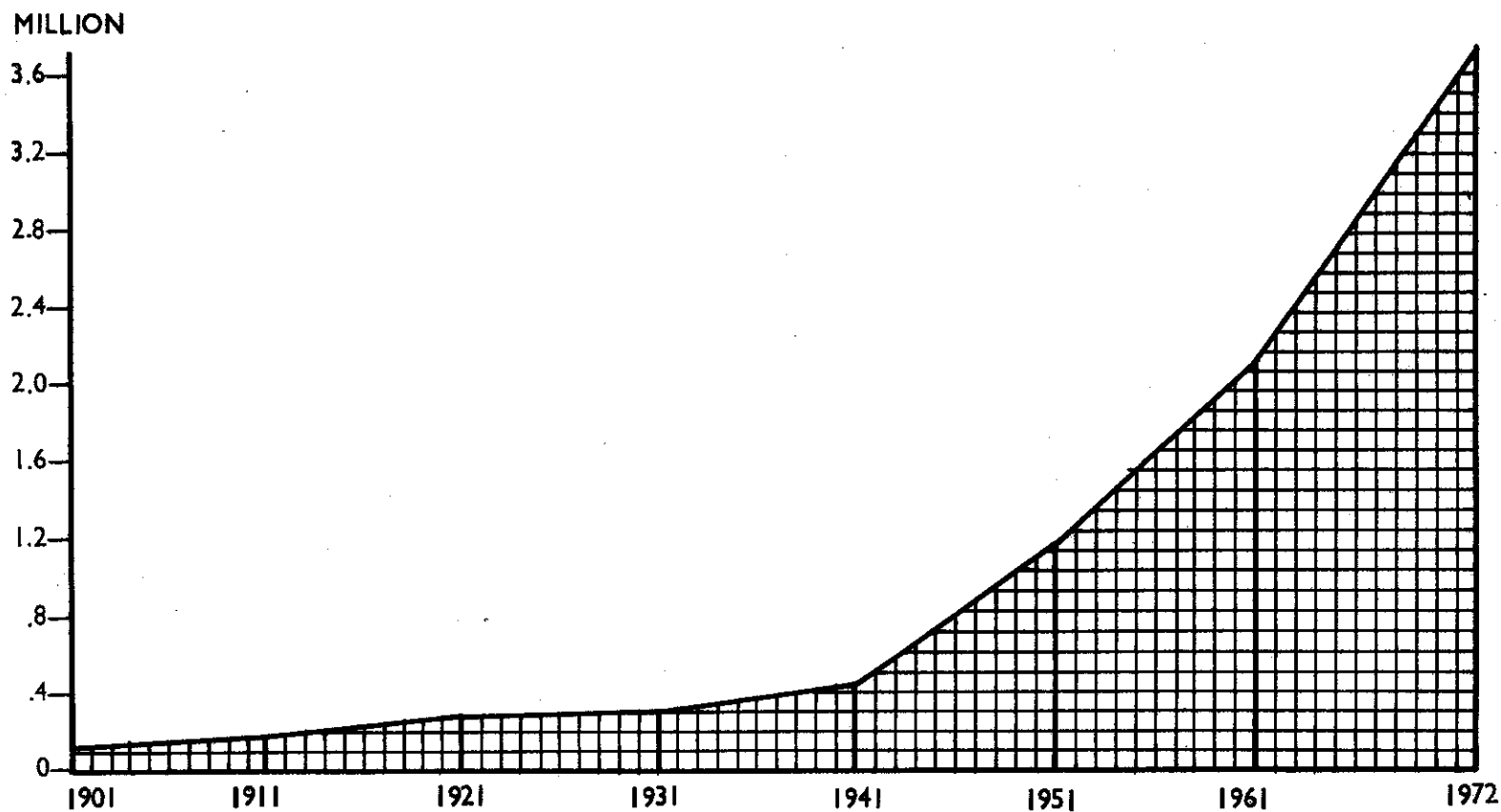

P R E F A C E

The District in Pakistan is the basic unit of administration under a Deputy Commissioner and the focal point of all social, cultural, economic, administrative and developmental activities. It was, therefore, for the first time, decided in the 1961 Census that a separate report on each District be published. The need for publishing these District Census Reports was all the more felt in the absence of the regular publication of the District Gazetteers. Keeping in view these considerations it was decided to publish the District Census Reports of the 1972 Census as well. These reports will be found useful by the local administrators and planners in their day to day work and will also be of interest to the general reader since dull and dreary statistics of the District have been presented against the living background of its history, geography, traditions and culture.

2. The District Census Reports are in two parts :

PART I—General description of the District.

PART II—Statistical tables.

3. PART I—The general description of the District is further divided into the following five sections :

(i) *Geography*

Area, boundary, geology and physical features, climate, flora and fauna, forestry, irrigation, agriculture, industries, transport and trade.

(ii) *History and culture*

History, races and tribes, food and health, dress, occupations, culture, customs and traditions.

(iii) *Administrative set-up*

Executive, judiciary and revenue system, educational, medical and health facilities.

(iv) *Description of important/historical places*

Importance, cultural aspects, socio-economic conditions.

(v) *Population*

Growth, distribution and composition of population.

It also includes 'District at a Glance' containing basic facts about the District and a few photographs of places of importance and scenic beauty as well as of the people and their cultural heritage. These photographs will be found to be fairly representative of the places and people of the District.

4. PART II—It includes twelve statistical tables. Statistics have been presented in these tables at different geographical levels keeping in view the importance of these statistics at these levels. Tables 4, 5 and 12 deserve special mention. Table 4 not only gives population by sex and age for rural and urban areas at District level but also at Tehsil/Taluka level and for individual urban areas. Table 5, which provides population by sex, age group and marital status has also been tabulated at the geographical levels similar to that of Table 4. These statistics had not been published in earlier censuses at these geographical levels and will be found of much help for the purpose of research on population dynamics which at the moment has engaged the attention of planners and researchers in all walks of life because of the population explosion problem being faced by Pakistan and many other countries. Table 12 gives Mauza statistics on population by sex, number of households and household size besides land area and local facilities. This table gives more information about Mauzas than published for the 1961 Census.

5. The reader may find that the 1972 District Census Reports do not contain all the data which was available in similar reports of the 1961 Census. This is because while planning the 1972 Census, many departures were made in the methodology and procedures from the practices followed in the past censuses with a view to improve the reliability and timeliness of data at as low a cost as possible.

6. The 1972 Census was planned to be conducted in three phases, namely, Household Listing, Big Count and Housing, Economic and Demographic Survey :

PHASE I—The Household Listing was conducted from the 1st to 15th September, 1972 just before the Big Count in order to provide an up-to-date list of households for enumeration in the Big Count.

PHASE II—The Big Count was a cent-percent count of the total population conducted from the 16th to 30th September, 1972. In this operation basic characteristics of each individual, i.e., name, relationship to the head of household, sex, age, marital status, religion and literacy were collected. The District Census Reports contain data collected during this phase of the census operation only.

PHASE III—The Housing, Economic and Demographic (HED) Survey was a sample survey conducted during August to November, 1973 to obtain detailed data on almost all topics usually covered in a population and housing census. The HED Survey results will be published separately and will provide data on housing and housing conditions, migration, educational attainment, labour force, fertility, etc.

7. The initial responsibility of writing the District Census Reports was assigned to the Census District Officers/Deputy Commissioners concerned. These drafts were received in the provincial offices of the Census Organization where these were further examined. When the reports were received at the headquarters, it was found that in some cases the reports were not in accordance with the layout and instructions issued by the Census Organization. Besides, in many cases these lacked up-to-date information. Therefore, the work of vetting these reports was assigned to the officers of the Census Organization. There is no doubt that the first part of the District Census Reports of the 1972 Census are largely adaptations from the 1961 District Census Reports but these have been modified and revised wherever necessary to bring the information up-to-date as far as possible.

8. Statistical tables given in this report have been produced on computer. The use of computer for processing of census data was made for the first time. The work relating to the preparation of data for input to computer and quality control was the responsibility of the Data Preparation Centre of the Census Organization. The tabulation of data was done on the computer of the Statistics Division.

9. I am grateful to the officers and staff of various Ministries, Departments of the Federal and Provincial Governments and their officers at District and lower levels, public spirited men and women who gave their unstinted support, in the execution of the 1972 Census and preparation of the District Census Reports. I gratefully acknowledge the help that the Chief Secretaries of the Provincial Governments gave us in this regard. It was indeed creditable that in the atmosphere prevailing in 1972, they were able to collect thousands of enumerators and supervisory staff to undertake the huge task of census taking all over the country.

10. My special thanks are due to the Joint Secretary, Statistics Division and his officers for their valuable help for processing the census data on their computer. I am grateful to the Surveyor-General of Pakistan and his staff who have been generous with the supply of maps as and when required for the census work. I would also like to thank the Managing Director, Printing Corporation of Pakistan Ltd., and his officers for their unstinted support and prompt service at all stages of printing of the census reports.

11. I must also thank officers and staff of the Census Organization who worked untiringly in planning and conducting the census and to edit these reports. The material and data contained in these reports represents cumulative efforts of a large number of persons, both paid and unpaid, to whom I acknowledge a debt of gratitude. I am grateful to all of them and in the end I would like to thank again all those who took part in the 1972 Census operation in any capacity to make it a success.

CENSUS PLANNING AND PROCEDURES

In planning the 1972 Census criticism about incomplete coverage and reliability of the 1961 Census data was kept in view at all stages of planning. Difficulties and problems faced in the planning and execution of the 1961 Census were also not lost sight of. The last census was found to suffer from lack of technical staff, inadequate maps, insufficient tabulation equipment, unscientific pre-testing and post-enumeration evaluation. In addition, the 1961 Census schedule contained too many questions resulting in not only under-enumeration but also lack of response to some of these questions. Therefore, certain fundamental departures were made in the 1972 Census from the practices followed in the 1961 Census with a view to overcome the above shortcomings.

2. The Census Commissioner as well as the Technical Advisory Committee were of the view that the basic questions on individuals, i.e., sex, age, marital status, etc., be asked on hundred percent enumeration basis, while all other questions on housing, economic and demographic characteristics be asked on sample basis. Thus, not only was the 1961 questionnaire bifurcated, but a few more questions on population and housing characteristics were added. It was also decided that instead of carrying out the post-enumeration census evaluation survey by the Census Organization themselves (which obviously would have produced biased results) the census evaluation survey be planned and conducted under the direction and supervision of an independent agency. To avoid confrontation of any problems in conducting the census pre-testing and rehearsal of all census steps was scientifically planned and conducted in urban as well as rural areas in all the Provinces. In order to make available the census results expeditiously and correctly the data was processed and tabulated on computer. With a view to creating discipline and getting the desired results from the enumerators, they were paid honoraria.

3. The 1972 Census was planned to be conducted in three phases, namely, Household Listing, Big Count, and Housing, Economic and Demographic Survey. The Big Count provided for enumeration of all persons living in

Pakistan on the dawn of 16th of September, 1972 excluding foreign diplomats and their dependent family members. All persons were enumerated at their usual places of residence, i.e., the place where they lived and slept usually (dejure enumeration). However, persons of armed forces (including prisoners of war) were enumerated at the places where their families were living because of the circumstances prevailing at the time of census taking. A simple questionnaire was used providing for collection of data on name of person, his relationship to head of household, sex, age, marital status, religion and literacy. This information was collected on hundred percent enumeration basis, whereas the data on complex population characteristics and housing topics was collected later through a sample survey. The Big Count was conducted from the 16th to 30th September, 1972 and was preceded by Household Listing operation for 15 days with the purpose to identify households for enumeration in the Big Count. The Big Count and Household Listing operations were conducted simultaneously in a few hilly areas which were not easily accessible to avoid the enumeration staff going twice to those areas. The sample survey called the Housing, Economic and Demographic (HED) Survey was conducted from August to November, 1973 and provided for collection of data from three hundred thousand households on housing conditions, migration, educational status, labour force, fertility, etc. Report on these aspects will be published separately. These steps resulted in a simple schedule and smaller assignments for enumerators and thus ensured better coverage and reliable data.

4. Improvements were made in delimitation of census areas by way of providing in advance corrected lists of Mauzas and updated maps of urban areas, which later helped the enumerators considerably in their enumeration work.

5. To overcome omissions of households and persons in enumerated households, special reporting centres were established in each village and different places in towns and cities so that people could report the missed households or persons. Wide publicity was given in this regard beside the regular census publicity campaign.

6. In spite of the fact that the schedule of the Big Count was quite simple, elaborate arrangements were made that enumerators and their supervisors were properly and adequately trained in their duties. This included practical training before conducting the actual enumeration. Detailed procedures and guidelines for enumerators and their supervisors were laid down in two manuals—Manual of Instructions for Enumerators and Manual of Instructions for Supervisors. A Training Guide was also issued which contained specific and typical questions on the procedures and questionnaire to guide and provide answers in specific cases. This guide proved to be of immense value to the enumerators and the supervisory staff. Instructions which could not be covered in these manuals were issued later as Census Commissioner's Circulars. These instructions helped a lot in achieving uniformity in enumeration and better quality of reporting.

7. Some of the terms used in this report which may need explanation, are given below :—

URBAN AREA—Urban areas include Municipal Corporations, Municipal Committees, Cantonment Boards and Town Committees. Other places having a concentration of population of at least 5,000 persons in continuous collection of houses where the community sense was well developed, and the community maintained public utilities, such as, roads, street lighting, water supply, sanitary arrangements, etc., were also treated as urban areas. These places were generally centres of trade and commerce with a population mostly non-agricultural and having comparatively higher literacy rate. As a special case, a few areas

having the above urban characteristics but population less than 5,000 persons were also treated as urban.

HOUSEHOLD—A household means a single person living alone or a group of persons living and eating together which may include family members, relatives, friends, servants and other non-relatives. Eating together implied common cooking arrangement.

AGE—Age has been reported in completed years except for infants whose age has been reported in completed months.

MARITAL STATUS—Marital status has been classified into never-married, married, widowed and divorced. Never married applies to persons who have never been married. Married includes all persons who are at present married and living as husband and wife as well as all other married persons living apart having a living wife/husband and who are not presently widowed or divorced. Widowed applies to a person whose husband or wife is dead and who has not married again. Divorced applies to both divorcer and divorcee, if not re-married.

RELIGION—Religion has been tabulated as reported by the respondents themselves.

LITERATE—A person who is able to read and write with understanding in any language is literate. This was a departure from the 1961 Census, where persons able to read and write (even without understanding) and able to read with understanding were treated as literates.

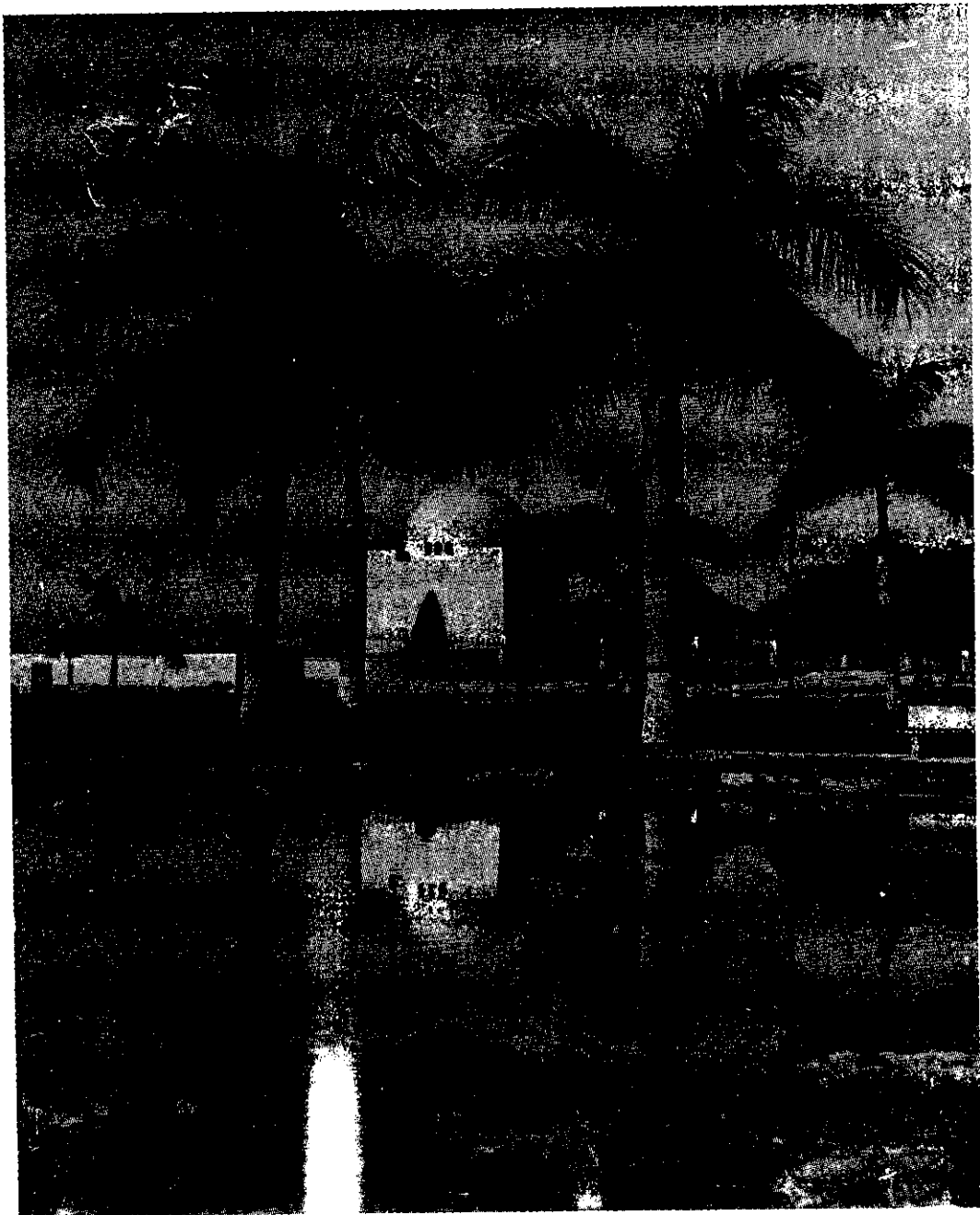

PART I.—GENERAL DESCRIPTION OF THE DISTRICT

SECTION 1—GEOGRAPHY

1.1 NAME, LOCATION, BOUNDARY AND AREA

The district derives its name from its district headquarters, which is the biggest city of Pakistan and provincial capital of Sind. The city is said to have been founded by a small community of fishermen and a few businessmen in the 18th century. The city at the time was called Kulachi Jo-Goth (village of Kulachi) or Kulachi-Jo-Kun (Kulachi's well). The name was changed to Kurrachee in the early British days and in the course of time to its present name of Karachi.

The district lies between 24°-44' to 25°-42' north latitudes and 66°-40' to 67°-35' east longitudes and is situated at extreme western-end of the Indus delta on the coast of the Arabian Sea. The present district of Karachi comprises the city of Karachi, 68 villages and five small islands. It is bounded on the north-east by Dadu District, on the east and south-east by Thatta District, on the south and south-west by the Arabian Sea and on the north-west by Lasbela District. On the western side, the district is sheltered by Cape-Manze, the southern most part of the Kirthar Range intervening between the Indus valley and the mountainous barren areas of Baluchistan. The southern boundaries of the district on the Arabian Sea with a large water inlet known as Western Backwater provide a natural harbour where large cargo and passenger ships can safely be anchored. During the intercensal period an area of 5 square miles was transferred from Thatta District to Karachi District. The total area of the district now stands at 1,362 square miles.

1.2 GEOLOGY AND PHYSICAL FEATURES

The coastal belt of the district is barren and flat with occasional dunes. The terrain rises gradually towards north and west turning into low flat-topped parallel hills, sub-parallel ridges with naked and wide intervening plains devoid of any vegetation, and dry and sandy river beds. The height of the city limits does not generally exceed 100 feet above sea level and the highest land mark Mango pir

is 582 feet. The level shows generally rising tendency from sea, which is gradually driven back. At one time the sea made in-roads and several islands were formed, such as Keamari, Bath Island, Clifton, Ghizri and Oyster Rocks, many of which are now connected with the mainland. The gentle sloping Clifton Beach affords an excellent paddling and bathing sites, where a driveway along the sea-side and a bathing basin has recently been constructed. The suburbs which at one time were predominantly agricultural are now crowded with new colonies and townships like North Karachi, New Karachi, Korangi, Landhi, Baldia, Orangi, Qasba and Malir Extension.

Due to the inherent barrenness of the region, the scenery is tame and yet there is some beauty in it with its low hills, wide valleys mostly eroded islets, a long sea beach, dry river channels and grey rock exposures.

1.3 RIVERS

There are no perennial rivers in the area except the Hub river which forms a series of shallow pools for most part of the year. The Layari river with its small tributaries flows past the most thickly populated parts of the city and ultimately falls into the Arabian Sea at Keamari. The Malir river draining the Mol plateau in Kohistan, has the Kol and Khodeji as its tributaries. After their confluence the river assumes the name of Malir, which ultimately falls into Ghizri Creek between Karachi City and Korangi township. Rainfall being scanty, these rivers hardly have any water for the major part of the year. But they provide underground sources of fresh water supply to the area.

1.4 CLIMATE

On the whole the weather of Karachi is pleasant, though occasionally sultry. The temperature is moderate but the relative humidity is high in some months and varies from 58 percent in December which is the driest month to 85 percent in August which is the moist of all the months. For the greater part of the year, cool evening sea breeze is a great boon to the inhabitants of this area. The hottest

months are May and June when the mean maximum temperature generally jumps to 95°F. The daily temperature at Monora Island and Drigh Road, only six miles apart, vary appreciably. Drigh Road is always hotter during the day and cooler during the night and the daily variation between Manora Island and Drigh Road is sometimes as much as 15°F. At times when the chilly Quetta winds blow from the north, temperature drops even below 40°F, but such periods are rare. For almost half the year, including the monsoons, the winds blow south-west to west. The wind direction during winter changes to east and north-east, maintaining an ideal temperature of about 70°F. January is the coolest and the healthiest month of the year.

Karachi has scanty rainfall but surprising variations from year to year. The average annual rainfall is approximately seven inches. In certain years the rainfall is as high as ten inches and may pour within a short period of 48 hours. With such usually heavy rain the entire city is flooded, choking the drainage system and flooding the low-lying areas making the Karachites life miserable during that period. The rainy season stretches between July-August during which it remains practically clouded every day.

1.5 FLORA

The location of Karachi being intermediate between tropical India and temperate Iran, the life of plants and animals is affected. Coastal types of algae, sea weeds and rose tangles grow in littoral areas. Fresh water vegetation is found in the river valleys and a few date palms grown near springs though not so well as in the interior due to the influence of the sea. Gardens and fruit trees also thrive in the green belts of Karachi. Dry hill vegetation is noticeable in the form of algae, cactus and castor plants.

1.6 FORESTRY

There are two range in the Karachi Forest Division, namely Dhabeji 308,972 acres and Thano Maula Khan 392,810 acres. The common trees grown in patches are

khar, babul and ber. The Forest Department is maintaining a nursery at Model Colony where plants are made available for road-side and other plantations. Schemes are, however, afoot to increase afforestation.

1.7 IRRIGATION

Karachi, being primarily an industrial and commercial district has no canal irrigation except for about 2,000 acres. Karachi Municipal Corporation manages, two modern sewerage water treatment plants, one at Sher Shah (Mangho Pir Road) and other at Mahmoodabad with an idea to provide permanent source of manure and water for cultivation purposes. The treatment plants at Mahmoodabad are designed to supply water for irrigation to the agricultural farms near Landhi and Malir areas. The District Council has constructed a dam over Thando nullah for irrigation.

To meet the increasing demand of water for drinking, washing, industrial and for irrigation purposes, a dam is being built on the river Hub at a distance of 35 miles north-east of Karachi City. The dam will be 151 feet high and 46,264 feet long. The water storage capacity of the dam will be 857,000 acres feet. It is estimated that about 21,000 acres land in Lasbela District of Baluchistan and 1,000 acres in Karachi District will be irrigated by this dam.

1.8 AGRICULTURE

As there is no canal irrigation in the district except about 2,000 acres in Deh Bund Murad Khan, cultivation is largely done by well irrigation. There are about 600 tube-wells run by diesel or electric motors, where vegetables and other commercial crops are grown.

During rainy season, farmers prefer to grow fodder crops instead of food crops as the former are comparatively more paying. The Government is encouraging farmers for the development of agriculture in the district by providing all possible help and facilities like latest scientific techniques, fertilizers, tractors and other implements through their field staff. Better crop varieties are being evolved, suitable to the soil and climate of this area. The

cultivated area available in Karachi District is smaller in comparison to the adjoining districts.

1.9 HORTICULTURE

The soil and climatic conditions of this district are best suited for papaya cultivation which grows in abundance in the district. Mangoes, *chikooos*, dates and guavas are other main fruits grown here. Cultivation of coconut is also gaining favour with the farmers. Once Karachi was known for its many varieties and excellent quality of grapes but probably due to the expansion of the city these orchards have almost disappeared. At present orchards and gardens are located mostly at Malir where land is suitable for such gardens. These gardens are raised along the banks of Nai Malir and Nai Thando, as these are the only *nais* from where sweet sub-soil water is available for fruit trees.

Vegetables grown in this area are lady-fingers, *tinda*, brinjal, melon, bean, turnip, radish, carrot, tomato, cauliflower, cabbage, sweet potato, peas and beet root. Some of these vegetables are seasonal while others are found throughout the year. These, however, do not meet the total requirements of the district. A statement showing area and production of major fruits and vegetables during 1972-73 is given below:

1.10 LIVESTOCK

Cows and buffaloes are kept for milk. Donkeys and camels are used extensively for transportation. According to 1972-Agricultural Census there were 25,000 heads of cattle; 27,000 buffaloes; 18,000 sheep and 69,000 goats in the district. The number of poultry birds stood at 785,000.

1.11 FISHERIES

Karachi has always been the hub of sea fishing in Pakistan. There are excellent fishing spots near Karachi coast, the main favourable conditions being the shallow continental shelf, the clear sun-light and the mingling of salt and fresh waters. River silt and sea weeds supply rich plankton and there are seasonal ocean currents too. Shoals of edible fish are found not very far from the coast. Salmon, pomfret and sardine are the usually available fish. Prawns are a speciality of Karachi.

In 1950, the Government constructed a modern fish harbour three miles off Karachi occupying an area of 380,000 square yards. The harbour originally designed to accommodate 300 to 400 mechanized boats is now loaded with 1,227 mechanized boats. The Marine Fisheries Department which is well equipped with marine research laboratory to undertake biological, technological and oceanographical research has planned to establish another similar organization on the reclaimed land of the harbour to expand the existing facilities and eliminate congestion. Moreover, efforts are also being made for constructing another fish harbour at Ibrahim Hyderi (Korangi Creek). Site for the harbour has been earmarked and is expected to be acquired shortly.

The Karachi Fishermen's Cooperative Society provides guidance to its members and gives monetary advances for necessary purchase of nets and trawlers. There are seventeen freezing, eight canning, eight fish meal one dehydration and one oil extraction plant in Karachi. Out of these plants, ten freezing and four canning plants have been established within the premises of the Karachi Fish Harbour.

The total number of fishermen engaged in marine fishing industry were nearly 71,000 in 1973. The fishing villages on the coastal belt are Ibrahim Hyderi, Rehri, Gizri, Baba Island, Bhit Khorio and Gassion, Khadda Nawabad, Slahabad Island, Shamspar Island, Buleji and Bunglow. In 1973 the marine fish production increased to 158,892 tons. Fish from Karachi is supplied almost daily to all parts of the country, while the average annual export to foreign countries exceeds Rs. 40 millions in foreign exchange.

1.12 INDUSTRIES

There are 1,800 industrial units in Karachi, employing 20 or more persons, the largest number of units in any district in Pakistan and vary from small scale industry to large scale complexes, like Karachi Shipyard and Engineerings Work and Karachi Steel Mills etc. The persons employed in these units are about 300,000. The larger units are located in the industrial estates, viz., Sind Industrial Trading Estate Karachi and Landhi and Korangi Industrial Estates. The smaller units are scattered throughout the city. There are about 67 units of engineering, 83 units of textile, 226 poultry farms, 18 match industries, 9 paper, card board and packaging material industries and 12 marble chips and marble handicraft industries in the district. Besides, there are industrial units which deal in leather and its product, pencil and ball point pens, tooth brush, printing, paper, flour, oil, glass, rubber and plastic, food and beverages, soap, pharmaceutical etc. Major manufactured items are textiles, hosiery, towels, carpets, leather and leather goods and ready made garments.

1.13 COMMUNICATIONS

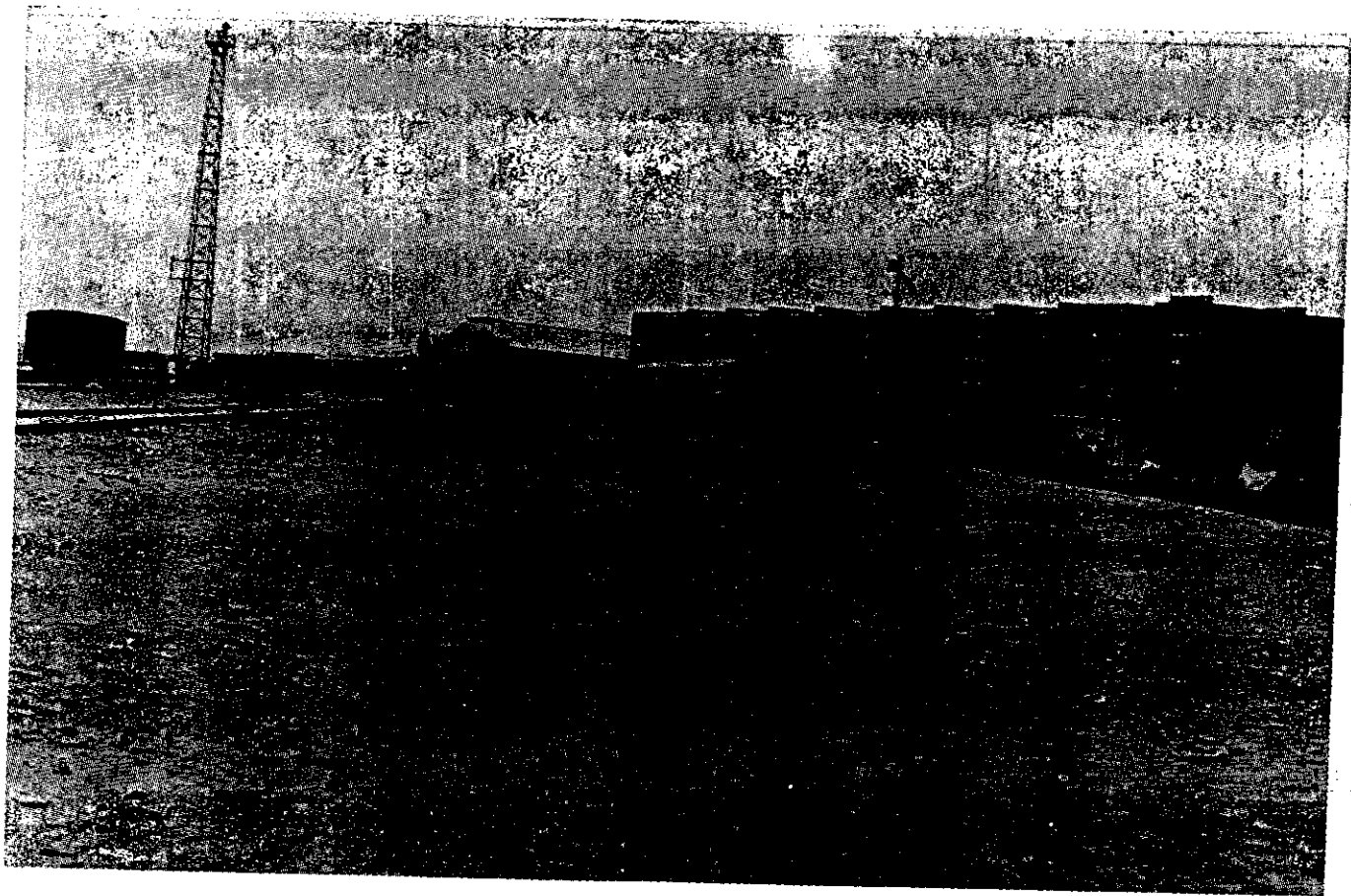
The importance of Karachi in a large measure lies in the network of its communication system. Transport facilities by air, sea and land are available. The Karachi-Peshawar Highway (National Highway) project is underway which will improve the conditions of journey by road. Karachi has also been connected with Hyderabad by newly constructed Super Highway. District Council built roads

in *Baldis* and a link road from village Gadap area with the Super Highway. Memon Goth and other villages in the green belt have been connected with the city through Saudabad by constructing a causeway which has reduced the distance by nearly five miles. Buses provide the cheapest mode of conveyance in the city. Out of the total of 87 routes, 28 have been allotted to public sector and 59 routes to private sector. There are over 4,000 taxi-cabs and about 7,000 motor rickshaws plying in the city. Taxi service is satisfactory and helpful in solving the transport problem to some extent. There are about 800 *Victorias* (Four wheeled horse driven vehicle) which are used for short distance journey and an attraction to tourists. Camel carts are also used extensively for transportation of goods, etc., from the Port to the Town and *vice versa*. There are approximately 1,600 miles of metalled and 500 miles of unmetalled roads in the district. The number of post offices and telegraph offices is 125 and 47 respectively.

Karachi is the terminous of Pakistan Railways. In addition to the main line, there are branch lines to Quetta and Mirpur-Khas branching off from Kotri and Hyderabad. The Circular Railway runs along the outer perimeter of the populated areas and is a cheap means of transportation. Nearly half a million passengers travel in this railway every year. Age-old tram service in the heart of the city, had become a big traffic hazard and was discontinued recently.

The Karachi International Airport along the Karachi-Hyderabad Highway provides all modern facilities required for all types of aeroplanes.

The journey by sea from Karachi is equally interesting. Karachi harbour is one of the best inland harbours of the world and all types of ships can be berthed here. The berthing facilities have been expanded considerably, but ships still have to wait for days outside the harbour for their turn to come. Ocean going streamers from India and the Persian Gulf find good berthing here. The tiny native boats (*dhow*s) still persist in the face of large steamers.

SECTION 2—HISTORY AND CULTURE

2.1 HISTORY

Karachi has a short recorded history of about one hundred years. From a tiny fishing village to a British military settlement, and later as an important commercial and shopping centre for the western part of the sub-continent, it developed by phases. It again became an important military base with sprawling army establishments when the Allied forces advanced into Egypt during the course of the Second World War. But the real growth and development of Karachi started with the partition of the sub-continent into India and Pakistan in 1947 and its transformation into the federal capital.

It is generally believed that Karachi represented Debal or Dewal, meaning a temple, the legend being traced from the Debal temple at Manora. Some historians still think that Karachi was a port described by Nearchos as "Alexander's Heaven" or "Krokala", named in his voyage down the Indus as far back as 325 B.C. Arrian's Indica and Vincent Smith support this theory. Memoirs of Seth Naomal Hotchand disclose interesting incidents of the birth of this city in recent times. There was a seaport town named Kharak *Bander* on the other side of the river Hub (about 16 miles west of Karachi), where Seth Bhojmal, Naomal's great-grand-father, conducted a roaring business in the beginning of the 18th century. Unfortunately the port became unsuitable for shipping purposes as its mouth became sand blocked. Bhojmal and his companions went out in search of another port and discovered this tiny fishing village, then known as Kalachi's Kun or Kalachi Jo-Goth.

The port attracted enterprising traders from the adjoining areas and with the silting of Shah Bandar, another port town, scores of people migrated to Kalachi Jo-Goth by 1782 A.D. When Seth Bhojmal died, this port had a respectable population. The town with its independent administration was headed by some top Hindu businessmen who governed it for years. Soon the Kalhoras of Sind swayed their power over this town but later on it was given to the Khan of Kalat by the Kalhoras as "blood money" for one of the Khan's brothers who had been killed by

thoras in a battle. Fateh Ali, the first Talpur ruler of the province, had sent an expedition to conquer Karachi but could not succeed. He made another attack in 1795. The Khan of Kalat being himself in difficulties surrendered Karachi to the Talpurs who ruled Sind from their capital at Hyderabad. They built the Manora Fort in 1797 as a defence against attack from the sea side.

The British rulers of India from the very beginning had an envious eye on the Sind Province. During the incursions of Sir Charles Napier in Sind, Captain Preedy with a band of about 300 British soldiers alongwith a few hundred locals, managed to subdue the *sardars* and officers of the Talpurs in a bloodless coup and thus Karachi passed on to the British on the 17th February, 1843. After the victories of Miani and Babo, Sir Charles Napier was appointed the first Governor and Commander of the British forces in Sind. The centre of Government was also shifted by him from Hyderabad to Karachi. Sir Charles Napier probably foresaw today's greater Karachi and immortalised the glory of Karachi in the following words: "Thou shalt be the Glory of the East: would that I would come again to see you, Kurrachee, in your grandeur". He brought forth speedy developments in Karachi making it a great military centre. Napier Barracks were built for the British soldiers and sanatoriums at Ghizri and Clifton for them. The Karachi harbour was developed and 120 feet high lighthouse was constructed at Manora, visible from a distance of about 16 miles out in the sea. He introduced the police system and appointed Lt. Marston as the first captain of this force. Marston House on Marston Road is still a tribute to his name. The present Municipal Zoological Garden was laid out in 1843, during the period of Napier.

General Sir Charles Napier resigned in August, 1847. Thereafter, Sind became a part of the Bombay Province and a Chief Commissioner was appointed in place of the Governor. Sir Bartle Frere the second Chief Commissioner, realising Sir Charles Napier's dreams, laid the first railway line between Karachi and Kotri, introduced postal system, built metalled roads, bridges, dak bungalows and court houses. He started an English school in Karachi and formed a civic body which in course of time became the

Municipal Corporation. Frere Garden was laid out by him and the Frere Hall building was later built and named after him.

In 1936, Sind was separated from Bombay Province and created into a separate province. Sir, Lancelot Graham was appointed the first Governor of the new province with Karachi as its capital.

On the 14th August, 1947 on the eve of Independence Karachi became the capital of the newly born state of Pakistan. Quaid-i-Azam Mohammad Ali Jinnah took oath of the office of Governor General in this historic city. The Government of Pakistan took over the administration of Karachi from the Government of Sind, on 23rd July 1948 and appointed an Administrator to look after it. The headquarters of the province of Sind, also continued to remain at Karachi.

In 1952 the status of Karachi was raised to that of a Chief Commissioner's jurisdiction and was later called the Federal Capital Area. In 1959 an Administrator again replaced the Chief Commissioner to control the affairs of the federal territory of Karachi.

After the merger of provinces of N.W.F.P., Punjab, Baluchistan and Sind into one province of West Pakistan in October, 1955 also known as "One Unit," Karachi was politically considered to be a part of West Pakistan and given representation in the West Pakistan Assembly but administratively it continued to be the federal territory under the Central Government till an alternative site for the country's capital was selected.

After dismemberment of "One Unit" and the restoration of four provinces on the 1st July, 1970. Karachi again became the capital of Sind.

Pilot Officer Rashid Minhas was the first officer of the Pakistan Air Force to be awarded Nishan-e-Haider. On the morning of Friday, August 20, 1971 he made the supreme sacrifice of his life to foil the evil designs of a defector, who attempted to hijack a plane of Pakistan Air Force. He deliberately made the supreme sacrifice for the honour of Pakistan. He was the brave son of Karachi. For his this act of gallantry, Rashid Minhas was awarded Nishan-e-Haider.

2.2 RACES AND TRIBES

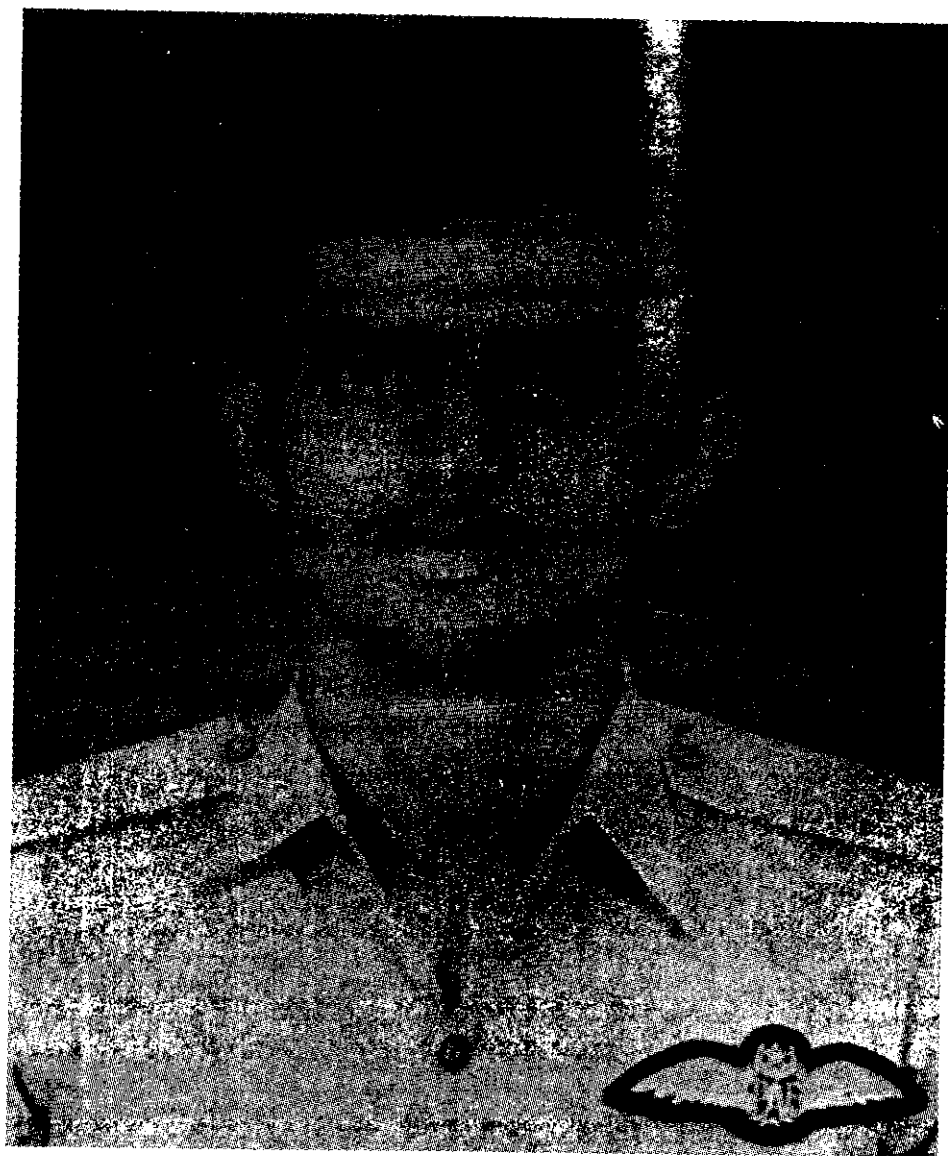
The attraction of big business and industry, allured a large number of people from the rest of the country. These out-siders in due course of time have become so numerous that the original residents of Karachi have become a small minority. This, in turn has lent a cosmopolitan atmosphere to the city not found elsewhere in Pakistan. People of all races, clans, regions and religions live here. The colour of their skins varies from dark to fair. It has become a melting pot of people from all parts of Pakistan. The tough Mekrani, with his dark colour and woolly hair, the tall fair-skinned Baloch and Pathan, the well built Punjabi, the sturdy Sindhi rub shoulders with the Parsis claiming Aryan descent, the Memons and Bohras with a fair amount of Arab blood, the Khojas (Ismailis) tracing their ancestry to Iran. However all these people have evolved a way of living in harmony without any discrimination of colour or creed.

The original residents of Karachi are dark brown, sturdy well built and of medium stature. They are concentrated in the old quarters of the city, viz, Khadda, Lyari, Mithadar, Kharadar and Ranchore Line areas.

The fishermen community is mostly concentrated in the villages of Ibrahim Hydri, Keamari, Sonmiari, Baba, Bhit, Manora, Khadda and Lyari areas. They are generally divided into different tribes, like Lara, Wangoor, Bandari, Karachia, etc. Each tribe has its own chieftain known as Jamot.

Another important, though small, native group is that of Shiddies or Mekranis as they are generally called. These people are of mixed negroid race. They have dark colour, curly hair and are strongly built. They claim to be the descendants of the soldiers and camp-followers of the great Muslim Arab conquerer, Muhammad-Bin-Qasim.

Ismaili Khojas and Dawoodi Bohras are important communities in the city. Khojas are members of Ismaili Shia sect. Bohras also belong to the Shia sect. These two communities are normally fair in colour and are noted for their remarkable business acumen.

Among the minority communities, there are Parsis, Christians and Bangies. Parsis came to Karachi as businessmen and trader with the British army. The bulk of the Christians are Goans who originally came from Goa. They are of mixed descent and distinguished by Portuguese surnames. Bangies belong to Schedule Castes. They are from Hyderabad, Tharparkar and Sanghar Districts and from the Punjab. They do menial jobs in the city.

Before Independence the main mother-tongue of the area of the present Karachi District was Sindhi. However, with the influx of the migrants from India and others from various parts of Pakistan, majority of the people in Karachi City and its suburbs now speak Urdu. Other important languages spoken in the district are Punjabi, Pushto, Gujrati. English is generally spoken by the educated classes and the foreign residents.

2.3 FOOD

The staple food is wheat bread (*chapatis*). The Punjabis, Sindhis, Mekranies, Balochis love *roti* or *chapati* moistened and enriched by the gravy of meat curry. Meat consumption is heavy in the city. Vegetables are also favourite as food articles. Fruits are also taken by those who can afford. Rice is a common dish among the Hyderabadis and Kashmiries. The Muslims prefer rich food as *shami kabab*, chicken *tikka*, etc. Fish is a boon to Karachi-tes, local prawns and shrimps are highly preferred. Pom-frets, *palkas* and carps of excellent quality are substituted for meat. The *gajar halwa* in winter is a wholesome sweet dish. The *shahi tookra* is another delicacy. The Karachi *halwa* is another speciality which is carried home by visitors from up country.

2.4 DRESS AND ORNAMENTS

The older group of the migrants wear *sherwani*, *kurta* straight or *churidar pajama* and a Jinnah cap.

Colourful clothes and *kamiz* (a long knee length collarless shirt) are favourite with the women folk. Besides, *ghararas*, *kamiz* and *shalwar* are commonly worn

with a *dupatta*. Migrants from eastern and southern India prefer *sari* which has now become a sophisticated dress. A large variety of ornaments, viz. *nath*, *jhoomar*, *guluband* and *paze* are also worn.

2.5 DWELLINGS

The new dwellings of this area are generally made of reinforced cement and concrete. The architecture of the old Karachi city is marked by tiled houses with deep wide verandahs enclosed by latticed wooden screens. These typical houses of the early British period dominate the sky-line of central Karachi around Victoria Road and Somerset Street. Most of these old houses have been built with the Ghizri stones. The Karachi Development Authority has played an important role in providing suitable land for the new colonies.

Through the development of Karachi, the former barren hilly terrain has been transformed into well planned residential areas with wide boulevards and green parks. This sprawling new suburbia is hardly recognizable to those who saw the area barely 30 years ago.

2.6 OCCUPATIONS

Karachi is an industrial and commercial city having multi-occupations. The main occupation of the people is business and trade. The other major portion of the population consists of labour class including skilled and unskilled labour. Most of the labourers have migrated to Karachi from different parts of Pakistan. The remaining small portion of the population is having different occupations including government and private service as well as agriculture. The women also assist their men in the economic activity in different fields of business, service, education and other institutions. Mostly the women are serving in schools, colleges and hospitals.

2.7 CULTURE, CUSTOMS AND TRADITIONS

Marriages in most families are still arranged by the parents. The betrothal ceremony is called *mangni*. It is the formal engagement of a boy and a girl. The

betrothal ceremony is the declaration of engagement on the part of the two parties in which the relatives and friends from both sides assemble at the bride's house and terms and conditions of marriage are settled. The betrothal ring is presented by the bride's parents to the bridegroom in the presence of guests. Generally betrothal ceremony is performed in a simple way but occasionally it is elaborate as in some other parts of the country.

The customs amongsts the Sindhi families of playing drums and *shahnai* (Sindhi flute) at least a week before the marriage is universal. The bride becomes the centre of every body's attention, when four to five days before the marriage women from the bridegroom's side go to the house and make her sit in seclusion. The ceremony is called *manja* or *manwah*. None is allowed to visit the bride during these few days except the close female relatives of the bride. Two days before the marriage the *mehndi* ceremony is performed at the bridegroom's house. The ladies of the bridegroom's house apply *mehndi* on the hands and feet of the bride. On the marriage day the bridegroom is taken in a procession on a horse back or a car accompanied by relatives, guests and friends. The procession is preceded by a band of musicians. Before reaching the house of the bride, the bridegroom is taken to a mosque or shrine of a saint for blessings. The procession terminates at the door of the bride's house. The marriage is then solemnized by the *moulvi* who recites *nikah*. The amount of *mehr*, the dower money is fixed and is made known to the wedding party. Dry dates and sweets are distributed and the marriage feast is served. The bride generally leaves her father's house with the bridegroom after *nikah*. The bridegroom gives a feast called *valima* at his residence usually on the following day.

Ismaili boys and girls generally marry young. The majority of the marriages are arranged by the parents. The choice of the boy and the girl is, however, given due consideration and more and more of them are picking their own spouses. The wedding is a gay day for every one concerned. Young and old dress up in the best of their dresses. A day prior to wedding, the bride has her

feet and hands dyed with *mehndi*, in beautiful and intricate designs. In the evening, the relatives and friends are invited to *pithee* ceremony. Paste of sandal wood, *till* (sesame), *haldi* (turmeric) and *wrad* (pulses) are applied by seven *sohagams* (happily married ladies from among the girls relatives and friends) to bring her good luck. The girl usually sits on a *bajot* (low square wooden stool). After the ceremony, the girl steps down from the *bajot* onto two empty lamp containers tied together with a red thread and breaks the thread with the accompaniment of songs, music, laughters and teasing. There is a common taboo that the bride should not see the groom after the wedding has been fixed.

The Parsi marriage, though simple and short is nevertheless a complicated affair made so by adopting all kinds of Hindu customs and practices. Marriage among the Parsis is a sacrament. To marry and bring up noble and pure children is given as a duty. Before the ceremony takes place presents are exchanged between the two parties. Bride's people decorate the bridegroom and the bridegroom's father with his own hands puts ear-rings on the bride. The bride and the bridegroom are then taken on a prepared *dias*. The marriage ceremony is short and simply performed by two priests one each from bride and bridegroom's party.

They recite the prayers which are in old Avastic language and close by blessing the couple. Immediately after the marriage ceremony, the priests are given some presents by both the parties according to their status. The bride and the bridegroom then go to the fire temple where a sacramental fire is kept burning day and night, say short prayers and offer sandal wood to the fire. Then they return to the bridegroom's house for a feast and marry-making.

Among the Muslims the birth of a child is a festive occasion and is attended by ladies. Soon after the birth of a child a *mullah* or an elderly member of the family is called to recite *azan* in the ears of the child. On the 6th day, a ceremony known as *chhatti* is performed when sweets are distributed. Child is bathed and mother's milk is given to infant. At this ceremony the name of the baby

is generally announced for the first time. Young girls sing festive songs with the accompaniment of *dholak*. The fortieth day, the end of the mother's confinement, is celebrated with feast for ladies and among more religious people by visits to the tombs of patron saints. The other important religious ceremony is called *aqiqah*. Generally two goats for a male and one for a female child is sacrificed on this occasion and the meat is distributed amongst relatives, friends, neighbours and poor people. The circumcision of a male child is often celebrated with gaiety.

In the case of death, the occasion is solemnly observed. Relatives and friends gather to console the bereaved family. The relatives of the deceased observe three days of mourning. Neighbours and relatives provide food to the deceased's family usually for two or three days, as by custom, no cooking is done in the house of the deceased during this period. The dead body is bathed and wrapped in a white shroud and taken on a cot in a procession to the graveyard. Every Thursday, for the first 40 days after death, people recite the Holy Quran to bless the departed soul. On the 40th day *cheelam* is performed when relatives gather and the Holy Quran is recited.

SECTION 3—ADMINISTRATIVE SET-UP

3.1 EXECUTIVE, JUDICIARY AND REVENUE SYSTEM

The district is under the charge of a Deputy Commissioner, who works under the general control of a Commissioner. The Deputy Commissioner is responsible for co-ordination of the functions of all nation-building departments in the district. On executive side he is assisted by Magistrates while on the revenue side by Deputy Collectors and *Mukhtariars*.

The police administration is vested in the Senior Superintendent of Police who is assisted by Superintendents of Police for each Police Division. The police administration in the district is divided into 51 police stations each headed by a Station House Officer (S.H.O.).

The judicial administration of the district is under the charge of a District and Sessions Judge who is assisted by the Additional Sessions Judge and other Civil Judges.

3.2 EDUCATIONAL FACILITIES

The educational system prevailing in Karachi at the time of Independence was not adequate to meet the need of tremendous increase of population. With the passage of time and increase in population the problem became more acute. As a result, a large number of schools, colleges, technical and vocational centres were established by the Government as well as by private organizations.

The University of Karachi was established in 1950 along the congested Princes Street from where it was moved to its new campus in 1960 on the Country Club Road. All the 33 degree colleges of arts, commerce, engineering, medicines, law and education are affiliated to this University. The University of Karachi is a teaching, examining and research body. The literacy ratio of Karachi District is 51.2% for both sexes and 55.8% and 45.0% for male and female respectively. A statement showing number of institutions and students in 1972-73 is given below:

3.3 MEDICAL FACILITIES

Among the city's major hospitals are Jinnah Post Graduate Medical Centre, Civil Hospital, Services Hospital, Holy Family Hospital, Saventh Day Adventist Hospital, Shoukat Haroon Hospital, Nazimabad Hospital, Liaquat National Hospital and Major Zia-ud-Din Abbasy Memorial Hospital. In addition there are a number of dispensaries, maternity homes and child welfare centres established by the Government, the Municipal Corporation and phillanthropic and charitable organizations. Besides, there is a tuberculosis centre, skin and social hyglene centre, leprosy control centre and epidemic hospital. In 1972 there were 62 hospitals and 396 dispensaries in the district.

SECTION 4—IMPORTANT HISTORICAL PLACES

4.1 KARACHI CITY

Quaid-i-Azam while replying to a civic address in August, 1947 describing the city of Karachi said, "I am Karachi born and it was on the sands of Karachi that I played marbles in my boyhood. I was schooled at Karachi. Un-doubtedly I have great love and regard for this beautiful town not only because of my old associations with it or because it is my birth-place but because it has now become the birth place of the free, sovereign and independent State of Pakistan. For all freedom-loving people, Karachi will on that account not only be a symbol of special significance but will occupy a place in history for which there is no parallel. Karachi is no ordinary town. Nature has given it exceptional advantages which particularly suit modern needs and conditions. That is why starting from humble beginnings it has come to be what it is, and one could say with confidence that the day is not far off when it will be ranked among the first cities of the world. Not only its airports, but the naval port and also the main towns will be the finest. There is one specially pleasing feature about Karachi, while most of the big cities are crowded and cramped with over-towering structures. Karachi has open spaces and hill-station style roofs which give to the visitor a feeling of space and ease. It has also got the advantage of a salubrious climate and is always blessed with healthy and cool breezes throughout the year".

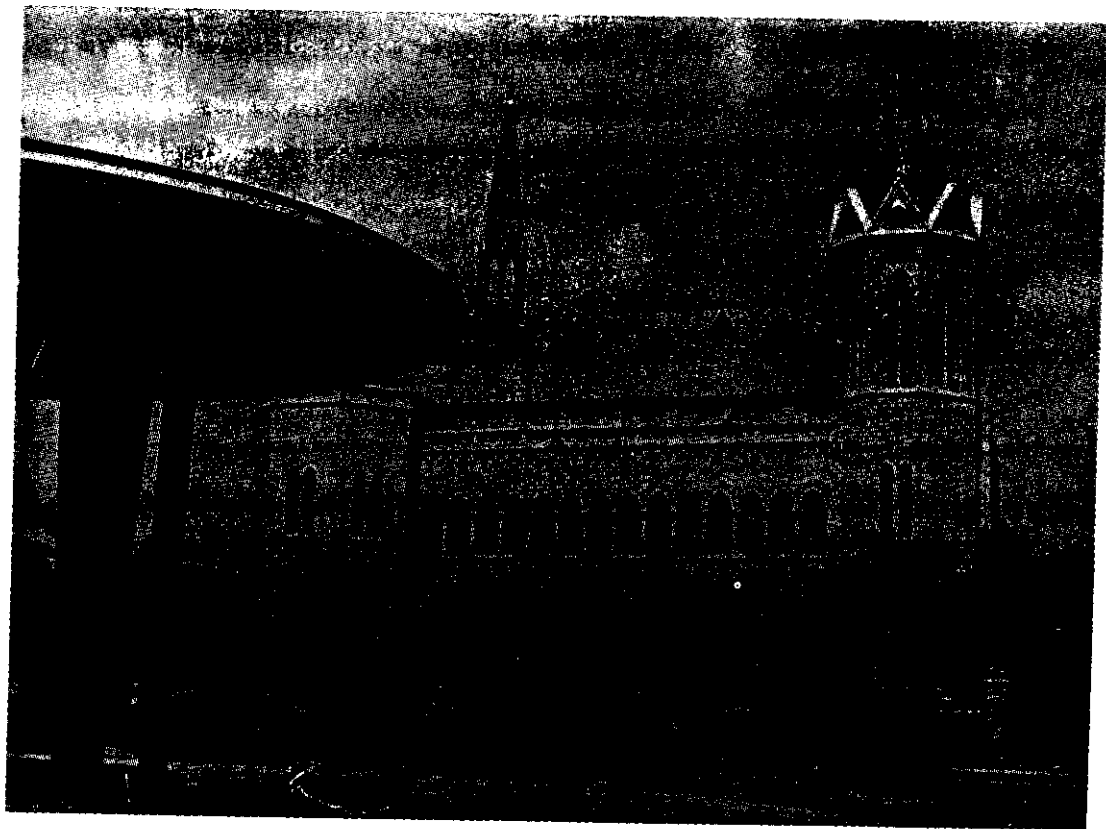
Karachi used to be a small, peaceful and quiet provincial headquarters before Independence. With the emergence of Pakistan and the selection of Karachi as the first Federal Capital in 1947 it developed into the largest and busiest metropolitan area of the country. Expansion of its boundaries has made it difficult to say where the city ends. On one side it is limited by the sea while on the other, the gently undulating land is open to further expansion and development. Karachi is important as a natural sea harbour and has been growing over the last century. The greatest impetus to its development in pre-Independence era was given during the two World Wars. Due to its importance of being on the international sea and air routes and a great natural harbour there has been great influx of business community in this city. The pressure of population increased in this city because of national capital and influx of refugees from India with the result that its present population is ten times its population in 1947.

There are first class hotels in Karachi, both on the sea front and in fashionable quarters for the visitors to choose from. Prominent among these are Hotel Inter-continental and Taj Hotel at Dr. Ziauddin Ahmad Road, Hotel Metropole and Palace Hotel at Club Road, Hotel Holiday and United at Frere Street Saddar, Beach Luxury Hotel and Hotel Imperial at Moulvi Tamizuddin Road, Hotel Salatin, Tiwana Tourist Inn and Hotel Al-Farooq in Saddar, Hotel Jabees at Abdullah Haroon Road, Midway House at Karachi Airport, Central Hotel in Civil Lines, Hotel Excelsior at Inverarity Road, Columbus Hotel at Clifton Road, Grand Hotel Malir and Alfaiz Hotel at Fatima Jinnah Road.

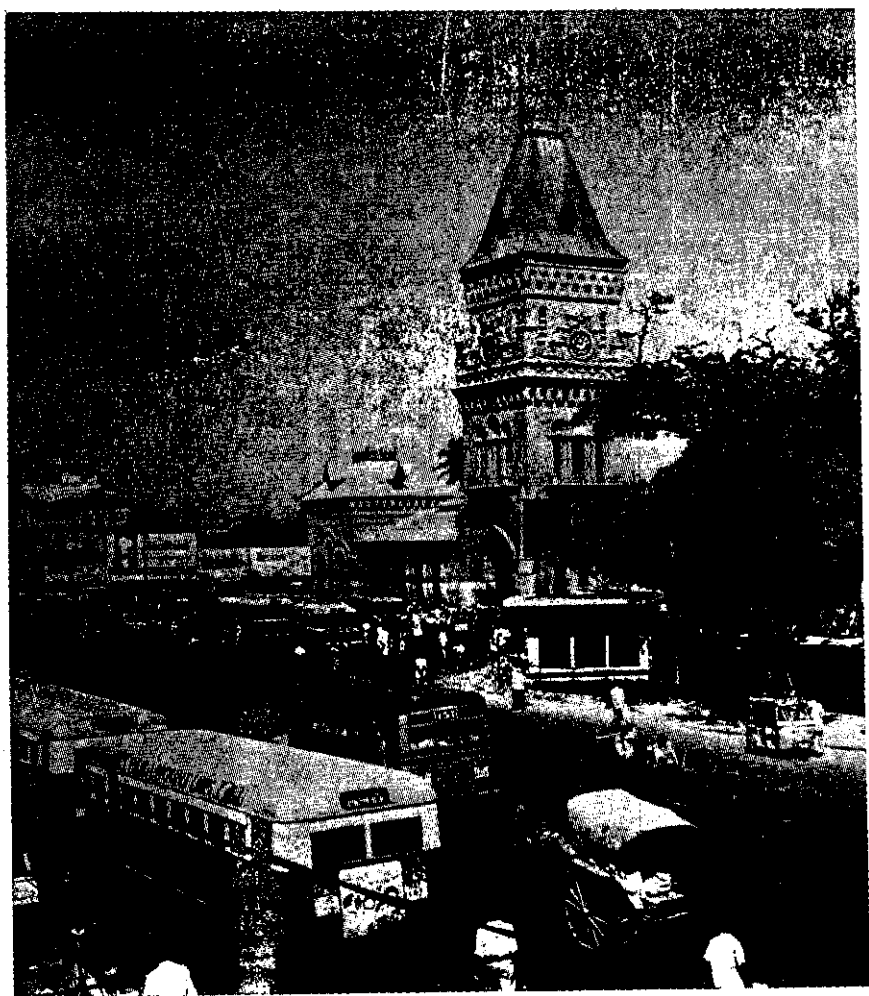
Andaleeb Room of Taj Hotel, Nasreen Room of Hotel Inter-continental, 007 Room of Beach Luxury Hotel, Panthouse of Hotel Excelsior, Playboy Club and Seacock at Dr. Ziauddin Ahmad Road and Samar of Hotel Metropole are the important night clubs in Karachi.

A brief description of important and historical buildings of Karachi is given below :—

1. SIND ASSEMBLY BUILDING.—This building is situated opposite the Chief Court Building near



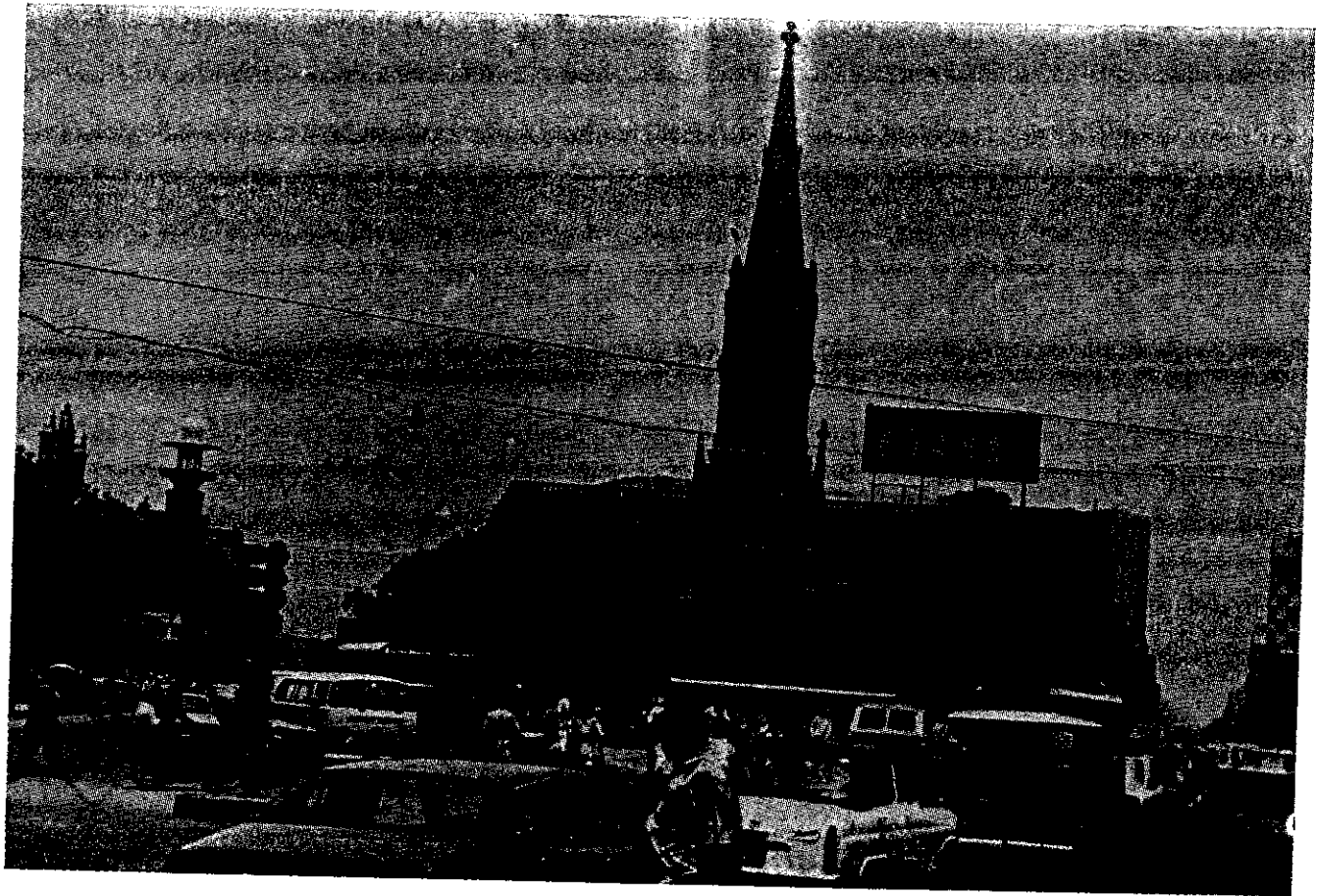
Bagh-e-Jinnah, Karachi

- Burns Garden. It is a beautiful building in Ghizri limestone covering a large area. It contains a portion of the Provincial Secretariat also.
2. **CHIEF COURT BUILDING.**—It is situated on Court Road opposite the newly constructed multi-storeyed building and the Provincial Assembly. This magnificent red sandstone structure in the renaissance style stands, as an evidence of Karachi's architectural wealth. It is one of the most imposing buildings in the city with magnificent cupolas, balconies and pillars.
 3. **BAGH-E-JINNAH.**—Built in the memory of Sir Walter Frere, Governor of Bombay in 1865 is one of the most striking buildings in Karachi. Though small in size, it has a charm of its own. This building now houses the National Museum. Attached to the Frere Hall are beautiful laid out gardens which are the scene of civic receptions to the visiting heads of states and other dignitaries.
 4. **EMPRESS MARKET.**—This is an attractive building along Predy Street in Saddar with a clock tower in front and a courtyard in the middle. One can find almost every thing for the household within the four walls of this market.
 5. **KHALIKDINA HALL.**—This hall is the largest public hall in Karachi which can accommodate over 700 people. It was constructed in 1906 on M.A. Jinnah Road and is under the control of Karachi Municipal Corporation. It also houses a library.
 6. **K. M. C. BUILDING.**—Quite in keeping with the tradition of the city, this building stands as a splendid monument of what the old Karachi Municipal Corporation has been able to achieve for nearly a century. It had cost the Corporation over Rs. 1,400,000. It is situated on M.A. Jinnah Road, with frontage in the form of the letter 'E' and is made of Jodhpur red sandstone. It has also a hall to accommodate 500 people.
 7. **DENSO HALL.**—Situated on the M.A. Jinnah Road it was built in 1856 and named after the chairman of the Karachi Chamber of Commerce. It has a hall on the upper storey with an accommodation of nearly 500 persons. A public library and a clock tower are among its attractions.
 8. **KARACHI CHAMBER OF COMMERCE.**—Established in 1865, this European institution stands on Wood Street. It is an important commercial centre and is a symbol of expanding business of Karachi. The building has a traditional Grecian column frontage and a beautiful hall with grey marble flooring.
 9. **STATE BANK OF PAKISTAN.**—Built in 1960, the State Bank of Pakistan, situated on McLeod Road, is a land mark in modern architecture. It has made attractive use of local building materials specially marble and other stones. Rising to a height of hundred and fifty seven feet it is one of the tallest buildings in Karachi. The special feature of the building is a well laid-out roof garden. This building accommodates all the headquarters departments of the State Bank of Pakistan.
 10. **COTTON EXCHANGE BUILDING.**—It is located opposite the City Railway Station and an exceedingly impressive building with the usual dome and column structure. It is always buzzing with activity of buyers and sellers of cotton, the silver fibre of Pakistan.
 11. **LAXMI BUILDING.**—It stands on M.A. Jinnah Road. It has a gigantic statue of Laxmi, the Hindu goddess of wealth, standing on a lotus flower, made of attractive stone and plaster work.
 12. **CUSTOMS HOUSE.**—Built in 1920, it houses the offices of the Pakistan Customs Department over looking the massive Import Yard and Native Jetty. It is grand pile of three storeys with an attractive cornice and frieze frontage.

13. **PORT TRUST BUILDING.**—It is a crescent-shaped building and built in the renaissance style almost in continuation of the Customs House. It is situated on the corner of M.A. Jinnah Road and Edulji Dinshaw Road at a short distance from Merewether Tower.
14. **PRESIDENT'S HOUSE.**—It is situated on the Havelock Road opposite Y.M.C.A. building. This is also one of the beautiful pieces of architecture the British have left. Initially built to be the official residence of the Governor of Sind, this building has the privilege of welcoming the Father of the Nation as the first Governor General of Pakistan after Independence. Apart from being a spacious building, it has beautiful gardens and open lawns on which the banquets and receptions, are often held in honour of visiting heads of states and other dignitaries.
15. **MOHATTA PALACE.**—This impressive building with its picturesque domes and art work was originally built by a Parsi business magnate at the turn of the century for his own residential purposes at Clifton.
16. **THE OLD SIND ASSEMBLY BUILDING.**—Situated on M.A. Jinnah Road, this building was used after Independence for holding sessions of the Sind Assembly. Set in a large compound, the building houses at present the N.J.V. School and Directorate of Education, Karachi.
17. **KARACHI POLICE HEAD OFFICE.**—Situated on McLeod Road, this newly constructed building accommodates all the departments of the Karachi police. It is a magnificent seven storey building with an impressive frontage.
18. **AMERICAN EMBASSY BUILDING.**—This building stands on Victoria Road opposite the Bagh-e-Jinnah and is a striking piece of modern architecture. It has added beauty and attraction to Karachi.
19. **MEMON MASJID.**—Situated in the heart of the big business area of the city at the western end of M.A. Jinnah Road. It was completed in 1960. Built of red sandstone, it has beautifully executed friezes and screens in intricate mosaic designs reminiscent of the glorious days of Islam. A large courtyard leads to the main hall supported by a number of pillars and arches in the Saracenic style.
20. **DEFENCE HOUSING SOCIETY MOSQUE.**—This mosque has recently been constructed in the Defence Co-operative Housing Society. It has a very large single dome under which prayer congregations are held. It is built of white and green marble and attracts a large number of visitors from up-country and tourists.
21. **KHURASAN ISLAMIC CULTURAL CENTRE.**—It stands on a quiet road in Amil Colony off the busy roundabout of the Old Exhibition Ground. This is a religious centre of the *Shia* community Religious meetings held here, and known as Majlis-i-Shah-i-Khurasan, are very famous and attended by thousands of people from all parts of the country.
22. **AGHA KHAN JAMAT KHANA.**—It is situated on Britto Road and is the main congregation place for the Ismaili Khojas of Karachi.
23. **STELLA MARIS.**—It is a fine example of modern architecture, completed in 1960, it is the chapel of Vatican Legation and is situated on Old Clifton facing the Sea.
24. **HABIB BANK PLAZA.**—Habib Bank Plaza is the tallest bank building in Asia and Africa (excluding South Africa). It is one of the most imposing modern building in this part of the world. The entire building is centrally air-conditioned. Each floor with 26 windows comprises two inter-connected semi-circles with independent entrance. The flooring is of heavy duty vinyl tiles. The building is equipped with

six computerised high speed elevators. It has its own post office and telegraph office on the 5th floor. Two cold water drinking fountains are provided on each floor. Two modern toilet blocks have been provided on every floor. The building is equipped with a specialised integrated telephone system. A conference hall with a seating capacity of 140 persons is available on the 22nd floor. The hall which can be rented is equipped with all modern facilities including cleaning and polishing services. Terrace gardens have been provided on 1st, 4th and 23rd floors. The main entrance has five automatic doors. The building has its own stand-by generators, which start working automatically in case the electric supply fails.

4.2 MAZAAR OF QUAID-I-AZAM

The most distinguished and revered premises in Karachi is the mausoleum of Quaid-i-Azam Mohammad Ali Jinnah the father of the Pakistani nation. He was born at Wazir Mansion in an old part of Karachi (Kharadar). Wazir Mansion has been declared a national monument. The last remains of the father of the nation are buried on a small mound on Mohammad Ali Jinnah Road. The mausoleum is built entirely of white marble. Its impressive dome, North African arches, copper grills, silver grave-railing, magnificent crystal chandelier of Chinese origin and of course changing of the guards give it an air of serenity and solemnity. Nearby the mausoleum of Quaid-i-Azam Mohammad Ali Jinnah are buried his two lieutenants-Khan Liaquat Ali Khan, the first Prime Minister of Pakistan and Sardar Abdul Rab Nishtar, and the Quaid-i-Azam's sister Miss Fatima Jinnah. The mausoleum is surrounded by well laid gardens and is illuminated with flood lights at night.

4.3 KARACHI SEA-PORT

Karachi is the best natural harbour in the entire region. Sir Charles Napier, the first British Governor of Sind, took personal interest in the town and port. In 1847, when he left Karachi, a monument was raised in his memory

near the Napier Mole, the construction of which was the first step in the improvement of the harbour. At first the port afforded anchorage for native jetties only. No vessel, drawing more than 10 to 12 feet of water, could enter the harbour safely. There were no wharves for passengers or goods. The Karachi Port Trust which replaced the previous Harbour Board was constituted by an Act of Bombay Legislature in 1886 and it constructed 13 berths for ocean-going ships by 1910. Thereafter it added Keamari Groyne, East Pier, China Creek Bridge, Manora Breakwaters, ship piers, such as, Merewether, West Wharf, Light Houses, Oil Pier, Dry Docks, until by 1917 the Karachi harbour boasted of having 17 berths and 2 moorings for ocean-going vessels drawing up to 27 feet at the lowest tide.

During World War II, the port of Karachi assumed strategic importance and in common with other ports in India and more particularly those on the west coast was called upon to handle the enormously increased volume of imports because of war. To cope with this sudden increase in traffic, additional cranes, lighters, tugs, etc. were acquired and ship repairing facilities at the port extended. As the premier sea-port of Pakistan, it continued to receive high priority for further improvements in its berthings, navigational and equipment facilities. It has recently added a dry dock and a shipyard to enhance its value as a first class port. Besides being a port of call for both ocean-going and coastal vessels, it is also the home port of the bulk of Pakistan merchant fleet and Pakistan Navy.

There are a number of projects for expansion of Karachi Port which comprise six schemes for port modernisation, rehabilitation and expansion.

4.4 KARACHI AIRPORT

Karachi Airport is the gateway to the east. It was built in 1924 when aviation was in its infancy. In 1928, it became the port of entry into India for the Imperial Airways (now B.O.A.C.). During World War II, it was taken over by USARF who handed it over to Civil Aviation in 1945 after the War. At the time of Independence this was the only airport in good shape and it met the national and international requirements at that time. During the last 26 years it has grown to be one of the best in

Asia in air traffic control and communication facilities. It has fully equipped Flight Information Centre, Area Control Centre, Radar Approach Control and Air Traffic Control Tower providing for the operation of aircraft in the air, efficient conduct of flights and maintaining an orderly crew of air traffic. Karachi Airport also has a big fire fighting fleet manned by trained personnel with ambulances and fire jeeps to meet any emergency. The Pakistan International Airlines (PIA) Head Office and engineering base is situated at the airport terminal. Besides operating Boeing and Fokker aircraft for home and international routes, the PIA is maintaining an Airlines Ground Training School which provides training in all the major fields of aviation. The PIA has undertaken a major renovation project at Karachi Airport to meet its daily expanding requirements of the supersonic jet era.

4.5 KAHKASHAN (CLIFTON)

Clifton is situated at a distance of about three miles from the centre of the city and is a prized evening resort. It has beautiful parks, a *baradari*, tower and a car parking place. This is known as Jehangir Kothari Parade. A beautiful promenade built of sand-stone, known as Lloyd's Pier, leads all the way from the Clifton Bluff to the beach nearly a quarter mile away by a series of stairs with level walks in between. It commands a breath-taking panoramic view of the Arabian Sea and the sprawling city and harbour of Karachi. The beach can also be approached by a road winding round the high-ground. Both Cliftons, old and new, attract a large number of visitors every evening and afford a great relief from the hustle and bustle of the city life. Vendors make good business in the evening. Sea shells, beads and cowries are a source of great attraction, specially for ladies.

4.6 HAWKS BAY

Hawksbay, situated a few miles from Mauripur, is linked with the city both by road and by sea. It is a lovely holiday resort with a row of beach huts comfortably equipped for overnight stay. The crescent shaped beach about two miles long offers good sea-bathing facilities to lovers of red sand, bright sun and salt water. It attracts a large

number of visitors on week-ends and other holidays. Foreigners love the spot and often go there for swimming.

4.7 MANORA

At a little distance from Karachi harbour at Keamari lies the island of Manora with its imposing lighthouse welcoming the incoming ships from the high seas. It is said that the ancient Arab traders coming into the port of Karachi had named this tiny island as "Al-Munawira"—the lighted one, on account of an old lighthouse. With the passage of time this island came to be known as Manora.

It is a popular tourist resort for the up-country visitors. It has a long beach but not very good for sea-bathing because of the high waves and deep sea front. The attraction of Manora, however, lies mainly in the sea view that it offers to the visitors.

When Karachi originally developed, a fort was built by the Talpur family at Manora to guard the harbour from attack from the sea side, but the fort has now vanished. There is also a temple on the island which is often referred to as the old temple of Debal which was attacked and conquered by Mohammad-Bin-Qasim.

Pakistan Navy has built several bridges connecting Manora with Mauripur but this long land route is, however, not open to general public. The only transport between the city and the island is a large number of launches and sail-boats.

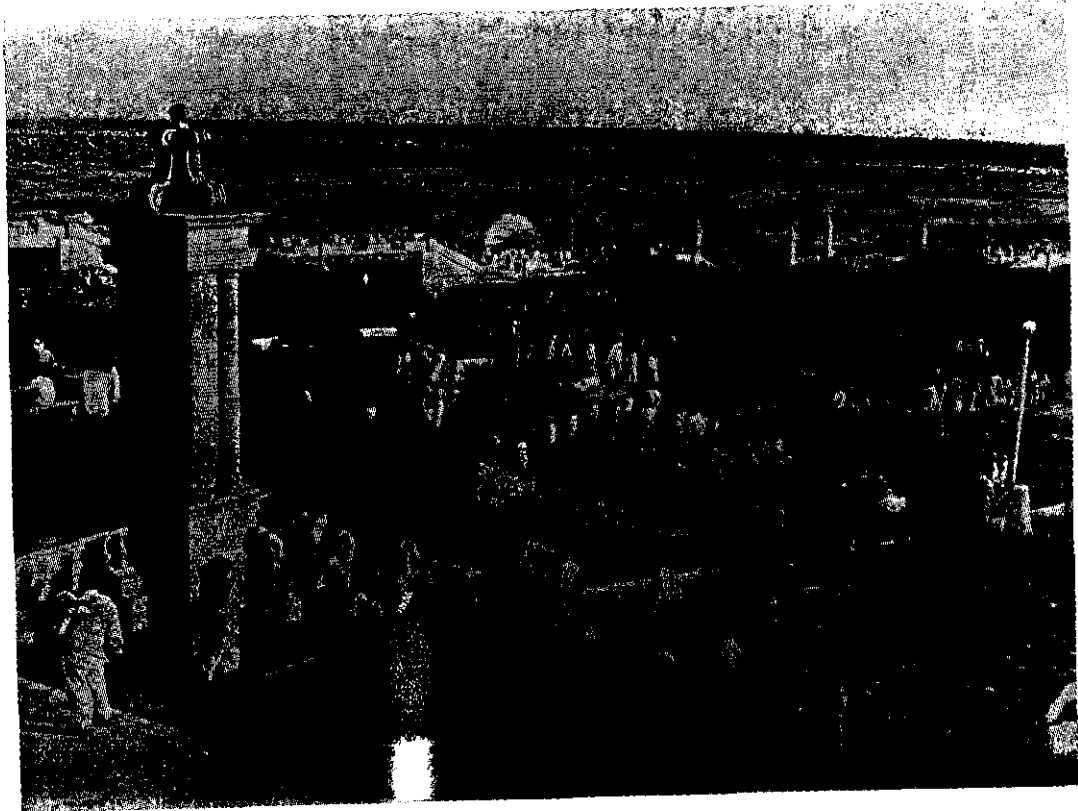
Manora Island houses a workshop of the Karachi Port Trust, a lighthouse and a navel training establishment.

4.8 SANDSPIT

Sandspit is a gently sloping sandy beach nearer to Karachi than Hawksbay and can be reached easily by road and sea. Well furnished beach huts have been constructed there for the comfort of picknickers who want to stay for the night. Local as well as foreign visitors

manifest an immense love for Sandspit and consequently weak-ends and other holidays attract a large number of people.

4.9 KORANGI TOWNSHIP

At a distance of about 8 miles from the heart of the city near Korangi Creek is Korangi Township. This colony is one of the remarkable achievements in construction works as it contains about 26,000 quarters which were built during 6 months time. The colony was established in order to remove the curse of slums from the face of this metropolitan city and provide decent shelter to the people of whom mostly were labourers. The houses consist of one or two pucca rooms and contain all the facilities of the modern standards of decency. Two oil refineries and a few industrial concerns are also established at Korangi in the area reserved for industries.

4.10 MANGOPIR

Traces of a small pre-historic settlement were discovered 10 miles north of Karachi on the eastern foot of the hillock on which the tomb of Pir Mango stands. The site is dotted with remains too fragmentary and scanty to enable us to visualise the actual plan of the settlement. All that is left of the site at present has been encroached upon by the inhabitants of the locality, who have built here the Pir's tomb and also have been burying their deads in the adjacent graveyard.

4.11 MALIR TOWNSHIP

It is situated at a distance of about 14 miles from Karachi city. The town has its own Municipal Committee known as "Landhi Korangi Malir Municipal Committee". The chief attraction of Malir is the chain of fruit orchards and vegetable gardens along the Malir river in the midst of which the town lies. It is a variable oasis free from the heat, dust, din and barrenness of Karachi. A large number of sweet water deep wells feed these gardens preserving a cool spot for the weary city dwellers.

2 ORANGI

The barren and rugged region across the ridge to the north of Karachi industrial area is Orangi. Here, a mile to the west of the 7th mile stone on the Karachi-Pir-Mango Road, is a groove of date-palms enclosing a stone lined spring. To the south east of the spring amidst the barren and sandy land, small pieces of chert flakes and bits of pottery, weathered and devoid of any decoration now, have been discovered in abundance which suggests the existence of a pre-historic settlement here. Its true character is difficult to determine at present without excavation.

4.13 LYARI RIVER AREA

Eight miles north-east of Karachi along the Country Club Road and near the present Karachi University Campus, there are traces of microlithic stone implements over a wide barren area of sandy and gravel waste, sparsely covered by cactus and camel thorn bushes and seamed by deeply cut dry stream beds which lead to the Lyari River. Along these stream beds micro-blade-scrapers and chipped cores were found in patches of few yards which indicate the existence of small pre-historic settlements here, which appears to be very much disturbed now by explorers and the builders of the University. The exploration has yielded only a very small number of microliths and one stone axe only, but no pottery.

4.14 NEL BAZAR SITE

About 20 miles north-east of Karachi and a mile and half to the south-west of Damloti Water Works are the remains of a Harappan settlement amidst the Nel Bazar desert scrub and wastes, roughly in an area of 40,000 square yards. The surface of the site is strewn with undressed stones, which originally formed part of the structures which are still well preserved at places. An examination of the surface finds on the spot was sufficient to establish the chalcolithic character of the site.

The finds collected from the surface of the site include stone implements of usual Harappan type terracotta bangles, plain and painted potsherds, fragments of a storage jar and perforated vessels. Other objects worth

mentioning are shell bangles, a tabular shell bead, a barrel shaped bead of semi-precious stone and a toy cart frame fragment of a terracotta cake, a stone ball and fragments of copper tools, which in character and shape are identical with those found in Harappa and Mohenjodaro.

4.15 HILL PARK (KOH SAR)

This recently developed park has a garden and a lake on the top of a hill covering an area of 60 acres. It is in the centre of the New Housing Society and it offers panoramic view of the sprawling city. The park has a beautiful restaurant and large space for car parking. This is a popular spot of Karachi. Thousands of people come here to spend their evenings.

4.16 SHAHEED AZIZ BHATTI PARK

It is located on the University Road and it has the city's largest artificial lake. This park has also recently been laid.

4.17 MUNICIPAL GARDEN AND ZOO

The Karachi Municipal Corporation maintains a zoo known as Municipal Garden. It houses a large number of birds and animals and attracts a large crowd specially on Sundays. On Fridays the park is open exclusively for ladies. Inside the garden, there is another park known as Mughal Garden. Horticulture and flower shows are usually held here.

4.18 KARACHI SHIPYARD

The Karachi Shipyard was established in 1957. It is spread over an area of about 70 acres and is located along the east and west Arabian sea routes. It is laid

out on modern lines with the latest machinery and experienced and skilled personnel. At present about 5,000 persons are working and the shipyard is in a position to meet the requirements of shipping and engineering industries.

The principal activities carried out in the shipyard are ship building, ship repair, general engineering and foundry.

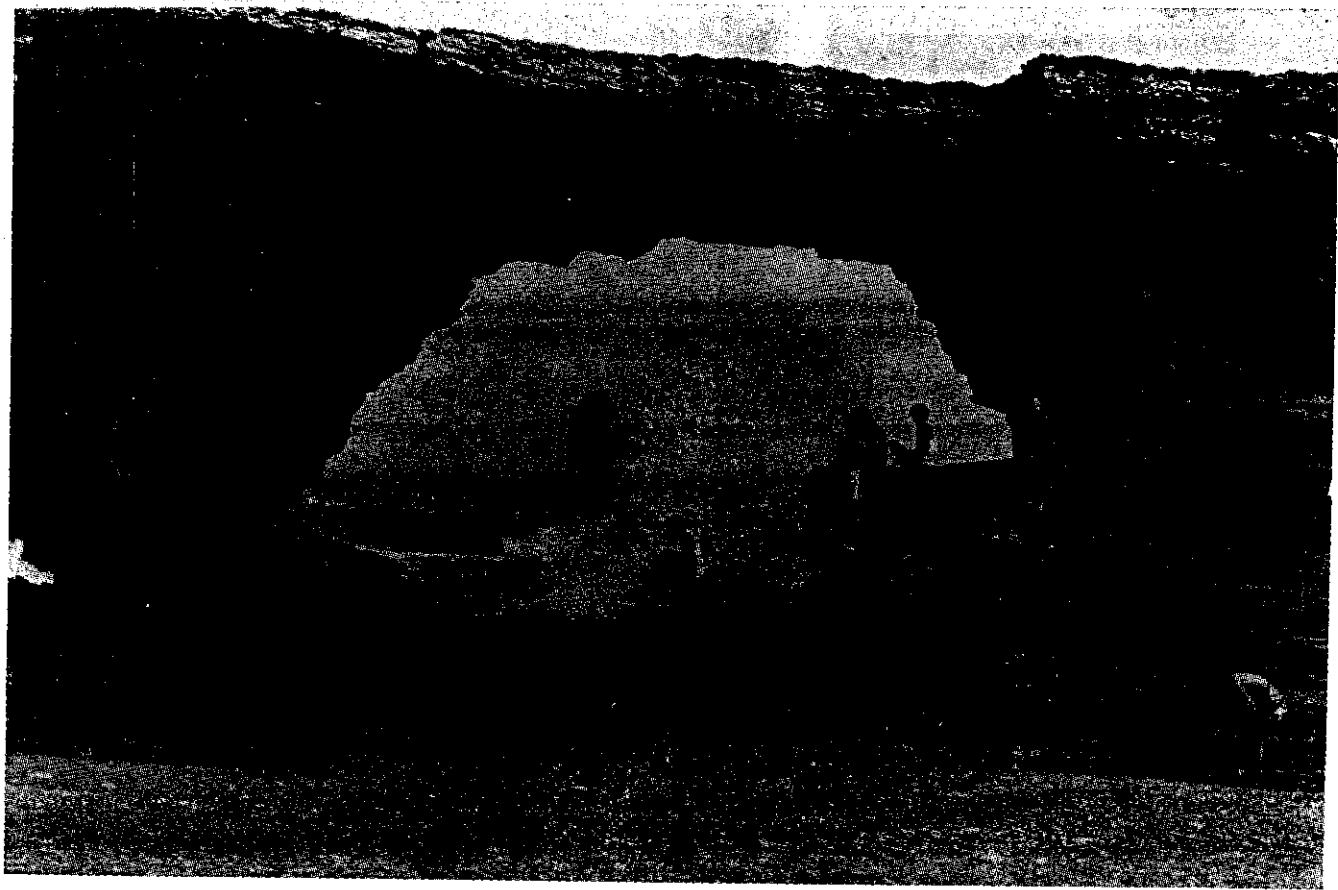
4.19 KARACHI STEEL MILLS

Costing Rs. 14,000 million including 7,000 millions of foreign exchange, the foundation stone of the Karachi Steel Mill at Pipri was laid down by the Prime Minister of Pakistan Mr. Zulfikar Ali Bhutto on 30th December, 1973.

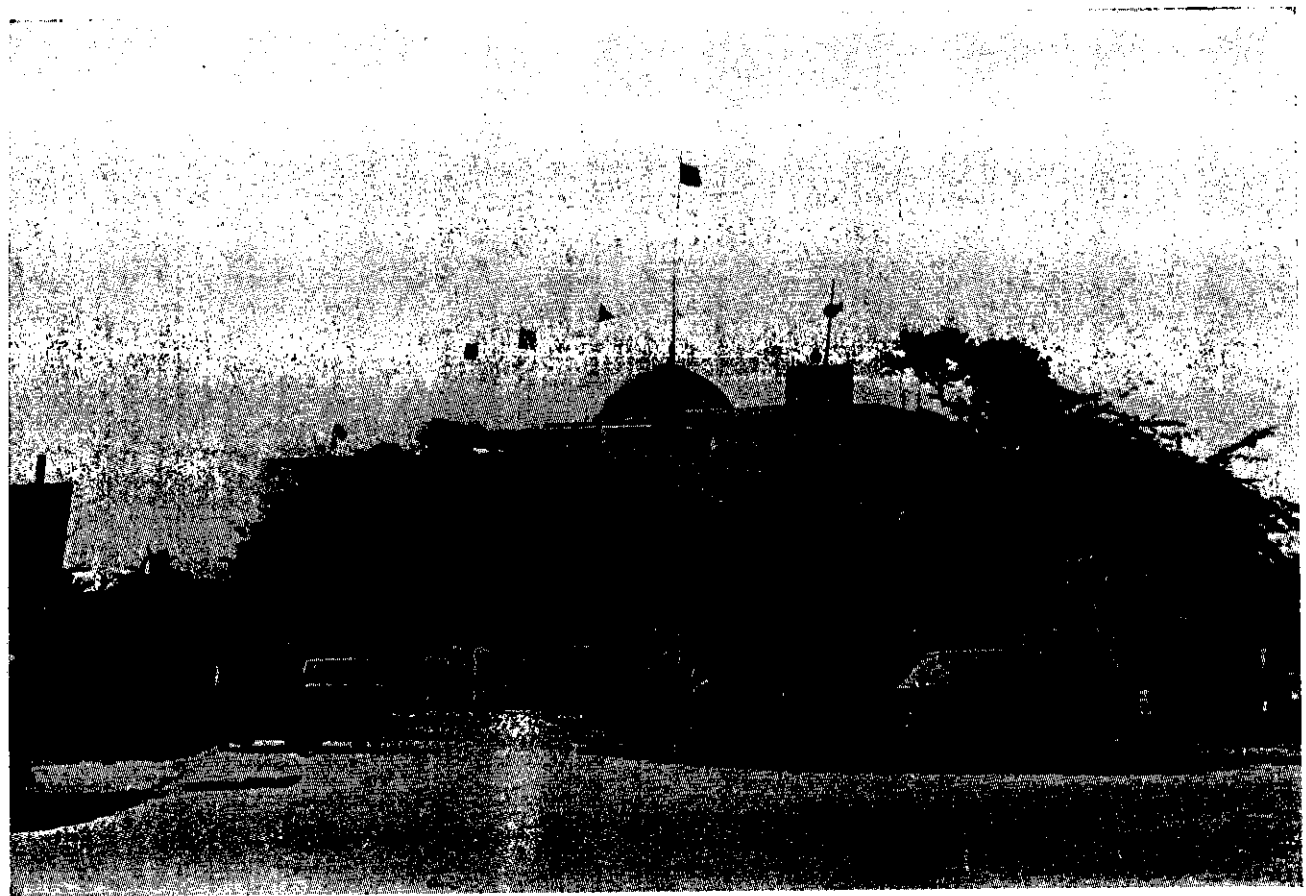
The mills comprise an area of 18,428 acres, out of which 10,203 acres are reserved for the plant and 8,626 acres for township to accommodate about 10,000 employees of the mills.

Work regarding land acquisition, construction of power main supply, general store and supply basis, pile testing and shuttering shop have been completed.

The highest priority is being attached to the training of technicians for the mills. A long term programme has been concluded with USSR to train 1,238 trainees in the USSR over a period of 5 years ending 1978-79. Arrangements with other friendly countries *viz.*, Iran, Egypt, Australia and Newzeland for training of Pakistani persons have also been made. The estimated maximum production capacity of the plant when completed will be 1,365,000 tons of steel.

SECTION 5—POPULATION

5.1 GROWTH AND DISTRIBUTION

The total population of Karachi District was 3,606,746 according to the 1972-Census, whereas it was 2,044,044 in the 1961-Census. The percentage increase

during the intervening period of 11 years and 8 months between the two censuses was 76.5% with an annual growth rate of 5.0%. The following statement also shows at a glance the variation in population before 1961 starting from 1901 :

The total area of the district is 1,362 square miles which gives a population density of 2,648 persons per square mile.

The urban population of the district was 3,515,402 (i.e. 97.5%) and the rural population was 91,344 (i.e. 2.5%). The percentage increase in urban and rural areas during the last two censuses was 83.8% and 30.5% respectively against the total-increase of 76.5%.

5.2 COMPOSITION

The male and female population was 1,993,806 and 1,612,940 respectively, giving a sex ratio of 1,236 against 1,317 in the 1961-Census.

The infant (less than one year) population was 73,023 (i.e. 2.0%), 28.6% were less than 10 years and the adult (18 years and above) population was 52.9%.

The population of 10 years and above was 2,576,443 out of whom 1,111,811 (i.e. 43.2%) were never-married, 1,320,309 (i.e. 51.2%) were married 140,174 (i.e. 5.4%) were widowed and 4,149 (i.e. 2%) were divorced.

Out of the total population of 3,606,746 the Muslim population was 3,491,999 (i.e. 96.8%), Christians came after Muslims whose population was 73,372 (i.e. 2.0%).

The literacy ratio of the district was 51.2% for both sexes and 55.8% and 45.0% for males and females respectively. In urban areas the literacy ratio was 51.7% for both sexes and 56.4% and 45.7% for males and females respectively. In rural areas the literacy ratio was 28.1% for both sexes and 35.0% and 19.3% for males and females respectively.

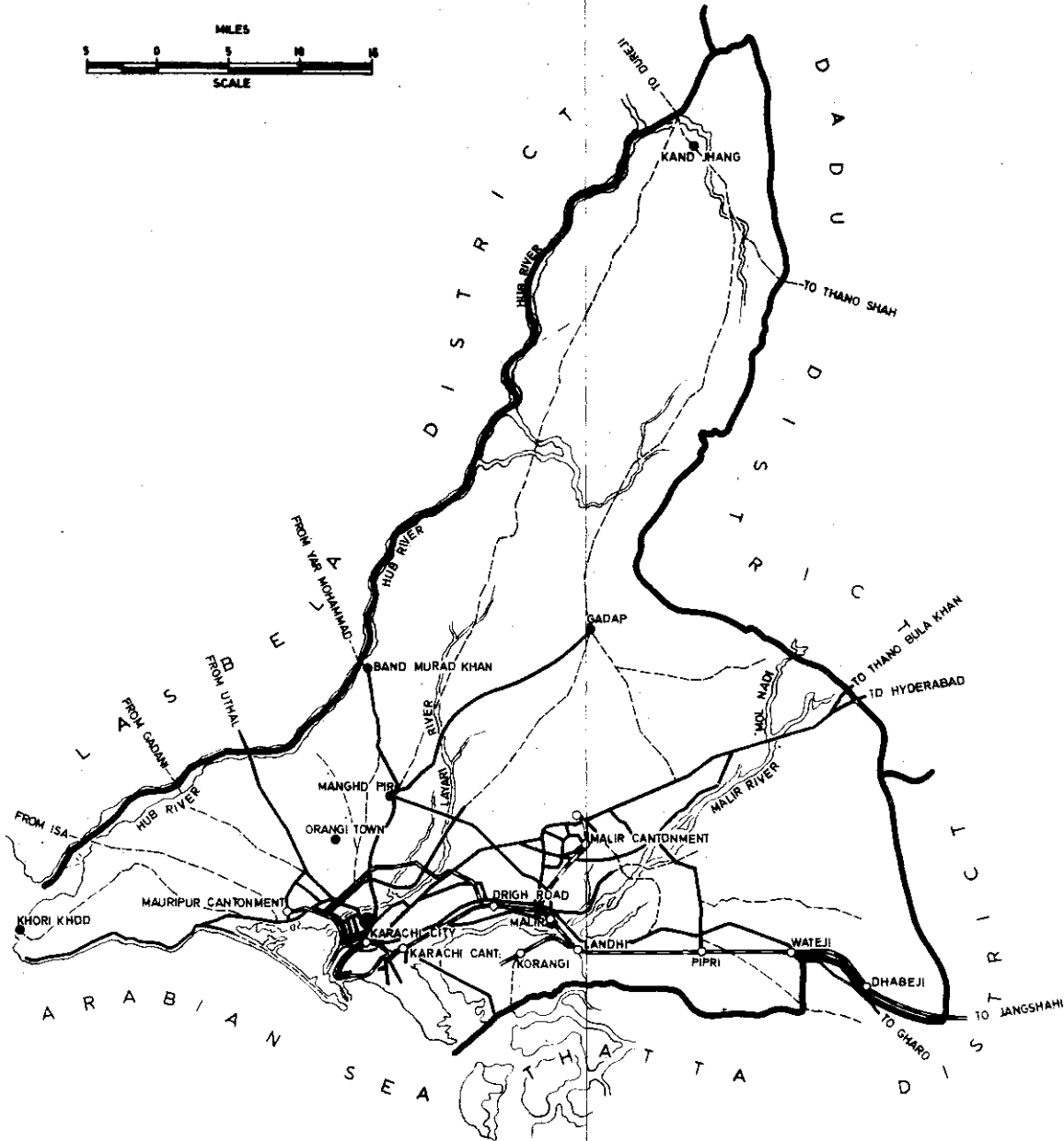
