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## FOREWORD

The "district" in Pakistan is the basic unit of administration and the focal point of all social, cultural, economic, administrative and developmental activities. This administrative reality was made the key-note of the publication programme of the 1960 Housing Census and 1961 Population Census. Accordingly, a separate report for each of the 62 Districts and 6 Agencies was included in that programme. The idea originated in June 1960 with my predecessor in office Mr. R. D. Howe, MBE, SQA, CSP, ably supported by his Deputy Mr. N. Shamsi. As initially conceived the District Census Report was to have been in 8 parts, namely:—

- Part I .. Geography and brief history of the administrative district.
- Part II .. General Information.
- Part III .. Housing and Household Statistics.
- Part IV .. Vital Statistics.
- Part V .. Cottage Industries.
- Part VI .. Population Statistics
- Part VII .. Village Lists.
- Part VIII .. Maps.

It was intended that the Village List should also include the complete location code number of every village and a fairly complete description of each block. Part VIII—Maps—was intended to include, besides the maps of the district, all urban area maps which have been collected and made up-to-date during the census operations. Recognizing that it was a very big task, Mr. Howe, while asking for the views of the Provincial Directors of Census, frankly said: "Admittedly, it is an ambitious project, but in my opinion the

labour involved will not be out of all proportion to the tremendous value of the end product."

The first reaction of the Provincial Directors was not favourable. They thought that the Zonal Officers did not have the time and necessary background to do justice to Part I—'Geography and brief history of the administrative district'. Meanwhile, Mr. S.M. Ikram, C.S.P. Member, Board of Revenue, West Pakistan, got interested in the District Census Reports and he hoped that "in spite of obvious difficulties the Distt. Census Reports should be enlarged and converted into handy and business-like District Decennial Gazetteers". Mr. Ikram's idea was pursued for some time but when it was found that the rewriting of Gazetteers involved far greater efforts outlay and much longer time than Census could afford, the Census Organisation reverted to the original plan of a brief narrative for Part I.

It was planned that the Zonal Census Officers would write short notes on the history, geography and a few administrative activities of the district after the Big Count was over in 1961. The Zonal Census Officers were actually busy in the field collecting the preliminary reports and consolidating them for inclusion in the provisional census results of Pakistan till the end of February, 1961. The work on the writing of the descriptive part was not therefore started until the middle of March 1961. I took over from Mr. Howe in the beginning of March 1961 and, although, initially, like Mr. Aslam Abdullah Khan, Provincial Director of Census, West Pakistan, I was myself hesitating from a sense of inadequacy to undertake such a big project, it did not take me long to be



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convinced about the tremendous value of presenting the district in all its aspects in a handy volume for the use of planners, administrators and the general public. After much consideration and consultation the scope of the Reports (except for the Agencies) was narrowed down to the following five parts only—

- Part I .. General Description.
- Part II .. General Tables.
- Part III .. Housing Tables.
- Part IV .. Population Tables
- Part V .. Village Statistics.

For various administrative reasons the reports for Agencies will be much shorter without the Housing Tables and Village Statistics but they will contain information about different Tribes and their social and economic life.

It was actually Part I, General Description, which called for the greatest amount of labour, research and co-ordination by the Census Officers at various levels. As stated earlier, there were some views that this part should have been more or less an up-to-date version of the encyclopaedic District Gazetteer. As against it there were advocates in the Census Organization of cutting it to the bare bones and present only a short description of the geography, natural resources and the administrative system of the district. I found it necessary to strike a middle course between these two extreme views and after much consideration the "General Description" was planned to contain the following chapters—

- Chapter I .. History, Geography and Administration.
- Chapter II .. People and Their Environments.
- Chapter III .. Important Places.
- Chapter IV .. District Headquarter Town.

I must admit that the inclusion of the last three

chapters is my idea as I felt that this would constitute a special contribution of the Census Officers to the total information about the districts. Population Census is admittedly the most comprehensive national stock-taking that a country embarks upon from time to time. The main object of census is no doubt taking an accurate count of the people according to their various demographic and social characteristics. In the process of census taking, however, a mass of related and ancillary information is collected, directly or indirectly, by the census-taker. The 'Census Officer', to use the generic term, applied to all those who were appointed to take the census, travelled widely and observed closely all manner of men and lands, thereby gaining valuable knowledge of the physical features, agriculture, industry, public health, communications, housing and above all of the way of life and cultural pattern of the people. I had no doubt in my mind that these officers could pool their knowledge and write out a short account of the people and their environments, the important places they saw and the district headquarter town in which they worked with great deal of confidence and accuracy. Despite various limitations, particularly lack of reference material and shortage of time, the Zonal Census Officers wrote out the draft Reports in time.

The Part I—General Description—of these Reports is essentially a compilation rather than a fully original writing. The very nature of the assignment left hardly any choice but to make the well-documented and authoritative District Gazetteers the main source of this compilation. The sections on physical features, geography, geology, climate, river and mountain systems, flora, fauna, history are largely adaptations from the relevant District Gazetteers. These have, of course, been modified, revised and enlarged wherever necessary to make the information up-to-date and factual. The Zonal Officers also toured



I must also place on record my deep appreciation of the energetic, intelligent and painstaking editing of all the District Census Reports of East Pakistan by Mr. Bahauddin Ahmed, Joint Director of Census, East Pakistan. He brought to bear in his writing and compilation a sharp insight and wide research into the history, geography and lives of the people of the districts. Mr. Sheikh Muhammad Sharif, Deputy Director of Census, Headquarter, West Pakistan, did an equally good job in the preliminary editing of these reports and in helping his Director by collecting reference material. I have also great pleasure in thanking Messrs P. A. Nazir, CSP, K.M.A. Samdani, CSP, A. Majid, PCS, B. Ahmed, EPCS, B. Alam, EPCS, Ghulam Husain, and A.K. As Karachi did not form part of the West Pakistan Province until some time after the conclusion of enumeration the descriptive part of the Karachi report was compiled independently by Mr. Agha Mustafa Qasim Qizilbash, Deputy Director of Census, Karachi. He undertook a very laborious research in order to collect accurate and up-to-date information about the various aspects of Karachi life. His task was rendered all the more difficult by the fact that no separate gazetteer for Karachi as such had been written ever before. He continued to display devoted enthusiasm and gave much material help for this report even after his reversion to his parent department. I must thank him for his deep devotion to duty and his unfailing co-operation. I also highly appreciate the services of Mr. Mohammed Hafiz Shaikh, Officer on Special Duty, Census, who gave me material support in recasting and editing this report.

Mr. Ruhul Amin, Deputy Director of Machine Sorting Centre, Dacca, and Mr.

W.A. Abbasi, Assistant Director of Machine Sorting Centre, Karachi, showed a high degree of technical skill and organizing ability in producing the Housing Census Tables with such a mass of details. I highly value their contribution to the success of the District Census Reports and extend to them my heartiest thanks. Messrs Akhlaque Hosain Kazi and Jalaluddin Ahmed Chowdhury, Assistant Directors of Compilation Centre, Lahore and Dacca, played a similarly important role in giving the final shape to the Population Tables. Part IV of this report bears ample testimony to their ability and hard work. The Statistical Officers Mr. Haq Nawaz Shaikh at Lahore, and Mr. Riaz-ud-Din at Dacca also made substantial contribution to the accuracy of the Population Tables and Village Statistics by their steady, painstaking and intelligent statistical work. The Assistant Directors of Hand Sorting Centres who compiled the report for the district towns deserve my special thanks as they were asked to do something which was beyond the normal call of their duty and they did it without the slightest murmur. My special and grateful thanks are due to Colonel E. H. Slade, MBE, MC, FIS, who had been with the Census Organisation as Census Adviser till May, 1962, for his ungrudging help in planning the final get-up of the District Census Reports. I feel at a loss to think what I would have done without his active guidance in the preparation of the coloured and black and white district maps as well as in selecting the proper symbols for the local details included in the Village Statistics. Besides being a distinguished statistician, he was also an artist-cartographer. He drew out the master copies of the maps with his own hand and wrote out the instructions for their printing. He had to leave us before the Reports came out in print but I hope he will be satisfied with the result. We are immeasurably indebted to him for his wise



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counsel and help. I am also thankful to his successor, Mr. Lowell T. Galt, head of the United States Statistical Advisory Service to Pakistan, for his keen personal interests in these reports and his encouraging comments and suggestions.

I have no words to adequately thank the officers and staff of the Central and Provincial Governments, various Ministries and Departments, the districts and sub-divisional officers and a host of other public-spirited men and women of our country who gave unstinted support, help and encouragement in the planning, preparation and publication of these Reports. In particular, I gratefully acknowledge the substantial help that the Chief Secretaries of the two Provincial Governments gave us by agreeing to let us have the photographs of the districts through their official photographers free of cost and by letting the District Officers write out the chapter on the "People and Their Environments." I am particularly happy to record that all the District Officers, in many cases assisted by their Revenue Assistants and Additional District Magistrates, enthusiastically took up this additional and unscheduled responsibility. The Secretaries, Information Departments and the Directors of Information of both the Provincial Governments rendered invaluable service in the matter of obtaining suitable photographs from far-flung corners of the districts. The Directors of Land Records

and Surveys made our task easier by supplying up-to-date roads and places maps of the districts as well as area figures. The Surveyor-General of Pakistan has been equally generous with the supply of topographical and administrative maps. I also acknowledge with great pleasure our indebtedness to various newspaper articles, learned societies, journals, periodicals, university professors, social scientists, geographers and historians for the valuable information we collected from them for inclusion in the reports. I would also like to thank Mr. N.H. Khandker, Controller of Printing and Stationery, and Mr. Qasim Ali, Deputy Controller of Printing and Stationery, and the various printing presses, particularly the Ilmi Press, Lahore, for their technical know-how, unhesitating advice and prompt service at all stages of the printing of these Reports. Lastly, I must thank the staff of the Census Organisations in the Centre and the Provinces who worked untiringly to edit, check and verify these Reports statistically and aesthetically. The Statistical Section of my Office did a fine job in this regard and were ably assisted by a very good team of Draftsmen who produced the cover plates and the maps inside. In particular, I am grateful to Messers Safdar Husain and A. Sattar, Statistical Officers and Messrs Hasan Akhtar and Din Mohammed, Investigators, for careful and painstaking checking of the narrative portions of all the districts.

## INTRODUCTION

The District Census Report of Dera Ghazi Khan District is one of the 51 similar reports being published separately for each District and Agency of West Pakistan.

In the last Census, the statistical results of the Census were published in various Provincial and Central Reports. Thus there were separate reports for the North-West Frontier Province, the Punjab and Bahawalpur, Sind & Khairpur and Baluchistan Provinces. These reports did not provide data in a handy volume separately for smaller geographical and administrative units namely; the districts with the result that the district statistics which were collected at much labour and expense were lost in the statistical totals for larger areas for the Province as a whole.

The integration of the former Provinces and States into the unified Province of West Pakistan has further underlined the need for statistics on district basis, as the individual identity of districts tends to get lost in the statistical totals contained in the Provincial Statistical Report. Further, the growing importance of developmental activities undertaken by Government for smaller administrative and geographical areas has made it imperative that data in much greater detail for districts should be made available to the administrators, planners and experts for the purpose of planning and development. The Provincial and All-Pakistan Reports do not meet this requirement to the desired extent.

The "Village Lists" published for the first time in 1951 provided limited information for all villages in each district giving the total population, the number of houses and

other local details. These volumes proved very useful for the Government Departments and other non-official bodies and individual users.

The District Census Report now being brought out is a more ambitious project and attempts to present the statistical data for the district which is often dull and lifeless against the living background of its geography, history and its people. It is hoped that this volume will acquaint the reader with the district as a geographic, administrative and human entity, against which its statistics will acquire a new meaning and help present the district in all its aspects.

This report is in five parts, namely—Part I—General Description, Part II—General Tables, Part III—Housing Tables, Part IV—Population Tables compiled from the Population Census, 1961, and Part V—Village Statistics.

In Part I, an attempt has been made to give a general picture of the district on the lines of the old District Gazetteers, though within a much shorter compass incorporating the changes which have taken place since the time the Gazetteers were last published. The General Description includes brief paragraphs on geography and geology, flora and fauna, climate, brief history, administrative set-up, Health, Education, Communications, Basic Democracies, Agriculture and Industries, Land Reforms, the population and its composition, ethnological and demographical features, cultural pattern of the people, important places of interest, etc. It also contains a brief description of the district headquarters town. Besides, this Part also



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contains maps and pictures which have been provided to enable the reader to have a clearer perspective of the district and its people.

Part II includes tables giving general information provided by sources other than Census. Inclusion of this Part was considered necessary in order to bring within one volume some general statistical information which, like the Census data, is commonly required by planners and administrators. The general information tables include data on rainfall, temperature, Irrigation, Industries, Dak Bungalows, Educational Institutions, Hospitals, Roads, Basic Democracies, etc. These tables were collected from the Government Departments at the Provincial Headquarters and other Divisional and District Offices of some Departments. The data supplied by the Departments has been checked only for purposes of editing. While efforts have been made to eliminate all errors, the Census Organization is not responsible for the accuracy of the data presented in these Tables. In some cases data in respect of particular Tables was either not supplied in time or not in the required form. Such tables perforce have had to be omitted from this volume. My thanks are due to the Heads of various Departments and Offices for their ungrudging and prompt response. All these tables were carefully scrutinized by Mr. Haq Nawaz, Statistical Officer of my Office with the assistance of Mr. Muhammad Aslam, Compiler and gone over by Mr. S. M. Sharif, Deputy Director, before they were incorporated in this report.

The Housing Tables which form Part III of this Report were entirely processed in the Machine Sorting Centre, Karachi. They were compiled and tabulated by mechanical operation on cent per cent basis for all urban areas, and on a 10% basis in the case of rural areas. The tables provide invaluable informa-

tion about the housing conditions in both urban and rural areas, the number of occupied and unoccupied houses, congested houses, size and structural characteristics of the housing units, size of family and the size of households, etc. All this work was done in the Machine Sorting Centre at Karachi under the able direction of Mr. W.A. Abbasi, Assistant Director, Machine Sorting Centre, to whom my thanks are due for furnishing this part of the Report.

Part IV contains the Population Tables which are based on data collected during the Big Count in January, 1961. These Tables provide data about population for smaller administrative areas down to Tehsils by sex and religion, urban and rural population, the composition of the population by age, sex and marital status, literacy and by mother-tongue, birthplace and main economic activities. It may be noted that detailed cross-classification of the Non-Agricultural Labour Force by occupations and industry has been left to be done by machine—sorting and the results will be published separately in a set of tables especially designed for the purpose. The Population Tables have been extracted from the Provincial Tables pertaining to this District. They are based on the data collected on the Individual Census Schedules by a large army of Census field workers, viz., the Enumerators, Supervisors, Charge Superintendents, District Census Officers and Zonal, Deputy/Assistant Directors. The names of some officers of each category are given elsewhere in this Report. In the District of Dera Ghazi Khan the Census was taken by 1,740 Enumerators, 420 Supervisors, 47 Charge Superintendents and 3 District Census Officers. After the field work was over records were sent by the District Census Officers to the Hand Sorting Centre, Multan which worked under the able guidance and control of Sh. A. Hamid, Deputy Director of Census, Incharge Hand Sorting Centre, Multan. Here the schedule were unstapled and sorted



and re-sorted according to different characteristics in accordance with Sorting and Compilation instructions, issued from the office of the Census Commissioner, Pakistan. A large number of Sorters, Supervisors, Inspectors and Compilers worked on this tedious and difficult job under the inspiring leadership of Mr. A. Hamid. After the sorting operations were over the Record Sheets which were prepared for each tabulating region separately, were transferred to the Central Compilation Office at Lahore, where the data was compiled by Mr. Akhlaque Hosain Kazi, Assistant Director of Census (Compilation), West Pakistan. Thus the data contained in Part IV represents the cumulative efforts of a large army of workers, both paid and unpaid, to whom the Census Organization acknowledges a debt of deep gratitude, for without their efforts, there would have been no Census. I wish I could name all of them individually but that would require a volume in itself.

In Part V, a complete list of the villages of the district has been arranged by Tehsils, Qanungo Halqas and Patwar Circles. The Village Statistics give for each village, the Hadbast Number, area, total population by sex, total literates, total number of houses and house-holds. Besides the above, local details showing the location, Schools, Post and Telegraph Offices, Railway Stations, Police Stations, Union Council Offices, Dak Bungalows, Dispensaries and Hospitals, etc., have been shown by appropriate symbols. The Village Statistics were originally compiled in the Hand Sorting Centre, Multan from the summaries prepared by the Census Supervisors and Charge Superintendents. The figures of population were thoroughly checked after physical counting of the individual enumeration schedules at the Circle Sort. The data about houses and households are based on the summaries prepared by the Charge Superintendents on the result of

Housing Census conducted in September, 1960. These figures were checked and adjusted, where necessary, with reference to the results of the Machine tabulation done in Census Commissioner's Office, Karachi. The literacy figures have been taken from the summaries prepared by the Census Supervisors and Charge Superintendents after the "Big Count". The particulars of "Hadbast" numbers, and local details were obtained from the Deputy Commissioner. The area figures have been supplied by the Deputy Commissioner, Dera Ghazi Khan and are based on revenue records. The Village statistics were thoroughly scrutinised by the Statistical Officer in my office before incorporation in this Report.

The data presented have been arranged by Tehsils and in each Tehsil the Villages have been grouped by Field Qanungo Circle and within each Field Qanungo Circle by Patwari Circles. A summary giving the total population of the district with its distribution by sexes to the nearest thousand by Tehsils and number of Qanungo Halqas, Patwari Circles and Villages has been given at the beginning. Similar summaries by Field Qanungo Circles within each Tehsil indicating separately figures of urban localities have also been added.

Part I—General Description was compiled by Sh. Muhammad Sharif, Deputy Director of Census, West Pakistan, Lahore. In preparing this Part he made extensive use of the District Gazetteer of Dera Ghazi Khan and various other published materials. The draft was seen by Mr. Muhammad Hafiz Sheikh, Officer on Special Duty (Census), who added several useful suggestions. The Census Commissioner was kind enough to spare enough time to edit this part of the Report and I am grateful to him for his guidance, inspiration and help in giving a final shape to it. In its present form and content this part is the result of the cumulative efforts of

Mr. Muhammad Hateez Sheikh, Mr. S. M. Sharif and myself, besides Mr. Rauf Ahmad Bhatti, my Stenographer, who typed several drafts of it. I am therefore, grateful to them all for their efforts.

The maps appearing in this volume were drawn in the Statistical Section of the Census Commissioner's office by Mr. Navai, Senior Draftsman, under the close supervision and guidance of Mr. Muhammad Hafiz Sheikh, Officer on Special Duty (Census). I am grateful to them for the hard work they have put in for the preparation of these maps.

My thanks are also due to Sh. Niaz Ahmad of the Ilmi Press, Lahore, where these reports have been printed from the "master copies" prepared in my office, through the photo-offset process.

The photographs which appear in this volume have been obtained by the courtesy of the Director of Information, Multan and the Deputy Commissioner, Dera Ghazi Khan to whom we are highly indebted.

I must express my gratitude to the Deputy Commissioner, Dera Ghazi Khan all Heads of Departments of the Government of West Pakistan, the Revenue Assistant and all subordinate revenue staff, who have rendered invaluable services in the collection and compilation of the Village Statistics and other data presented in this volume.

I must also record my appreciation for the hard work put in by Sh. Muhammad

Sharif, Deputy Director of Census, West Pakistan, Mr. A. Hamid, Deputy Director of Census, Hand Sorting Centre, Multan, Mr. Haq Nawaz, Statistical Officer, Mr. Waheed Akhtar Sheikh, Statistical Assistant, Mr. Muhammad Aslam, Compiler and other staff in my own office who have given unremitting pains in completing this volume for publication. It is hoped that this volume will be of benefit to the various Departments of Government and will also be useful as a reference material.

My thanks are also due to Mr. Lowell T. Galt, Statistical Adviser to the Government of Pakistan and Dr. James Maslowski, Adviser, Planning and Development Department, Government of West Pakistan, who were kind enough to visit the Compilation Centre and offer valuable advice and guidance at the crucial stages in which the data took the shape of comprehensible tables.

The idea of publishing comprehensive statistics for districts collected in the 1961 Census had its beginnings in the Village List of 1951. The proposal was first made by Mr. R. D. Howe, in 1961. The idea was doggedly pursued and developed by Mr. A. Rashid, his successor, and the format, lay-out and plan of the present volume is due entirely to his vision, planning and perseverance in getting this project translated from a mere idea into reality. I must confess that I faltered and hesitated at many stages in completing this assignment as being too ambitious for Census, but his unflinching interest and inspiration made the publication of this volume in its present shape possible.

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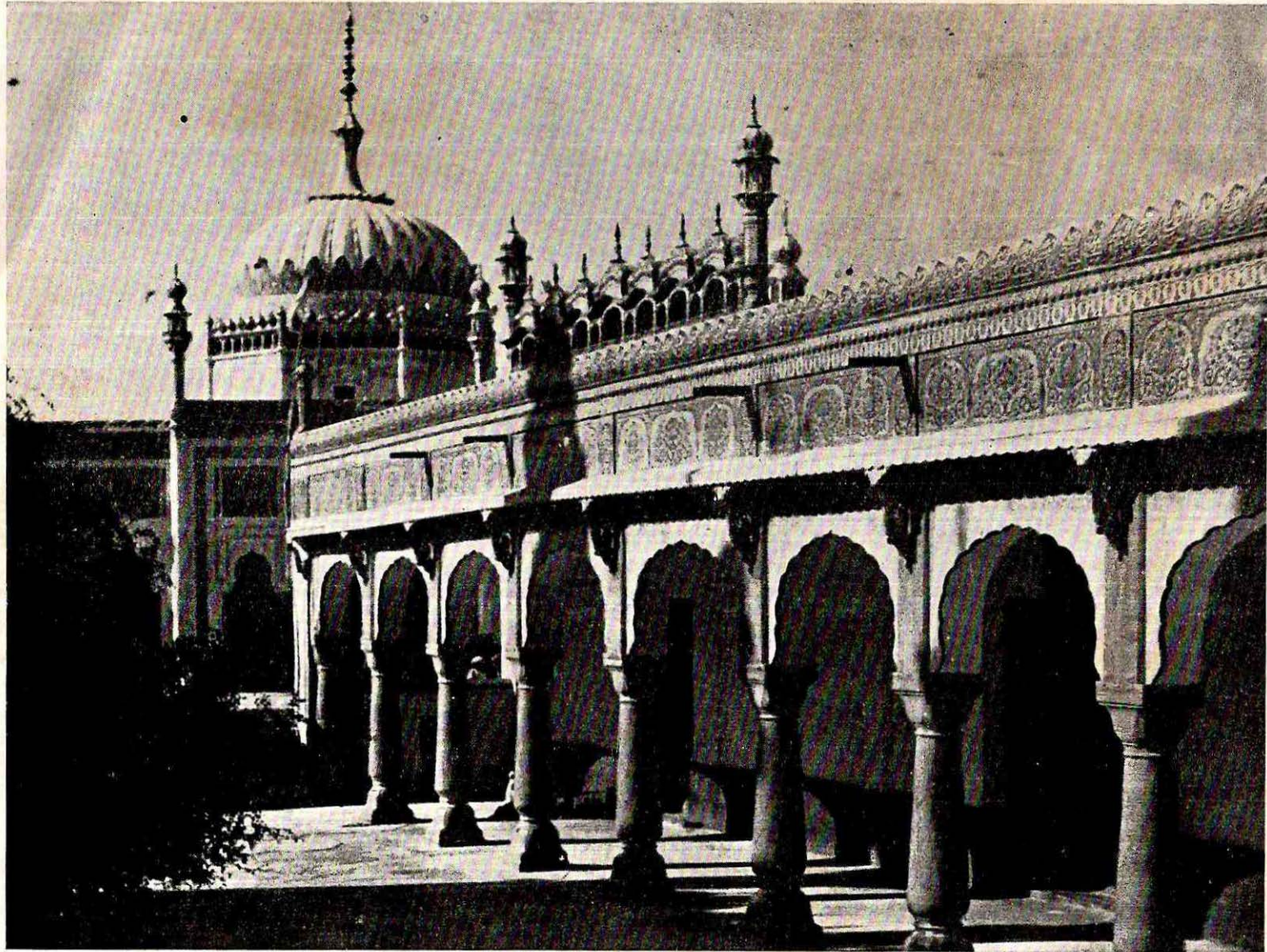

## CHAPTER 1

### GEOGRAPHY, HISTORY AND ADMINISTRATION

#### 1.1 NAME.

The district is named after the headquarters town Dera Ghazi Khan, which was founded some five hundred years ago by Ghazi Khan Mirrani, who was a great cattle-owner and was attracted by the plentiful supply of grass.

#### 1.2 LOCATION.

The district is the extreme south-western district of Multan division. It lies between north latitudes  $28^{\circ} 20'$  and  $31^{\circ} 15'$  and east longitudes  $69^{\circ} 35'$  and  $70^{\circ} 59'$ .

#### 1.3 BOUNDARIES.

It is bounded on the north by Dera Ismail Khan district; on the east by a fixed boundary with the Alipur tehsil of Muzaffargarh district, running roughly parallel with the Indus upto the Panjnad confluence and further south by a fixed boundary with the Rahim Yar Khan district; on the south lies the district of Jacobabad while on the west lie the foothills of Suleiman Range.

#### 1.4 AREA.

The total area of the district is 9,359 square miles. Its position in respect of area both in Pakistan and West Pakistan is 9th.

#### 1.5 PHYSICAL FEATURES AND TOPOGRAPHY.

The district is divided into three different tracts—(1) Pachadh, (2) Chahi-Nehri and (3) Sindh Circle. The Pachadh contains the area stretching along the base of hills, where the cultivation entirely depends on the

flow of hill torrents. In the Rajanpur Sub-Division the Pachadh tract is divided into nine Patwar Circles each with an area of more than eighty square miles. This tract is inhabited mainly by the Baloch tribe. The people live on sheep and camel breeding and are always migrating either into the hills or to the canal or riverain tracts. The cultivation of this tract depends on rain water brought down by hill torrents from the adjacent Suleiman hills. The sub-soil water is bitter and the people leave the area as soon as drinking water is exhausted. The only settled population is in the canal irrigated tract wherein three urban areas—Rajanpur, Mithankot and Rojhan are situated with a few important villages. The rest of the population lives in hamlets or small concentrations near the wells. There are, however, small villages situated all along the fixed bank of the river Indus. The other three tehsils of Dera Ghazi Khan, Taunsa and Jampur are bounded on one side along with its length of some 155 miles by the Suleiman hills and on the other side by the Indus. In breadth (west to east) it ranges from 15 to 25 miles.

The Chahi-Nehri tract forms the intermediate zone between Pachadh and riverain area. The cultivation is based on wells or canals.

The Sindh Circle is mostly comprised of lands which are subject to river action. The cultivation in this area depends on river spill.



The Excluded Area of Dera Ghazi Khan district runs parallel to the district of Dera Ghazi Khan and comprises of certain ranges of the Suleiman Mountains. It extends from Dera Ismail Khan district in the north, to the district of Jacobabad (Sind) in the south and the districts of Loralai and Sibi in the West. The mountains are dry, parched and rugged; consisting mostly of the sand-stones, they stand out desolate and dreary in melancholy grandeur. From the plains the mountains look like parallel chains gradually rising in altitude. Although they appear to be continued in north-south chain, they are broken at various places by innumerable hill torrents. They are about 270 in number but of considerable size. These hill torrents form the most important feature of this area in the sense that they provide the communication routes. They also determine the location of habitation in these lonely hills.

#### 1.6 GEOLOGY.

Suleiman Range forms low ridges, more or less continuous, parallel to each other. There are broad plains at a considerable elevation above the sea, bordered by slopes of detritus derived from the hills and often composed of fine and fertile soil. The hill torrents in the southern part of the district bring down much saline matter in their waters. Parts of Jampur tehsil near Drigri contain salt or saltpetre, but not to such an extent as to materially affect its utility for irrigation. The soil throughout the Rajanpur tehsil is very saline.

#### 1.7 FLORA.

The trees most commonly found in the district are *deb*, *Jand* and *Frash* (Tamarix Articulata). The *kiḱar* (Acacia Arabica) also grows widely. *Shisham* (Dalbergia Sisso) and *Siris* (Albizzia Lebbex) are also found.

Date trees abound around the town of Dera Ghazi Khan and are found almost entirely in that tehsil, with the exception of a few groves near Harand in the Jampur tehsil and at Wang in the Rajanpur tehsil. Date trees in this district are assessed to land revenue and the dates are the most important product of the district.

The dwarf palm which is called *Pish*, grows freely in the Suleimans. The finer leaves are made into mats, and the more coarse ones into ropes and sandals.

#### 1.8 FAUNA.

Pig and hog-deer are thick in the dense river jungles. Hares are also fairly common and black and grey partridges are also found in the same locality. In the cold weather, many varieties of duck and teal visit the district. The river Indus contains a variety of fish which the best is the *Roh*. Fish are caught in greater quantities in the cold weather when the river recedes. The best fishing is in the Hairo Dhand in the Jampur tehsil, and in the Vang, Nurpur and Rojhan Dhands in the Rajanpur tehsil.

#### 1.9 RIVERS AND NALLAHS.

The river Indus which lies on the east begins to rise in May when the melting of the snow on the Himalayas commences and gradually swells till it fills its bed for as much as a breadth of nine miles, in places pouring floods down the depressions in the Rajanpur tehsil and filling the inundation canals. It continues high till the end of August, and then begins to subside, reaching its cold weather level at the end of September.

#### 1.10 MOUNTAINS AND HILLS.

The Suleiman mountains drain the torrents in the district. In the north they rise to peaks as high as 10,000 feet above the sea, and two smaller chains run parallel with the main range between it and the plain;



the two merge into one, and disappear in the north of the Dera Ghazi Khan tehsil, cropping up into two small chains of low hills (Rohri) near Batil and Sakhi Sarwar, and at the same time the height of the main range gradually diminishes southwards the highest peak to the south being Gaindhari, 4,160 feet, from which the range turns away westwards from the Indus valley. The highest peaks towards the centre of the district are Ekbhai, 7,462 feet; Fort Munro 6,300 feet; and Dragul 5,385 feet. To the south of Dragul is the Mari mountain, the summit of which forms a large and fairly level plateau. The mountains are formed of sandstone with occasional outcrops of limestone and as they are completely bare of trees except some of the higher summits in the north of the district, they yield readily to the action of rain and present jagged and fantastic outlines.

#### 1.11 HILL TORRENTS.

Three large torrents rising far to the west of the Suleimans pierce through them from west to east through narrow and tremendous gorges. The most northerly, the Vihowa, emerges from them into the Dera Ismail Khan district, but its flood water reaches villages in the north of Sanghar. The Sanghar emerges near the village of Mangrotha at the centre of the western boundary of the Taunsa tehsil, and the third, the Kaha, near Harrand which is similarly situated in the Jampur tehsil.

#### 1.12 CLIMATE.

##### Temperature.

The climate is exceedingly dry both in the hills and in the plains, in summer as well as in winter. The cold weather is a very short one, comprising only the months of December and January. November and February are pleasant months with a minimum night temperature running between 40° and 50° F. In March the days warm up and the minimum night temperature is

seldom below 60°, and often reaches 70°. From May to August the heat is intense everywhere and especially in the Pachadh, record maximum temperatures are marked and the night minimum outside rarely falls as low as 80°. August is sometimes rendered tolerable by a breeze, but is generally steamy as well as hot. In September and October the heat become gradually less oppressive.

In the hill tract the climate is cold and bracing from September to April, and mild and pleasant in the summer months. At Fort Munro, which is a hill station, the night temperature in June averages 70° or under and the day temperature indoors rarely rises over 80°. The misty clouds characteristics of the Himalayas in the monsoon are seldom seen and the rain generally takes the shape of an afternoon shower, after which the atmosphere resumes its normal dry condition.

#### 1.13 RAINFALL.

The annual rainfall in the district is very meagre. The average for the last five years is reported to be as 0.5".

In the Sulemans the rainfall in the summer is much greater than in the plains.

In the Excluded Areas the rainfall is scanty and the patches of cultivation are few and far between. The mountains are rocky and have little by way of sort earth so that vegetation is non-existent. Apart from occasional springs here and there, the hill torrents are the only source of water supply. The hill torrent water is also utilized for the cultivation and irrigation of tiny patches in the ruggea hills where water is accumulated in tanks and reservoirs.

#### 1.14 HISTORY.

##### Early Hindu History.

Tradition states that centuries before the



1st Muslim invasion, there were three towns only in the area now composing the district—Harrand, Mari, and Asni and the rest of the country was an uninhabited waste. Two of these towns are remarkably connected by tradition with Rasalu, the legendary hero and his opponent Raja Sirkap.

#### THE FIRST MUHAMMADAN INVASION.

At the time of the invasion by Muhammad bin Qasim in A. D. 711, the district was subject to the Hindu Prince called Dahir, whose capital was at Alor near Bhakkar. The seizure by Dahir of an Arab ship at a Sind seaport drew upon him the wrath of the Caliph Walid and has army led by Muhammad bin Qasim conquered all the Hindu Prince's strongholds upto, and including Multan. The country remained subject to the Arabs till A. D. 750, when they were expelled by Sumra tribes of Rajputs. The subsequent Muslim invasions were by Sabaktagin of Ghazni and Mahmud of Ghazni, thereafter on the decline of House of Ghazni, by Shahab-ud-Din Ghorî which dynasty continued till A. D. 1206. Kutb-ud-Din Aibak, the slave king, then succeeded to the full sovereignty over that tract. The slave kings were succeeded by the house of Khilji and the Khiljis by the house of Tughlak, who ruled until the invasion of Tamerlane in A. D. 1398. In the confusion which followed the withdrawal of Tamerlane, the province of Multan became independent under a family of Langas, in A. D. 1445, and maintained their independence, till A.D. 1526. The Lodhi kings then followed. Islam Khan who was then in charge of the southern part of the Multan Province, set up a separate Government at Sitpur and they were thence forward known as Nahars. Thereafter, the Mirranis set up an independent village in A. D. 1469. The town of Dera Gazi Khan was founded by Haji Khan and called after his son Ghazi Khan, who succeeded him, and who died in A. D.

1494. as the date on his tomb at the village of Choratta shows. The Mirranis soon came into conflict with the Nahars and had ejected them in A. D. 1482.

The independence of the Langas at Multan and those of Mirranis and the Nahars came to an end with the conquest of the area by Babar in A. D. 1526. The immigration of the Biloch tribes into this area via Kech and Mekran was coincident with the time of Babar and Humayun and they seem to have spread all of the south and west of the former Punjab. All the Biloch Tribes now occupying the D. G. Khan frontier trace their settlement to this period. Some, such as the Mazaris, the Gurchanis and Tibbi Lunds, first confined themselves to the Sulemans, but they gradually spread down into the plains and occupied the nearest lands, extending themselves in some places as far as the Indus. The Mazaris in this way ousted the Nahars from Kin in the south of the district, and the Nahar dominions were reduced to the tract ruled from Sitpur, viz., the north of the present Rajanpur, and the south of the present Alipur tehsil of Muzaffargarh district. The sway of Mirranis continued till 1700 A.D. and Kalhora family came into prominence. When Nadir Shah invaded in A. D. 1739, he recognised as his Governor in Dera Ghazi not the Mirran Chief, but his *wazir* Muhammad Khan Gujar, and that too in subordination to Nur Muhammad Kalhora, who had submitted to Nadir Shah. The Nahars ruling at Sitpur also fell into decay about the same time. They were expelled during the reign of Nadir Shah by Makhdum Sheikh Rajan. It is from Sheikh Rajan that Rajanpur takes its name. On the assassination of Nadir Shah in A.D. 1747, Ahmad Shah Durrani, obtained possession and Nur Muhammad Kalhora submitted to him. In A. D. 1769 Ghulam Shah Kalhora, again attacked Dera Ghazi Khan, and finally broke the Mirrani power.



The Kalhoras lost their power in Sind in A.D 1772, when they were driven out by the Talpurs, a section of the Leghari tribes.

Dera Ghazi Khan's Governors under Ahmad Shah Durani, were appointed direct from Khurasan. This state of anarchy extended to the southern part of the district and this gave an opportunity to the Nawabs of Bahawalpur, and the greater part of the territory was held by the Makhdums, who gradually annexed the whole up to the present left bank of the Indus. The small portion left on their right bank became nominally subject, like the northern part of the district, to the Afghan Governors.

In 1819 A. D. Ranjit Singh seized the Derajat including the district of Dera Ghazi Khan and until 1830 the district was farmed by the Sikhs to the Nawab of Bahawalpur. After the Nawab's farm of the district ceased in 1830, General Ventura held charge of it for two years as Governor and was succeeded by Diwan Sawan Mal, who governed it till his death in A. D. 1844. Sawan Mal was succeeded by his son, Mulraj, whose defiance of the Sikh authority caused the outbreak at Multan. Sir Herbert Edwards was then in the Upper Derajat, and after the conclusion of the second Sikh War, the district was annexed by the British in 1849. Adjustments in the boundaries between this district and Dera Ismail Khan were made in 1866 and 1871 and the boundaries finally fixed were published in 1897.

There is, however, no historical place and the forts of the old Chief of the Nahars in Kin and Mirranis at Asni no longer exist. Mithan Kot has become a place of reverence for containing two tombs of a number of saints of whom Khawaja Ghulam Farid is famous. The saints of Kot Mithan were spiritual guides of rulers of Bahawalpur including a number of leading families of Rahimyar Khan, Multan, Muzaffargarh

and Dera Ghazi Khan districts.

After Independence no major change in administration has occurred except the termination of Tumandar system. The tumandara system has been withdrawn with effect from 1950. It was felt that civil and judicial cases which were decided by the hereditary Honorary Magistrate were not in a regular order.

The whole of the Excluded Area is inhabited by different Biloch Tribes. Owing to the lack of education among them, no history of their influx in these hills seem to have been recorded. Only there are Biloch anecdotes which pass on from generation to generation. Before partition this area was a Special Area and its administration was under the direct control of Governor General. The Tumandars systems was in vogue. Each tribe constituted a Tuman and its chief was called Tumandars who exercised first class magisterial powers and civil and judicial cases decided by them under the Frontier Crimes Regulations. After independence these powers were withdrawn and 3 Political Naib-Tehsildars and one Political Tehsildar were appointed to administer justice to the public. In 1950, the Special Area was declared as Excluded Area of Dera Ghazi Khan district, but no major change in the administration occurred with this change of title. *Jirgas* continued to be held in the same manner which were held previously. The only change which took place was that these *Jirgas* were presided over by the Naib-Tehsildars instead of Tumandars. This was in fact a step to do away with the individual influence of the Tumandar which he wielded over his tribe in times of British rule and which the British utilized to achieve their political ends. This also meant a step towards the freedom of Biloch people who were under the yoke of this age-long dictatorial system. After 1950 things continued to



happen without any conspicuous change. With the auspicious revolution of 1958 Basic Democracies came into existence and the hill people were also given a chance of electing their own representatives to various tiers of Basic Democracy system.

#### 1.15 ADMINISTRATION.

The district is under the general charge of a Deputy Commissioner, who combines the functions of District Magistrate as well as Collector. He is also responsible for the coordination of the functions of all nation-building departments in the district. On the judicial side he is assisted by an Additional District Magistrate and 7 Magistrates, while on the revenue side he is assisted by a Revenue Assistant with a Tehsildar and Naib Tehsildar in each tehsil. For revenue administration, the district is divided into 4 Tehsils namely Dera Ghazi Khan, Taunsa, Jampur and Rajanpur who have their tehsil headquarters at these respective places. Rajanpur is also a Sub-Division. The Excluded Area is under the charge of Political Assistant with headquarters at Fort Munro (now designated as Sub-Divisional Officer).

The police administration is vested in the District Superintendent of Police, who is assisted by one Assistant Superintendent of Police at headquarters and a Deputy Superintendent of Police at Rajanpur. For police administration the district is divided into 18 police stations. Each police station is under the charge of a Sub-Inspector with one or two Assistant Sub-Inspectors of Police.

The judicial administration of the district is under the charge of a District and Sessions Judge who is assisted by 2 Civil Judges.

The other departments functioning in the district with their head of offices are as follows:—

7. Medical ..District Health Officer.
8. Industries ..Assistant Industrial Development Officer.
9. Forests ..Divisional Forest Officer.
10. Education ..(1) District Inspector of Schools assisted by Assistant District Inspector of Schools. The schools in the Excluded Area are under the direct administration of Deputy Commissioner through the Political Assistant at Fort Munro.  
(2) District Inspectress of Schools (for girls schools).

## 1.16 BASIC DEMOCRACIES.

One of the most far-reaching and momentous reforms of the Revolutionary Regime was the introduction of Basic Democracies. The election to the Basic Democracies were held in early 1960. These institutions have created unprecedented social and political awakening among the masses, who are now eager to come to grips with the problem of poverty, illiteracy and disease in the rural areas. One of the principal aims of the Basic Democracies is the association of the People with the administration at each level and making the functionaries of Government accountable to the elected representatives of the people. The tiers of the Basic Democracies with their structure and composition is indicated in the table below:—

Seven Union Councils have been formed on Tribal basis in the Excluded Areas.

The District Council consists of 40 members of whom 20 are appointed, 20 are official members. The representatives of all the Departments in the district are members of the District Council. The income of the District Council including Government grants for 1960-61 was Rs. 23,48,788.

#### 1.17 IRRIGATION.

The soil in the Pachad is a rich loam formed by the action of the hill-torrents, but owing to the scanty rainfall the tract is a bare waste except in the blocks of embanked fields, for which water for irrigation is available from the hill-torrents. Such land is called *rodkohi*. It is sometimes possible to utilize the local rainfall in this tract by leading the drainage from sand hills in channels to fields which are embanked in the same way as *rodkohi* fields but with lighter embankments, and such lands is called *barani*. *Rodkohi* and *barani* soils occupy 99 and 95 per cent respectively, of the total cultivated land in Sangarh and Jampur, which are the more distinctively Pachad Circles; in the Dera Tahsil canal-irrigation has been extended to part of the tract, and in Rajanpur some of the Pachad villages extend into the river bed and get river flood. As the cultivation is dependent on the rainfall in the hills, the area cropped varies tremendously from year to year.

The Kalapani Circle comprises the land which, at the point of issue from the hills of the Kaha torrent in the Jampur tahsil, receives perennial irrigation from that stream. The perennial flow is called Kalapani, and it is led away from the torrent by water-cuts at a point considerably above the place where embankments are made to guide the autumn floods (*rodkohi pani*) into the distributaries. The land to which the perennial flow is applied is also called Kalapani.

The most valuable land in the district is comprised in the Chahi Nahri Circle of Dera and the Sindh Circle of Jampur, which together include nearly the whole of the tract that has been protected from river flood by embankments, and is irrigated by a good system of Inundation Canals supplemented by wells. The cities of Dera Ghazi Khan and Jampur are situated in this tract.

The average depth of wells to water level is 12 to 14 feet, and to the bottom 21 or 22 feet. The average area attached to a well is from 24 to 27 acres in the two circles on which about 22 acres of crops are annually grown, half with the aid of canal water alone and the other half with water from the well in addition to canal water.

The Sangarh-Chahi Nahri Circle, a small and inferior one, lies between the Pachad and the Indus in the half of the tahsil lying to the north of the Sangarh torrent, and is on a lower level than the Pachad though for the most part beyond the reach of river flood. The eastern half of it is irrigated by the Mussuwah Canal.

The canal is liable to be breached and the land adjoining it to be injuriously flooded by two hill torrent, the Vahowa and the Kanwan, when they come down in great flood. On account of this and the unsatisfactory position of the headworks watering of the canal is often bad, but the spring level of water in its vicinity has been raised by its construction, and this is the cause of the increase in the number of wells. The canal at present never flows late enough to give a watering preliminary to rabi sowings in the well estates.

The Dhundi Circle comprises the area irrigated in the Rajanpur tehsil by the Dhundi Canal and was, before the extension of the canal to this tehsil, the north-east corner of the Pachad. The soil is a rich loam formed



by the action of hill-torrents, and the fields are often embanked to better to retain the canal water, and the yield of *jowar* is very superior. When there is good rain the bar waste or part to the west of the canal becomes for a short time a shallow lake, and oil-seeds are then grown as a *barani* crop. Wells are few in number and deep.

#### 1.18 TAUNSA BARRAGE PROJECT.

The Taunsa Barrage Irrigation Project which was taken in hand in 1953 and was completed in March 1959 provides irrigation facilities to Dera Ghazi Khan and Muzaffargarh districts.

This Barrage across the river Indus 12 miles down stream of Taunsa on a line along latitude 30°.32' marks a new milestone in the agricultural economy of West Pakistan. The width of this Barrage is 4,346 feet between abutments consisting of 64 spans of 60 feet each and one span of 22 feet and other accessories. The height of the weir pier is 36 feet. The maximum height of the Barrage is 41.5 feet at weir portion that is from downstream bed level upto the road level. The intensity of flow per foot run works to 228 cusecs. The down stream floor of the stream is worked out for the worst conditions in winter when all the water in the river is to be diverted to the irrigation channels and link channel with no water downstream. In order to effect economy the road and rail way bridges are combined with the Barrage by extending the piers suitably. This also avoids construction of separate well foundations for these bridges. The estimated cost of the weir and Muzaffargarh canals is Rs. 20.71 crores while that of the Dera Ghazi Khan canals is Rs. 6.70 crores making a total Rs. 27.41 crores.

The Muzaffargarh canals have been completed and irrigation has commenced since Kharif 1959. Link No. 1 (Jampur Branch in Dera Ghazi Khan district has also

been completed and water was released in September 1960. The remaining Dera Ghazi Khan canals are likley to be completed in 1962.

A comprehensive Master Plan for the Taunsa Barrage project is being drawn up on the lines of Master plan for Ghulam Muhammad Barrage. The Taunsa Barrage Project is one of the areas in which the Agricultural Development Corporation will operate for increasing agriculture production through intensive effort.

The total gross area commanded by Taunsa Barrage is, 21,17,362 acres while the culturable commanded area is 19,52,000 acres, of which about 15,49,950 acres will receive irrigation annually. Out of this about 14,75,000 acres are proprietary and only 75,000 acres are State land. The State land in Muzaffargarh district is 26,438 acres and in Dera Ghazi Khan is 48,562 acres.

#### 1.19 AGRICULTURE.

##### (a) Main Crops.

The main crops during Rabi season are wheat, gram, barley, oilseeds, *taramira*, *sarsun* and *toria* and in Kharif season sugarcane, cotton, jowar, *bajra* and rice. In addition to these two main crops, there are subsidiary crops known as *Zaid Rabi* and *Zaid Kharif* and *Dobari*. The area under principal crops is given below:—

**(b) Cross Husbandry Practices.**

Sowing is still done with *Desi* plough and indigenous tools. The big Zamindars have started use of new method elements like Furrow investing plough, Master Ploughs Single row Cotton Drill and Rabi Automatic Drill.

**(c) Use of Fertilisers.**

Organic manure and chemical fertiliser are also used by big landlords.

Ammonium Sulphate and Super Phosphate are also used to some extent.

**(d) Waterlogging and Salinity.**

The total area under *thur* and *sem* in this district is 18,164 acres and is increasing due to Taunsa Barrage Canals.

**(e) Soil Reclamation.**

207 acres *banjar* land has been brought under cultivation as a result of notices served to Zamindars under the Land Utilization Act 1959.

**1.20 HORTICULTURE.**

The total area under orchards in the district is 1,294 acres. The main fruits grown in the district are Date-palm, Oranges, *Malta* and Mangoes.

In the Excluded Areas there is a garden at Khar near Fort Munro. Mulberry, Vine, French Olive, almond, peach, plums and apricots fruits are found there. Besides Deodar, long leaved pine and Eucalyptus are also grown.

**1.21 ANIMAL HUSBANDRY AND LIVESTOCK.**

Two breeds of cattle namely Rojhan and Dajal are found in this district. The bullocks of Rojhan breed are of medium size and fit for draught purposes. The Dajal breed is heavy draught. These are found in Rojhan and Dajal tracts. 60 Bulls of Dajal

breed and 25 of Rojhan are selected annually by the Animal Husbandry Department and are subsidised by the Provincial Government and District Council, Dera Ghazi Khan, for the purposes of breeding in the district. 10 Buffaloe Bulls are also subsidised by the District Council for the development of buffaloes. A Horse Stallion of Balochi Breed is maintained by the Government and District Council in every Veterinary Hospital for horse breeding. A livestock farm is located at Fazilpur under the control of Director, Livestock Development.

**1.22 FORESTRY.**

Afforestation is also being introduced in the district including the Excluded Area by the Forest Department. Several strips of lands have been selected for experimentation and demonstration to give stimulus to vegetation in the Area.

The spontaneous products of the plains are *Munj* Grass and *Nilofar*.

**1.23 MEDICAL.**

The hospitals at Dera Ghazi Khan proper are the District Headquarters Hospital with a bed strength of 125, Police Hospital with 18 beds and District Jail Hospital with 10 beds. Civil Hospitals are located at Rajanpur, Taunsa, Fort Munro, Jampur, Rojhan, Kot Chuutta, Vehoa, Mithan Kot, Dajal and Lalgah with varied bed strength. There are 12 Civil Dispensaries spread all over the district in rural areas. Canal Department has its own hospital at Fazilpur with 10 beds and a dispensary at Shahdan Lund. There is also a Jail Dispensary at Rajanpur.

**1.24 COMMUNICATION.****(a) Roads.**

The district is served by *pacca* and *Kacha* roads. The important metalled roads in the district are:—



Muzaffargarh-Bewata road (65.23 miles), Dera Ghazi Khan-Mithan Kot road (80.60), Dera Ghazi Khan—Dera Ismail Khan road (66.00), Kot Chutta-Choti road (9.89), Taunsa Barrage Link road (7.60) and Link Fort road (3.00).

These roads are maintained by the P.W.D. (B & R). One Kacha road namely Rajanpur-Kashmore road would shortly be macademized as part of the Indus Highway. Total length of this road will be 65.00 miles after completion. The kacha roads leading to certain villages are being controlled by the District Council.

In Rural areas a camel is used as a means of transport. Tongas and Horses are also used for conveyance. Apart from this Government Transport Service runs regular bus services on all routes.

The agricultural produce is carried from one place to the other generally on donkeys and camels. Carts and trucks are also used for this purpose. Trucks are used for transport of goods for commercial purposes. Carts and tongas resemble those plying in Multan and Muzaffargarh.

Steamer Service is available at Ghazi Ghat on the river Indus connecting Muzaffargarh district with Dera Ghazi Khan during summer while a boat bridge is erected by the P.W.D. on this route during the winter season. A large number of ferries also exist on the Indus river where passengers are transported by boats. Taunsa barrage has however provided an all weather road link between the two banks of the river.

The railway is conspicuous by its absence in this district and most of the people in the rural areas have not so far seen a train or a railway engine. This district has not been able to keep pace in advancement with the other districts, because of the absence of railway for one thing.

### 1.25 INDUSTRIES.

There is no large scale industry in this district.

Wood Lacquer work is unique and a popular small scale industry at Dera Ghazi Khan and Jampur. Pretty articles are manufactured for drawing rooms, Table decorations such as electric lamps, cots and looking glasses, holders, flower bases and bowls, dressing tables, and many other articles of decorations are also made. In order to develop this industry a section of wood lacquer work is functioning in the Government Industrial School, Dera Ghazi Khan, with the support of District Development Fund.

4 Cotton Ginning Factories exist at Dera Ghazi Khan, Besides 2 Oil Factories, 3 Ice Factories and 4 Engineering Workshops are also functioning. There is a Government Development Training Centre at Dera Ghazi Khan for Carpet Industry.

### 1.26 LAND REFORMS.

After promulgation of the Land Reforms, 344 landowners whose holding exceeded the limits prescribed in the Martial Law Regulation No. 64 declared their agricultural properties. The entire area under their possession in this district worked out to 8,18,838 acres. On scrutiny of the declaration forms only 50 landowners were affected whose surplus areas measuring 5,79,921 acres situated in this district and 7,502 acres in other district total 35,94,092 Produce Index Units was resumed. The Land Commission shall be paying a sum of Rs. 1,09,80,566 in the forms of 25 years Bonds accruing a sum of Rs. 4,39,222/00 as an annual interest thereon.

Out of the entire resumed lands in this district, an area of 80,684 acres has since been sold to 6,019 sitting tenants



and 1235 acres to small landowners for upgrading their holdings to the level of subsistence units. As the purchasing capacity of the peasant class in this district is abnormally low so the whole of the resumed land could not be disposed of even in the upgrading scheme. Consequently the remaining lands available in plots less than 500 acres is being released in the open auctions. The areas left out as undisposed of in plots of more than 500 acres will be transferred to

the Provincial Government for reclamation and utilization under various development schemes.

So far approximately 7,200 tenants and small landowners have been made owners of land each possessing a subsistence unit. The lands reforms when finalized in this district shall be supplying all the vital requirements for the sizeable peasant class.



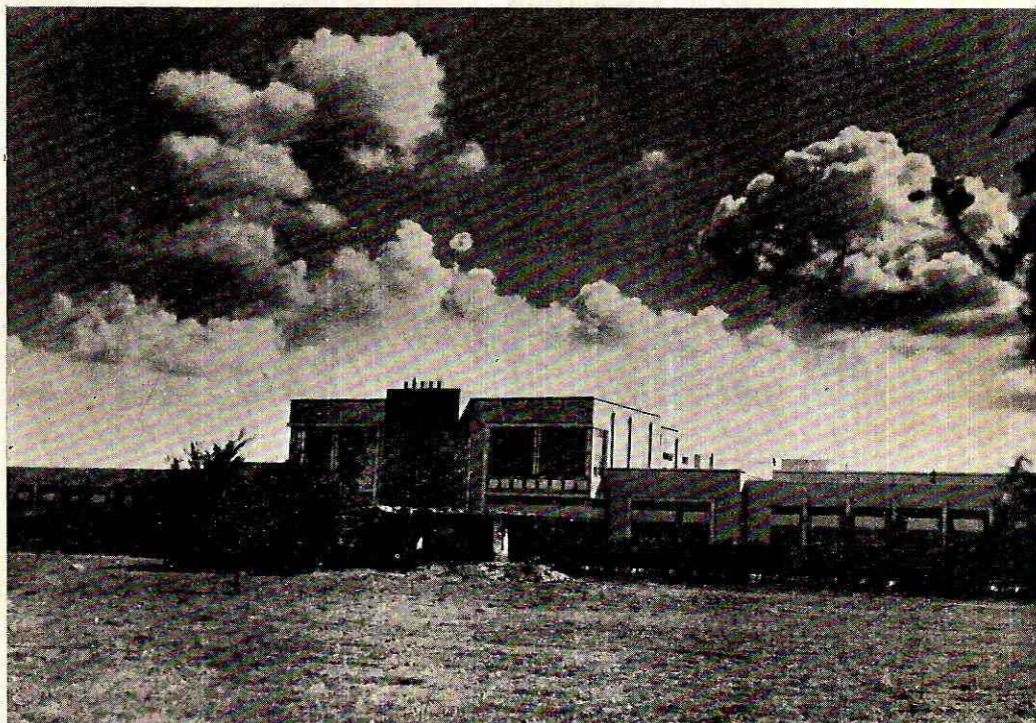

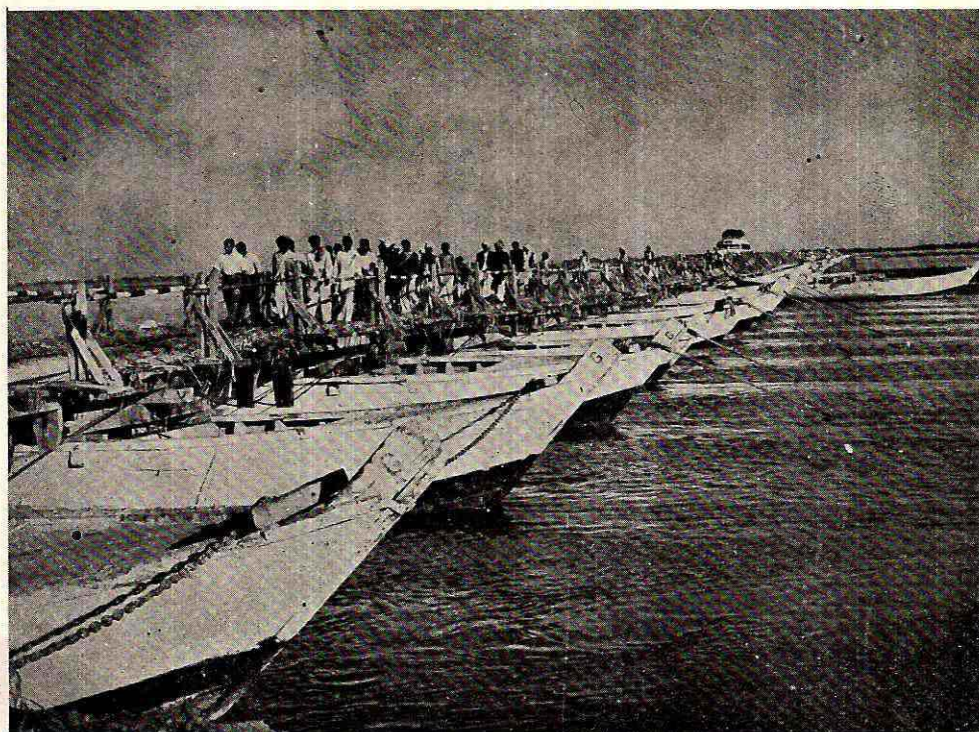


*Adult males and females working in the field.*

## CHAPTER 2

### PEOPLE AND THEIR ENVIRONMENTS

#### 2.1 POPULATION.

The total population enumerated in 1961 was 7,76,620 out of which 4,17,574 were males and 3,59,046 females. The population enumerated in 1951 Census, excluding non-Pakistanis was 6,27,529 out of which 3,40,069 were males and 2,87,460

were females. The percentage increase during the 10 years between 1951 and 1961 works out to 23.8—the percentage of increase among the males 22.8 and among the females 24.9. The sub-joined statement indicates the population growth in the district for the period 1901 to 1961:—

#### 2.2 DENSITY.

The average density of population per square mile in the district works out to 83. The position of the district in order of population is 37th in Pakistan and 21st in West Pakistan. In order of density the district stands 46th in Pakistan and 34th in West Pakistan.

#### 2.3 URBAN/RURAL POPULATION.

The urban/rural distribution of the population is shown below:—

The areas classified as urban in the district in the 1961 Census were:—

Dera Ghazi Khan Municipal Committee, Jampur Town, Taunsa Town, Rajanpur Town, Vehoa Town, Kot Mithan Town Dajal Town, Rojhan Town and Kot Chutta Town.

In respect of urbanisation the district has registered an increase of 29.92 per cent over the 1951 urban population which shows the extent of mobility of the population. The principal reasons for mobility are industrialisation and greater educational and employment opportunities in urban localities.



## 2.4 LANGUAGES AND LITERACY.

The principal mother tongue of the district is Punjabi. The other important languages spoken in the district are Baluchi and Urdu. The percentage of people speaking these languages in the district is indicated in the table below:—

The number of literates recorded in the 1961 Census is 51,333 out of which 44,999 are males and 6,334 females, which gives an over-all percentage of 6.61. Considering the literacy figures by sex, the percentage of literacy amongst males is 10.78 and females 1.76.

The position of the district in respect of literacy in Pakistan is 46th and in West Pakistan 34th.

## 2.6 ETHNOGRAPHY : RACES AND TRIBES.

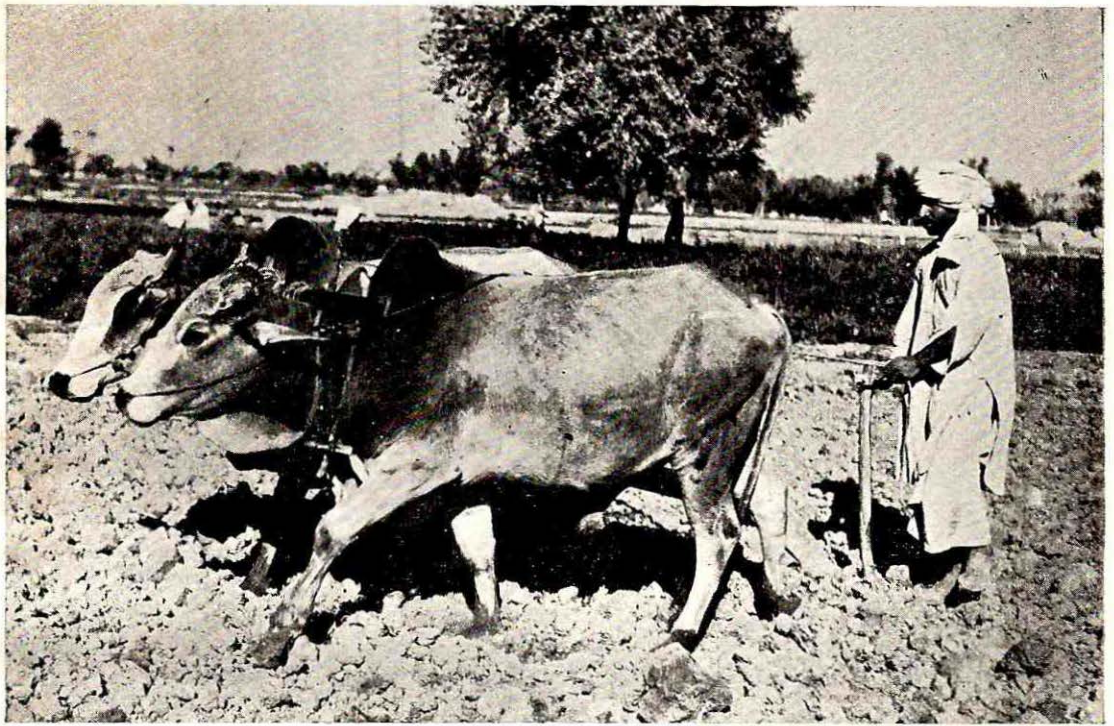
The inhabitants of the district are predominantly Balouch belonging to various tribal groups. Nutkani, Buzdar and Qaisrani tribes are in overwhelming majority in Taunsa tehsil whereas Sori Lund, Khosa and Leghari tribes dominate in Dera Ghazi Khan tehsil. Lund and Gurchanies command majority in Jampur tehsil, while Drishak, Mazari dominate in Rajanpur tehsil. Besides this, people belonging to smaller sub-tribes such as Pitafi and Jaskan are settled in all the four tehsils. Khitran, Pathans dominate in the villages situated in the north-west of Taunsa tehsil, which formerly formed a part of Dera Ismail Khan district. Apart from this the people of other tribes *i.e.*, Sayed, Pathan, Moghul, Jat, Arain, Awan, Rajput, etc., all commonly called Jats, are scattered all over the district but they are found mostly in the areas along the Indus.

After Independence a considerable number of refugees belonging to Jat, Rajput, Arain, Pathan and Bodla tribes have also settled in the district.

## 2.7 COMPLEXION; PHYSICAL FEATURES.

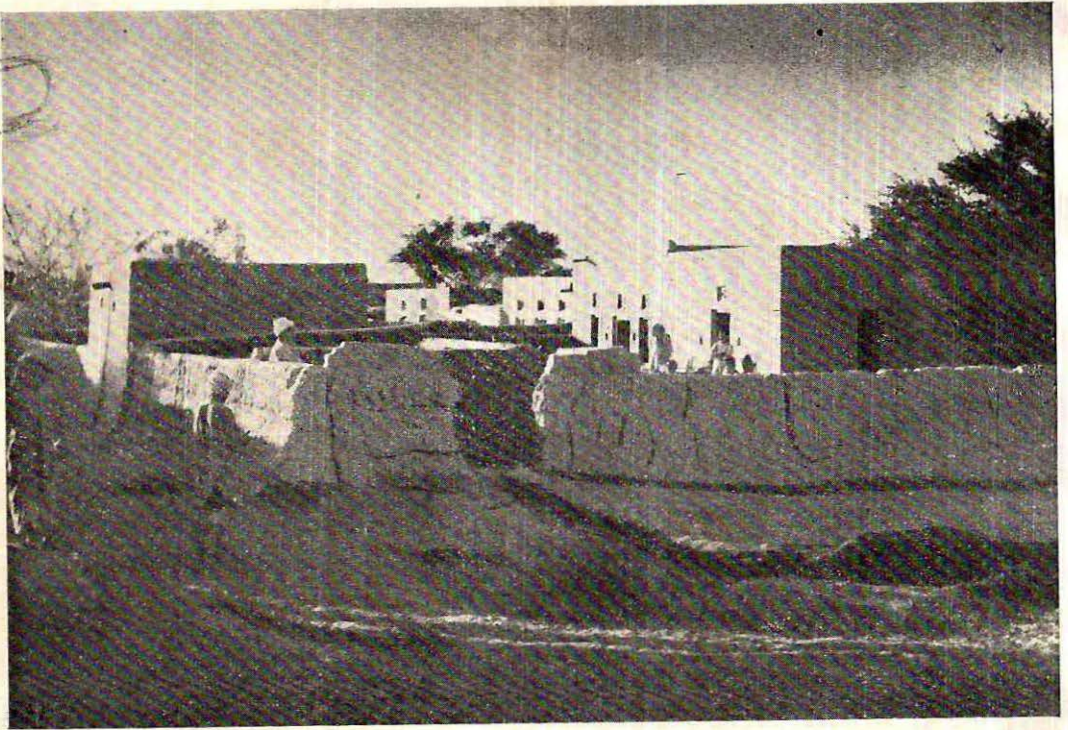
Mostly the people are of wheatly complexion. They are physically tall, strong and robust. The women folk are of medium

stature except in the Raĳanpur Tehsil, where they are tall and strong.

### 2.8 DRESS.

The pattern of dress varies in different parts of the district. In the Western part, the male dress consists of a white *Pagri*, a loose *Kurta* and a big *Shlwar*. *Chappal* is the common footwear. The women folk wear white dress consisting of *Dopatta Kurta* and a big *Shalwar*. The children are also dressed in the same fashion. On ceremonial occasions costly dress is rarely worn by women folk who, however, decorate and embellish their shirts, etc. with embroidery work set with small pieces of mirror or glass. This work is mostly done on the cuffs and the front portion of the shirt.

There is no separate dress for winter as the same dress is used in both seasons. In winter, however, they use a rough blanket known as *Khatti* for protection against chill and cold.

In plains most of the people, who are somewhat advanced, live in *kachha* houses built of mud. The cultivators in the east and in Pachad, both the owners and the cultivators, live on their well and bunds. *Abadies* in compact blocks are few far between particularly in Pachads. They wear *Pagri*, shirt and *Tehmat* instead of *Shalwar*, which is also worn only on ceremonial occasions. Indigenous *Juttas* are used by those who can afford. Woolen clothes are also worn during winter, but in summer they wear a shirt known as *chola* and a big *shalwar*.

The women in this area are not so advanced. They have a weakness for coloured dress. Their dress which consist of *Dopattas*, shirt, and *shalwar* is usually embroidered. Silken dress is rarely used. Indigenous shoes and *slippers* are worn by them.

In the western part of the district, silver

ornaments of old designs consisting of a earrings, necklace known as *Hasli* and Bracelet *Kanggan*. and finger rings are worn by the women folk. In plains, however the women use both silver and gold ornaments of modern designs.

### 2.9 DWELLING HOUSES.

In the hills the people have no proper houses. The line in heets along with that herds of sheep and goats, mat made of date leaves serves as bedding practically throughout the year. They are homeless, wanderers in the hills and lead a nomadic life. While in the fact of the hills they have *kachha* huts scattered here and there. There is no compact *abadi* and each individual has his own hut standing far away from the other. In the plains people have houses made of mud with wooden roofs, the buttons of which are usually of *Jal* wood whereas the beams are of *Kanda*, *Keekar* and date Tree. there are some *pacca* houses as well, in which mud mortar and cement mortar is used. Similar houses are used for cattle farm and poultry. Compact blocks of houses in the form of village *abadies* are few. In the Pachadh tract the population is migratory. During winter the people migrate with their cattle to riverain areas and other parts or even to other district where fodder is available. The cultivators usually live on their respective lands, wells and bunds. The houses are not decorated, furnished and fitted with sanitary arrangements in the sense that there are no ventilators and latrines etc. In the urban areas, a part of the population is educated and well advanced. Mostly they have *pucca* houses. The houses which are ventilated and airy consists of two or more rooms with separate kitchen, bathroom and latrines. The houses are moderately decorated and adequately furnished according to the taste of the occupier. They wear different dresses i.e. western suits, *Sherwani*, *Chola*, *Shalwar* Hat, Cap, *Pagri*, etc.



## 2.10 FOOD AND HEALTH.

The population of the urban and rural areas is generally non-vegetarian. The staple food of the common man, including owner cultivators and the man behind the plough, in the rural areas, is generally *Jawar* and *Bajra*. It is taken in the form of thick *chappaties* with *Lassi*, onions and chillies. Wheat is very rarely consumed by them. They like *chappaties* of rice of inferior quality sown locally. In towns a family of average income consumes wheat, meat, pulses and vegetables. Boiled rice is occasionally used as a special dish and is not taken in the form of *chapaties* as in rural areas. On marriage occasions the guests forming the marriage party are usually served with rice or wheat *chappaties* and beef; and a cattle is specially slaughtered for this purpose. In the western part of the district (Pachadh) generally the water is not wholesome and being brackish is unfit for human consumption. ✓

In the hills *Sijji*, i.e. meat roasted on fire and cooked balls of wheat flour known as *Kak* is served to the guests. Well-to-do and rich families in the rural areas eat wheat *chappaties* with curry.

There are no wells in Pachadh where rain and hills torrents water is stored for human consumption as well as for cattle in *Kacha* tanks, maintained by the village community. In the riverain area there are *Pacca* as well as *Kachha* wells for drinking water. Hand pumps are also installed in some *abadies* Canal and river water is used for human consumption, where no wells are found.

In Urban areas also, the conditions are not good. In Dera Ghazi Khan town the water is highly brackish containing nitrates, and bacteria. The nitrates are insoluble in water and are extremely injurious to health. This has given rise to various diseases in the town.

Jampur town remains waterlogged and

the subsoil water is not good particularly during the rainy season when it is unfit for human consumption. The water is also bad in other places of the district except the riverain areas.

## 2.11 BETROTHAL AND MARRIAGES.

In the whole district a marriage is usually preceded by a betrothal. At the time of betrothal, the parents and relatives of the bridegroom call on the bride's parents and seek their consent to the proposal of marriage. After betrothal the bridegroom's parents go to the bride's home with some gift, such as clothing, a ring and sweet-meats etc. Thereafter a date is fixed for marriage and the bride and the bridegroom are bound in wedlock by *Nikah* ceremony. The guests and relatives are entertained by the parents of the bridegroom. The bride brings dowry along with her according to the status of her parents.

Prior to the enforcement of family laws, early age marriages of a male below 14 and female below 12 years child marriage were not uncommon. In the towns however, the marriage used to be solemnised at a more mature age.

## 2.12 BIRTHS.

The birth of a son is an occasion for general festivities and merriment. To celebrate the occasion, colour is sprinkled on relatives and friends and sweetmeats are distributed among friends and food and meat is distributed as charity. The birth of a daughter, however, is received with quiet resignation.

## 2.13 DEATHS.

The death rites are observed with usual gloom. The holy Quran is read and prayers are offered for the peace of the soul of the deceased, and food is given at the time of *Qul* ceremony.

In rural areas the people are superstitious

and have faith in amulets and other magical scripts and recipes.

#### 2.14 RELIGION.

The entire population of the district is Muslim. They, however, belong to different sects; viz., Sunnis, Shias, Ahle-Hadis, etc.

#### 2.15 CUSTOMS AND USAGES.

In the Tribal Area every guest is served with *Sijji* without exception. There is a peculiar custom called *Hall Deana* (enquiring about the welfare when meeting each other). While on some occasions especially at condolence meetings, when two persons meet by design or coincidence they are under a moral obligation, to recapitulate as faithfully as possible all about his family during the period they met last. And since there is no mincing of words the account is over burdened with details which the listener has to hear with rapt attention.

#### 2.16 MAIN AND SUBSIDIARY OCCUPATIONS.

Cultivation and livestock breeding are the main occupations and means of livelihood of the rural and urban population, depending on agriculture. The cultivator does not depend mainly on agriculture as the income from it is insufficient due to low yields and has taken up livestock breeding as an additional source of income. In Pachadh, however, livestock breeding has more importance, remains uncultivated continuously for some years due to the paucity of rains when the hill torrents do not flow. In such drought years the cultivators migrate with their livestock to the other places where fodder is available. Livestock breeding is also the main occupation of some people in the hills and rural area. They breed sheep and goats and trade in its wool. In the plains camel and horse breeding is also an occupation and source of income. The horse of Baluchi

breed, which is of small height and length, easily distinguishable by the corners of his ears, is commonly used for travelling in the district. The Jats live on camel breeding. It is generally used for transport of goods. Apart from this there are other subsidiary means of occupations of the rural populations, i.e. basket making, mat making and shoe making etc. There are people in the rural areas, who have other means of occupation i.e. weavers, shoe makers, etc. Some people are employed in Government, semi-Government and private services.

The skilled labour, i.e., the masons, carpenters, black-smiths, goldsmiths, is found generally in the towns. Jampur and Dera Ghazi Khan towns are famous for their lacquer work. The excessively hot climate of the district induces indolence and lethargy and is the one absolute among factors responsible for poor agricultural returns. The tiller of the soil here is a poor cultivator. His plough hardly goes a few inches deep below the surface of the earth. He is content with his lot and does not bother about making any improvement in his implements and method of cultivation so much so that a number of people are content to cultivate a few acres jointly and are indifferent to increase their cultivation. The women-folk do not share the work of their men, but in Pachadh women work side by side with men in field and do their chores in the house.

#### 2.17 CULTURAL PATTERN OF THE PEOPLE.

In the rural areas there are no clubs and other means of engagement. The people play Doda (*Kabaddi*) for recreation.

Dancing (*Jhommar*) is also a favourite recreation of the people. Men and women dance separately on ceremonial occasions. *Dholak* is the only musical instrument played by them.



In urban areas, Hockey, Football, Badminton, Cricket, Tennis, Volley-ball, etc., are played. There are regular clubs and teams. Besides this there are also cinemas and theatres. Parks have also been provided for the recreation of the people.

2.18 FESTIVALS AND FAIRS.

The religious festivals of the population, which is entirely muslim, are Eid-ul-Fittar, Eid-ul-Zuha, Muharram Sharif and Shab-e-Barat. Cattle fair and *mela* is held at Sakhi Sarwar during the *Urs* days, when a large number of cattle are bought and sold. Bands of men and women in the forms of *Sangs* (Procession) with a green banner held

by one of them come singing and dancing from all over Pakistan to attend the annual *Urs*. *Melas* are held at Taunsa and Kot Mithan during the days of annual *Urs* at these shrines. People go there to play homage, offer gifts, donations and pray for their well being.

## CHAPTER 3

### IMPORTANT PLACES

#### 3.1 FORT MUNRO.

Fort Munro occupies a place of interest. It is hill station situated at a height of 6,200 feet above sea-level. It has gardens and orchards, beautiful bungalows, Government offices and Tumandars residential houses.

It is about 54 miles in the east of Dera Ghazi Khan and is connected by a metalled road.

During summer season, the climate of this place is very cool and the mercury runs down to 40/45 degrees. It is used as summer resort during the hot weather. Dames Lake and Trimmu waterfall situated near Fort Munro are good picnic spots. The means of conveyance is the Government Transport Bus.

#### 3.2 SHRINES.

Dera Ghazi Khan District has been a favourite resort of Saints in the past. The important shrines are—

##### (a) Sakhi Sarwar.

The most renowned saint of the district was Sakhi Sarwar, and if the renunciation of self is really one of the virtues by the exercise of which pious Muslims become saints. Sakhi Sarwar well deserves his high place amongst holy men, for the spot selected by him is the last place that any one who in the least regarded his personal comforts, would choose as an abode.

Sakhi Sarwar or generally known as

Lakhdata was the son of Hazrat Zenulabdin who migrated from Baghdad in 750 A.H. (1220 A.D.) and settled at Sialkot. His original name was Saidi Ahmad who studied at Lahore and from there went to Dhonkal, near Wazirabad in the Gujranwala district. While at Dhonkal he showed a miracle by calling a mare which the owner, a carpenter, denied to have one. After this Saidi Ahmed by the order of his father went to reside at the foot of the Suleman Range and settled at the place now called after him. Shortly after retiring into the desert, Saidi Ahmed performed another miracle. A camel belonging to a caravan, which was going from Khorasan to Delhi, broke his leg. The leader of the caravan applied to Saidi Ahmed, who told him to return to where he had left the camel and he would find it sound. The merchant did as he was directed, and was pleased to find his camel recovered. Arriving at Delhi, the merchant published the miracle, and the news reached the Emperor. The Emperor, anxious to inquire into the miracle, sent for the camel and had it killed. The leg was examined and found to have been mended with rivets. The Emperor was convinced of the miracle, sent four mule loads of money of Saidi Ahmed, and told him to build himself a house. Sakhi Sarwar Shrine was built with this money.

The shrine is built on the high banks of a hill stream, and a handsome flight of steps leads up and from the bed of the stream to the shrine. These steps were built at the expense of two Hindu merchants of Lahore.



One of the chief peculiarities of the shrine is that it is venerated equally by Hindus as well as Muslims.

The buildings of the shrine consist of Sakhi Sarwar's tomb on the west and a shrine attributed to Baba Nanak on the north-west. On the east is the tomb of Mussammat Bibi Bhai, wife of Sakhi Sarwar, and a *Thakardwana*. The shrine of Sakhi Sarwar is thus a curious mixture of Muslim, Hindu and Sikh architecture.

Diwan Sawan Mal endeavoured to stop Hindus from frequently visiting the Sakhi Sarwar, and fined all who attended at the fair Rs. 1/4/- each. In 1883 the shrine was destroyed by fire and two rubies presented by Nadir Shah, and some valuable jewels presented by Sultan Zaman Shah were consumed or lost. It has since then been rebuilt.

#### (b) Muhammad Suliman at Taunsa.

The shrine of Muhammad Suliman Shah at Taunsa is commonly known as Taunsa Sharif. This is the handsomest shrine in the district. It was built by the Nawab of Bahawalpur in 1272 A.H. at a mausoleum to Safieman Khan, his *Pir* or spiritual guide whose tomb it contains, at a cost of Rs. 85,000.

The outside of the dome has been covered with tiles of Jaipur marble and its beauty is enhanced by contrast to the dry desert country surrounding it, over which it can be seen from a distance of several miles. The tomb beneath the dome is of marble, and the inside of the dome and the walls supporting it are laid with tiles of the blue and white pattern made by potters from Multan.

There is a fine mosque beautifully decorated attached to the shrine.

The annual *Urs* at the shrine is held in the beginning of Muslim month of *Safar*

which last three days and is attended by large multitudes from all parts of the country.

#### (c) Dera Din Panah.

About five miles from Taunsa, on the bank of the river Indus and threatened with erosion by it, is the Dera Din Panah shrine, the tomb of a Bokhari Sayed, who died in 1012 A.H.

#### (d) Pir Adil.

The shrine of *Pir Adil*, nine miles from Dera Ghazi Khan is the site of a fair, second in importance only to the Sakhi Sarwar fair.

#### (e) Zinda Pir.

There is another shrine called Zinda Pir in the Lund country, in the valley of the Shori torrent, about six miles above the place where it issues from the hills. It stands beside a hot sulphur spring which is efficacious in cases of skin disease and lameness. As the name implies, the spring is believed to be frequented by an immortal and invisible saint. The shrine consists of a house which has been built for his residence and has been furnished with beds and other furniture, and a copy of the Holy Quran.

### 3.3 MITHANKOT.

Mithankot is situated on the right bank of the river Indus, some miles below the point of confluence of the Panj-Nand with the Indus. It formerly commanded a large trade, but the town was destroyed by the river in 1862 A. D. upto which the Assistant of the Rajanpur Sub-Division had been stationed there. A new town was then laid out five miles inland from the river of that time. The Indus has since then worked its way westward and is now only half-a-mile from the town which has not, however, been seriously threatened upto now and has benefited from its nearer proximity to the river traffic. Its population was recorded as 4,382 in 1961 Census.



Mithankot has become a place of reverence for containing tombs of a number of Saints. Of these most famous is the shrine of Khawaja Ghulam Farid a well known Sufi Poet of Multani language. His *Kafis* are known far and wide for the sweetness and pathos contained in them.

The saints of Mithankot were spiritual guides of the rulers of Bahawalpur and leading families of Rahimyar Khan, Multan, Muzaffargarh, and Dera Ghazi Khan districts.

There is also a fine shrine belonging to Akil Muhammad. There is a district bungalow, a thana and a *serai*. There are a few gardens of fine quality mangoes outside the town.

#### 3.4 RAJANPUR.

Rajanpur is the Sub-Divisional and Tehsil headquarter town at a distance of 70 miles towards the south from Dera Ghazi Khan. It is said to have been founded by Makhdum Sheikh Rajan in 1145 A. H. (1732-1733 A. D.) It was a small unimportant town till 1862 A. D. when the town of Mithankot was carried away by the river Indus and the headquarter of the Assistant Commissioner of Rajanpur Sub-Division was shifted from Mithankot to Rajanpur. The old city is surrounded by the gardens and it has now become a flourishing town of the district. The main shopping centre is the bazaar running from north to south in the centre of the town with a gate at either end.

It is connected with the District Headquarter Town with *pacca* road. The means of communication are easy. The buses of Government Transport Service and various private transport services run regularly. The town is electrified and it has a Town Council. Drinking water is sweet and is obtained from the surface wells through baskets. The important buildings in the town are Muhammad Hassan's mosque, Town Hall, Assistant

Commissioner's Bungalow, Tehsil and Police Station, all situated on the northern side of the town. There are also public gardens containing a swimming bath built by the garrison at the time which was occupied as Cantonment. The town is protected by an embankment from hill-torrent floods which in 1883 did much damage. According to 1961 Census its population was 6,575 against 5,280 in 1951 which has recorded an increase of 25 per cent during the last decade. There are High Schools for boys and girls. The chief commodities are Rough Woollen Blankets, Carpets and *Loies* of wool manufactured at Rojhan.

#### 3.5 JAMPUR.

Jampur is a Tehsil headquarter town situated at a distance of 30 miles on the south of Dera Ghazi Khan. It is said to have been founded about 600 years ago by one Jam, a Manik Jat. According to another account, Jam was a Chughatta who escaped from Delhi after the rest of his clan had been slain in battle. The Jakkars claim descent from him. It is connected with *pucca* road with Dera Ghazi Khan, Rajanpur and Jacobabad. It is situated on the right bank of river Indus and in summer is attacked by floods. The town being of a low level is surrounded by *sem* and *thur* on all sides. Its population was recorded in 1961 as 13,161 against 13,235 in 1951 which has shown a decrease of 0.5 per cent during the last decade. Drinking water is obtained through hand pumps. It is important for lacquer and wood work. The manufactured wooden boxes and toys are exported to other parts of the country.

There is a Government High School in this town.

#### 3.6 TAUNSA.

Taunsa is the Tehsil Headquarter Town commonly known as Sanghar. It is situated on the north-west of Dera Ghazi Khan at a



distance of 48 miles. It is at the foot of Suleman Mountain Range and on the right bank of river Indus and on the left side of the Bed Rod Sanghar. According to 1951 Census its population was 9,712 against 7,286 in 1951 which has shown an increase of 33 per cent during the decade. It has a Town Committee and one High School. There are only two sweet wells for drinking purposes. Otherwise the surface water is sour and cannot be used for irrigation which is done by Rod Sanghar (Hill Torrent). The town has not yet been electrified. Annual *Urs* is held in the memory of *Khawaja* Shah Suleman Sahib. People reach there to pay humage, offer gifts and donations on this holy shrine. Intricate and delicate wooden hand combs, engraved with mercury, is the important industry of this town. Buses of Government Transport Service ply daily. The camels are used as means of transportation especially during hill torrents.

Taunsa Village has recently been constructed on the river Indus, 12 miles down stream of Taunsa Sharif. It is a scenic place.

### 3.7 ROJHAN.

Rojhan is the terminus town on the southern-most portion of the district. It is the headquarters of the Mazari tribe, who hold the territory being some 40 miles long by 20 broad. Their western boundary is the hills, and their eastern boundary the river. They own all the country between these limits upto Umarkot and the Pitok Pass on the north and their southern boundary is also the boundary between the Dera Ghazi Khan district and the former Sind.

There is well furnished Dak Bungalow for the use of Officers and Tourist. An Extra Assistant Commissioner is posted here for criminal work.



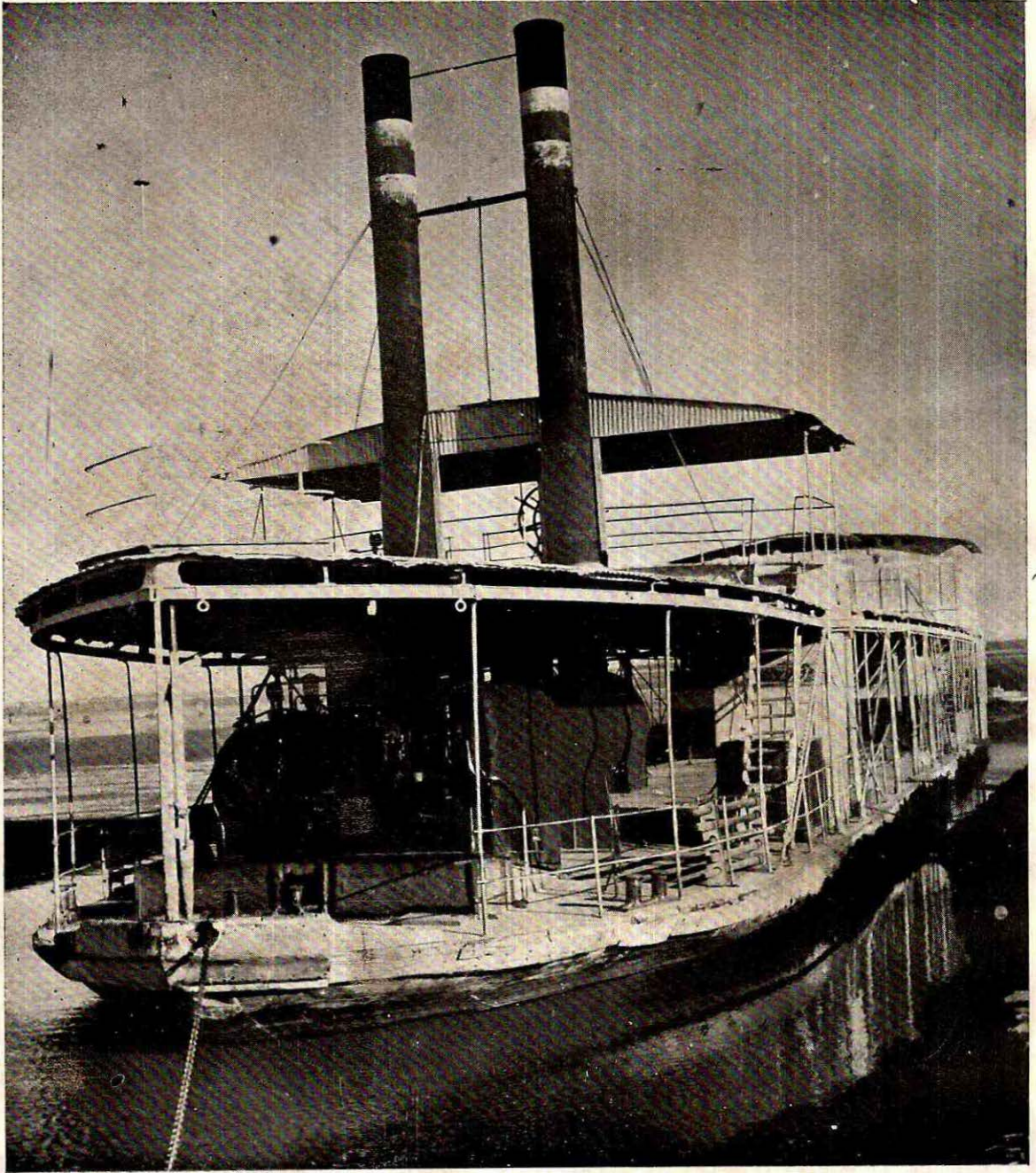

## CHAPTER 4

### DERA GHAZI KHAN TOWN

#### 4.1 LOCATION.

The town of Dera Ghazi Khan lies in north latitude 30°4' and longitude 70°49'. It is situated close to the right bank of the river Indus 60 miles west of Multan the Divisional Headquarter. Ghazi Khan Mirrani was a great cattle-owner, and was attracted to the site by the plentiful supply of grass and town of Dera Ghazi Khan which was situated on the western bank of Indus was founded by the then ruler Haji Khan Mirrani in 1480 after the name of his son Ghazi Khan. It was a beautiful town which was eroded by the river Indus during 1909-10 and the new town was built at the present site about 10 miles from the old town.

#### 4.2 AREA AND POPULATION.

It comprises an area of about 4 square miles. Its population as recorded in 1961 Census was 47,105 persons of which 25,481 were males and 21,624 females. The population in 1951 Census was 36,239 and it has shown an increase of 30 per cent.

#### 4.3 BOUNDARIES.

It is bounded on the east by Manka Canal. The Fort Munro road and the protected Bund are on the southern and western boundary. Its northern direction is formed by the confluence of the Bund and the Manka Canal.

#### 4.4 CLIMATE.

The climate of the town is dry with scanty rainfall. The winter is not very cold and the climate is hot during the major

part of the year but it is very hot in summer. The temperature during summer is usually between 115° and 120°F. while during Winter season the mercury goes down as far as 40F.

#### 4.5 CIVIC ADMINISTRATION.

Dera Ghazi Khan is a Municipal Committee with 8 members of which 4 are elected and 4 appointed. It has 4 Union Councils with 50 elected members in all.

#### 4.6 EDUCATION.

There is one Degree College and 2 High Schools—one for boys and the other for girls. Besides there are 14 private schools for boys and 10 for girls. Apart from these there is an Industrial School both for boys and girls. One Carpet Weaving Centre is also functioning with success.

#### 4.7 HEALTH.

There is a District Headquarter Hospital at Dera Ghazi Khan with 125 beds. Besides there is a District Jail Hospital with 10 beds and a Police Hospital with 18 beds.

#### 4.8 COMMUNICATION AND TRANSPORT.

The town is not connected by rail. The only means of communication is the Government Transport Service which runs daily services between Dera Ghazi Khan-Multan, Dera Ghazi Khan-Dera Ismail Khan and Dera Ghazi Khan-Bahawalpur. For travel to the rural areas camels are used. Tongas and horses are also available as means of conveyance in the city.



#### 4.9 WATER AND ELECTRICITY.

The town is electrified. The water of the town is brackish. There is only one water works maintained by the Municipal Committee which supplies drinking water.

#### 4.10 IMPORTANT PLACES.

##### (a) Mosulium of Dera Ghazi Khan.

This tomb is of Ghazi Khan the founder of the town. It is a specimen of Tugluk architecture. The coloured marble bricks are nicely laid in

##### (b) Tomb of Saint-Mulla Aqaid Shah.

It is situated close to the mosuleum of Ghazi Khan and is a place of an attraction for the masses.

#### 4.11 PLACES OF RECREATION.

There are 2 descent Parks for public recreation namely the City Park and the Company Garden. The Municipal Town Hall is located in the heart of the city with its 4 gates opening in the four directions in the bazaar.

#### 4.12 GOVERNMENT BUILDINGS.

In the Civil Lines and Cantonment area are located the Deputy Commissioner's house, built on the site of Ghazi Khan Garden and other Government offices including the District Courts, the District and Sessions Courts, Office of P. W. D. ( B. & R) and Circle Offices of the Irrigation Department and the District Council. Besides a good colony containing sufficient number of bungalows and residential quarters have been constructed for the Canal Officers and other Government Departments.

#### 4.13 TRADE AND COMMERCE.

Trade is carried on mainly in agricultural products including *Jowar*, Wheat,

etc. Besides, business is transacted in the sale of wool. *Ghalla Mandi* (Grain market) *Sabzi Mandi* (Vegetable market) Cotton market, Pakistani Chauk area and the Sa'adar Bazaar are the main business and industrial centres.

#### 4.14 ARTS.

Lacquer work is famous here. Wood is turned in the desired shape on a turner and lacquer of different shades and colour is rubbed on the wood by frictions. Pictures of flora and fauna are inscribed on the surface of the articles with the help of a fine instrument locally known as iron pencil or scraper. There is also one Carpet Factory.

#### 4.15 MOSQUES.

There are about 100 mosques in the town of which Juma Mosque is the biggest. The other important mosques of historical nature are those constructed by Ghazi Khan the founder of the town; Abdul Jabar's mosque, built in 1235 A. H. Chutawala mosque built by Chuta Khan, Gujar in 1265 A.H. and Haji Muhammad Sadozai's mosque, built with red mortar.

#### 4.16 REST HOUSES AND RESTAURANTS.

There is a Sessions House a P. W. D. Rest House and a Dak Bungalow mainly for Rest House and a Dak Bungalow mainly for the use of Government Officers travelling on duty.

There are a few hotels of average standard. *Nanbai* shops are, however in large numbers to meet the requirements of people coming to the town to attend the Courts and transact other business.

#### 4.17 LANGUAGES.

Locals generally speak Bilochi or Jatki. Urdu and Punjabi is also spoken by the people.



The "Hadbast" numbers are the numbers assigned to a revenue estate at the time of the settlement operations. They are allotted serially within the Tehsil at the time of settlement. Hence the arrangement of villages in each Tehsil does not follow the serial order of Hadbast numbers, but within each Patwar Circle they have been arranged serially. Where no survey and settlement operations have been carried out, this column is left blank. The area figures have been supplied by the Deputy Commissioners and are based on revenue records. Local details regarding Schools, Colleges, Post Offices, Telegraph Offices, Railway Stations, Police Stations, Rest Houses, Union Council Offices, Hospitals, Dispensaries, Electricity, Tube-wells, etc., have been indicated by appropriate symbols against each village. A list of these symbols is appended. These details have been obtained from Deputy Commissioners and from the concerned Departments. The data has been presented by Tehsils within each district. In each tehsil, the villages have been grouped by Field Qanungo Circles and within each Field Qanungo Circle by Patwar Circles. The

name of the Field Qanungo Circle has been separated from the text by double lines and the village in which the Patwari's head-quarter is located is shown in bold print.

The Village Statistics for this district were compiled in the Hand Sorting Centre, Multan under the supervision of Mr. A. Hamid, Deputy Director of Census, Incharge of Hand Sorting Centre, Multan. After compilation, the lists were sent by the Officer-in-Charge, Hand Sorting Centre, to the Deputy Commissioner concerned for verification and completion of figures relating to "Hadbast" numbers, area and local details. After this verification, the Village Statistics were sent to my office, where they were further checked, adjusted and consolidated before publication.

A summary giving the total population of the district and distribution by sexes to the nearest thousand has been given in the beginning. Similar summaries by Tehsils and by Field Qanungo Circles within each Tehsil have also been added.

## INTRODUCTION

The village is the basic unit of revenue administration and the need for basic statistics for villages is quite obvious as all planning depends on such statistics. They are also indispensable for carrying out sample surveys over limited areas and from the basis of continuous collection of statistics on different aspects of rural life and economy. The village was taken as the basic unit of enumeration if its population was 600 or it was a continuous collection of about 150 houses on an average. Where the village approximated to this size, it was constituted into a Block. A large number of villages has to be split up into a number of Blocks, but the boundaries of Census Block did not go beyond the limits of a revenue estate. All statistics pertaining to a village concerning land administration are given by "Mauza" or revenue estate and the importance of this territorial unit in our administrative set-up is unique. A "Mauza" may be defined as a parcel or parcels of land having a separate name in the revenue records and known limits. The unit of revenue administration is the revenue estate or "deh" which is usually identical with the village or "mauza". A revenue estate is a unit of area—

- (a) for which a separate record-of-rights has been made; or
- (b) which has been separately assessed to land revenue or would have been so assessed, if the land revenue had not been leased, compounded for, or redeemed; or
- (c) which the Local Government may by general rule or special order declare it to be an estate.

The Village Statistics contained in this part have been compiled from Block-wise figures contained in the Summaries prepared by the Census Supervisors and Charge Superintendents. Except for data on houses and households they are based on the results of the "Circle Sort" which was carried out in the Hand Sorting Centres after the physical counting of the individual enumeration schedules. The literacy figures, however, have been lifted from the Summaries prepared by the Supervisors and Charge Superintendents.

The plan of presentation is that for each village, the Hadbast number, its name in English and Urdu and area in acres, the total population by males and females, and the number of literates in each village has been recorded.

The last two columns pertain to number of houses and households. This information is based on the Housing Census which was carried out in September, 1960. The data was collected in the first instance from the Summaries prepared after the Housing Census by the Charge Superintendents. These figures have been checked with the results of the Machine tabulation in the case of urban localities, but since only 10 per cent sample was taken for the villages, the data of villages has been extracted directly from the Household Summaries. The number of houses refers only to the "occupied" houses, while the number of households refers to the commensal unit the members of which live together and eat from a common kitchen. The definitions of "house" and "households" are given in the Explanatory Note.

homeless folk and others who are found then anywhere within your area must be questioned and, if they have not been enumerated before, a slip must be prepared for each of them.

**The End of the Work :**

When you are sure that you have properly enumerated every person in your Block, and your last check-up has been completed as above, you should recount all your valid schedules in each Pad and check the totals which you will have recorded on the back covers thereof, showing males, females and literate persons separately. These totals on the back covers should then be added up and the grand totals recorded in your Report Sheet reproduced as a detachable form at the end of this Booklet. This Report Sheet should then be removed and handed over to your Supervisor along with the used and partially used pads of Schedules and the Supervisors receipt should be obtained in the form below:

Copy No. 1 of the Housing Census Register should also be handed over to the Supervisor at this time which should be before 3rd February 1961.

**DUTIES OF THE CENSUS OFFICER UNDER CENSUS ORDINANCE, 1959**

1. To ask all authorised questions from all persons in the limits of the area for which he has been appointed. [Sec. 7(1)].

2. Not to ask any improper or unauthorised question, nor ask any authorised question, in an offensive manner. Therefore he should always be most courteous in the discharge of his duties. [Sec. 13(b)].

3. Not to disclose any information collected by him during the Census to any unauthorised person as all such information is to be regarded as confidential. [Secs. 10 and 13(b)].

(iii) Are you an INMATE OF MENTAL ASYLUM, JAIL or other such Institution or are you a beggar?

Ring round number "3".

(iv) DEPENDENT and others.

Ring round number "4".

*Explanation.*—More than one of the numbers in this Question may have to be ringed.

---

**Q. 22. ONLY FOR WOMEN WHO ARE OR HAVE BEEN MARRIED?**

(i) *During your whole married life:*

How many CHILDREN have been born ALIVE altogether?

Write under "Children born" total number of children born alive to her.

(ii) *During your whole life:*

How many years you REMAINED MARRIED altogether?

Write under "Years Wed" total number of years.

*Explanation.*—Include any infant born alive who may have died since.

If a woman has been married more than once the two questions should cover the whole period she remained married from the date

of her first marriage. For example a woman married for the first time and after 5 years was divorced. Some years later she remarried and her (new) husband died 10 years later, since when she has remained a widow. In this case "Total years remained wed" is  $5+10=15$  years.

---

After filling up a Schedule for each member of the household, you should check again that no one in the household (particularly daughters-in-law) has been over-looked. Also that no one normally resident in the household is temporarily absent and expected back before the 31st of January 1961.

**Progress Reports:**

Carry out the enumeration of your area progressively every day. Don't leave the work to be done towards the end of the Enumeration Period. In order to ensure this, report regularly to your Supervisor in the prescribed forms regarding the percentage of the work completed on the dates shown in the Calendar. The first round of your visits to all the houses in your Block should be completed during the 1st two weeks. Then during the next three days carry out a 2nd round and enumerate the Households that might have been left out during the 1st round, and also those normal residents who were temporarily absent, but have since returned and have not been enumerated elsewhere. Two days before the last date (*i.e.*, 29th January 1961) make an announcement in your Block that persons left out may kindly report to you at an agreed place and get themselves enumerated. Continue the checking for omissions during the last two days and then on the actual Census Night (Night of the 31st January) you must make a rapid and thorough examination of the whole Block. All new arrivals, travellers, wanderers,



- (ii) or Are you an EMPLOYEE? If yes, ring round "2" under "Employee".
- (iii) or An INDEPENDENT worker? If yes, ring round "3" under "Independent worker".
- (iv) or UNPAID FAMILY HELP? If yes, ring round "4" under "Unpaid family help".

*Explanation.*—Every non-agriculturist who is economically active must be classified under one and *only one* of the above categories.

Note that the whole question concerns the main occupation given in question No. 16. Persons who employ others in their profession or business will be classed as "Employer". No one will be classed as "Employer" merely because he employs domestic servants. For example, a cook is classed as an employee in his occupation, but if he is cooking for, let us say, a civil servant, the latter will *not* be shown as an employer on that account. Similarly a Company Director for instance, although he may have power to appoint and discharge Company staff, will not be classed as "Employer", because he himself is an employee of the Company. An independent worker is his own master in his trade or business who does not employ others. An unpaid family help is a member of the family who assists directly in the trade or business of another member but receives no separate payment in cash or kind.

Q. 20. HAVE YOU ANY SUBSIDIARY MEANS OF LIVELIHOOD? IF SO, WHAT?

Write it out.

IF A PERSON HAS NO SUBSIDIARY OCCUPATION, PUT A CROSS IN THE BOX.

*Explanation.*—Enter the name of Subsidiary Occupation in full, or at least, in sufficient detail to ensure identification from the Main Occupation.

In order to claim "Subsidiary Occupation", a person must be following two occupations, the second being pursued in addition to or alternatively to the "Main Occupation".

This may be either a secondary source of income pursued throughout the whole year or an alternative means of livelihood adopted at times when the main occupation cannot be followed. This distinction, however, need not be recorded, and it is only necessary for the Enumerator to say what, if any, is the secondary or alternative means of livelihood of the respondent.

In rural areas the Subsidiary Occupation (if any) of cultivators will generally be one of the agricultural occupations such as poultry, bee-keeping, etc., or a cottage industry. Service on roads or in the militia may be a normal subsidiary occupation in some areas. When Cottage Industries are given as subsidiary occupation, they should be described as "Home weaving", "Home pottery making", "Home mat making", etc.

Q. 21. DETAILS OF INACTIVES?

*Only those persons who are ringed as "3" in question No. 15 should be asked:*

- (i) Do you work as HOUSE WIFE, *i.e.*, perform household duties only?

Ring round number "1".

- (ii) Do you receive any kind of RENT, PENSION, etc.?

Ring round number "2".

The entry has to be made *only* if the person is working, or if not working, has been previously working and is at present looking for work. In the case of a person who is looking for work for the first time, enter "X" against this question.

Industry refers to the activity of the firm, establishment or department in which the person is employed or to the kind of business the person operates. The following are examples of Industry/Business descriptions:—

Stock-raising, forestry and logging, fishery, biscuit making, clothes making, furniture making, brick manufacturing, pineapple canning, cotton ginning, cotton textiles, jute textiles, woollen textiles, tannery, leather products, blacksmithy, motor repairing, road making, fish retailing, boot and shoe retailing, banking, insurance, architecture, advertising, cinema, restaurants, hotels, laundries, hair-dressing, etc.

Railway transport, motor taxi service, motor cycle rikshaw service, air transport, postal services, primary school, technical school, university, Governmental medical services, private medical services, social welfare services, legal services, domestic services, armed services, etc.

The list is not comprehensive but it should indicate the variety of descriptions and the degree of precision required.

---

Q. 18. AGRICULTURAL STATUS? Only for persons ringed "T" in question No. 16.

(i) Do you OWN ALL OR PART OF THE LAND you till? If yes, ring round "1" under "owner cultivator".

(ii) TENANT— Do you pay rent in cash or kind for ALL OR PART OF the land you till? If yes, ring round "2" under "Tenant".

(iii) Are you UNPAID FAMILY HELP? If yes, ring round "3" under "Family help".

(iv) Are you an AGRICULTURAL LABOURER working for others for wages in cash or kind? If yes, ring round "4" under "Agricultural Labour".

*Explanation.*—All persons classed as Tillers in Q. 16 *must* have a ring round one or more of the numbers in this question. For instance a man who owns a little land which he cultivates himself, who also has some land on rent, and who in his spare time works for reward in agriculture for others, will have rings round numbers 1, 2 and 4.

---

Q. 19. STATUS IN BUSINESS, TRADE, INDUSTRY OR SERVICE? For persons Not ringed "T" in question 16.

(i) In your main occupation do you EMPLOY OTHERS? If yes, ring round "1" under "Employer".



**Q. 16. WHAT IS YOUR MAIN OCCUPATION?**

(what kind of work do you do)?

If a TILLER OF THE SOIL, ring round "T" and move on to Q. 18. Otherwise write the OCCUPATION.

*Explanation.*—A tiller of the soil is one who himself works on the land or gets it cultivated under his direct personal supervision. Information regarding "Main Occupation" is required only if the person is "WORKING" or, if not working is "LOOKING FOR WORK". It is essential that a person's occupation be recorded in such a way that it may provide an adequate description of the work he is doing, or is looking for. In the case of a person looking for work for the first time, enter "NONE YET".

For your guidance a list of descriptions of occupations which are not acceptable without qualification is given below. This list is not comprehensive but gives an idea of the precision required.

*Administrative Officer.*—State whether Government Administrative, City Council Administrative Officer, etc.

*Clerk.*—State whether accounts clerk, correspondence clerk, stores clerk, solicitor's clerk, tally clerk, timekeeper, etc.

*Driver.*—State whether lorry driver, bus driver, taxi driver, car driver, tractor driver, railway engine driver, crane driver, bulldozer driver, etc.

*Conductor.*—State whether bus conductor, band conductor, railway conductor, etc.

*Engineer.*—State whether civil engineer, electrical engineer, mechanical engineer, mining engineer, motor engineer, etc.

*Factory Worker.*—State the exact nature of work done and the kind of factory.

*Inspector.*—State whether fire inspector, health inspector, labour inspector, police inspector, traffic inspector, ticket inspector, railway inspector, vehicle inspector, etc.

*Labourer.*—State whether dock labourer, earth moving labourer, godown labourer, transport labourer, etc.

*Manager.*—State whether finance manager, personnel manager, general sales manager, textile retail manager, owner or partner (stating nature of business), etc.

*Mechanic.*—State whether motor mechanic, radio mechanic, lift mechanic, etc.

*Owner Proprietor.*—State nature of business owned.

*Salesman.*—State whether retail shop salesman, insurance salesman, ticket salesman, newsboy, street vendor, wholesale commodities salesman, broker, auctioneer, etc.

The description should be appropriate to the actual work done irrespective of educational, professional, or technical qualifications achieved by a person. Vague, incomplete and ambiguous descriptions like "service" "Labourer" "Mulazmat" should be avoided.

For *PERSONS NOT RINGED "T" IN QUESTION NO. 16.*

**Q. 17. NAME AND TYPE OF INDUSTRY, BUSINESS OR SERVICE?** Write it out.

*Explanation.*—Enter the name of the Industry, Business or Service in which the person is working.

IF A PERSON HAS NOT PASSED ANY GRADE AT ALL PUT A CROSS IN THE BOX

Q. 14. OWNERS OF AGRICULTURAL LAND. DO YOU OWN AGRICULTURAL LAND IN PAKISTAN?

Ring round "Yes" or "No" as appropriate.

Explanation.—(1) Agricultural land includes land producing crops and also banjar. It excludes building sites and land reserved for residential purposes such as 'Abadideh'.

(2) Owner of Agricultural land includes one shown as such in the Revenue records (khewat or khata). But it also includes Lease purchasers, Mortgagees with possession, Refugees and other persons who have been given provisional or permanent allotment of Agricultural land and Grantees of land in Colonies on instalment payment or other bases (including those who became owners after Land Reforms).

(3) Owner excludes those who are mortgagees without possession and adult sons of landowners who work their parents' land, with or without their own ploughs. It excludes also all occupancy and other tenants and share croppers.

REMAINING QUESTIONS ARE TO BE ASKED ONLY OF PERSONS TEN (10) YEARS OLD AND ABOVE.

Q. 15. ECONOMICALLY ACTIVE UN-EMPLOYED AND INACTIVE.

Are you WORKING FOR PROFIT or to EARN WAGES or SALARY or do you

If "Yes", ring round (1).

HELP ANY MEMBER OF YOUR FAMILY ON THE FARM, ETC.?

If not working at present, are you LOOKING FOR WORK for salary or wages or profit, etc.

If "yes", ring round (2).

If "No", ring round (3).

Explanation.—(1) If the respondent is not a tiller of the soil, this question should be put with specific reference to "WORKING" or "NOT WORKING BUT LOOKING FOR WORK" during the last week, i.e., a non-agricultural worker who has not been working, but looking for work during the last week will be ringed "2", but if he has done any work for profit, etc., during the week, he will be ringed "1".

(2) "Inactive" is a person who is not working to earn his livelihood nor is he in search of any work. Students and Housewives doing only household duties are to be treated as "Inactive". But persons who are helping any member of their family in his profession or trade, even if they are not paid for such work in cash or kind, are to be classed as "Working". Persons not working and living on rent or pension only are also to be treated as inactives. Beggars and Prostitutes are also to be classed as inactives, because, although they do earn, they are not helping in the production of economic goods.

(3) In the case of "Inactives" questions 16 to 20 will not be asked but the details of their categories will be ascertained from Question No. 21 and recorded accordingly.

Questions 16 to 20 to be asked only of persons who are "WORKING" OR "LOOKING FOR WORK", i.e., who are ringed (1) or (2) in Q. No. 15.

(i) WHAT IS THE HIGHEST GRADE YOU HAVE PASSED IN SCHOOL OR COLLEGE?

(a) For below Matriculation :

Ring round the appropriate number, from 1 to 9 for the highest class completed at School.

(b) For Matriculation and above.

Ring "M" for Matriculate.

Ring "Int" for Intermediate Passed.

Ring "D" for Degree Holder.

Ring "HD" for Higher Degree such as Master's or Doctor's Degree, and

Ring "O" for others including Oriental Degrees.

(ii) In which FIELD OF PROFESSIONAL (INCLUDING TECHNICAL) EDUCATION, if any, have you passed?

Ring round "1" under "Educ." for Education.

Ring round "2" under "Med." for Medicine.

Ring round "3" under "Engin" for Engineering.

Ring round "4" under "Agri" for Agriculture.

Ring round "5" under "Com." for Commerce.

Ring round "6" for Law.

Ring round "7" for Others.

*Cert.*—If passed "middle" or the 8th class in School or higher, and hold a Certificate awarded by a recognised Educational Institution after at least 6 months full time attendance in the field of Educ., Med., Engin. or Agri., ring "Cert" and the number of the appropriate Professional (including Technical) field, as well as the highest grade in general education. *E.g.*, a certificated Nurse who has passed "middle" or the 8th class would have 3 rings round "8", "Cert" and "2" under "Med." field. Certificates will not be recorded if general education has not passed "middle" or the 8th class.

*Dip.*—If passed Matriculation or higher and hold a recognised Diploma, ring "Dip" and the number of the Professional (including Technical) Field, as well as the highest grade in general education, *e.g.*, a Diplomaed Teacher who has passed Matric, will have 3 rings round "M", "Dip" and "1" under Education Field. No Diploma will be recorded unless the holder has passed Matric or higher in general education.

*Field.*—The Professional (including Technical) Field should only be ringed in the case of those who hold a recognised Professional (or Technical) Certificate or Diploma, or a Professional Bachelor's, Master's or Doctor's Degree.



Q. 11. LITERACY?

(i) Are you able to read and write a simple letter? If so, in what languages?

Ring round the number under appropriate languages against "Write and Read only".

(ii) Are you able to read with understanding, but not write? If so, in what languages?

Ring round the number under appropriate languages against "Read only".

(iii) Are you able to read the Holy Quran without understanding?

If yes, put a √ mark under Arabic in box 9 against "Read only."

IF CANNOT READ OR WRITE AT ALL DRAW A CROSS RIGHT THROUGH THESE BOXES.

Explanation.—A ring round 9 under Arabic against "Read only" will mean that the respondent can read Arabic and the Holy Quran with understanding. A √ in this box will clearly mean ability only to read the Holy Quran without understanding. Languages already ringed for "Write and Read" should not be ringed again for "Read only".

Q. 12. SCHOOL OR COLLEGE ATTENDANCE?

Are you NOW ATTENDING A SCHOOL OR COLLEGE OR AN INSTITUTE OF EDUCATION?

If attending a school or college of General or Professional Education ring round "G". If attending an Institution of

Technical Education ring round "T".

If attending a Maktab ring round "M".

IF A PERSON IS NOT AT PRESENT ATTENDING ANY SCHOOL OR COLLEGE, PUT A CROSS IN THE BOX "NOW GOING TO SCHOOL OR COLLEGE."

Explanation.—For the purpose of Census a person is regarded as regularly attending school or college, or a technical institution regardless of any temporary break in attendance due to sickness or holiday, etc. The terms "School" and "College" cover institutions imparting General or Professional Education below and above matriculation standard respectively without regard to the names of the institutions.

Technical Institutions include Polytechnics, Technical High Schools, etc.

Maktab or Madrasa includes places where the Holy Quran and often elementary Urdu or other local languages are taught by an Imam, Maulvi or other teacher.

Q. 13. EDUCATION?

(This applies both to those who are now attending School/College, and to those who have completed education).

If not what is your NATIONALITY? Write it out.

*Explanation.*—Write down exactly what the respondent says. People know quite well whether they regard themselves as Pakistani or not and it is their opinion that has to be recorded.

For non-Pakistanis record the name of the country of which they claim to be Nationals.

*Afghan Powindahs.*—If an Afghan does not know whether he is a Powindah, ask him how long he is staying in Pakistan. If he is only here for the winter, treat him as a Powindah.

Q. 7. RELIGION? Ring round the appropriate number.

*Explanation.*—Accept respondent's own classification. The last blank box is intended for persons who claim a religion other than those recorded on the schedule, when the religion claimed should be written in the blank box. If a person claims no religion, write "None" in the blank box.

Q. 8. DISABLED? If totally blind, ring round "1" under "Blind".

If deaf and dumb, ring round "2" under "Deaf and Dumb".

If crippled ring round "3" under "Crippled".

*Explanation.*—A person will be treated as blind if he cannot count the Enumerator's

fingers held up about one foot in front of his face with or without spectacles, and as "Crippled" if he is permanently unable to use one or both of his arms and or legs. A person who is deaf but *can* speak, or dumb but *can* hear will *not* be counted as "deaf and dumb".

IF NOT DISABLED PUT A CROSS IN THIS BOX

Q. 9. MOTHER TONGUE? Ring round the appropriate number under languages.

*Explanation.*—One of the last blank columns is intended for persons whose mother tongue is not one of those named on the schedule; when that is the case write the name of the language in the blank heading and then ring the number underneath. Every person must have a mother tongue. In the case of a young child who is as yet unable to speak, or of a deaf-mute, the language to be entered would be that principally spoken at the present time in the home by the parents or guardians. A person cannot have more than one mother tongue and for this reason there should be *only one* entry in this column.

Q. 10. OTHER LANGUAGES YOU CAN EASILY SPEAK? Ring round the appropriate number under languages.

*Explanation.*—The respondent should not claim to speak any language unless he can easily converse in it. If he claims to be able to speak languages which are not provided on the schedule write the names in the blank columns and ring the number in the appropriate box. The language already ringed as mother tongue in the preceding question should *NOT* be ringed again in this question which deals only with *OTHER* languages spoken.

*Explanation.*—Enter age in *completed years*, except for children less than 12 months old *e.g.*, a person who will be 20 years 10 months on 31st January, 1961, should be entered as 20 years and not 21 years. For a child less than 12 months old, enter number of *completed months*. Enter “0” months when under 1 month. If age is not known, try to ascertain the age as accurately as possible by reference to any past event which may be remembered. The estimation of age is of great importance and calls for intelligence and diligence on the part of the Enumerator. It will generally help in the estimation of ages to enumerate the children in a household starting from the youngest child.

Q. 4. MARITAL STATUS?

Single.	Ring round “1” under ‘Single.’
Married.	Ring round “2” under ‘Married’.
Widowed.	Ring round “3” under ‘Widowed.’
Divorced.	Ring round “4” under ‘Divorced’.

*Explanation.*—“Single” applies only to persons who have never been married.

“Married” includes all persons who are at present married, all persons habitually living together as man and wife and all persons living apart but still married and not widowed or divorced.

“Widowed” applies to a person whose husband or wife is dead, and who has not married again.

“Divorced” applies to both divorcer and divorcee if not remarried.

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Q. 5. WERE YOU BORN IN THIS DISTRICT?

If not, WHERE?

If yes, ring round “Born in”.

For other places in Pakistan write name of the District.

If born in “Azad Kashmir” or “Occupied Kashmir” the word “Azad Kashmir” or “Occupied Kashmir” should be written along with the name of District.

If born in India, write “India” along with the name of District.

Elsewhere write name of COUNTRY ONLY.

*Explanation.*—Birth place means the country or district in which the person was born according to present political boundaries which may differ from those existing at the time of birth.

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Q. 6. ARE YOU A PAKISTANI ?

If a Powindah; ask are you an Afghan Powindah?

If a Kashmiri:

Are you a national of “Azad Kashmir” or “Occupied Kashmir”?

If yes, ring round “PAK”.

If yes, write “AFGHAN” and put “Powindah” after it.

Write one of them.



- Have you been enumerated already?
- (a) Is this your present REGULAR residence or lodging place?
- (b) Will you be BACK in your normal residence before 31st JANUARY, 1961?
- If "NO" ask question (a).
- If "YES" carry out enumeration in full. If "NO" ask question (b).

be later destroyed. The reason for the recording of the name is to assist you in obtaining correct information and in preventing double counting. If a child has not been named enter "Son of———" "Daughter of———". If any person is hesitant to let you know the names of female members of his household, do not insist upon knowing the name but write down "Wife of———", "Daughter of———" and so on. 6. Should any person object to answering any Census question you should explain that the information collected is **STRICTLY CONFIDENTIAL**, that it will not be communicated to any person whatsoever, and that no use will be made of it, which can in any way injure the respondents interests.

7. Spoiled Schedules should *not* be removed from the pad, but should be clearly cancelled with a cross on both sides. If a wrong entry is made by mistake under any question, it may be neatly cancelled by a cross (x) and the right entry made.

#### Whom to Count:

8. The object is to *include in the Census* all persons who are normally residents of Pakistan and all visitors to Pakistan during the Enumeration Period. The Census is to be complete and the motto should be "catch every person", but *no one should be counted more than once*.

9. Therefore *visit each and every house* during the Enumeration Period, missing no place in your Block. Write a schedule for every person you find there who is a Normal Resident, and also for visitors, travellers and wanderers in accordance with these instructions.

10. *A Normal Resident* in a house is a person who has his or her present regular residence of lodging place there. If you have any doubt as to whether a person is truly a normal resident, you should fill in a schedule for him or her and make a note to consult your Supervisor. .

11. *Absent members of the household*.— The object of the *Preliminary Questions* is to ensure that persons who are temporarily away from their present normal residence for part

of the Enumeration Period, are enumerated in the locality in which they normally reside. This will be part of your job.

Persons who are absent from their Normal Residence during the *whole* Enumeration Period will be counted at the place where they have gone and you need not worry about them.

12. *Temporary visitors* who have not already been enumerated, should be enumerated where they are found no matter where they come from, unless they will be back at their normal place of residence in Pakistan at some later time during the Enumeration Period. If you enumerate them you must warn them not to allow themselves to be enumerated again. But if you do *not* enumerate them you should ask them to get themselves enumerated at their normal place of residence when they return there before 31st January, 1961.

#### Post Enumeration check:

13. In addition to normal Supervision and Checking during the Enumeration Period, a percentage of the Enumeration Schedules will be completely checked soon after the "BIG COUNT" in order to assess the accuracy of the Census. Every Census Officer should try to ensure that no defect is discovered in his work at that stage.

Also satisfy yourself that all *INFANTS* and all additions made in the household until the time of Enumeration are properly reported. People usually forget to get all the *female members* enumerated, so take special care to see that *every female* in the household is enumerated.

5. Always introduce yourself by showing your letter of Appointment which you should carry with you.

### METHOD OF RECORDING PARTICULARS IN THE ENUMERATOR'S REGISTER FOR THE HOUSING CENSUS

1. You have been given two copies of this Register, one of which (Copy No. 1) contains Cottage Industry Schedule which is also to be completed while taking the Housing Census. Even if there is no Cottage Industry in your Block the Cottage Industry Form should still be returned with the word "BLANK" written across it.
  2. Your "Location Code" should be completed on each copy of the Housing Census Schedule and on the Cottage Industry Form at home before going out in your Block to fill up the Schedule & Form. This copy of the Housing Census Schedule and the Cottage Industry Form (Copy No. 1) should be completed while out in the Block carrying out the actual Housing Census. The second copy (Copy No. 2) of Housing Census Schedule may be filled up at home by copying out neatly in ink on it each evening the entries you have made on the original (Copy No. 1), during the day.
- Column (2) of Housing Census Schedule :** The "Census House Number" given to the building or house should be recorded in this column. In a building there can be many houses. In such a case the building number should be recorded first, underneath the No. of the building, the No. of the house therein should be recorded separately. It should be remembered that in case more than one households are living in the same house, the particulars of each of the households will be recorded on a different line by writing "Do" in this column.
- Column (3) :** Enter the number of one of the eight types of material used in walls and in case where more than one material has been used in different portions of the house, enter the number of the principal material used in outer walls of the Major portion of the house.
- Column (4) :** Enter the relevant number as in column 3.
- Column (5) :** If a household is living in a boat or in tent, etc., then put the relevant No. (1, 2 or 3) in this column. Columns (3) & (4) will then be blank.
- Column (6) :** Give serial number to the households residing in the same house whose particulars are to be recorded on different lines.
- Column (7) :** If the household is living in "owned", "rented" or "free" house enter the relevant No. (1, 2 or 3) in this Column. In the case of servant quarters, etc., allowed free of rent, write the No. of Free (*i.e.* 3).
- Column (8) :** Name of the head of the household has to be entered for all occupied houses. For institution, hotel, etc., enter its name. For any unoccupied dwelling write "Vacant Residential" or "Under Construction residential" etc. For non-residential buildings write Mosque, Primary School, Office, Warehouse, Shop, "Vacant Shop" etc., "Under Construction Shop" etc., as the case may be.
- Column (9) to (16) :** Write the number in the appropriate column.
- Column (17) to (18) :** For making entries in columns 17 and 18 the head of the household should be specifically asked to state separately the total number of males and females included in the household. This will serve as a check on any possible discrepancy due to the under-reporting of females which must be continually guarded against.
- Column (19) :** Write the number of rooms occupied by the household (See instruction 10 (c) ante for definition of "room").
- Columns (20) to (25) :** Write the number in the appropriate column.

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## Instructions to the Enumerators.

- Study again the summarized House Numbering Procedure which you received with the list of your duties for the first phase of the Census.
- Read these instructions repeatedly until you are completely familiar with them.
- Study the Dummy interview sheet carefully and see if there are any particular types of houses/households in your block which are not included therein, or if there is any aspect of it which you do not understand, so that you may get your difficulties resolved in the Training Classes.
- Always carry your letter of appointment and introduce yourself by means of it, explaining to each Householder briefly the objects of the Census and the fact that all true information gained in the Census is strictly confidential in respect of all persons and can never be used in any manner against their interests.
- Remember that the "Household" is the smallest unit in the Housing Census and enter the necessary information about each and every Household on a separate line in the Housing Census Schedule.
- Ensure that every Building in your Block has been numbered.
- Carry out completely the Housing Census and Cottage Industry Enquiry. The Housing Census Schedule to be completed in duplicate and only one copy of the Cottage Industry Enquiry Form.
- The entries are required to be made of the total number of each sex regardless of age, who are "normal residents". At this stage no effort will be made to include figures of floating population like visitors to households, homeless folks, etc., Hotels, Serais, Boarding Houses and Hostels will however, report the average number of their total occupants (staff, permanent guests and temporary visitors) as their normal inhabitants. Persons living regularly in Boats, Tents, etc. will be included where they are found.
- Be ready at all times for a visit of inspection by your Circle Supervisor.
- DEFINITIONS**—(a) Household is a collection of persons living and eating in one mess with their dependents, relations, servants and lodgers who normally reside together.  
(b) Normal Resident or Usual Inhabitant is a person to whom the house is his or her permanent home or regular lodging place. Floating Population means homeless folks or regular itinerants, visitors to households, etc.  
(c) Room is broadly a compartment of House large enough to be slept in.  
(d) Cottage Industry: For purposes of this enquiry, a "Cottage Industry" is one which is carried on wholly or mainly with the help of the members of a household working whole-time or part-time on a handicraft or in manufacturing articles of utility, decorative or artistic value for sale mainly outside the village or Mohalla where they are manufactured. This will exclude repair and maintenance services, and will normally exclude village artisans such as the Lohar, Tarkhan, Kumhar, etc., unless they do special work so as to fall within the above definition.
