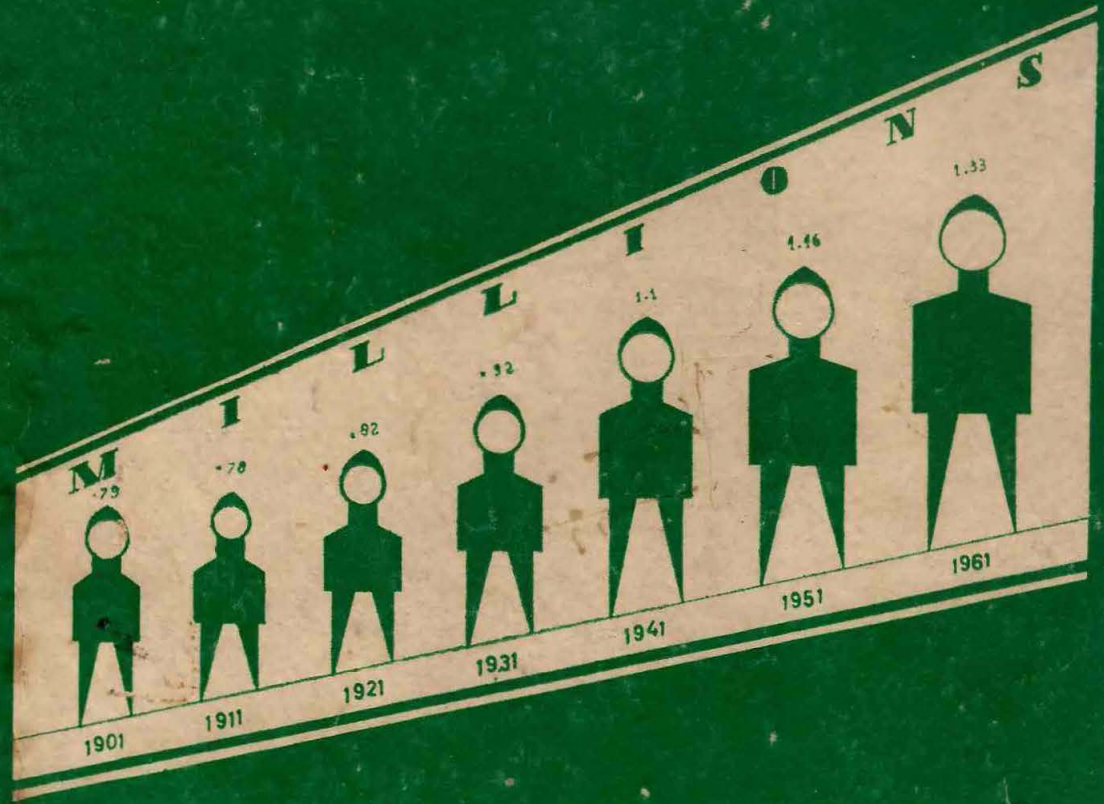

FOREWORD

The "district" in Pakistan is the basic unit of administration and the focal point of all social, cultural, economic, administrative and developmental activities. This administrative reality was made the key-note of the publication programme of the 1960 Housing Census and 1961 Population Census. Accordingly, a separate report for each of the 62 Districts and 6 Agencies was included in that programme. The idea originated in June 1960 with my predecessor in office Mr. R. D. Howe, MBE, SQA, CSP, ably supported by his Deputy Mr. N. Shamsi. As initially conceived the District Census Report was to have been in 8 parts, namely:—

- Part I .. Geography and brief history of the administrative district.
- Part II .. General Information.
- Part III .. Housing and Household Statistics.
- Part IV .. Vital Statistics.
- Part V .. Cottage Industries.
- Part VI .. Population Statistics
- Part VII .. Village Lists.
- Part VIII .. Maps.

It was intended that the Village List should also include the complete location code number of every village and a fairly complete description of each block. Part VIII—Maps—was intended to include, besides the maps of the district, all urban area maps which have been collected and made up-to-date during the census operations. Recognizing that it was a very big task, Mr. Howe, while asking for the views of the Provincial Directors of Census, frankly said: "Admittedly, it is an ambitious project, but in my opinion the

labour involved will not be out of all proportion to the tremendous value of the end product."

The first reaction of the Provincial Directors was not favourable. They thought that the Zonal Officers did not have the time and necessary background to do justice to Part I—"Geography and brief history of the administrative district". Meanwhile, Mr. S.M. Ikram, C.S.P. Member, Board of Revenue, West Pakistan, got interested in the District Census Reports and he hoped that "in spite of obvious difficulties the Distt. Census Reports should be enlarged and converted into handy and business-like District Decennial Gazetteers". Mr. Ikram's idea was pursued for some time but when it was found that the rewriting of Gazetteers involved far greater efforts outlay and much longer time than Census could afford, the Census Organisation reverted to the original plan of a brief narrative for Part I.

It was planned that the Zonal Census Officers would write short notes on the history, geography and a few administrative activities of the district after the Big Count was over in 1961. The Zonal Census Officers were actually busy in the field collecting the preliminary reports and consolidating them for inclusion in the provisional census results of Pakistan till the end of February, 1961. The work on the writing of the descriptive part was not therefore started until the middle of March 1961. I took over from Mr. Howe in the beginning of March 1961 and, although, initially, like Mr. Aslam Abdullah Khan, Provincial Director of Census, West Pakistan, I was myself hesitating from a sense of inadequacy to undertake such a big project, it did not take me long to be

convinced about the tremendous value of presenting the district in all its aspects in a handy volume for the use of planners, administrators and the general public. After much consideration and consultation the scope of the Reports (except for the Agencies) was narrowed down to the following five parts only—

- Part I .. General Description.
- Part II .. General Tables.
- Part III .. Housing Tables.
- Part IV .. Population Tables
- Part V .. Village Statistics.

For various administrative reasons the reports for Agencies will be much shorter without the Housing Tables and Village Statistics but they will contain information about different Tribes and their social and economic life.

It was actually Part I, General Description, which called for the greatest amount of labour, research and co-ordination by the Census Officers at various levels. As stated earlier, there were some views that this part should have been more or less an up-to-date version of the encyclopaedic District Gazetteer. As against it there were advocates in the Census Organization of cutting it to the bare bones and present only a short description of the geography, natural resources and the administrative system of the district. I found it necessary to strike a middle course between these two extreme views and after much consideration the "General Description" was planned to contain the following chapters—

- Chapter I .. History, Geography and Administration.
- Chapter II .. People and Their Environments.
- Chapter III .. Important Places.
- Chapter IV .. District Headquarter Town.

I must admit that the inclusion of the last three

chapters is my idea as I felt that this would constitute a special contribution of the Census Officers to the total information about the districts. Population Census is admittedly the most comprehensive national stock-taking that a country embarks upon from time to time. The main object of census is no doubt taking an accurate count of the people according to their various demographic and social characteristics. In the process of census taking, however, a mass of related and ancillary information is collected, directly or indirectly, by the census-taker. The 'Census Officer', to use the generic term, applied to all those who were appointed to take the census, travelled widely and observed closely all manner of men and lands, thereby gaining valuable knowledge of the physical features, agriculture, industry, public health, communications, housing and above all of the way of life and cultural pattern of the people. I had no doubt in my mind that these officers could pool their knowledge and write out a short account of the people and their environments, the important places they saw and the district headquarter town in which they worked with great deal of confidence and accuracy. Despite various limitations, particularly lack of reference material and shortage of time, the Zonal Census Officers wrote out the draft Reports in time.

The Part I—General Description—of these Reports is essentially a compilation rather than a fully original writing. The very nature of the assignment left hardly any choice but to make the well-documented and authoritative District Gazetteers the main source of this compilation. The sections on physical features, geography, geology, climate, river and mountain systems, flora, fauna, history are largely adaptations from the relevant District Gazetteers. These have, of course, been modified, revised and enlarged wherever necessary to make the information up-to-date and factual. The Zonal Officers also toured

the districts extensively and consulted revenue and executive officers as well as well-informed local people about facts and statistics given in every section. The sections on Agriculture, Irrigation, Communication, Industry, Administration, Medical and Health, Education and Land Reforms are mostly original writings but do not fail to include relevant information from District Gazetteers not rendered obsolete by passage of time. The section on the Basic Democracies is an entirely new feature giving a brief pen-picture of the revolutionary concept of national and local administration as working in practice. The reports drafted by the Zonal Officers were sent to the respective Deputy Commissioners for scrutiny and comments. The object of routing the reports through the Deputy Commissioners was to ensure the accuracy and completeness of the facts and figures. The Deputy Commissioners, busy as they were with their multifarious co-ordinating and developmental activities, found time not only to check the drafts but in almost all cases also to add their personal contributions in several sections, thereby making definite improvements in the text.

The chapter on "The People and their Environments" is an attempt at a sociological and demographic study of the district. This was added in September 1961 when the Zonal Officers had already left the scene. As no specific instruction was given to the Zonal Officers earlier in this regard, their treatment of the demographic features was casual and incidental. The Deputy Commissioners were, therefore, asked to rewrite the sections on races and tribes, dress, dwelling houses, food and health, betrothals and marriages, births and deaths, religion, customs and usages, main and subsidiary occupations, and cultural pattern of the people. In these sections the District Gazetteers again played an important part but from their intimate knowledge of the district the Deputy

Commissioners and their Revenue Assistants threw new and interesting light on the life and activity of its people. In several districts these sections have been entirely re-written.

The chapter on the "District Head-quarter Town" was added much later and the help of the Assistant Directors of Census in charge of and Sorting Centres was very much welcomed at that stage for writing a brief account of these towns. This chapter is, in fact, an original contribution of the Census Officers.

It was not found administratively feasible to include in these Reports all the maps that the Census Organisation had collected during the census operations. I quite realise that the inclusion of urban area maps would have enriched these volumes but due to the overriding considerations of economy and time these had to be left out. Maps are, however, an integral part of any report that claims to present a comprehensive picture of the district and keeping this point in view two maps of the district have been included in these Reports. One of the maps is in colour showing the district by sub-divisions/Tehsils and such details as railways, roads, canals, rivers, hills and mountains, district, sub-division and Thana headquarters and important places. The other map is in black and white showing the industrial establishments and agricultural products of the district in symbols and letters. There is one feature in the District Census Reports which, to our knowledge, has not been included in any previous census or gazetteer publications. I refer to the photographs of the people and the land in which they live and work. Simultaneously with my request to the Deputy Commissioners for the report on the "People and Their Environments", they were asked to take suitable photographs of the people, young and old, their activities in the field and at home, the typical landscapes and the places of historical importance and of scenic beauty

The photographs thus collected are in themselves a storehouse of information and provide ample material for a general study of demographic and economic characteristics of the country. For lack of space, we have been able to reproduce only a part of the photographs but we hope they are fairly representative of the people and their surroundings.

All the officers engaged in the original drafting of the various sections and chapters of Part I "General Description" of these reports gave commendable performance. It is no reflection on the merit of their work that despite their sincere and wholehearted work these drafts had to be thoroughly edited at the level of the Provincial Directors and Census Commissioner. The Provincial Directors have in their 'Introduction' related their experience in revising, enlarging or condensing, adjusting and checking the wealth of information already supplied in these draft reports. While doing so, they undertook extensive tours of the districts and brought their knowledge and experience to bear upon the final shape of the information given. I also felt it necessary to take extensive tours in the different sectors of our big and widely separated country and made demographic and economic investigation into representative facts. The District Census Reports of West Pakistan came under the thorough scrutiny of Mr. Aslam Abdullah Khan, Provincial Director of Census, while I gave only general editorial guidance. So far as East Pakistan Reports are concerned, I am glad to take the responsibility of large scale editing of the various chapters and sections. I was emboldened to do so by the fact of my association with the district, and sub-divisional administration of that Province for nearly a quarter of a century and also by the knowledge I had acquired during my extensive tours of every single Census District of the Province in the year 1960 in connection with the organiza-

tion of the census.

For a small census organisation consisting of barely half a dozen officers at the top, publication of a District Census Report for each of the sixty-two districts and six agencies is undoubtedly a huge undertaking. We are painfully conscious of our shortcomings and limitations. None of my colleagues who produced the General Description of the Report claim to be a scholar "with a flair for penmanship"—a quality which Mr. Ikram desired in a writer of gazetteers—yet all of them took up the challenge cheerfully and did their very best to complete the job once undertaken. Ours is a modest effort which by no stretch of imagination can replace the excellent gazetteers. We were at one stage tempted to call Part I of the Report—a Brief Gazetteer—but we saw the peril in time and named it—General Description—which it really is. I would request the readers not to look for the details or merits of a gazetteer in these volumes but I do hope that until gazetteers are extensively rewritten, these will be found useful as up-to-date reference materials.

Mr. Aslam Abdullah Khan shook off his initial hesitation and in spite of his full-time occupation as Secretary, Basic Democracies, West Pakistan, thoroughly revised the descriptive portions of the Reports. In particular, his intimate knowledge of the Frontier areas and the districts of Quetta and Peshawar Divisions has enriched the reports of these districts. Mr. H. H. Nomani, M.A., S.K., who has varied experience of the district administration of East Pakistan as District Magistrate and Deputy Commissioner has also taken pains to go through the reports closely and given his valuable suggestions for their improvement. Mr. Aslam Abdullah Khan and Mr. H. H. Nomani stood solidly by me at all times of stress and strain and I am deeply grateful to them for their valuable help.

counsel and help. I am also thankful to his successor, Mr. Lowell T. Galt, head of the United States Statistical Advisory Service to Pakistan, for his keen personal interests in these reports and his encouraging comments and suggestions.

I have no words to adequately thank the officers and staff of the Central and Provincial Governments, various Ministries and Departments, the districts and sub-divisional officers and a host of other public-spirited men and women of our country who gave unstinted support, help and encouragement in the planning, preparation and publication of these Reports. In particular, I gratefully acknowledge the substantial help that the Chief Secretaries of the two Provincial Governments gave us by agreeing to let us have the photographs of the districts through their official photographers free of cost and by letting the District Officers write out the chapter on the "People and Their Environments." I am particularly happy to record that all the District Officers, in many cases assisted by their Revenue Assistants and Additional District Magistrates, enthusiastically took up this additional and unscheduled responsibility. The Secretaries, Information Departments and the Directors of Information of both the Provincial Governments rendered invaluable service in the matter of obtaining suitable photographs from far-flung corners of the districts. The Directors of Land Records

and Surveys made our task easier by supplying up-to-date roads and places maps of the districts as well as area figures. The Surveyor-General of Pakistan has been equally generous with the supply of topographical and administrative maps. I also acknowledge with great pleasure our indebtedness to various newspaper articles, learned societies, journals, periodicals, university professors, social scientists, geographers and historians for the valuable information we collected from them for inclusion in the reports. I would also like to thank Mr. N. H. Khandker, Controller of Printing and Stationery, and Mr. Qasim Ali, Deputy Controller of Printing and Stationery, and the various printing presses, particularly the Ilmi Press, Lahore, for their technical know-how, unhesitating advice and prompt service at all stages of the printing of these Reports. Lastly, I must thank the staff of the Census Organisations in the Centre and the Provinces who worked untiringly to edit, check and verify these Reports statistically and aesthetically. The Statistical Section of my Office did a fine job in this regard and were ably assisted by a very good team of Draftsmen who produced the cover plates and the maps inside. In particular, I am grateful to Messrs Safdar Husain and A. Sattar, Statistical Officers and Messrs Hasan Akhtar and Din Mohammed, Investigators, for careful and painstaking checking of the narrative portions of all the districts.

INTRODUCTION

The District Census Report of Gujrat District is one of the 51 similar reports being published separately for each District and Agency of West Pakistan.

In the last Census, the statistical results of the Census were published in various Provincial and Central Reports. Thus there were separate reports for the North-West Frontier Province, the Punjab and Bahawalpur, Sind & Khairpur and Baluchistan Provinces. These reports did not provide data in a handy volume separately for smaller geographical and administrative units namely; the districts with the result that the district statistics which were collected at much labour and expense were lost in the statistical totals for larger areas for the Province as a whole.

The integration of the former Provinces and States into the unified Province of West Pakistan has further underlined the need for statistics on district basis, as the individual identity of districts tends to get lost in the statistical totals contained in the Provincial Statistical Report. Further, the growing importance of developmental activities undertaken by Government for smaller administrative and geographical areas has made it imperative that data in much greater detail for districts should be made available to the administrators, planners and experts for the purpose of planning and development. The Provincial and All-Pakistan Reports do not meet this requirement to the desired extent.

The "Village Lists" published for the first time in 1951 provided limited information for all villages in each district giving the total population, the number of houses and other local details. These volumes proved

very useful for the Government Departments and other non-official bodies and individual users.

The District Census Report now being brought out is a more ambitious project and attempts to present the statistical data for the district which is often dull and lifeless against the living background of its geography, history and its people. It is hoped that this volume will acquaint the reader with the district as a geographic, administrative and human entity, against which its statistics will acquire a new meaning and help present the district in all its aspects.

This report is in five parts, namely—Part I—General Description, Part II—General Tables, Part III—Housing Tables, Part IV—Population Tables compiled from the Population Census, 1961, and Part V—Village Statistics.

In Part I, an attempt has been made to give a general picture of the district on the lines of the old District Gazetteers, though within a much shorter compass incorporating the changes which have taken place since the time the Gazetteers were last published. The General Description includes brief paragraph on geography and geology, flora and fauna, climate, brief history, administrative set-up, Health, Education, Communications, Basic Democracies, Agriculture and Industries, Land Reforms, the population and its composition, ethnological and demographical features, cultural pattern of the people, important places of interest, etc. It also contains a brief description of the district headquarters town. Besides, this Part also contains maps and pictures which have been provided to enable the reader to have a clearer perspective of the district and its people.

Part II includes tables giving general information provided by sources other than Census. Inclusion of this Part was considered necessary in order to bring within one volume some general statistical information which like the Census data, is commonly required by planners and administrators. The general information tables include data on rainfall, temperature, Irrigation, Industries, Dak Bungalows, Educational Institutions, Hospitals, Roads, Basic Democracies, etc. These tables were collected from the Government Departments at the Provincial Headquarters and other Divisional and District Offices of some Departments. The data supplied by the Departments has been checked only for purposes of editing. While efforts have been made to eliminate all errors the Census Organization is not responsible for the accuracy of the data presented in these Tables. In some cases data in respect of particular Tables was either not supplied in time or not in the required form. Such tables perforce have had to be omitted from this volume. My thanks are due to the Heads of various Departments and Offices for their ungrudging and prompt response. All these tables were carefully scrutinized by Mr. Haq Nawaz, Statistical Officer of my office and gone over by Mr. S. M. Sharif, Deputy Director, before they were incorporated in this Report.

The Housing Tables which form Part III of this Report were entirely processed in the Machine Sorting Centre, Karachi. They were compiled and tabulated by mechanical operation on cent per cent basis for all urban areas, and on a 10% sample basis in the case of rural areas. The Housing Tables provide invaluable information about the housing conditions in both urban and rural areas, the number of occupied and unoccupied houses, congested houses, size and structural characteristics of

the housing units, size of family and the size of households, etc. All this work was done in the Machine Sorting Centre at Karachi under the able direction of Mr. W.A. Abbasi, Assistant Director, Machine Sorting Centre, to whom my thanks are due for furnishing this part of the Report.

Part IV contains the Population Tables which are based on data collected during the "Big Count" in January, 1961. These Tables provide data about population for smaller administrative areas down to Tehsils by sex and religion, urban and rural population, the composition of the population by age, sex and marital status, literacy and by mother-tongue, birthplace and main economic activities. It may be noted that detailed cross-classification of the Non-Agricultural Labour Force by occupations and industry has been left to be done by machine-sorting and the results will be published separately in a set of tables especially designed for the purpose. The Population Tables have been extracted from the Provincial Tables pertaining to this District. They are based on the data collected on the Individual Census Schedules by a large army of Census field workers, viz., the Enumerators, Supervisors, Charge Superintendents, District Census Officers and Zonal, Deputy/Assistant Directors. The names of some officers of each category are given elsewhere in this Report. In the District of Gujrat the Census was taken by 2,241 Enumerators, 316 Supervisors, 31 Charge Superintendents and 1 District Census Officer. After the field work was over records were sent by the District Census Officer to the Hand Sorting Centre, Rawalpindi, which worked under the able guidance and control of Khan Bashir Ahmad Khan. Here the schedules were unstapled and sorted and re-sorted according to different characteristics, in accordance with Sorting and Compilation instructions, issued from the office of the

Census Commissioner, Pakistan. A large number of Sorters, Supervisors, Inspectors and Compilers worked on this tedious and difficult job under the inspiring leadership of Khan Bashir Ahmad Khan. After the sorting operations were over the Record Sheets which were prepared for each tabulating region separately, were transferred to the Central Compilation Office at Lahore, where the data was compiled by Mr. Akhlaque Hosain Kazi, Assistant Director of Census (Compilation), West Pakistan. Thus the data contained in Part IV represents the cumulative efforts of a large army of workers, both paid and unpaid, to whom the Census Organization acknowledges a debt of deep gratitude, for without their efforts, there would have been no Census. I wish I could name all of them individually but that would require a volume in itself.

In Part V, a complete list of the villages of the district has been arranged by Tehsils, Qanungo Halqas and Patwar Circles. The Village Statistics give for each village, the "Hadbast" Number, area, total population by sex, total literates, total number of houses and households. Besides the above, local details showing the location, Schools, Post and Telegraph Offices, Railway Stations, Police Stations, Union Council Offices, Dak Bungalows, Dispensaries and Hospitals, etc. have been shown by appropriate symbols. The Village Statistics were originally compiled, in the Hand Sorting Centre, Rawalpindi, from the summaries prepared by the Census Supervisors and Charge Superintendents. The figures of population were thoroughly checked after physical counting of the individual enumeration schedules at the Circle Sort. The data about houses and households are based on the summaries prepared by the Charge Superintendents on the results of Housing Census conducted in September, 1960. These figures were checked and adjusted, where necessary, with reference to the

results of the Machine tabulation done in Census Commissioner's Office, Karachi. The literacy figures have been taken from the summaries prepared by the Census Supervisors and Charge Superintendents after the "Big Count". The particulars of "Hadbast" numbers, and local details were obtained from the Deputy Commissioner. The area figures have been supplied by the Deputy Commissioner, Gujrat and are based on revenue records. The Village Statistics were thoroughly scrutinised by the Statistical Officer in my office before incorporation in this Report.

The data presented have been arranged by Tehsils and in each Tehsil the Villages have been grouped by Field Qanungo Circles and within each Field Qanungo Circle by Patwari Circles. A summary giving the total population of the district with its distribution by sexes to the nearest thousand by Tehsils and number of Qanungo Halqas, Patwari Circles and Villages has been given at the beginning. Similar summaries by Field Qanungo Circle within each Tehsil indicating separately figures of urban localities have also been added.

Part I—General Description was compiled by Sh. Muhammad Sharif, Deputy Director of Census, West Pakistan. In preparing this Part he made extensive use of the District Gazetteer of Gujrat and various other published materials. The Census Commissioner was kind enough to spare enough time to edit this part of the Report and I am grateful to him for his guidance, inspiration and help in giving a final shape to it. In its present form and content this part is the result of the cumulative efforts of Sh. Muhammad Sharif and myself, besides S. Sajjad Hussain Shah, my Stenographer, who typed several drafts of it. I am therefore, grateful to them all for their efforts.

The maps appearing in this volume were drawn in the Statistical Section of my office by Mr. Muhammad Saleem, Draftsman, under the close supervision and guidance of Mr. Haq Nawaz, Statistical Officer and of Sh. My thanks are also due to Sh. Niaz Ahmad of the Ilmi Press, Lahore, where these reports have been printed from the "master copies" prepared in my office, through the photo-offset process.

The photographs which appear in this volume have been obtained by the courtesy of the Director of Public Relations, West Pakistan and his staff and the Deputy Commissioner, Gujrat, to whom we are highly indebted.

I must express my gratitude to Nawabzada Muhammad Yaqub Khan, then Deputy Commissioner, Gujrat, all Heads of Departments of the Government of West Pakistan, Rai Ghulam Mehdi, Revenue Assistant and all subordinate revenue staff, who have rendered invaluable services in the collection and compilation of the Village Statistics and other data presented in this volume. I must also record my appreciation for the hard work put in by Sh. Muhammad Sharif, Deputy Director of Census, West Pakistan, Khan Bashir Ahmad Khan, Assistant Director of Census, Hand

Sorting Centre, Rawalpindi, and Mr. Haq Nawaz, Statistical Officer and the staff in my own office who have given unremitting pains in completing this volume for publication. It is hoped that this volume will be of benefit to the various Departments of Government and will also be useful as a reference material.

My thanks are also due to Mr. Lowell T. Galt, Statistical Adviser to the Government of Pakistan and Dr. James Maslowski, Adviser, Planning and Development Department, Government of West Pakistan, who were kind enough to visit the Compilation Centre and offer valuable advice and guidance at the crucial stages in which the data took the shape of comprehensible tables.

The idea of publishing comprehensive statistics for districts collected in the 1961 Census had its beginnings in the Village List of 1951. The proposal was first made by Mr. R. D. Howe, in February, 1961. The idea was doggedly pursued and developed by Mr. A. Rashid, his successor, and the format, layout and plan of the present volume is due entirely to his vision, planning and perseverance in getting this project translated from a mere idea into reality. I must confess that I faltered and hesitated at many stages in completing this assignment as being too ambitious for Census, but his unflagging interest and inspiration made the publication of this volume in its present shape possible.

CHAPTER 1

GEOGRAPHY, HISTORY AND ADMINISTRATION

1.1 NAME.

The District takes its name from the headquarter town of Gujrat. This town grew up round a fort established by the Emperor Akbar in A. D. 1580 with the help of the Gujjar inhabitants of the neighbouring areas. Its shape is roughly that of a parallelogram, and it forms the northern most portion of the Chaj Doab lying between the Jhelum and Chenab rivers.

1.2 LOCATION.

The district lies between north latitudes $32^{\circ}10'$ and 33° and east longitudes $73^{\circ}18'$ and $74^{\circ}31'$.

1.3 BOUNDARIES.

It is bounded on the north-east by Jammu; on the north-west by the River Jhelum, which separates it from Jhelum district; on the south by the river Chenab, separating it from the districts of Gujranwala and Sialkot; on the east by the river Tawi, which divides it from the Sialkot district; and on the west by Sargodha district.

1.4 AREA.

According to Survey of Pakistan records its area is 2264.42 square miles. Its position in respect of area in Pakistan is 51st and in West Pakistan is 38th.

1.5 PHYSICAL FEATURES AND TOPOGRAPHY.

The northern corner of the district is the plain country, cut off from the Jhelum by a range of hills. The district is divided into four parts as follows:—

(1) *The Submontane Zone.*—It is the lowest slope of the foothills of the Himalayas. The main feature of this part of the district is the drainage. There are numerous streams which bring down the water from the low hills of Pabbi. In the rains all these are filled with torrents which deposit the heavier sand first, and carry the lighter silt to a greater distance. The low-lying ground often gets the benefit of silt.

(2) *The Central Plateau of Bar.*—It is of a good firm soil of a reddish colour and is mostly flat and extends from Dinga to the western border of the district. The whole of this tract is irrigated by the Upper Jhelum Canal, and produces splendid crops.

(3) *Old River Beds.*—The old river bed of the Chenab in the Gujrat Tehsil is very high, and the low-lying land has received so much silt that it is not inferior in quality to the land above the original bank, but rather superior. On the border of the Gujrat and Phalia Tehsils, the original high bank can be seen plainly. The old river bed of the Jhelum is much better, because the Jhelum carries more silt, while the Chenab carries more sand. The amount of good soil washed down from the Bar into the Jhelum riverain is larger than in the Chenab riverain.

(4) *The Fringes of the District.*—These are liable to river action and form considerable area. The Chenab Valley is inferior while the Jhelum valley is superior in soil and productivity.

1.6 GEOLOGY.

The geology of the greater part of the district is simple. From Dinga westwards the alluvion of the Doab results in an alternation of clay and sand. From Dinga eastwards it has been described as the lower slope of the Himalayan foothills, consisting of a mixture of sand, clay and conglomerates. The main feature of interest is the Pabbi hills.

The submontane tract may be considered in two parts—first where the drainages are on an appreciable slope, and the streams have a defined bed, though constantly varying; the other west of the Grand Trunk Road where the water spreads out and by its deposit of silt has made the land into hard clay. In this part of the district wells cannot be sunk except in the depressions or near the banks of the streams.

1-7 SOILS.

The soils of the district are:—

- (a) *Maira*—which is a sandy loam;
- (b) *Walchi*—more sandy than *Maira*;
- (c) *Retli*—sandy;
- (d) *Missi*—good soil constituting the greater part of the Phalia Bar;
- (e) *Rohi*—stiff clay usually found in depressions;
- (f) *Kallarathi*—affected by salt petre.

The eastern half of the district is mainly *Maira* with *Retli* on the banks of the numerous hill streams and *Rohi* in depressions. The Bar is mostly of *Missi* soil, but there is *Rohi* in depressions.

1-8 MINERALS.

There are no mines and no mineral resources in the district. The manufacture of salt petre was once a flourishing occupation in few villages, but it has now ceased. Stone Metal from the Pabbi hills is used for construction of roads.

1.9 FLORA.

A considerable area of State land is in the form of *Rakhs* which had originally been demarcated as Government property because it was considered to be more than was needed for the use of villages. Most of the *Rakhs* are in Phalia tehsil, but there are several in Gujrat tehsil also the chief being the Dhul and Mari and in the Kharian tehsil the extensive area of the Pabbi which is Government property. The *Belas* or alluvial land on the banks of Chenab and Jhelum which was taken up by Government in the same way as the *Rakhs*, have been sown chiefly with *Shisham*, but due to erosion from rivers the *Shisham* plantations have been abandoned and the *Bela* lands are leased out for cultivation. The *Rakhs* are much valued by the people as pasturage in spite of the fact that in the Phalia tehsil there were large areas of proprietary land used only for grazing. When grass is scarce in the riverain areas, cattle are sent to the Bar for grazing. When it is scarce in the Bar they are sent to the *Belas*.

The principal tree species found in the Phalia Bar forests are *Van* (*Salvadora oleoides*), *Jand* (*Prosopis specigera*), *Karil* (*Capparis aphylla*), *Mala* (*Zizyphus nummularia*), *Chhichhra* (*Butea frondosa*), *Sakar* (*Feronia elephantum*), *Lasura* (*Tecoma undulata*), *Phulahi* (*Acacia modesta*), *Ber* (*Zizyphus jujuba*), *Kikar* (*Acacia Arabica*), *Tut* (*Moras alba*), *Drek* (*Melia azedarach*), *Shisham* (*Dalbergia sissoo*), *Ganger* (*Lycium europaeum*) and *Frash* (*Tamarix articulata*).

The grass found in the district are *Palwan*, *Dhaman*, *Chhimar*, *Khabal* and *Madhana*.

The construction of the Upper Jhelum and Upper Chenab Canals have brought about a great change. All the *Rakhs* in the Phalia Tehsil which are capable of irrigation are now being cultivated though a large area in two

of them is being retained by the Forest Department as irrigated plantation. *Rakhs* Dhul and Mari were given up in compensation for land acquired from neighbouring villages for the construction of the Headworks of the Upper Chenab Canal at Marala. The Pabbi hills are under the control of Government. The main plantation is that of *Phulahi* which suits the local conditions. The hills are closed to grazing.

1.10 RIVERS.

The Jhelum river enters the district from Kashmir hills towards the north-east corner of the district and flows in a south-westerly direction forming its north-western boundary with the Jhelum district. The river bed of the Jhelum is always better because the Jhelum carries more silt than the Chenab. The amount of good soil washed down from the Bar into the Jhelum riverain is larger than in the Chenab riverain. The depth to water is small and wells can easily be sunk. The sub-soil is sandy and gets benefit from percolation at a considerable distance from the present river.

The old river bed of the Chenab can be seen in a well-marked high bank. In Dhul in the Gujrat tehsil it is very high, but from that point to one west of Gujrat town the old bank has been obliterated by the action of various streams so that it is scarcely perceptible and the low-lying land below it has received so much silt that it is not inferior in quality to the land above the original bank but rather superior. At the border of the Gujrat and Phalia tehsils, the original high bank begins to be seen plainly, and as the drainages have ceased to deposit silt the true character of the country can be seen. The rest of the district is the old river bed with a sub-soil of sand and a thin top layer of silt. There are still to be seen the old creeks. Water is quite near the surface varying from 20' to 10', but the soil is nowhere good.

The other rivers are smaller. The Tawi is a stream which flows from Kashmir into the Chenab and forms the eastern border of the district, though some of the Gujrat villages extend slightly across the stream. Like the Chenab it carries much sand. The Bhimbar is a larger hill torrent. The Jaba is a smaller stream which flows from the north slope of the Pabbi into the Jhelum and is crossed by the Upper Jhelum Canal in a level crossing.

1.11 NALLAS.

The two main *Nallas* are the Bhimbar and the Bhandar. There are numerous smaller streams many of which are called *Dalli* or *Doara*. In the rains all are filled with torrents which deposit the heavier sand first and carry the lighter silt to a greater distance and as sand banks are formed the current is diverted on to fresh ground. So in their courses their sandy beds spread and encroach on cultivated ground, though often the low-lying ground gets benefit of silt. They do not all reach the river but many of them are used up in spreading out over the low-lying land. The Bhimbar which is the largest of all used to reach the Chenab in several channels after crossing the Grand Trunk Road, but as its course was crossed by the Upper Jhelum Canal, the stream has now been turned into a bed of a canal. Other drainages to the west of Bhimbar used to find their way into a single channel after passing Dinga and when this channel reached the softer soil of the old river bed, a fairly deep channel was scoured out which after many windings joined the Chenab at Kadirabad. This channel is the Budhi or old *Nalla*.

1.12 CLIMATE. ✓

The climate in the eastern part is bearable, and even in the hot weather never oppressive but in the hot weather the western part is as hot as the adjoining Bar tracts of Sargodha. However, the climate is healthy. By October the hot weather may be said to have ended. The cold weather is dry and clear, with

splendid views of the distant snow-clad hills of Kashmir. In January and February frost is common, and on a few nights the temperature falls below the freezing point. The weather gets warmer after the end of March. The hottest months are May, June, July and August.

1.13 TEMPERATURE. ★

During May and June the day temperature averages 110°, while the minimum is as high as 85°. Frequently the mercury touches 112°, but hot spells are comparatively short due to proximity of Azad Kashmir mountains. The winter months are very pleasant and the temperature during the dry months averages about 80° while the night temperature is in the neighbourhood of 65°. Frequently the mercury dips to freezing point and frost is common.

1.14 RAINFALL.

The average rainfall varies considerably for different parts of the district, and decreases rapidly as one goes south-west away from the Himalayas. It is somewhat heavier near the rivers than in the dry uplands. The annual average on the Kashmir border is over 40 inches, at Kharian it is 29.75, at Gujrat 26.38, at Dinga 19.74, at Phalia 20.94 and at Head Fakirian on the extreme western border of the district 18.16 inches.

1.15 FLOODS.

The district is subject to floods from the rivers Jhelum and Chenab, but the flash floods in Bhimbar and other *Nallas* cause greater damage than the river floods.

1.16 HISTORY.

Little is known concerning the early history of this district. The town of Gujrat itself is of modern origin, but occupies the site of an ancient city; the foundation of which is traditionally assigned to one Raja Bachan Pal, a Surajbansi Rajput, who emigrated from the Lower Gangetic Doab, but of whom nothing more is known. The

original name of the city is said to have been Udanagri, the ever lasting or sweet-smelling city.

The other ancient sites are those of Helan, 25 miles to the west of Gujrat; Paki Kothi, at the foot of Pabbi Hills; Islam Garh near Jalalpur, 10 miles north-west from Gujrat; Rasul, at the western extremity of the Pabbi Hills and the bank of Jhelum, and Mong, 6 miles to the north-west of Rasul.

The period of the colonization of the district by Jat and Gujar tribes, cannot be determined with certainty.

In the reign of Bahlol Lodhi (A.D.1450-88) it appears that the tract of country on the right bank of the Chenab and including part of this district was separated from the Province of Sialkot, and formed into an independent charge under the name of *Zila* Bahlolpur. The ensuing century was an era of great confusion preventing the consolidation of the Delhi Empire under Akbar. Akbar is said to have visited this part of the country to assert his authority and, having induced the Gujjars of the neighbourhood to restore Gujrat, made it the headquarters of a considerable district, half of which was occupied by Gujjar clans and the other half by Jats. This new district was known as Chala Gujrat. It was divided into two primary sub-divisions—the Parganas of Gujrat and Herat, the latter being the Jat and the former the Gujjar country. There was subsequently a third Pargana formed that of Shahjahanpur (subsequently called Dinga). The Parganas were sub-divided into *Tappas*, and the *Tappas* again into *Tops*. The records of this period are still extant. This system continued until the death of Aurangzeb in A. D. 1707 plunged the Empire into disorder. The details of internal administration appear to have been mainly left to local notables appointed under the name of *Chaudhri* for every *Top* or group of villages who were responsible for collection of revenue.

 During the decay of the Empire the district suffered much. In 1738 it was ravaged by Nadir Shah and was soon afterwards overrun by the Ghakkars of Rawalpindi under Sultan Mukarrab Khan who succeeded in establishing himself at Gujrat about the year 1741. From 1748 to 1761 the district was a prey, with little or no respite, to the advancing and retiring armies of Ahmed Shah Durrani whose route to and from the Punjab lay across it; the Government meanwhile being nominally administered by Mukarrab Khan, who had been confirmed in his possession by the Durrani monarch.

Mukarrab Khan thus ruled Gujrat until 1765, when Sardar Gujjar Singh Bhangi, crossed the Chenab advancing at the head of a large force from his possessions in Lahore and Amritsar. Mukarrab Khan gave him battle outside the walls of Gujrat, but was defeated and compelled to retire beyond the Jhelum, and the district fell without further struggle into the hands of the conquerer. In 1767 when Ahmed Shah made his last descent upon the Punjab, Gujjar Singh retired bending before the storm; but in the following year again marched northwards, and having recovered his former conquests with but little trouble, laid siege to the famous fort of Rohtas in Jhelum. On this occasion he was allied with Sardar Charat Singh Sukarchakia, grandfather of Ranjit Singh, with whom he now divided the Upper Punjab. The greater part of this district, together with the town and fort of Gujrat, fell to the share of Gujjar Singh. As soon his affairs in the north were definitely arranged Gujjar Singh, who was mixed up in the intrigues for power which centred at this period upon Amritsar and Lahore, divided the territories between his two eldest sons, Sukha Singh and Sahib Singh, the latter being installed at Gujrat. The brothers, however, soon quarrelled, and in an action which took place between them, Sukha Singh was killed. Thereupon Gujjar Singh marched northwards to punish Sahib

Singh. The latter, at first, made preparations for resistance, but a reconciliation being effected he was permitted to retain Gujrat. Gujjar Singh died in 1788, leaving his estate to his youngest son Fateh Singh.

Sahib Singh, however, obtained possession of the whole territory which had belonged to him. Fateh Singh took refuge with Mahan Singh, who espoused his cause, and hostilities ensued, in the course of which Sahib Singh was at one time closely shut up in the fortress of Sodra. With the help of Karam Singh Dulu, he succeeded at length in beating off the attacks of Mahan Singh, who shortly afterwards died, leaving the quarrel as a legacy to his son, the famous Ranjit Singh (A.D. 1791). Sahib Singh did not rest in peace at Gujrat, which remained his headquarters until 1797 when he retired to the hills before the advancing army of Shah Zaman, but shortly afterwards with the help of the Chiefs of Attari and Wazirabad defeated the representative of Shah Zaman and reoccupied Gujrat.

Ranjit Singh, whose power was on the ascendant during this period, finding an excuse in the conduct of Fateh Singh, marched against Gujrat. After a brief period of warfare, a reconciliation was effected between the brothers, after which Sahib Singh again enjoyed a period of peace and quiet. In 1806, Ranjit Singh tried to dispossess Sahib Singh of his possessions. But in 1810, at the intercession of his mother, Mai Lachhmi, Ranjit Singh conferred upon him in Jagir the Bajwat territory, now belonging to Sialkot, where he resided till his death in 1814.

Under Sikh Rule, the district was formed into Talukas, of which the largest was that which had its headquarters at Gujrat. The remaining Talukas were those of Kadirabad, Phalia, Dinga, Kunjah, Wazirabad, Kathala, and Khari Kariali. The Gujrat, Khari Kariali and Kadirabad Talukas were retained under direct management (Khalsa) while the

remainder of the district was, with few exceptions, either farmed out to contractors or granted in Jagir on condition of military services. The Talukas were further subdivided into *Zails*.

The first governors of Gujrat under Ranjit Singh were Khalifa Nur-ud-Din and Faqir Aziz-ud-Din, whose system is thus described by Captain Mackenzie:—

“Wherever they found powerful or influential heads of clans, they propitiated them by the bestowal of *Inams* and by maintaining their influence. These men soon assumed the position of half Government officials, half clan representatives. They attended Darbar (the court of the royal agent); they were consulted in all points affecting the administration of the revenue in their respective tracts. These tracts soon became exactly defined and denominated *Zails*, and within their limits the *Chaudhris*, now termed *Zaildars*, were employed as fiscal agents or assistants, go-between to the Government and the agricultural community. Sometimes, they would even be given a contract for the revenue of their respective *Zails*.”

The only notable agent of the Sikh administration was Raja Gulab Singh, afterwards ruler of Kashmir, who was contractor for the revenue of the whole upper portion of the Chaj Doab from 1834 to 1846, whose administration appears to have been popular with the public.

The district first came under the supervision of British Officers in 1846, when Lieutenant Lake effected a settlement of the land revenue under the orders of the Provincial Government established at Lahore. On the outbreak of the second Sikh War, Gujrat was

for some time in the hands of the insurgent Sikhs; and it was within the borders of this district that the final struggles, the battles of Chillianwala and Gujrat, took place. The district then, with the remainder of the Punjab, passed under British rule. Chillianwala is to this day called by the people of neighbourhood as *Katalgarh* or the “house of slaughter”.

The whole country of the Chaj Doab, from the Jammu border to the junction of the Chenab and Jhelum, formed in the first instance a single district. In June of the year of annexation, however, this huge charge was broken up, and the southern portion of the Doab (the *Kardaris of Miani*, Sahiwal and half Kadirabad) were formed into a separate district with its headquarters at Shahpur. Some exchange of villages took place between Gujrat and Shahpur Districts between 1851 and 1857. Finally, in 1857, the Bajwat country, lying between the Tawi and the Chenab, was transferred to the district of Sialkot. The present tehsil boundaries were fixed in 1856. At first, the headquarters of the tehsils were at Gujrat, Kunjah and Kadirabad; but in June 1849, the two latter stations were abandoned in favour of Kharian and Phalia.

The next change in the boundaries of the district was made in 1911 and 1914, when 81 estates, including Government *rakhs*, were transferred from Shahpur to Gujrat including most of the 28 transferred to Shahpur in 1855. The reason for the change was to keep irrigation from the Upper Jhelum Canal in the Gujrat District.

No change in the boundaries of the Gujrat District has taken place after Independence. Gujrat District forms one of the four Districts of Rawalpindi Division. Its history since 1947 is one of rapid economic expansion rather than of administrative or political change.

1.17 ADMINISTRATION.

Under the supervision of Commissioner Rawalpindi Division the District is under the executive charge of a Deputy Commissioner, who combines the functions of a District Magistrate as well as Collector. He is also responsible for the co-ordination of the functions of all nation-building Departments in the district. On the judicial side, he is assisted by an Additional District Magistrate and five magistrates; while on the Revenue side he is assisted by a Revenue Assistant with a Tehsildar and two Naib Tehsildars in Gujrat and Phalia tahsils and a Tehsildar and one Naib Tehsildar in Kharian Tehsil. For revenue administration, the district is divided in three Tehsils namely Gujrat, Phalia and Kharian who have their Tehsil headquarters at their respective places.

The Police administration is vested in the District Superintendent of Police, who is assisted by two Deputy Superintendents of Police on the executive side. For Police administration the district is divided into 17 Police Stations.

The Judicial administration of the district is under the charge of a District and Sessions Judge, who is assisted by 3 Civil Judges.

1.18 BASIC DEMOCRACIES.

One of the most far-reaching and momentous reforms of the Revolutionary Regime was the introduction of Basic Democracies. The elections to the Basic Democracies were held early in 1960. These institutions have created unprecedented social and political awakening among the masses, who are now eager to come to grips with the problems of

poverty, illiteracy and disease in the rural areas. One of the principal aims of the Basic Democracies is the association of the people with the administration at each level and making the functionaries of Government

accountable to the elected representatives of the people. The tiers of the Basic Democracies with their structure and composition is indicated in the table below:—

1.19 IRRIGATION.

The western half of the district is irrigated by the Upper Jhelum Canal. This is one of the canals of the triple project which provides water for three canals. The Upper Jhelum Canal which irrigates part of the Gujrat district and flows into the river Chenab to provide irrigation water for the Upper Chenab Canal which irrigates parts of Sialkot and Gujranwala and then goes on to cross the Ravi and with the aid of water from the Ravi irrigates part of Montgomery and Multan districts in the Lower Bari Doab Canal. Irrigation in the Bar is perennial but below the old high banks towards the Chenab and Jhelum river is only for Kharif.

Where the level of water is near enough to the surface, well irrigation is resorted to. Before the advent of the canals, well-irrigation was the only source in Phalia tehsil. Irrigation from *Bunds* or embankments in the beds of hill streams is not done on a very extensive scale. The district is one of the small peasant proprietors and very few zamindars have more than one or two acres of land though in Phalia tehsil there are larger holdings. The average cultivated area for each shareholder is not more than 5 or 6 acres.

1.20 AGRICULTURE.

The district is almost entirely agricultural and cultivation depends on facilities for irrigation. The eastern half of the district

depends more on rainfall and all culturable land is under the plough. It is split up into small holdings. In the west the cultivation combines a little plough land with a proportion of grazing. Cultivation in Phalia tehsil before the construction of the Upper Jhelum Canal was precarious, but the Upper Jhelum Canal has completely changed the aspect of the tehsil and it is now one of the most fertile and productive tehsil in the former Punjab. The land is classified with regard to irrigation as *Chahi*, *Sailabi* and *Barani*. *Chahi* and is irrigated from wells. In the eastern part of the district all fields can be irrigated during the year, but in the west especially in the Hithar Circle of the Phalia tehsil, the area is large and the fields are watered by turn. The *Sailab* land is irrigated by river floods. In the Bar of Phalia tehsil *Sailab* is used in the same sense as *Barani* elsewhere and in the eastern part of the district *Barani* land in a depression is often called *Sailab* by the villagers.

Rabi crops are sown following the heavy rains in July, August and September. The winter rains are important for maturing of Rabi crops. Cultivation in the district is not of a high order and people are not as good cultivators as elsewhere. The method of cultivation depends largely on the pressure on the soil. In the eastern part of the district holdings are small. It is common for fields, especially those dependent on rains to be cultivated for two harvests in succession and then left fallow for two harvests. A field which has grown wheat or cotton must be left fallow for at least six months. But sowing of Kharif crop is generally done after the first monsoon rain although cotton is sown in April. The millets and pulses are reaped in November while cotton picking lasts until the end of December, and sugarcane remains on the ground till February or March. The Kharif crops require ample rain which should come in September. Wheat and gram

are sown in October, but if the rain is late they can be sown up to December. Rabi crops need rain in January and February. Harvesting of wheat is done in April, but gram and barley are cut earlier. Green wheat for fodder is cut as needed.

The main agricultural implements are the plough, *Kahi* (Spade), *Khurpa* (Hoe), *Rumba* (Spud), *Dantri* (Sickle), *Trengli* (pitchfork). Threshing is done on the hard beaten ground on which crop is spread. A sledge or harrow (*Phala*) is dragged over it till the grain is separated from the husks. Winnowing baskets (*Chajj*) are made of thick stalks of *Sarkanda*. Sowing is usually done broadcast (*Chhatta*) and in the eastern part of a drill (*Nali*) is often used specially for wheat. After sowing *Sohaga* (levelling beam) is run over the cultivated fields to flatten the ground. On well irrigated land *Kiaries* (small compartments) are made for irrigation. Manure is applied to *Chahi* land so far as is available. But there is not enough organic manure for fertilising the soil. The use of chemical manure is gradually gaining popularity amongst the bigger zamindars. The principal crops are wheat which is by far the most important crop in the district, followed by barley, gram, *massar*, *baira*, *jowar*, maize, cotton, rice, sugar-cane, oil-seeds, tobacco and miscellaneous cereals like *Mash*, *Kangni*, etc.

1.21 MEDICAL.

The civil hospitals are at Gujrat, Phalia, Mandi Bahaud Din, Kharian, Jalalpur Jattan with bed strength of 52, 12, 12, 10, 10 respectively. Besides there are the Police Hospital, District Jail Hospital and Dow Memorial Hospital at Gujrat proper and the Municipal Hospital at Lala Musa and the Mission Hospital at Jalalpur Jattan.

Besides there are a number of dispensaries spread all over the district both in rural and urban areas. PWR dispensaries are at Lala Musa and Malikwal.

1.22 COMMUNICATIONS.

(a) Railway.

The district is traversed by the main line of the West Pakistan Railway with stations at Kathala, Gujrat, Deona, Lala Musa, Chak Piran, Kharian, Kariala and Sarai Alamgir. From Lala Musa the line to the west of the former Punjab serves the district with stations at Jaura, Dinga, Chillianwala, Mandi Baha-ud-Din, Aka, Haria, Malakwal and Mona. From Mandi Bahaud-Din a short line of railway belonging to the Canal Department runs to Rasul.

(b) Roads.

The district has a few metalled roads. The Grand Trunk Road passes through the district. The District Council maintains a metalled road from Gujrat to Jalalpur Jattan. A new metalled road connects Gujrat with Sargodha. The mileage of the various important roads of the district is as under:—

There is an air-strip about two and a half miles from Gujrat Town belonging to the Pakistan Air Force, but the town is not served by any air service.

1.23 INDUSTRIES.

(a) Large-scale.

The district had practically no large-scale industries prior to Independence. During the last 14 years it has made remarkable progress and is now the biggest centre in the country for the production of electric fans. There are 16 units engaged in this industry and the value of annual production is about Rs. 60 lakhs. S.A. and other good brands are made in Gujrat.

(b) Small-scale.





It is also one of the biggest centres in the country for producing cheap quality tableware, china-ware and other pottery goods. There are more than 200 small establishments including 32 sizeable units of production. The quality of products is fairly high and besides meeting local demands, serves a sizeable export market also.

There are five power-loom factories engaged in the manufacture of silk fabrics and about a dozen units engaged in the manufacture of furniture, especially camp equipment, which is exported all over West Pakistan.

(c) Cottage industries.

One of the chief industries is that of household furniture, chairs, tables etc., in Gujrat city, the making of *Shawls* in Jalalpur and *koftgari* or damascening in Gujrat. Metal Works, manufacture of trunk and suit-cases, soap and oil crushing, manufacture of cycle spare parts, inks and agricultural implements are some of the other important industries in the district. Hosiery goods and other miscellaneous textiles are also produced. There are about six thousand handlooms and two thousand power-loom working in Gujrat. In many villages cotton is woven into coarse cloth for local use and is generally worn white but often dyed blue and black and sometimes coloured red also. In the western half of the district the whole piece or a border are woven into a kind of tartan pattern, in which black, red and yellow predominate. The wooden chairs are of remarkably good quality and the Gujrat chairs are well known. There is a considerable trade in camp furniture and ordinary furniture is made in Gujrat and supplied in large quantities. *Shisham* cart wheels and wheels of persian-wells are also exported from Gujrat. Wood carving is popular in towns. It is largely done for door panels and cornices, but in villages

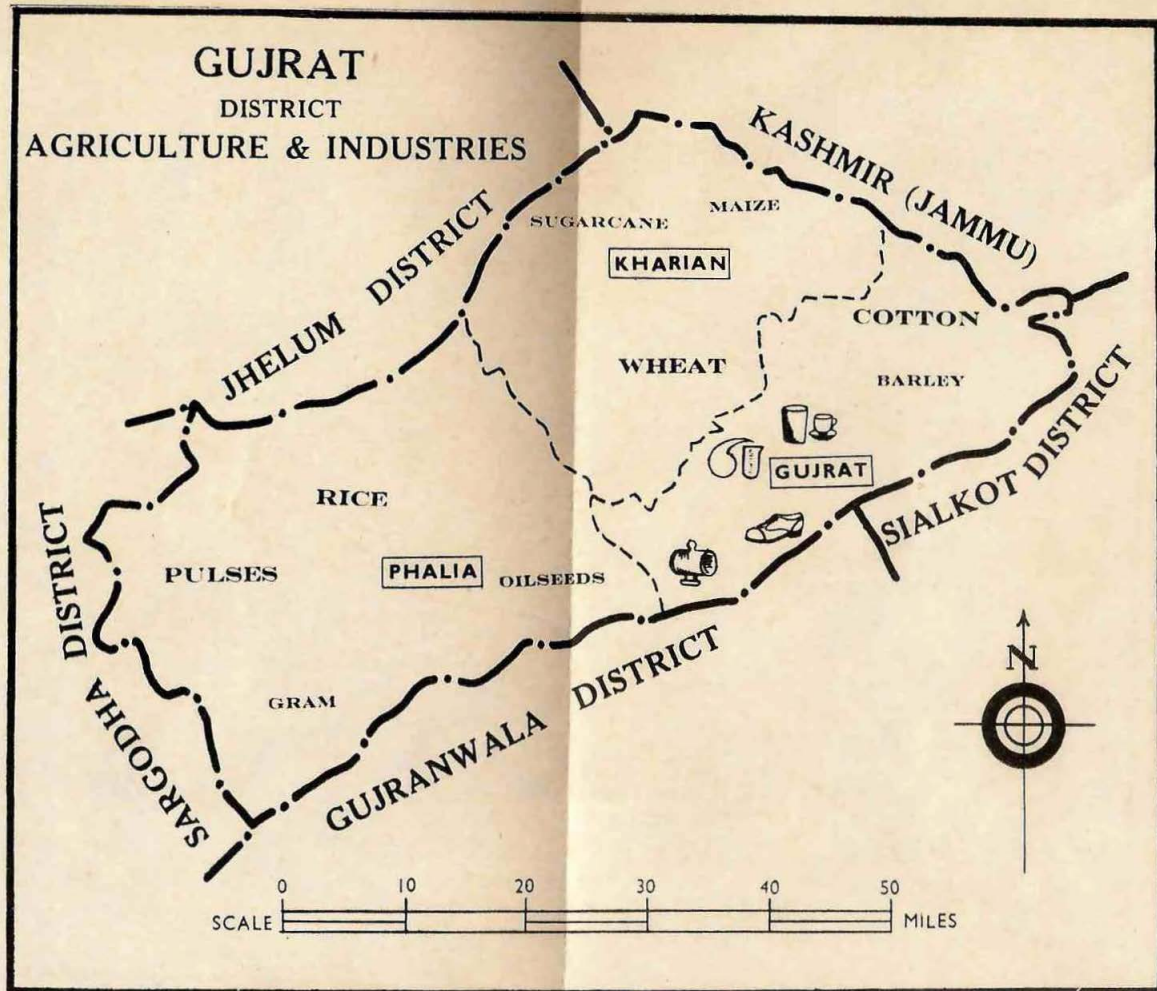

especially in the west of the district, the carved door-ways form a special feature of building. Every well-to-do person has a carved door-way in his house.

A leading tannery has been established at Gujrat which produces tanned leather of the value of Rs. 60 lakhs per annum of which leather valuing about ten lakhs is exported abroad.

An Industrial School for boys is run by the Government at Gujrat which imparts training in weaving and finishing of cotton textiles. A Vocational Training School for girls also exists at Gujrat for training in

tailoring, machine and hand embroidery and *salma* and *tilla* work and knitting.

1.24 LAND REFORMS.

No declaration was filed by any of the landlords of this district whose area was above the permissible limit fixed by the Land Commissioner. Three landlords of other districts—two from Shahpur and one from Jhelum—owning land in this district were, however, effected. Land measuring above 245 acres was resumed in 12 estates of this district. 207 acres have been sold to the sitting tenants and small land-owners.

CHAPTER 2

PEOPLE AND THEIR ENVIRONMENTS

2.1 POPULATION.

The total population enumerated in 1961 was 13,26,012 out of which 6,98,283 were males and 6,27,729 females. The population enumerated in 1951 Census exclusive non-Pakistanis was 11,57,742 out of which 6,14,959 were males and females were

5,42,783. The percentage increase during the 10 years between 1951 and 1961 works out to 14.53% the percentage of increase amongst the males 13.55% and amongst the females 16.65%. The sub-joined statement indicates the population growth in the district for the period 1901 to 1961:—

The number of literates recorded in the 1961 Census is 2,02,760 out of which 1,67,059 are males and 35,701 females, which gives an over-all percentage of 15.3. Considering the literacy figures by sex, the percentage of literacy amongst males is 23.9 and females 5.7.

2.6 ETHNOGRAPHY.

Races & tribes.

The main tribes of Gujrat District are Jats and Gujjars, but there are also Arains, Awans, Balochs, Qureshis, Mughals, Pathans, Rajputs and Syeds.

The Jats occupy the strip of land parallel to the Chenab river, which is irrigated by wells and also in the Bar tract of Phalia. Their sub-castes, Warraichs dominate in the Gujrat Tehsil, Tarrars and Ranjhas in the Chenab riverain area of Phalia Tehsil, and Gondals in the Bar. The Gujjars occupy the centre of Gujrat and Kharian Tehsils. Rajputs and Awans mostly live in the northern corner on the slopes of the Pabbi Hills. The upper corner of the Kharian Tehsil has a strong sprinkling of Awans, Chibs and Jats, with a few villages of Mughals and Khokhar Rajputs.

Many of the villages are named after their founders or their notable persons. The Jats are of good appearance, healthy and strong built. Next to the Jats, the most important tribe is the Gujjars, who are strong and sturdy with simple and industrious habits. They are all agriculturists. The other tribes, though small in number, are like the other Punjab tribes, well built with a good heritage.

2.7 DRESS.

The dress of the majority of the population consists of four garments. The first is a *Tehband* (loin cloth) which is tied round the waist and allowed to hang in loose folds over the lower part of the body. The second is *Kurta* or *Chola*, i.e. shirt. The third is a *Chadar* (sheet), which is wrapped round the upper part of the body. The fourth is *Pag* or turban, which is wound over the head. The colour of men's clothes is usually white, but often the *Tehband* is blue and the turban is white. In the Bar, the *Tehband* is often of a check pattern. Pyjamas or trousers are worn only by men in towns, and during leisure hours. The men in towns tend to adopt the western style dress, viz. trousers, shirts and in winter coats or jackets and they are usually the educated persons. In villages, the dress of the women is very like that of the men. They tie the *tehmat* in the same way, but it is usually blue, with a *kurta* of black colour, and *bhochhan* or *dupatta* either white or coloured. They wear *Shalwar* also occasionally instead of *tehmat*, particularly the more well-to-do, and the women in the towns. In the villages, the majority of the people wear a *tehmat* and a *chaddar* in summer, and in winter a *kurta* is also added to the *tehmat* and *chaddar*. The *Achkan* and *Shalwar* is worn by the more sophisticated in the towns. In towns a large number of people wear trousers, bush-shirts or shirts in summer, and in winter trousers, shirts and coats or coat and *Shalwar*. Chappal and shoes are common in towns, but in the villages *desi jooti* is usually worn, while shoes are worn only by the more well-to-do or educated Zamindars.

2.8 DWELLING HOUSES.

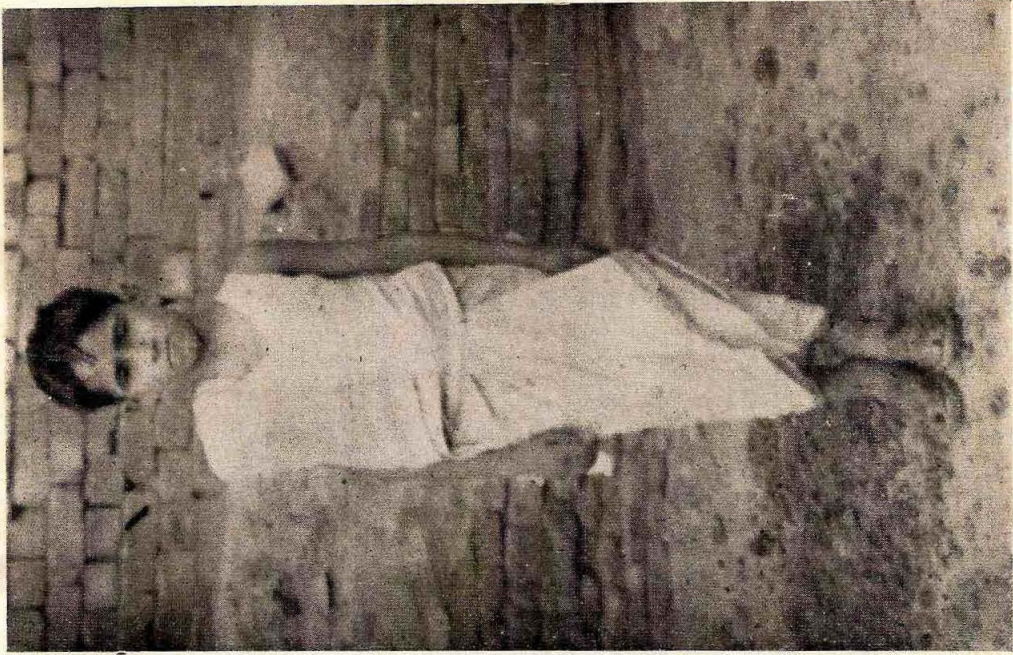
The dwellings of the ordinary people in the villages consists of one or two rooms (*Kothas*) with a courtyard in front. The walls are of blocks of clay dried in the sun, piled one on top of the other, and then mud plastered. In

most houses, there are usually no chimneys or windows, and the only openings are the doors. But some houses have a small opening in the centre of the roof, known as *Magh* for letting in sunshine, and for pouring down the grain after it has been dried in the sun on the roof. The wealthier people build pucca-brick houses with windows and chimneys, and all modern features. The roofs are flat with bricks resting on wooden beams, and sometimes of reinforced concrete. In the courtyard, there is usually a *Khurli* (shed) for the cattle, a trough raised about two feet from the ground built of clay, and also sheds for the cattle built in the same way as the house, but in a less completed form. Cooking is usually done in a partly roofed shelter in a corner of the courtyard. People live in villages consisting of one hundred or one hundred and fifty houses, which are built close together.

Sometimes, the Zamindar has to cover some distance to get to his fields. In the larger villages, separate houses or hamlets are built on the outlying wells. The houses of the *mueens* are usually together, but close to the rest of the *abadi*.

The houses are usually simply furnished, with beds of wood laced with strong cords, a few stools (*Pihris*), corn bins made of clay; sometimes a small hand-mill (*Chakki*) for grinding corn; large wooden or tin boxes for keeping clothes and valuables. There is sometimes a spinning wheel for women; but a small *madhani* and kitchen utensils, including some cooking pots of iron or earthenware are universal. For lighting, kerosene oil lamps, especially the hurricane lantern are used, but some villages have electricity also.

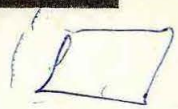
The arrangement of houses in a village does not have a conscious pattern, but is rather haphazard. The cattle sheds and the living rooms frequently adjoin each other, resulting in unsanitary conditions. There is hardly any

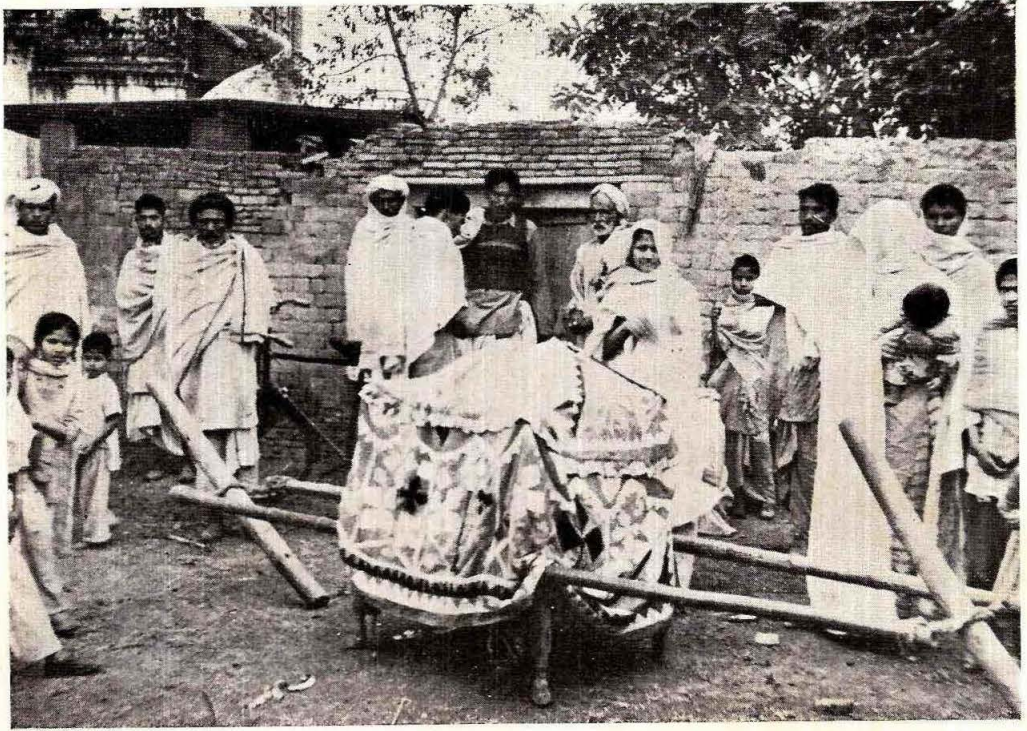


A young boy below ten years of age in his usual home dress.

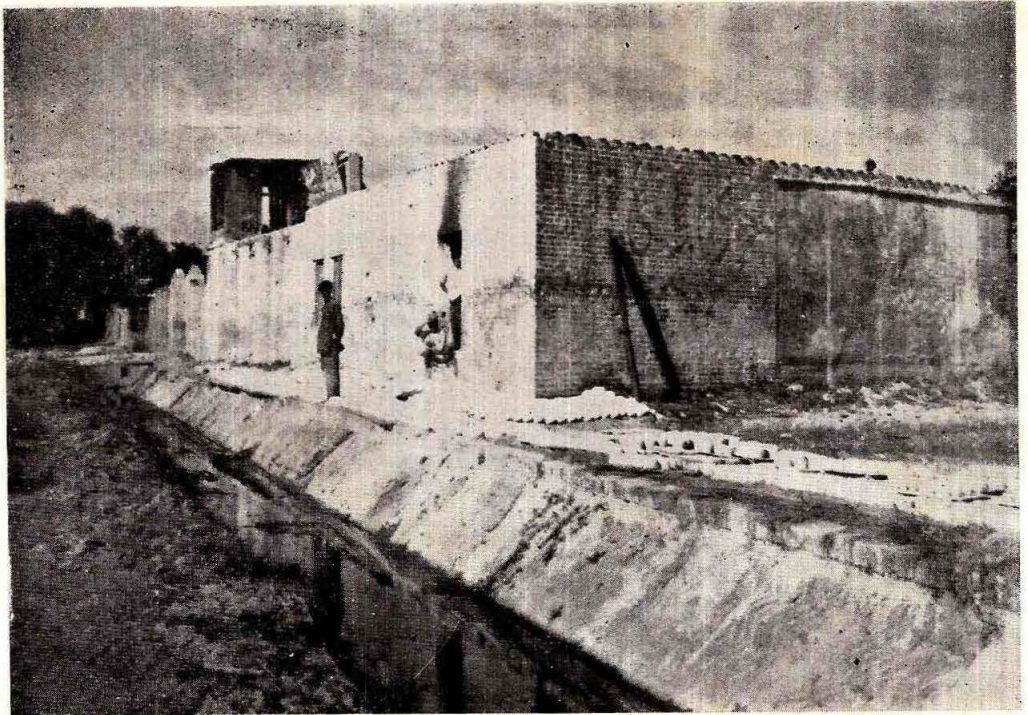


Demure and shy little girl on her way to school.

drainage system, and the refuse is heaped outside the village, making the surroundings unhygienic. The Union Councils are creating a consciousness amongst the people to improve their living standards and traditional modes of life are giving place to better living conditions.

2.9 FOOD & HEALTH.

The staple diet is baked wheat *chappatis* and cereals (*dal*) cooked with salt and pepper and occasionally meat. Rice boiled in water (*Khushka*) or cooked in meat (*Pulao*) is taken mainly by the better classes of people. Bajra, or maize, is eaten when wheat is scarce. Rich food, consisting of *pulao*, *zarda* and *korma* is usually served on marriage feasts and on festivals. Delicious dishes made from sugar are *halva*, *puri*, *kheer*, *firni*. The people in the towns usually have a richer diet consisting of *chappatis* made of wheat *atta* rice, *dal*, vegetables, meat, and occasionally some sweet dish or fruits. There is considerable variation in the standard of diet between the poor and the richer classes of people in the villages as well as towns.

2.10 BETROTHALS & MARRIAGES.

There are no special customs in this district regarding betrothal and marriage, which may distinguish it from the other areas. Usually, the betrothal takes place at an early age, mostly between 7 and 15 years. The custom of making matches through intermediaries, such as the barber, is slowly giving way to direct negotiations. The relatives and friends of the boy and girl make the match by mutual consultations, though the barber (*Nai*) or *Mirasi* may be used as a messenger during the negotiations, and he often carries the customary presents. Betrothal is arranged between the parents of the parties; while a man may sometimes arrange his own betrothal, this freedom is not given to a woman. The day of marriage is fixed by mutual consent, but formal notice is given by the bride's parents by sending some clothes and sweets to the

boy's parents after which the date is fixed. In acknowledgment, the boy's parents send some money, dates, fruits and coloured thread (*Mauli*). The writing out of a formal contract of marriage (*Nikahnama*) has now become mandatory under the law.

A few days before the marriage, the ceremony of dyeing the hands and feet of the bride with henna takes place. On the wedding day, the pair is dressed in new clothes and garlanded; but the tendency is to avoid many of the old traditional details and to make the wedding a simple affair. The marriage procession of the bridegroom goes to the bride's house, and the *Nikah* ceremony is performed usually on the morning after the arrival of the bridegroom's party. The bride's father then displays articles given by him in dowry—clothes, ornaments and furniture according to his circumstances. The girl is then taken back in a *doli* to the bridegroom's house. She stays there for a few days and returns to her parents' house. The final departure of the bride to her husband's home takes place after a few weeks when the bridegroom goes again to fetch her to his house for good (*muklawa*). In some cases, the *muklawa* ceremony is combined with the marriage. The usual age for marriage amongst the boys is between 18 and 20 years, and for girls 16 to 18 years. The recent legislation enhancing the age for marriage in the case of boys and girls has curbed the tendency for early marriages, which was prevalent before.

The expenses vary according to the circumstances of the families, and there is an increasing tendency towards economy. Both the common people as well as rich families, are now satisfied with a simple ceremony of *Nikah* by the Mullah at the house of the girl in the presence of a few friends without much ostentation and ceremonies.

2.11 BIRTHS.

Births and deaths, particularly amongst the village folk, are usually attended by some

customary ceremonies. A son is still considered to be a treasured gain, and the birth of girls not a very happy event. The ceremonies attending the two events differ accordingly. The childless couple usually goes to *Pirs*, *Dargahs*, and *Mazars* to invoke the prayers of saints for getting a son. The shrine of Hazrat Shahdaula in Gujrat town is visited by issueless people, who go to the *Mazar* and pray for an issue.

Some ceremonies are common to the birth of a son or of a daughter. Soon after the child is born, the Maulvi of the village mosque recites *Azan* in its right ear. After this something sweet is poured into the mouth of the child by a pious person of the family. This first intake by the child is known as *Ghutti*, and the child is believed to follow the general disposition and the character of the person who gives the *Ghutti*. When the child is five days' old, his head is shaved by the barber, and this is called *Jhand* ceremony.

The birth of a son, particularly the first one, is celebrated with more enthusiasm and ceremonies. The sweepress brings a bunch of *Shareen* leaves and hangs it at the outer door. Similarly, the potter brings a horse of clay, and the carpenter a small pair of wooden oxen and a plough. These are ceremonial toys for the child to play with. All those who bring these gifts get in return a sum of money called *Laag*, varying with the status of the family. But these customs are observed very rarely now. After seven days of the birth of the child, the ceremony of *Aqiqah* is observed. Two goats for a son and one for a daughter are sacrificed, and the meat is distributed among the poor and the relatives. When a child is born, the superstitious people keep iron or fire nearby in order to ward off *jinn* or evil spirits. Old women suspected of having vicious supernatural power are not allowed to come near the child, and no one is allowed

to go up the roof of the room in which the new-born baby is lying. But these superstitions are rapidly dying out now, as people do not believe them any longer.

2.12 DEATH.

After a person dies, he has got to be given a bath, and taken on a cot to the grave. The dead body is covered with a white cloth known as *Kafan*. The cot upon which the corpse is taken to the graveyard is carried by the close relatives and friends of the deceased. Before the dead person is laid to rest in the grave, *Namaz-i-Janaza* is offered by the gathering.

For forty days after the death of a person, the village Mullah is usually given food by the relatives of the dead as a gesture of charity for the sake of the redemption of the departed soul.

Relatives and friends of the family come to offer *Fateha* which continues for several days. *Qul* or *Soyem* is held on the third day of the death when the Quran is recited and the gathering is given food or refreshments. The mourning gathering of the women is known as *Mokan*. It continues for ten days within the precincts of the house. All the women of the village come in groups, embrace the women of the household, and bewail the loss by crying and weeping—which is known as *Wain*. Sometimes, very close relatives beat their chests and pull their hair. Except in case of children, a Maulvi is detailed to recite the Quran until the following Thursday. On the tenth day, the ceremony known as *Daswan* takes place, when all the relatives and friends are invited and served a meal. The food is distributed amongst the poor as well. On the fortieth day, a similar ceremony—known as *Chehlum* is held.

2.13 RELIGIOUS GROUPS.

The people of the district are predominantly Muslims and the main sects are: (1) Sunnis, (2) Shias, (3) Wahabis and (4) Ahmadis.

The influence of *Pirs* and *Murshids* is prevalent more among Sunnis and Shias than amongst the Wahabis or Ahmadis.

2.14 CUSTOM AND USAGES.

A peculiar custom of the people is the taking of *Mian* (i.e., an oath from a third party enjoying the confidence of the complainant and the accused) usually at some shrine.

2.15 MAIN AND SUBSIDIARY OCCUPATIONS.

Agriculture is the main occupation of the people and 84 per cent of the population live in rural areas, and are engaged directly or indirectly in agriculture and allied pursuits. A vast majority are cultivators, but the usual *mueens*, e.g., blacksmiths, carpenters, weavers, spinners, tailors and shoe-makers, who are an essential part of the normal life in rural as well as in urban areas are also found. The other persons carrying on subsidiary occupations are shop-keepers, hawkers and domestic servants. The people are generally active, and the labour class works at least 8 hours in urban areas with an hour's

break; in rural areas the agricultural labour's work for the whole day with short intervals for meals, etc. The women work mostly at home and occasionally in fields as well.

2.16 FESTIVALS, FAIRS AND MELAS.

The most popular festival in the district after the two Eids is Eid-Milad-un-Nabi, when religious meetings are organized by the public. In Juma Masjids speeches are delivered and tributes paid to the Holy Prophet. There is a great rejoicing and every town is decorated and illuminated at night.

Mela Shah Jehangir is a very popular fair held immediately after the end of the harvesting season. The people assemble there from far off places in groups and dance (*Bhangry*) and sing songs with the beat of drum. The most important feature of this fair is that the Mutawalli of this *Dargah Sharif* distributes *Bhandra* to the visitors. The women also attend the *mela* before sunrise, and go in groups to give offerings. The women also purchase earthen pots for the household use.

CHAPTER 3

IMPORTANT PLACES

Some of the sites of historical and archaeological interest are as follows :—

3.1 HELAN.

There are some extensive and old ruins at Helan (25 miles to the west of Gujrat), but nothing is known of their history. Some coins were picked up among the ruins bearing the date of 8th century Hijri, but nothing earlier than the Mohammadan times has been discovered. There is a large tomb perhaps that of Mirza Sheikh Ali Beg, an Amir of Emperor Akbar who was killed in an encounter with the Ghakkars. He founded a village close to Helan still called after him Sheikh Alipur. His tomb is in a dilapidated condition.

3.2 PATI KOTHI.

This is a very old ruin situated on the banks of Jaba Nalla at the foot of the Pabbi. It is reputed to be a part of an old, perhaps buried, city—the bricks are of a large mould, one foot square and three inches thick and are finely burnt. No inscription of any kind has been found.

3.3 RASUL.

An old mosque here contained an inscription commemorating its erection. The date was placed at 1000 Hijri.

3.4 ISLAMGARH.

This is on a very high and imposing mound, which is probably very ancient. It is said to have been the headquarters of the large *Chaurasi* of villages belonging to the Waraich Jats.

3.5 MONG.

Mong is a very old place in which many coins of late Indo-Greek Kings were found.

3.6 KHWASPUR.

The route to Kabul through the district is still the remains of the *Serais* and *Baolis* erected by Muslim kings. The Serai of Khwaspur was built by Sukhi Khwas Khan in 952 Hijri. Khwas Khan was in the service of Sher Shah whose mother was a slave girl. He married the daughter of a Ghakkar Chief and was deputed by the Emperor Sher Shah to govern this part of the empire.

3.7 KHARIAN.

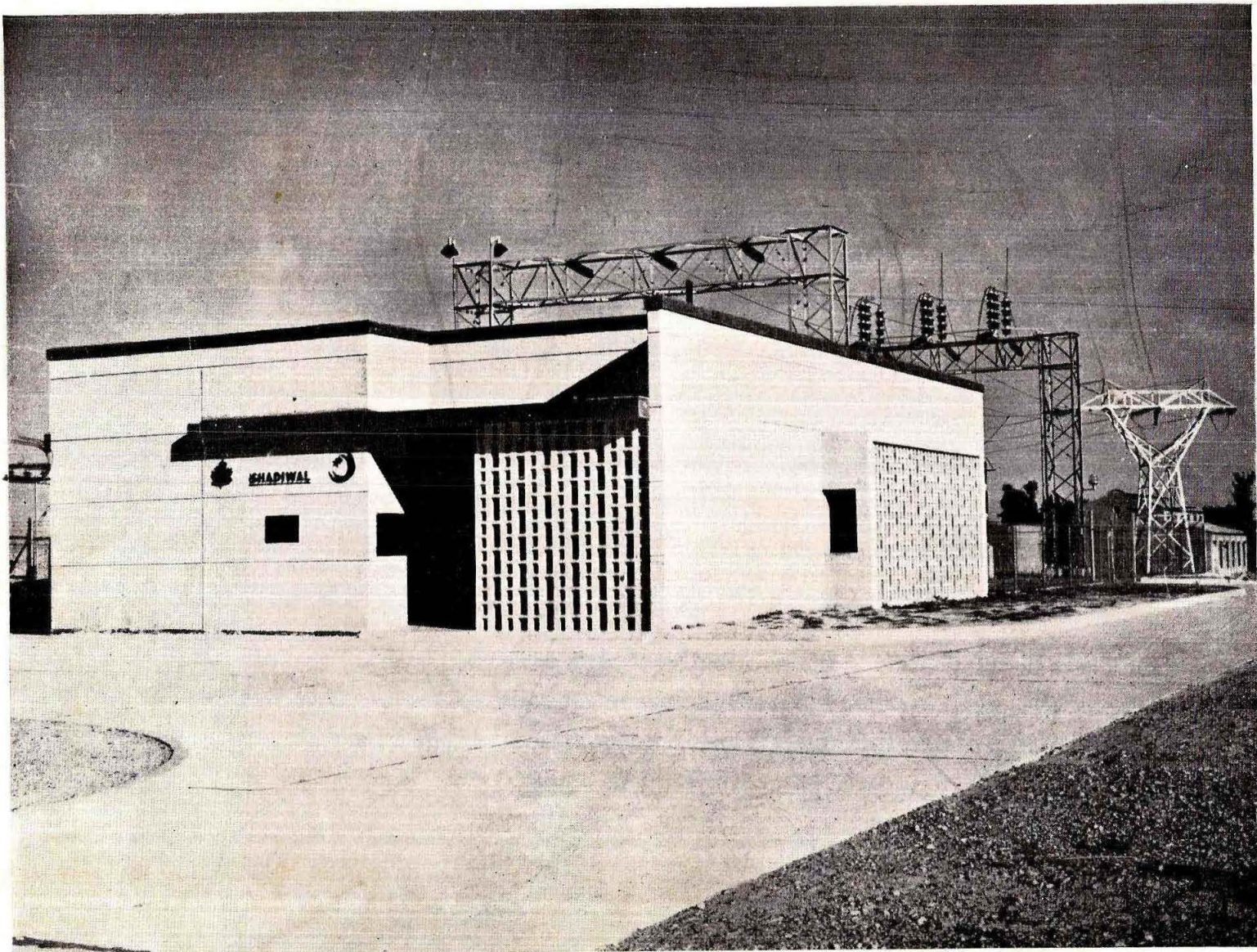
Kharian is situated on the Grand Trunk Road on mile No. 92, at a distance of 21 miles from the Gujrat District Headquarter and 92 miles from Lahore on the northern side. It is at a distance of 11 miles from Jhelum city on the southern side.

It is a Tehsil Headquarter and lies on a metalled road and is also a railway station. A good number of buses are available at every time for Lahore and Rawalpindi. All kinds of facilities for journey are available.

Its population according to the Census of the year 1951 was 4,598 which has risen to 7,482 in the year 1961, showing an increase of 2884 in the decade.

Kharian is a Town Committee and it is also the Tehsil office of Union Councils.

The people use the water of ordinary wells. Some of the wells contain sour water, which is not fit for drinking while some wells contain soft water. The hand pumps are not

successful in supplying the water for daily use as the water level is very deep. The Water and Power Development Authority is supplying electricity in this village.

There are two High Schools, *i.e.*, one for girls and the other for boys.

There is a big Cantonment quite adjacent to this village, which was built in the year 1958.

Besides there is a Police Station, a Hospital, a Veterinary Hospital and offices of the Agriculture and Plant Protection Assistants. There is also Range Officer of the Forest Department.

Kharian Cantt. is one of the finest cantonments in Pakistan which is still in an age of development. When this project is complete it would bring added glamour to this part of the country.

At Kharian there are two large *Baolis* both of which are said to have been built at the same time and their very different appearances now are accounted for by the western one. The eastern *Baoli* is in its original state, built of stones, now very much worn. Over the top of steps is a massive dome with an inscription. It simply records the completion of the work in the month of Ramzan 1013 Hijri.

3.8 NAURANGABAD.

The Serai of Naurangabad was built by Aurangzeb after whom it is called Alamgir. The village Aurangabad is half a mile away. During the Sikh rule there was probably a Cantonment in Naurangabad.

3.9 CHOKANDI.

The ruins of Chokandi near Alamgarh was probably the halting residence built by Akbar Shah and was the first halting place after crossing Chenab on the way from Delhi to Kashmir.

3.10 PHALIA TOWN.

Phalia is the headquarters of the Tehsil of same name. It is located approximately in the Centre of the Tehsil.

It is 32 miles towards the west of Gujrat District Headquarters and is connected by a metalled road.

Its population in 1951 was 3,810 and has risen to 5,518 which gives a percentage increase of 41. There is a Union Council. The town is not yet electrified. Under-ground sweet water level is not deep and the Town does not necessitate mechanical water supply system.

There are two Government High Schools at this place, one for boys and other for girls. There is a Civil Hospital for males and females as also a Health Centre and a Veterinary Hospital.

3.11 RASUL HEADWORKS.

Rasul Headworks is located 50 miles from Gujrat. It is provided on River Jhelum to feed Lower Jhelum Canal taking off from Rasul. The designed capacity of the weir is 900,000 Cs. The Canal taking off from Rasul Headworks irrigates up to Jhang District.

There is a Hydel Station provided at Rasul which is being fed by Upper Jhelum Canal and the supplies discharged is passed into Lower Jhelum Canal. The total output of power is 22,000 Kilowatt which is managed by Resident Engineer with full establishment comprising of various officers and full Divisional Establishment.

3.12 FAKIRIAN HEAD.

Head Fakirian is located 30 miles from Rasul where the Lower Jhelum Canal ends and is further distributed into 3 Main Branches *i.e.*, Northern Branch, Southern Branch and Southern Feeder. The District boundary of Sargodha District and Gujrat District meets at this place.

CHAPTER 4

GUJRAT TOWN

4.1 AREA & BOUNDARIES.

The area of Gujrat town is 3.78 square miles. It is bounded on the south by Railway Station and the Electric Power House, on the west by the well-known Bhimber Nallah which is about two miles from the town, on the north by the Zamindar College and on the east by the well-known shrines of Sain Karam Ilahi Kanwanwala and Hazrat Shah Daula. It is on the north-west of Lahore at a distance of 70 miles.

4.2 POPULATION.

The total population of the city is 59,821, males and females being 31,739 and 28,082 respectively.

4.3 CLIMATE.

The climate of the town is pleasant in the months of March and April and again in September, October and November. The summer is spread over the months of May, June, July and August and the winter months are December, January and February. In summer the maximum temperature is 114° F.H. and the minimum 81° F.H. In winter the maximum temperature is 73° F.H., and the minimum 36°. The rainfall ranges from 10" to 26" during the year.

4.4 LITERACY.

The literacy in the town is 11.1 % and there are many schools besides a degree college.

4.5 MAIN ROADS AND TYPES OF TRANSPORTATION.

There are four main roads in the town viz., Railway Road, Circular Road, Katchery

Road and Bhimber Road. The means of transport are Omni buses, taxis and tongas.

4.6 EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTIONS.

The important educational institutions are the Zamindar College, Zamindar Higher Secondary School, Government College for Women, Normal School, Government Girls High School, and Industrial School.

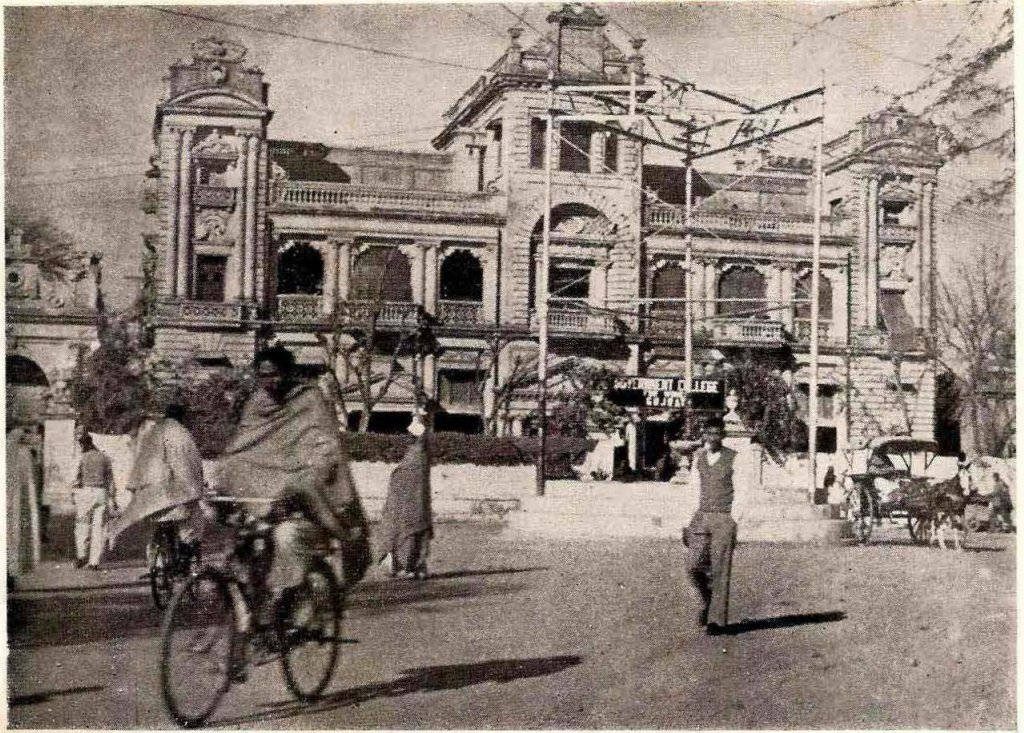
(b) PUBLIC INSTITUTIONS.

The important public institutions are the Civil Hospital and the Kings Library. There is a Children's Park in the town and a Park in the Civil Lines. There are two Cinema Houses, but there are no good hotels or restaurants. There is a Town Hall as well as a District Council Hall forming parts of the Municipal Office and the District Council Office respectively.

The important Government Offices are the Deputy Commissioner's office, District Katchery, Sessions House, Police Office and the Forest and Canal Offices.

4.7 COMMERCIAL CENTRES.

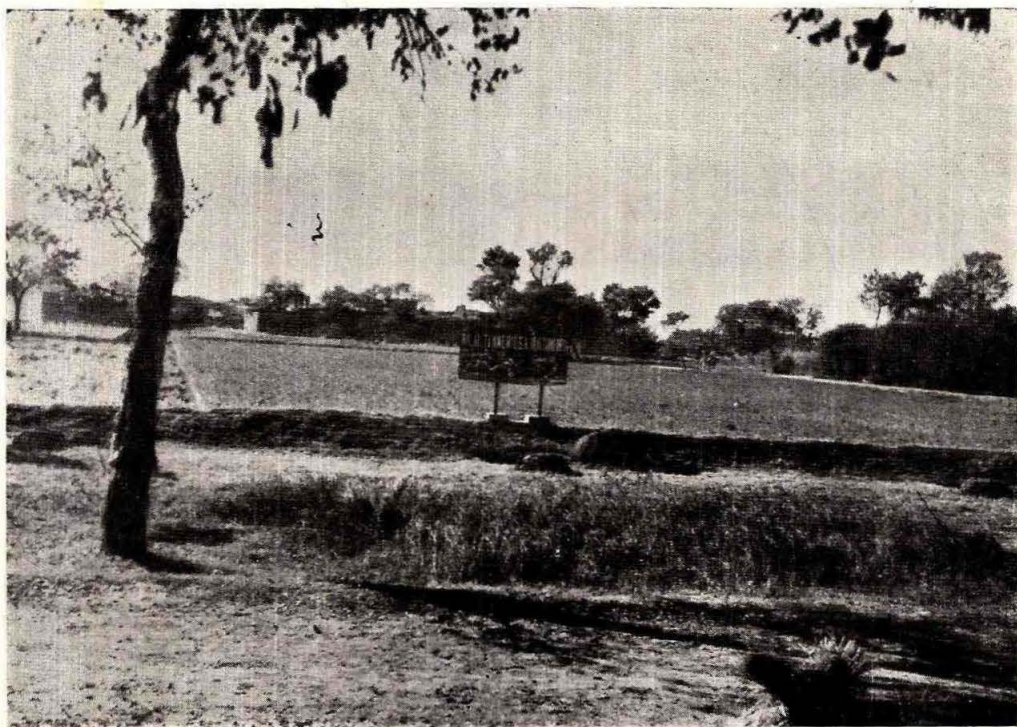
The important commercial centres are the National Bank of Pakistan, the Agricultural Bank, Habib Bank, Bank of Bahawalpur and the Central Cooperative Bank. Shopping centres are confined to the main bazar, the Circular Road bazar and the Railway Road bazar. The commercial and industrial buildings consist of the Hilal Tanneries, the Electric Power House, the Pakistan Pottery Works and a number of fan manufacturing industries.



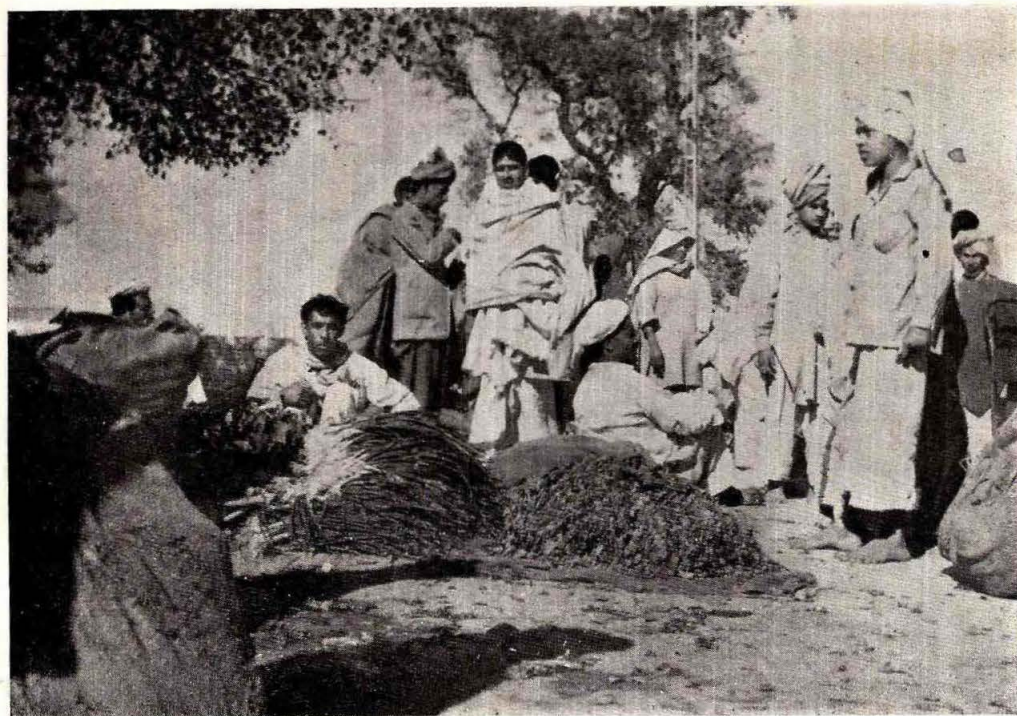
Government College for Women, Gujrat.

4.8 HANDICRAFTS.

The main articles of trade are cloth, food-grains, medicines, stationery, general-merchandise and the important local products, which are found scattered in the city, are fans, crockery, furniture and cloth.

4.9 CIVIC ADMINISTRATION.

The administration of the town is being run by a Municipal Committee, with an official Chairman. The maintenance of law and order is the responsibility of the local Police.

4.10 SHRINES.

There are numerous shrines at Gujrat out of which the following four deserve special mention:—

(1) Shrine of Hazrat Shah Daula.

Shah Daula was a saint of great repute who in the reign of Shah Jahan lived in Gujrat and from the rich offerings made to him spent freely on the adornment of the town and its suburbs.

Shah Daula was a Pathan and claimed descent from the Emperor Bahlol Shah Lodhi; at the same time the Gujjars assert that he belonged to their class; and the present *Sajjada-nashin* at the shrine professes to be a Sayed. To this *khanqah* are sent deformed children known as *Shahdaulas Chuha's* (rats). The popular belief is that the priest undertakes to cause children to be born in childless homes on condition of the parents consenting at the shrine to relinquish to him their first born child, which is then said to be born rat-headed. They look like imbeciles with little or no forehead, and sharp features, which in a manner justifies the appellation of "rat head". They are very shy and most of them are male.

Shah Daula besides being a great Saint, is well-known for helping to build work of

public service like bridges, roads, etc. He is popularly known as the "Saint Engineer" of the Punjab. He died at the age of 95 years.

(2) Shrine of Hazrat Shah Jahangir.

Shah Jahangir was a great Saint who lived during the life time of Shah Daula. His name was Shah Husain. He was a disciple (*Chela*) of Hazrat Daood Bandgi Karmani (Ikrami) who lived in Sher Garh. His tomb is visited by the devotees all the year, and his *Urs* and the *Mela* is held on the first Tuesday of the month of *Asarh* when thousands of persons collect at the *Mazaar*. The day is declared a local holiday by the district authorities.

(3) Shrine of Sain Kanwanwala.

The name of the saint is Sain Karam Ilahi. He belonged to Gujrat town. He died in the year 1930 at the age of about 70. He was *Majzooob Faqeer* of very high calibre. It is said that he used to throw every *Nazrana* (Sweets, fruits, etc.) to the crows who flocked at his *dera* in large numbers. That is why he is called Sain Kanwanwala. His annual *Urs* is held on the first Sunday of the Bikrami month of *Sawan*.

(4) Tomb of Pir Jafar.

The name of the saint is Sayed Said Miran. He was Sayed and claimed descent from sixth Imam Hazrat Jafar Sadiq. He came from Iraq along with his brother and lived here. He remained here and his brother later gone to Jammu & Kashmir State. His brother's tomb is at village Panjeri. The saint is known as Sayed Pir Jafar Shah in this area.

The tomb is picturesquely placed on a higher peak of the Pabbi above the village of Besa. The chief difficulty here is to get water. The attendants live on the offerings of visitors to the shrine who appear to be generous.

Instructions to the Enumerators.

1. Study again the summarized House Numbering Procedure which you received with the list of your duties for the first phase of the Census.
2. Read these instructions repeatedly until you are completely familiar with them.
3. Study the Dummy interview sheet carefully and see if there are any particular types of houses/households in your block which are not included therein, or if there is any aspect of it which you do not understand, so that you may get your difficulties resolved in the Training Classes.
4. Always carry your letter of appointment and introduce yourself by means of it, explaining to each Householder briefly the objects of the Census and the fact that all true information gained in the Census is strictly confidential in respect of all persons and can never be used in any manner against their interests.
5. Remember that the "Household" is the smallest unit in the Housing Census and enter the necessary information about each and every Household on a separate line in the Housing Census Schedule.
6. Ensure that every Building in your Block has been numbered.

9. Be ready at all times for a visit of inspection by your Circle Supervisor.
10. **DEFINITIONS**—(a) *Household* is a collection of persons living and eating in one mess with their dependents, relations, servants and lodgers who normally reside together.
 (b) *Normal Resident or Usual Inhabitant* is a person to whom the house is his or her permanent home or regular lodging place. *Floating Population* means homeless folks or regular itinerants, visitors to households, etc.
 (c) *Room* is broadly a compartment of House large enough to be slept in.
 (d) *Cottage Industry*: For purposes of this enquiry, a "Cottage Industry" is one which is carried on wholly or mainly with the help of the members of a household working whole-time or part-time on a handicraft or in manufacturing articles of utility, decorative or artistic value for sale mainly outside the village or *Mohalla* where they are manufactured. This will exclude repair and maintenance services, and will normally exclude village artisans such as the Lohar, Tarkhan, Kumhar, etc., unless they do special work so as to fall within the above definition.

METHOD OF RECORDING PARTICULARS IN THE ENUMERATOR'S REGISTER FOR THE HOUSING CENSUS

1. You have been given two copies of this Register, one of which (Copy No. 1) contains Cottage Industry Schedule which is also to be completed while taking the Housing Census. Even if there is no Cottage Industry in your Block the Cottage Industry Form should still be returned with the word "BLANK" written across it.

2. Your "Location Code" should be completed on each copy of the Housing Census Schedule and on the Cottage Industry Form at home before going out in your Block to fill up the Schedule & Form. This copy of the Housing Census Schedule and the Cottage Industry Form (Copy No. 1) should be completed while out in the Block carrying out the actual Housing Census. The second copy (Copy No. 2) of Housing Census Schedule may be filled up at home by copying out neatly in ink on it each evening the entries you have made on the original (Copy No. 1), during the day.

Column (2) of Housing Census Schedule : The "Census House Number" given to the building or house should be recorded in this column. In a building there can be many houses. In such a case the building number should be recorded first, underneath the No. of the building, the No. of the house therein should be recorded separately. It should be remembered that in case more than one households are living in the same house, the particulars of each of the households will be recorded on a different line by writing "Do" in this column.

Column (3) : Enter the number of one of the eight types of material used in walls and in case where more than one material has been used in different portions of the house, enter the number of the principal material used in outer walls of the Major portion of the house.

Column (4) : Enter the relevant number as in column 3.

Column (5) : If a household is living in a boat or in tent, etc., then put the relevant No. (1, 2 or 3) in this column. Columns (3) & (4) will then be blank.

Column (6) : Give serial number to the households residing in the same house whose particulars are to be recorded on different lines.

Column (7) : If the household is living in "owned", "rented" or "free" house enter the relevant No. (1, 2 or 3) in this Column. In the case of servant quarters, etc., allowed free of rent, write the No. of Free (*i.e.* 3).

Column (8) : Name of the head of the household has to be entered for all occupied houses. For institution, hotel, etc., enter its name. For any unoccupied dwelling write "Vacant Residential" or "Under Construction residential" etc. For non-residential buildings write Mosque, Primary School, Office, Warehouse, Shop, "Vacant Shop" etc., "Under Construction Shop" etc., as the case may be.

Column (9) to (16) : Write the number in the appropriate column.

Column (17) to (18) : For making entries in columns 17 and 18 the head of the household should be specifically asked to state separately the total number of males and females included in the household. This will serve as a check on any possible discrepancy due to the under-reporting of females which must be continually guarded against.

Column (19) : Write the number of rooms occupied by the household (See instruction 10 (c) ante for definition of "room").

Columns (20) to (25) : Write the number in the appropriate column.

2. Fill in the Location Code at the top of each schedule at home before you start Enumeration. The following is an example of how these 5 boxes should be filled up by an imaginary Enumerator whose Block Location Code number is 334060312.

3. The remainder of each schedule is to be completed in the field at the actual time of enumeration. Please write clearly and definitely, using your presentation Ball-point pen.

4. Be sure to include all persons enumerated in Cols. 8 to 16 of the Housing Census Schedule who are still present. Also satisfy yourself that all *INFANTS* and all additions made in the household until the time of Enumeration are properly reported. People usually forget to get all the *female members* enumerated, so take special care to see that *every female* in the household is enumerated.

5. Always introduce yourself by showing your letter of Appointment which you should carry with you.

(ii)

6. Should any person object to answering any Census question you should explain that the information collected is **STRICTLY CONFIDENTIAL**, that it will not be communicated to any person whatsoever, and that no use will be made of it, which can in any way injure the respondents interests.

7. Spoiled Schedules should *not* be removed from the pad, but should be clearly cancelled with a cross on both sides. If a wrong entry is made by mistake under any question, it may be neatly cancelled by a cross (x) and the right entry made.

Whom to Count:

8. The object is to *include in the Census* all persons who are normally residents of Pakistan and all visitors to Pakistan during the Enumeration Period. The Census is to be complete and the motto should be "catch every person", but *no one should be counted more than once.*

9. Therefore *visit each and every house* during the Enumeration Period, missing no place in your Block. Write a schedule for every person you find there who is a Normal Resident, and also for visitors, travellers and wanderers in accordance with these instructions.

10. *A Normal Resident* in a house is a person who has his or her present regular residence of lodging place there. If you have any doubt as to whether a person is truly a normal resident, you should fill in a schedule for him or her and make a note to consult your Supervisor.

11. *Absent members of the household.*— The object of the *Preliminary Questions* is to ensure that persons who are temporarily away from their present normal residence for *part*

of the Enumeration Period, are enumerated in the locality in which they normally reside. This will be part of your job.

Persons who are absent from their Normal Residence during the *whole* Enumeration Period will be counted at the place where they have gone and you need not worry about them.

12. *Temporary visitors* who have not already been enumerated, should be enumerated where they are found no matter where they come from, unless they will be back at their normal place of residence in Pakistan at some later time ~~during~~ during the Enumeration Period. If you enumerate them you must warn them not to allow themselves to be enumerated again. But if you do *not* enumerate them you should ask them to get themselves enumerated at their normal place of residence when they return there before 31st January, 1961.

Post Enumeration check:

13. In addition to normal Supervision and Checking during the Enumeration Period, a percentage of the Enumeration Schedules will be completely checked soon after the "BIG COUNT" in order to assess the accuracy of the Census. Every Census Officer should try to ensure that no defect is discovered in his work at that stage.

How to write answers.

PRELIMINARY QUESTIONS :

House No.

Write in the box.

Household No.

Write in the box.

(This will nearly always be "1" save in cities).

Have you been enumerated already? If "NO" ask question (a).

(a) Is this your present REGULAR residence or lodging place? If "YES" carry out enumeration in full. If "NO" ask question (b).

(b) Will you be BACK in your normal residence before 31st JANUARY, 1961? If "NO" or doubtful, carry out enumeration.

If "YES" do not fill in this form, but carefully warn the person that it is his/her duty to see that a form is made out at his/her normal residence.

Q. 1. NAME ?

Write it out.

If a tribesman put name of tribe, clan and section of tribe after the person's name in the Quetta and Kalat Divisions and in the area between the Durand Line and the settled Districts in the Peshawar and Dera Ismail Khan Divisions. In the Chittagong Hill Tracts, put name of Tribe.

Explanation.—Statistically names have no significance and the record of names will

be later destroyed. The reason for the recording of the name is to assist you in obtaining correct information and in preventing double counting. If a child has not been named enter "Son of——" "Daughter of——". If any person is hesitant to let you know the names of female members of his household, do not insist upon knowing the name but write down "Wife of——", "Daughter of——" and so on. Similarly if the respondent is a woman, do not insist upon knowing the name of her husband or any such person whose name she is reluctant to give in view of any prevailing custom.

Relationship to HEAD OF HOUSE- HOLD ?	Write it out.

Explanation.—For Head, write "Head". For wife or husband, son or daughter of Head, enter "wife", "Husband", "son", "daughter" as the case may be.

For non-relatives enter "Servant", "Guest", "Friend" and so on, as the case may be.

Q. 2. SEX ?

Ring round "male" or "female".

Explanation.—Every person will be classed either as male or female. Eunuchs will be recorded as males.

Q. 3. AGE ?

Write the number of years completed on the 31st January, 1961.

For infants under one year.

Write number of completed months in box "Under one year", i.e., 0 to 11.

(iv)

Explanation.—Enter age in *completed years*, except for children less than 12 months old e.g., a person who will be 20 years 10 months on 31st January, 1961, should be entered as 20 years and not 21 years. For a child less than 12 months old, enter number of *completed months*. Enter “0” months when under 1 month. If age is not known, try to ascertain the age as accurately as possible by reference to any past event which may be remembered. The estimation of age is of great importance and calls for intelligence and diligence on the part of the Enumerator. It will generally help in the estimation of ages to enumerate the children in a household starting from the youngest child.

Q. 4. MARITAL STATUS?

Single.	Ring round “1” under ‘Single.’
Married.	Ring round “2” under ‘Married’.
Widowed.	Ring round “3” under ‘Widowed.’
Divorced.	Ring round “4” under ‘Divorced’.

Explanation.—“Single” applies only to persons who have never been married.

“Married” includes all persons who are at present married, all persons habitually living together as man and wife and all persons living apart but still married and not widowed or divorced.

“Widowed” applies to a person whose husband or wife is dead, and who has not married again.

“Divorced” applies to both divorcer and divorcee if not remarried.

Q. 5. WERE YOU BORN IN THIS DISTRICT?

If not, WHERE?

If yes, ring round “Born in”.

For other places in Pakistan write name of the District.

If born in “Azad Kashmir” or “Occupied Kashmir” the word “Azad Kashmir” or “Occupied Kashmir” should be written along with the name of District.

If born in India, write “India” along with the name of District.

Elsewhere write name of COUNTRY ONLY.

Explanation.—Birth place means the country or district in which the person was born according to present political boundaries which may differ from those existing at the time of birth.

Q. 6. ARE YOU A PAKISTANI ?

If a Powindah; ask are you an Afghan Powindah?

If a Kashmiri:

Are you a national of “Azad Kashmir” or “Occupied Kashmir”?

If yes, ring round “PAK”.

If yes, write “AFGHAN” and put “Powindah” after it.

Write one of them.

If not what is your NATIONALITY? Write it out.

Explanation.—Write down exactly what the respondent says. People know quite well whether they regard themselves as Pakistani or not and it is their opinion that has to be recorded.

For non-Pakistanis record the name of the country of which they claim to be Nationals.

Afghan Powindahs.—If an Afghan does not know whether he is a Powindah, ask him how long he is staying in Pakistan. If he is only here for the winter, treat him as a Powindah.

Q. 7. RELIGION? Ring round the appropriate number.

Explanation.—Accept respondent's own classification. The last blank box is intended for persons who claim a religion other than those recorded on the schedule, when the religion claimed should be written in the blank box. If a person claims no religion, write "None" in the blank box.

Q. 8. DISABLED? If totally blind, ring round "1" under "Blind".

If deaf and dumb, ring round "2" under "Deaf and Dumb".

If crippled ring round "3" under "Crippled".

Explanation.—A person will be treated as blind if he cannot count the Enumerator's

fingers held up about one foot in front of his face with or without spectacles, and as "Crippled" if he is permanently unable to use one or both of his arms and or legs. A person who is deaf but *can* speak, or dumb but *can* hear will *not* be counted as "deaf and dumb".

IF NOT DISABLED PUT A CROSS IN THIS BOX

Q. 9. MOTHER TONGUE? Ring round the appropriate number under languages.

Explanation.—One of the last blank columns is intended for persons whose mother tongue is not one of those named on the schedule; when that is the case write the name of the language in the blank heading and then ring the number underneath. Every person must have a mother tongue. In the case of a young child who is as yet unable to speak, or of a deaf-mute, the language to be entered would be that principally spoken at the present time in the home by the parents or guardians. A person cannot have more than one mother tongue and for this reason there should be *only one* entry in this column.

Q. 10. OTHER LANGUAGES YOU CAN EASILY SPEAK? Ring round the appropriate number under languages.

Explanation.—The respondent should not claim to speak any language unless he can easily converse in it. If he claims to be able to speak languages which are not provided on the schedule write the names in the blank columns and ring the number in the appropriate box. The language already ringed as mother tongue in the preceding question should *NOT* be ringed again in this question which deals only with *OTHER* languages spoken.

Q. 11. LITERACY?

- (i) Are you able to *read and write* a simple letter? If so, in what languages? Ring round the number under appropriate languages against "Write and Read only".
- (ii) Are you able to *read with understanding*, but not write? If so, in what languages? Ring round the number under appropriate languages against "Read only".
- (iii) Are you able to read the Holy Quran *without understanding*? If yes, put a \checkmark mark under Arabic in box 9 against "Read only."

IF CANNOT READ OR WRITE AT ALL DRAW A CROSS RIGHT THROUGH THESE BOXES.

Explanation.—A ring round 9 under Arabic against "Read only" will mean that the respondent can read Arabic and the Holy Quran *with* understanding. A \checkmark in this box will clearly mean ability only to read the Holy Quran *without* understanding. Languages already ringed for "Write and Read" should *not* be ringed again for "Read only".

Q. 12. SCHOOL OR COLLEGE ATTENDANCE?

Are you *NOW* ATTENDING A SCHOOL OR COLLEGE OR AN INSTITUTE OF EDUCATION?

If attending a school or college of General or Professional Education ring round "G".
If attending an Institution of

Technical Education ring round "T".

If attending a Maktab ring round "M".

IF A PERSON IS NOT AT PRESENT ATTENDING ANY SCHOOL OR COLLEGE, PUT A CROSS IN THE BOX "NOW GOING TO SCHOOL OR COLLEGE."

Explanation.—For the purpose of Census a person is regarded as regularly attending school or college, or a technical institution regardless of any temporary break in attendance due to sickness or holiday, etc. The terms "School" and "College" cover institutions imparting General or Professional Education below and above matriculation standard respectively without regard to the names of the institutions.

Technical Institutions include Polytechnics, Technical High Schools, etc.

Maktab or Madrasa includes places where the Holy Quran and often elementary Urdu or other local languages are taught by an Imam, Maulvi or other teacher.

(This applies both to those who are now attending School/College, and to those who have completed education).

Certificates will not be recorded if general education has not passed "middle" or the 8th class.

Dip.—If passed Matriculation or higher and hold a recognised Diploma, ring "Dip" and the number of the Professional (including Technical) Field, as well as the highest grade in general education, *e.g.*, a Diplomaed Teacher who has passed Matric, will have 3 rings round "M", "Dip" and "1" under Education Field. No Diploma will be recorded unless the holder has passed Matric or higher in general education.

Field.—The Professional (including Technical) Field should only be ringed in the case of those who hold a recognised Professional (or Technical) Certificate or Diploma, or a Professional Bachelor's, Master's or Doctor's Degree.

Explanation.—(1) If the respondent is
not a tiller of the soil, this question should be
put with specific reference to "*WORKING*"
or "*NOT WORKING BUT LOOKING*
FOR WORK" *during the last week, i.e.,* a
non-agricultural *worker* who has not been
working, but looking for work during the last
week will be ringed "2", but if he has done
any work for profit, etc., during the week, he
will be ringed "1".

(2) "Inactive" is a person who is not
working to earn his livelihood nor is he in
search of any work. Students and House-
wives doing *only household duties* are to be
treated as "Inactive". But persons who are
helping any member of their family in his
profession or trade, even if they are not paid
for such work in cash or kind, are to be classed
as "Working". Persons not working and
living on rent or pension *only* are also to be
treated as inactives. Beggars and Prostitutes
are also to be classed as inactives, because,
although they do earn, they are not helping
in the production of economic goods.

(3) In the case of "Inactives" questions
16 to 20 will *not* be asked but the details of
their categories will be ascertained from
Question No. 21 and recorded accordingly.

Questions 16 to 20 to be asked only
of persons who are "*WORKING*" OR
"*LOOKING FOR WORK*", *i.e.,* who are
ringed (1) or (2) in Q. No. 15.

Q. 16. WHAT IS YOUR MAIN OCCUPATION?

(what kind of work do you do)?

If a **TILLER OF THE SOIL**, ring round "T" and move on to Q. 18. Otherwise write the **OCCUPATION**.

Explanation.—A tiller of the soil is one who himself works on the land or gets it cultivated under his direct personal supervision. Information regarding "Main Occupation" is required only if the person is "WORKING" or, if not working is "LOOKING FOR WORK". It is essential that a person's occupation be recorded in such a way that it may provide an adequate description of the work he is doing, or is looking for. In the case of a person looking for work for the first time, enter "NONE YET".

For your guidance a list of descriptions of occupations which are not acceptable without qualification is given below. This list is not comprehensive but gives an idea of the precision required.

Administrative Officer.—State whether Government Administrative, City Council Administrative Officer, etc.

Clerk.—State whether accounts clerk, correspondence clerk, stores clerk, solicitor's clerk, tally clerk, timekeeper, etc.

Driver.—State whether lorry driver, bus driver, taxi driver, car driver, tractor driver, railway engine driver, crane driver, bulldozer driver, etc.

Conductor.—State whether bus conductor, band conductor, railway conductor, etc.

Engineer.—State whether civil engineer, electrical engineer, mechanical engineer, mining engineer, motor engineer, etc.

Factory Worker.—State the exact nature of work done and the kind of factory.

Inspector.—State whether fire inspector, health inspector, labour inspector, police inspector, traffic inspector, ticket inspector, railway inspector, vehicle inspector, etc.

Labourer.—State whether dock labourer, earth moving labourer, godown labourer, transport labourer, etc.

Manager.—State whether finance manager, personnel manager, general sales manager, textile retail manager, owner or partner (stating nature of business), etc.

Mechanic.—State whether motor mechanic, radio mechanic, lift mechanic, etc.

Owner Proprietor.—State nature of business owned.

Salesman.—State whether retail shop salesman, insurance salesman, ticket salesman, newsboy, street vendor, wholesale commodities salesman, broker, auctioneer, etc.

The description should be appropriate to the actual work done irrespective of educational, professional, or technical qualifications achieved by a person. Vague, incomplete and ambiguous descriptions like "service" "Labourer" "Mulazmat" should be avoided.

For **PERSONS NOT RINGED "T" IN QUESTION NO. 16.**

Q. 17. NAME AND TYPE OF INDUSTRY, BUSINESS OR SERVICE? Write it out.

Explanation.—Enter the name of the *Industry, Business or Service* in which the person is working.

(xii)

The entry has to be made *only* if the person is working, or if not working, has been previously working and is at present looking for work. In the case of a person who is looking for work for the first time, enter "X" against this question.

Industry refers to the activity of the firm, establishment or department in which the person is employed or to the kind of business the person operates. The following are examples of Industry/Business descriptions:—

Stock-raising, forestry and logging, fishery, biscuit making, clothes making, furniture making, brick manufacturing, pineapple canning, cotton ginning, cotton textiles, jute textiles, woollen textiles, tannery, leather products, blacksmithy, motor repairing, road making, fish retailing, boot and shoe retailing, banking, insurance, architecture, advertising, cinema, restaurants, hotels, laundries, hair-dressing, etc.

Railway transport, motor taxi service, motor cycle rikshaw service, air transport, postal services, primary school, technical school, university, Governmental medical services, private medical services, social welfare services, legal services, domestic services, armed services, etc.

The list is not comprehensive but it should indicate the variety of descriptions and the degree of precision required.

Q. 18. AGRICULTURAL STATUS? Only for persons ringed "T" in question No. 16.

Explanation.—All persons classed as Tillers in Q. 16 *must* have a ring round one or more of the numbers in this question. Explanation.—Every non-agriculturist who is economically active must be classified under one and *only one* of the above categories.

Note that the whole question concerns the main occupation given in question No. 16. Persons who employ others in their profession or business will be classed as "Employer". No one will be classed as "Employer" merely because he employs domestic servants. For example, a cook is classed as an employee in his occupation, but if he is cooking for, let us say, a civil servant, the latter will *not* be shown as an employer on that account. Similarly a Company Director for instance, although he may have power to appoint and discharge Company staff, will not be classed as "Employer", because he himself is an employee of the Company. An independent worker is his own master in his trade or business who does not employ others. An unpaid family help is a member of the family who assists directly in the trade or business of another member but receives no separate payment in cash or kind.

Explanation.—Enter the name of Subsidiary Occupation in full, or at least, in sufficient detail to ensure identification from the Main Occupation.

In order to claim "Subsidiary Occupation", a person must be following two occupations, the second being pursued in addition to or alternatively to the "Main Occupation".

This may be either a secondary source of income pursued throughout the whole year or an alternative means of livelihood adopted at times when the main occupation cannot be followed. This distinction, however, need not be recorded, and it is only necessary for the Enumerator to say what, if any, is the secondary or alternative means of livelihood of the respondent.

In rural areas the Subsidiary Occupation (if any) of cultivators will generally be one of the agricultural occupations such as poultry, bee-keeping, etc., or a cottage industry. Service on roads or in the militia may be a normal subsidiary occupation in some areas. When Cottage Industries are given as subsidiary occupation, they should be described as "Home weaving", "Home pottery making", "Home mat making", etc.

Explanation.—Include any infant born alive who may have died since.

If a woman has been married more than once the two questions should cover the whole period she remained married from the date

of her first marriage. For example a woman married for the first time and after 5 years was divorced. Some years later she remarried and her (new) husband died 10 years later, since when she has remained a widow. In this case "Total years remained wed" is $5+10=15$ years.

After filling up a Schedule for each member of the household, you should check again that no one in the household (particularly daughters-in-law) has been over-looked. Also that no one normally resident in the household is temporarily absent and expected back before the 31st of January 1961.

Progress Reports:

Carry out the enumeration of your area progressively every day. Don't leave the work to be done towards the end of the Enumeration Period. In order to ensure this, report regularly to your Supervisor in the prescribed forms regarding the percentage of the work completed on the dates shown in the Calendar. The first round of your visits to all the houses in your Block should be completed during the 1st two weeks. Then during the next three days carry out a 2nd round and enumerate the Households that might have been left out during the 1st round, and also those normal residents who were temporarily absent, but have since returned and have not been enumerated elsewhere. Two days before the last date (*i.e.*, 29th January 1961) make an announcement in your Block that persons left out may kindly report to you at an agreed place and get themselves enumerated. Continue the checking for omissions during the last two days and then on the actual Census Night (Night of the 31st January) you must make a rapid and thorough examination of the whole Block. All new arrivals, travellers, wanderers,

homeless folk and others who are found then anywhere within your area must be questioned and, if they have not been enumerated before, a slip must be prepared for each of them.

The End of the Work :

When you are sure that you have properly enumerated every person in your Block, and your last check-up has been completed as above, you should recount all your valid schedules in each Pad and check the totals which you will have recorded on the back covers thereof, showing males, females and literate persons separately. These totals on the back covers should then be added up and the grand totals recorded in your Report Sheet reproduced as a detachable form at the end of this Booklet. This Report Sheet should then be removed and handed over to your Supervisor along with the used and partially used pads of Schedules and the Supervisors receipt should be obtained in the form below:

Copy No. 1 of the Housing Census Register should also be handed over to the Supervisor at this time which should be before 3rd February 1961.

INTRODUCTION

The village is the basic unit of revenue administration and the need for basic statistics for villages is quite obvious as all planning depends on such statistics. They are also indispensable for carrying out sample surveys over limited areas and form the basis of continuous collection of statistics on different aspects of rural life and economy. The village was taken as the basic unit of enumeration if its population was 600 or it was a continuous collection of about 150 houses on an average. Where the village approximated to this size, it was constituted into a Block. A large number of villages had to be split up into a number of Blocks, but the boundaries of Census Block did not go beyond the limits of a revenue estate. All statistics pertaining to a village concerning land administration are given by "Mauza" or revenue estate and the importance of this territorial unit in our administrative set-up is unique. A "Mauza" may be defined as a parcel or parcels of land having a separate name in the revenue records and known limits. The unit of revenue administration is the revenue estate or "deh" which is usually identical with the village or "mauza". A revenue estate is a unit of area—

- (a) for which a separate record-of-rights has been made, or
- (b) which has been separately assessed to land revenue or would have been so assessed, if the land revenue had not been leased, compounded for, or redeemed, or
- (c) which the Local Government may by general rule or special order declare it to be an estate.

The Village Statistics contained in this part have been compiled from Block-wise figures contained in the Summaries prepared by the Census Supervisors and Charge Superintendents. Except for data on houses and households they are based on the results of the "Circle Sort" which was carried out in the Hand Sorting Centres after the physical counting of the individual enumeration schedules. The literacy figures, however, have been lifted from the Summaries prepared by the Supervisors and Charge Superintendents.

The plan of presentation is that for each village, the Hadbast number, its name in English and Urdu and area in acres, the total population by males and females, and the number of literates in each village has been recorded.

The last two columns pertain to number of houses, and households. This information is based on the Housing Census which was carried out in September, 1960. The data was collected in the first instance from the Summaries prepared after the Housing Census by the Charge Superintendents. These figures have been checked with the results of the Machine tabulation in the case of urban localities, but since only 10 per cent sample was taken for the villages, the data of villages has been extracted directly from the Household Summaries. The number of houses refers only to the "occupied" houses, while the number of households refers to the commensal unit the members of which live together and eat from a common kitchen. The definitions of "houses" and "households" are given in the Explanatory Note.

The "Hadbast" numbers are the numbers assigned to a revenue estate at the time of the settlement operations. They are allotted serially within the tehsil at the time of settlement. Hence the arrangement of villages in each tehsil does not follow the serial order of Hadbast numbers, but within each Patwar Circle they have been arranged serially. Where no survey and settlement operations have been carried out, this column is left blank. The area figures have been supplied by the Deputy Commissioners and are based on revenue records. Local details regarding Schools, Colleges, Post Offices, Telegraph Offices, Railway Stations, Police Stations, Rest Houses, Union Council Offices, Hospitals, Dispensaries, Electricity, Tubewells, etc., have been indicated by appropriate symbols against each village. A list of these symbols is appended. These details have been obtained from Deputy Commissioners and from the concerned Departments. The data has been presented by tehsils within each district. In each tehsil, the villages have been grouped by Field Qanungo Circles and within each Field Qanungo Circle

by Patwar Circles. The name of the Field Qanungo Circle has been separated from the text by double lines and the village in which the Patwari's headquarter is located is shown in bold print.

The Village Statistics for this district were compiled in the Hand Sorting Centre, Rawalpindi under the supervision of Mr. Bashir Ahmad Khan Assistant Director of Census, incharge of Hand Sorting Centre, Rawalpindi. After compilation, the lists were sent by the Officer-in-Charge, Hand Sorting Centre, to the Deputy Commissioner concerned for verification and completion of figures relating to "Hadbast" numbers, area and local details. After this verification, the Village Statistics were sent to my office, where they were further checked, adjusted and consolidated before publication.

A summary giving the total population of the district and distribution by sexes to the nearest thousand has been given in the beginning. Similar summaries by tehsils and by Field Qanungo Circles within each tehsil have also been added.

1. Population in the Village Statistics includes persons who claimed nationality other than Pakistani.

2. Tehsil figures include those of urban areas within its jurisdiction.

3. Figures for Municipal and Town Committees as well as other urban localities are given separately under respective Tehsils within which they are located.
















4. Household is a collection of persons living and eating in one mess with their dependents, relatives, servants and lodgers who normally reside together.

5. House is a structurally separate set of living premises, with an entrance from outside the building or from a common half way or courtyard or staircase.

6. Number of literate figures have been taken from Charge Superintendents Abstracts (Provisional results of Census published in February 1961). These may not tally with the final figures published in Part IV of District Census Report.

7. Urban Localities are grouped separately at the top of the Village Statistics of each Tehsil. The areas of Urban localities and their Hadbast numbers, being not available, have not been shown separately.
