Executive Summary

Indeed, prosperity of a nation hinges upon its tertiary education rate. This reinforces the undeniable fact that uplift of higher education sector in any country guarantees progress. In the light of its well-defined obligation and noble cause of spreading the light of higher education in Pakistan, the Higher Education Commission (HEC) is leaping ahead with its endevours focusing on a visible growth in a plethora of dimensions of tertiary education.

During 2014-15, HEC planned, initiated and accomplished various projects focusing its main concerns ranging from capacity building of existing institutions and faculty, faculty development, equitable access, quality, governance and infrastructural development to enhanced research and innovation, national and international collaboration, and development of qualified human capital.

In the Fiscal Year 2014-15, the government released Rs. 24551.344 million for execution of 192 development projects of universities and HEC, which included 15 projects for Balochistan costing Rs. 3,206.368 million.

Almost 40 per cent of HEC funds are specified for human resource development every year. Amidst a large number of initiatives, HEC formed National Scholarship Management Committee to oversee the implementation of scholarship programmes. It implemented 22 scholarship programmes of a total of 26,987 scholarships. Of which, 193 Oversees Scholarships were awarded in the said financial year, while 89 scholars returned to Pakistan after completion of their degrees. About 1530 scholars completed their PhD degrees under Overseas Scholarship Scheme for PhD in Selected Fields (Phase-I and II), while 57 scholars completed PhD under the Human Resource Development Initiative-MS Leading to PhD Programme of Faculty Development for Universities of Engineering Sciences and Technology of Pakistani Universities of Engineering and Technology. Thirty seven scholars were awarded financial support under the HEC initiative titled, 'Partial Support for PhD Studies Abroad'.

As for Indigenous Scholarships, 421 scholars completed PhD under the Indigenous PhD Fellowship for 5000 Scholars (Phase I and II). Two hundred and thirty Need-based Scholarships were granted to students apart from award of 197 scholarships under French Need-based Programme and 429 scholarships under German Need-based Programme. Likewise, 10 post-doctoral fellowships were awarded. And, a total of 25,874 students benefited from Prime Minister's Fee Reimbursement Scheme for Less Developed Areas.

Promoting a research culture in the country, HEC executed the International Research Support Programme from which 402 students benefited in the said year. Eight new Offices of Research, Innovation and Commercialisation (ORICs) and five new Business Incubation Centres (BICs) were set up in 2014-15 taking the number of already functional ORICs and BICs to 44 and 18 respectively. Thirty companies were incubated in the BICs in this period. Furthermore, 1246 research projects have been carried out since 2002 under National Research Programme for Universities. Under the University Faculty Startup Research Grant Programme, 300 research projects worth Rs. 150 million were funded. In the same direction, HEC awarded 27 HEC Outstanding Research Awards. So far, 161 awards have been conferred since 2009.

HEC follows no-compromise policy to ensure quality higher education. Among other measures for this purpose, it set up as many as 31 QECs in higher education institutions, taking the total number of QECs to 147 till June 2015. Qualitative assessment of 116 QECs was also carried out. Five more programme accreditation councils have been set up and QAA-HEC conducted 11 workshops for programme evaluators. Besides, QAA reviewed 43 MS/ MPhil and equivalent programmes of various universities in addition to 225 PhD programmes of 31 universities till June 2015.

HEC has initiated Distinguished National Professors Programme aiming to acknowledge the services of eminent professors serving in specialised fields. Following this track, 503 PhDs were placed as Assistant Professors in higher education institutions across Pakistan under the Interim Placement of Fresh PhDs Programme. Around 13,292 faculty members and university management officials have been trained by HEC in order to further build their capacity.

It is impossible to overlook the role of universities' topnotch leadership in the well-being of higher education institutions. Keeping this in view, HEC enforced Leadership Training Programme for Newly Inducted Vice Chancellors of HEIs in Pakistan, apart from holding Strategic Management Workshops for Senior Management of HEIs and implementing Indigenous On-campus Training Programme for capacity building of non-teaching staff of public sector HEIs.

Strengthening its collaborative efforts with foreign partners and establishing new academic bonds, HEC has made considerable hallmarks in the field of international collaboration. This is aimed to provide vast exposure to Pakistani faculty and students, preparing them to meet the research and technological needs of the country. HEC continued the Pak-US Science and Technology Cooperation Programme (Phase VI), under which 13 projects are currently being executed. In addition to this, three projects were approved for funding under the Pak-France PERIDOT Research Programme. HEC and British Council have also initiated bilateral cooperation programme titled Knowledge Economy Partnership. Under the initiative, 14 collaborative research projects each spanning three years have been approved after a thorough review process. The two partners have also agreed to launch HEC-BC Researcher Links Programme in order to bring together the academic community to utilise their experiences on common grounds.

Human Resource Development

Human Resource Development Division

The Human Resource Development (HRD) Division was established for management and execution of scholarship programmes at HEC. This Division is responsible for formulating policies, implementing quality processes and monitoring development projects for scholars and Universities. It also provides research grants for improvement of higher education and promotion of research culture. A total number of 22 scholarship programmes are currently being implemented by the Division with a total approved budget of Rs. 70,987.22 million for a total number of 26,987 scholarships. The major thrust of programmes is directed towards increasing the PhD faculty base. Under the Indigenous scholarship programme for Phase-I 5000 scholars are to be trained in Pakistan at the PhD level, and under Phase-II another 5000 Indigenous scholarships are to be awarded. Similarly, 4,000 scholars will be sent to overseas for PhD studies.

HEC scholarship programmes are complemented by other scholarship programmes such as USAID-funded Merit and Need Based Scholarship, US Fulbright Scholarships, 1000 Cuban Scholarships for studies in General Comprehensive Medicine, German Need Based Scholarships, French Need Based Scholarships, HEC Need Based Scholarships and Fee Reimbursement for less developed areas for MS, MPhil and PhD studies. Apart from this, HEC has taken special initiatives to hire fresh PhD holders for placement in Public and Private Sector Universities, for a period of one year. Foreign faculty is being invited to serve for a period of two weeks to one semester at Pakistani Universities on short-term and long-term basis to meet the scarcity of faculty. Also, HRD Division processes the cases for PhD Supervisors which allows them to supervise PhD students at Pakistani HEIs. HEC has also initiated the Distinguish National Professors Programme under which highly eminent researchers are selected and provided research funding.

For overseeing the implementation of most of the scholarship programmes, National Scholarship Management Committee (NSMC) has been formed. This committee has representatives from all Provinces, Planning Commission, Pakistan Atomic Energy Commission (PAEC), Industry and Ministry of Education, apart from HEC. In addition, various scholarships have their own Steering/Management committees to advise on issues related to a particular programme.

Scholarship Categories

Scholarship programmes are divided into four broad categories:

1. Overseas Scholarship Programmes

Overseas scholarships are awarded every year for MS/MPhil leading to PhD and PhD programmes. The scholars are placed in technologically advanced countries that have signed Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with HEC and Higher Education Agencies. The current schemes enhance HEC efforts for provision of an adequate number of trained PhD manpower to support technology upgrading, to develop high standards of Science and Technology, Humanities, and Business education/training in Pakistan and to meet the challenging needs of Pakistan's economy.

a. Overseas Scholarship Scheme for PhD in Selected Fields (Phase-I)

The first mega project for overseas PhD scholarships was launched by HEC in 2004 with the objective to create a pool of highly qualified human resource by offering Merit Based Scholarships to the deserving candidates in technologically advanced Universities around the world. So far, 966 scholars have been awarded with this scholarship. Following table depicts the overall progress of this project, since the time of its inception:

During the year 2014-15, total seven scholars have completed their PhD studies. The project is closed for further intake.

Achievements of Scholars

Dr. Zahid Munir completed his PhD in Micro Biology with Distinction from Medical University Vienna, Austria in January 2015. He also managed to publish two research articles in the journal "PLOS ONE". The scholar joined COMSATS University, Islamabad Campus after his return.

b. Overseas Scholarship Scheme for PhD in Selected Fields (Phase-II)

This project was launched in 2006 at a total cost of Rs.14,522.35 million to award 2000 scholarships in order to build the capacity of Universities, Research and Development Organisations and Industries in Pakistan through the addition of PhD scholars in various fields. Following table represents the overall progress of this project, since the time of its inception:



Achievements of Scholars

Mr. Muhammad Asif Khan has successfully completed his PhD within two years and four months. He defended his thesis on the topic "Adjusting Business Entities in a Globalised World: The Concept of an International Treaty Regulating Transnational Corporations against Violations of International Law". After completion of his PhD, he rejoined the University of Malakand, in the Department of Law. He aims to train more manpower in the same field to produce quality education and research within Pakistan.

Dr. Abid Mehmood Yousaf has done PhD in Physical and Industrial Pharmacy at Hanyang University of South Korea. He was bestowed with the oral presentation award for his entry "Novel Free-Flowing Fen fibrate-Gelatin Microcapsules With Improved Aqua Solubility: Preparation, Physicochemical Characterization and Pharmacokinetics in Rats" at the Spring International Convention of the Pharmaceutical Society of Korea, Osong, Chungcheongbukdo, South Korea, April 23-24, 2015.

c. Human Resource Development Initiative (HRDI)-MS Leading to PhD Programme of Faculty Development for Universities of Engineering Sciences and Technology, Pakistan (UESTP)

This project was launched in September 2007 to offer 1500 PhD scholarships in the fields of Engineering, Physical and Social Sciences. Since the initiation of this Project, 1807 candidates have been shortlisted. Out of 1807, total 730 availed the overseas scholarships and proceeded for their PhD studies in foreign Countries. So far, 151 scholars have completed their PhDs and are serving in various Higher Education Institutions.




Following pie chart depicts Country-wise Distribution of scholars who have completed PhDs in year 2014 -15:

d. Master Leading to PhD Scholarship Programme (Overseas) for the Students of Balochistan (An Initiative of the *Aghaz-e-Haqooq-e-Balochistan* Package)

The Project was launched in November 2012 with the cost of Rs. 3138.692 Million. This project was aimed to provide 200 scholarships in MS leading to PhD and PhD studies in the top-ranked Universities around the world. It provides an incentive to the talented students of Balochistan to achieve excellence in their areas of interest in several Disciplines including Arts, Languages, Social Sciences, Basic Sciences, Agriculture, Life Sciences and Engineering and Technology.

Progress of the Programme in the Year 2014-15

Under this programme, 82 candidates are provisionally selected. Out of 122, however, only seven candidates availed the scholarships. The status of the programme in year 2014-15 is as follows:

e. Partial Support for PhD Studies Abroad



This scheme provides Partial Monetary Support (one-time) up to US \$ 15,000/- in terms of tuition fee, research/study related expenses or living allowance.



Country-wise Distribution





f. HEC-USAID Fulbright Scholarship Programme Phase-II

The project aims at providing PhD/MS scholarships to scholars at reputed US universities. A Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) was signed between HEC and USAID in December 2005 according to which HEC has to contribute 35% of the total cost of PhD scholarships. 65% funds have been contributed by the USAID. The second phase of the programme was approved in December 2015, after the successful competition of Phase I. Under this programme, 816 talented students from Pakistan will get MS (550) and PhD (266) degrees from top-notch universities of USA.

2. Indigenous Scholarship Schemes

a. Indigenous PhD Fellowship for 5000 Scholars (Phase I and II)


HEC emphasises on Indigenous Scholarship Schemes to provide Fully-funded Scholarships to the locally qualified researchers. The research is expected to have direct relevance to the growth and socio-economic development of Pakistan. So far, total 5000 and 2400 Scholarships have been awarded in Phase I and Phase II of the project, respectively. This scheme also provides funds to the Universities for upgrading their research facilities particularly laboratory equipment, chemicals and IT equipment.

Progress of Phase I of the Programme during the Year 2014-15

Total 5000 scholarships were awarded as per PC-1. Out of this, 1817 scholars have completed their PhD degree and are serving Pakistan. Progress of Phase I of this programme during the year 2014-15 is as follows:

Discipline-wise Distribution of scholars who have completed their PhDs in Phase I of the programme in year 2014-15:





b. Prime Minister's Fee Reimbursement Scheme for Less Developed Areas

This scheme was approved by the Government of Pakistan in June, 2012. The evident socio-economic disparity across Pakistan highlights the fact that special measures are required to address affordability issue so that youth of economically deprived areas can also acquire benefits from higher education. Based on various studies and socio-economic indicators, various regions of Pakistan have been identified as less developed. Therefore, Government of Pakistan through Prime Minister's Tuition Fee Reimbursement Scheme attempted to create an opportunity for youth so that they can continue their higher education without any difficulty.

It was initially designed to provide financial assistant in terms of tuition fees and mandatory charges for the students of Balochistan, FATA, and Gilgit-Baltistan who are enrolled on merit in Masters/MPhil/PhD programmes in any public sector institution. The scope of the programme has been increased since 2013 and now 114 districts of Pakistan are eligible under the Scheme. On special instructions of Prime Minister, Muhammad Nawaz Sharif following areas were also included in the scheme:

- Azad Jammu Kashmir
- Malakand, Kohistan and Dera Ismail Khan (Divisions of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa)
- Attock, Mianwali, Khushab and Bhakkar (Districts of Punjab)

In the year, 2014-15 following areas of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa were also included:

- Lakki Marwat, Batagram, Torghar/Kala Dhaka, Hangu, Kohat, Bannu, Karak
- Financial Coverage of the Scheme
- Actual Tuition Fee (Masters, MS/MPhil, and PhD Programmes
- Mandatory charges include Registration Fee/Enrolment Fee, Admission Fee (for new admissions only), Examination Fee, Library Charges (non-refundable), Laboratory Charges and Research related academic activities only.

Overall Progress of the Programme

So far total 77833 students have benefited since the inception of the programme in 2012. Following table summarises the overall progress of this programme:





c. Master Leading to PhD Scholarship Programme (Indigenous) for the Students of Balochistan (An Initiative of the *Aghaz-e-Haqooq-e-Balochistan* Package)


The Project was launched in November, 2012 with the cost of Rs. 3138.692 Million. It was aimed at providing 400 MS leading to PhD degrees and PhD scholarships in different HEIs of Pakistan. It provides an incentive to the talented students of Balochistan to achieve excellence in their areas of interest in the disciplines including Arts, Languages, Social Sciences, Basic Sciences, Agriculture, Life Sciences and Engineering and Technology. This project covers tuition fees, accommodation and living expenses as well.

Progress of the Programme in the Year 2014-15


One hundred and twenty-two candidates were provisionally selected whereas only 25 candidates availed these scholarships. Moreover, orientation sessions were arranged in the Balochistan University of Information Technology, Engineering and Management Sciences (BUITEMS), Quetta, University of Loralai (UoL) and Lasbella University of Agriculture, Water and Marine Sciences (LUAWMS). Dissemination of Project related Brochures and Advertisements were also prepared which were made available to all relevant stakeholders of Balochistan. Following charts represent the district and discipline wise distribution of PhD scholars who were studying during year 2014-15 respectively:




District-wise Distribution



Discipline-wise Distribution


d. Provision of Higher Education Opportunities for Students of Balochistan and FATA (Phase-I)

The Programme was launched in 2007 with a total cost of Rs. 981.486 million. The scholarship Programme was focused on providing financial assistance to 1300 Undergraduates (4-years degree Programmes) and 700 Postgraduates (2-years degree Programmes) of Balochistan and FATA on the basis of merit in local universities. 10 PhD scholarships were intended for Journalists belonging to FATA in the foreign universities. 3. Need-Based Scholarship Schemes

Merit and Need based scholarships are focused on providing opportunities for access to higher education to underprivileged candidates who, despite possessing academic merit, are unable to finance their education. These scholarships are provided in the fields of Medical, Engineering, Social Sciences, Business and Agriculture in Public/Private Institutes across Pakistan.

a. USAID-Funded Merit and Need-Based Scholarship Programme (Phase-II)


USAID supported scholarships for meritorious but financially disadvantaged students since 2004 through the Merit and Need-Based Scholarship Programme (MNBSP) to assist the Government of Pakistan's efforts to raise enrolment in Pakistani Universities and meet International standards. USAID expanded the programme in 2013 with a total estimated cost of US\$ 23.1 million. This includes 3000 scholarships, of which 50% were targeted for females. Additional disciplines such as Social Sciences, Agriculture Sciences, Medical Sciences and Engineering were included along with 19 more Public and Private sector Institutions were became part of this programme, bringing the number of total partner universities to 30. New components of the programme built capacity of participating institutions in designing operational, financial management, monitoring and evaluation processes and fund flow mechanism for implementing MNBSP. The programme had also recently been selected to contribute to the "Let Girls Learn" initiative.


Gender-wise distribution of the awarded scholarships is as follows:

b. HEC Need-Based Scholarship Programme

HEC facilitates needy and deserving students through Need-Based Scholarship Programmes and provides fully-funded scholarships which cover tuition fee, boarding and lodging, and monthly stipend including allowances for stationary. This programme is being successfully executed in 82 public sector universities along with their campuses. So far, 18608 scholarships have been awarded to the deserving students. Noticing the success of the HEC Need-Based Programme, more donor agencies are attracted to support the deserving students.


c. German and French Need-Based Scholarship Programme

German Need-Based Scholarship Programme was launched in 2013 with the help of German Government to extend helping hand to needy students from selected Pakistani Universities. Preference was given to the students from FATA/Balochistan with special emphasis on selecting more female students. So far, total 429 students have been awarded scholarships whereas 366 students are still studying.

French Need-based Scholarship Programme is also meant to support the financially weak students from less developed areas of Pakistan. The programme was initiated in 2012 with the help of French Eembassy in Pakistan. As many as 790 students of 16 participating universities have been supported with donation from French Government. In French Need-based Programme, 606 students are still studying while 40 scholars have completed their studies.



4. Other Programmes

a. International Research Support Initiative Programme

HEC offers a research fellowship abroad to full-time PhD students to enhance quality research and support their PhD studies under International Research Support Programme (IRSIP). This scheme provides an opportunity to PhD students who are enrolled in local universities to spend six months in highly reputable and top-ranked foreign universities and conduct research. This enhances the quality of doctoral research in Pakistan and also develops linkage between Pakistani and foreign institutions. Under this programme, about 3500 PhD students have availed this opportunity. Following table shows the number of students from different universities who have been awarded this scholarship:





Discipline-wise distribution of scholars who have been awarded research support in the year 2014-15:





b. Post Doctorate Fellowship Programme


Since the last few years, universities in Pakistan are focusing on imparting education in critical areas to meet technical manpower needs of the country. To achieve this objective, it is essential that the universities and other institutions should be well equipped with highly qualified and experienced faculty so that faculty can be able to supervise more PhDs within the country. For this, it is essential to send our university faculty abroad for post-doctoral research to enable them to update their knowledge and skills in selective fields. So far, total 631 post doctorate fellowships have been awarded in various disciplines. Around 615 scholars have completed their studies whereas 36 scholars are still pursuing their degrees.

Discipline-wise Distribution





c. Interim Placement of Fresh PhDs (IPFP)

In order to engage the freshly qualified PhDs, an Interim Placement of fresh PhDs Programme was launched in 2009. The purpose was to assist fresh PhDs to start their activities at HEIs of Pakistan without any delay. IPFP underlines a two-pronged approach. Primarily, it provides lucrative avenues of employment to fresh PhD professionals and, in turn, develops the faculty of public and private sector universities/DAIs to ensure quality teaching and research. The programme provides all Pakistani fresh PhD scholars an opportunity to be placed as Assistant Professor on a Tenure Track based System (TTS) for a maximum period of one year with an agreement with institutions to offer them TTS or regular position after the completion of terms under IPFP. So far, overall 2291 PhD scholars availed the IPFP and severed in Pakistani HEIs.

Progress of the Programme in the Year 2014-15

d. Recognising Approved Supervisors for PhD Students

Doctoral education aims to cultivate research skills and knowledge necessary to undertake independent studies. In pursuing PhD, supervisers play an important role by mentoring students about research trends and guiding their academic careers in general. HEC Approved Supervisors Programme aims to assist PhD students in this regard by pairing them with qualified and experienced faculty members of HEC recognised universities, degree-awarding institutions and R&D organisations. HEC has devised the criteria to allow faculty members to supervise MS/MPhil and PhD students. Status of approved supervisor is effective for a period of three years initially which is extendible to another term of three years, if supervisor fulfils the criteria.

Since 2003, HEC has approved 7750 supervisors in various disciplines. Selection criteria has been revised in 2013. After revision, 520 PhDs were selected as approved supervisers.

Progress of the Programme in the Year 2014-15

During the year 2014-15, 190 PhDs were selected as approved supervisors to provide supervision to PhD scholars.

e. HEC Distinguished National Professors Programme

HEC initiated HEC Distinguished National Professors Programme in the year 2003 with an aim to recognise services of eminent professors/scientists who have been working in their specialised fields with dedication. A total of 45 Distinguished National Professors have been selected by HEC since the commencement of this programme. The professors are engaged in teaching and research in public sector institutions.

Progress of the Programme in the Year 2014-15

In the year 2014-15, a total of 126 applications were received; 76 applications were from Natural and Basic Sciences discipline and 50 applications were from Social Sciences discipline. Four professors were awarded Distinguished National Professors Awards.

f. Visiting Foreign Faculty Programme

This programme was initiated to invite foreign faculty from reputed universities from overseas to share their expertise and knowledge with local faculty and postgraduate students. The Programme also conducted workshops, seminars and symposiums at host institutions. The programmes also provided guidance to the postgraduate students for their research work. The foreign faculty can be invited for a period of two to maximum of 16 weeks. The faculty can also spend one full semester and teach advanced level courses to graduating students.

Research and Development

Research and Development


The economic development of a country is directly linked to research and development. Therefore, both the academia and industry need to play their part in producing quality research and commercialising it.

Research and Development Division (R&D) of the Higher Education Commission (HEC) executes programmes and projects which ensure sustainable and progressive research culture. R&D Division adopts a wholesome approach for development through research, which ranges in objectives from personal development to strengthening of universities. The desired goals can be achieved by the development of research incubators, by capacity development of human resource, and also by exposure of faculty and researchers to international academia by establishing university-to-university linkages.

HEC aims to develop a research culture in Pakistan, which will lead to economic prosperity, national well-being and expansion of research. For this purpose, HEC has several initiatives for the promotion of quality research, via, Research Grants, Resource Grants, Travel Grants, Industrial Liasion, Enhanced IT infrastructure, and Digital Resources. These initiatives will lead to a boost in research activities of both public and private universities.


National Research Programme for Universities (NRPU)


The National Research Programme for Universities (NRPU) is a platform, which provides modest grants to catalyse research. The vision behind this programme is to enhance the capacity of researchers to undertake bigger initiatives, which address the local demands. NRPU, research grants are awarded on merit for high-level and promising scientific research projects to be carried out in Pakistan by university teachers.



During FY 2014-15, a total of 3025 research projects were processed (1779 research proposals were received and 1246 research projects were carried forward from 2002-14), 189 research projects were approved for funding and 435 research projects were rejected after evaluation. In addition, 1155 research proposals are in the evaluation phase. A total amount of Rs. 701.86 million was provided to different universities of Pakistan through NPRU research grants during the financial year 2014-15.

Ever since inception of the programme, highest numbers of research proposals were received during 2014-15. An overall comparative analysis of research proposals received under NRPU is as follows:

Establishment of ORIC 2014-15



A twelve day overseas Training cum exposure visit was organised by the TESP-HEC on "Managing & Facilitating Research in HEIs" for Managers and HRs of the Offices of Research Innovation and Commercialisation (ORIC). The Training was conducted by the AIT Extension Bangkok: 21 participants from different universities across the country have participated.
- Under the provision of HEC, 3rd Annual Entrepreneurship Conference 2014 "Learn, Create, Lead" was held on November 15, 2014 at Jinnah Convention Centre, Islamabad. People from all across Pakistan, participated in this conference and pledged to rebuild Pakistan through the strength of entrepreneurship. HEC chairperson, along with ORIC team also participated in the conference.
- One Day Session on 'Internal Compliance Procedures' was conducted on May 18, 2015 at Forman Christian College, Lahore. Directors and Managers ORIC, from KPK, and Punjab participated in this workshop.
- Doctoral Capacity Building Programme, University College London Institute of Education, UK together with the Association of Commonwealth Universities is working in key partnership with
 the Higher Education Commission, Pakistan and the British Council, Pakistan to embed excellent
 doctoral programmes in several new public sector universities in Pakistan, and to strengthen other
 existing programmes. In this regard, three-day workshop was organised from May 12-14, 2015.
 Total 28 Participants from 13 universities participated in this workshop.

Workshops on Intellectual Property Rights

- In Phase III, reprentatives of five ORICs from regional universities (One from each region; Punjab, Sindh, KPK, Balochistan and AJK) visited USA in October 2014 to attend 'Training for New ORIC Group'.
- To take all the participants of said workshops onboard, to reassess and to determine next steps for technical assistant, a meeting of stakeholders was held at HEC on December 15-16, 2014. As a result of this effective collaboration, five universities have been able to develop and finalise their own IP policy while rest are in process.

ORIC Policy and Third Party Validation

World Bank conducted Third Party Validation (TPV). Out of 13 ORIC, nine were awarded W-Category. TPV report has been circulated to all notified ORIC to improve their performance. New ORIC policy has been disseminated to all notified ORIC for the implementation with the prior approval of Chairman HEC.

HEC Outstanding Research Awards

This programme aims to acknowledge the high performance of the Pakistani faculty and researchers. It promotes a competitive research culture in higher education and R&D institutions. So far 161 awards have been conferred in five award ceremonies since 2009. Under the programme, applications are invited from researchers/scholars all over Pakistan in 5 categories for specified number of awards against each.

Pak-France PERIDOT Research Programme

PERIDOT is the Franco-Pakistani Hubert Curien Partnership (PHC). It is implemented in Pakistan by the Higher Education Commission (HEC) and in France, by the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and International Development (MAEDI) and the Ministry of Higher Education and Research (MESR). The objective of this programme is to develop new scientific and technological cooperation between French and Pakistan's higher education institutions and research laboratories by supporting the mobility of researchers.

Pakistan Programme for Collaborative Research (PPCR)

Pakistan Programme for Collaborative Research allows university faculty working in Pakistan to go abroad, or researchers from technologically advanced countries to come to Pakistan. Preference is given to faculty members visiting foreign institutions that have recognised excellence in the relevant research area. Visits can last from one to four weeks while time period can be extended to more than four months in case of sabbaticals and are limited to one person (the visiting fellow) visit to an institute/department in the host institution. The visiting fellow and a person from the host institution (the host) are co-applicants of the proposal. The basic aim of this funding, which is open to all fields of research, is to initiate or to consolidate international collaborations. To reach this aim, short research activity between the host institution and the visiting fellow should be carried out during the stay. Preference will be given to activities that will support:

- Submission of papers to peer-reviewed scientific journals (co-authored by the visiting fellow and the host). The paper must be an effort of the joint research work being carried out by the applicants.
- Preparation of joint research proposals to be submitted for funding bodies. There must be previous communication with the applicant on the matter.
- Training for lab techniques in Pakistan for postgraduate students.

- Scientific or academic sabbatical for Pakistani faculty.
- Curriculum review by the international experts invited by Pakistani universities and/or HEC.
- Academic consultancy to review processes and procedures in the universities and/or HEC.

Patent Filing

Keeping in view the importance of patent filing HEC in July 2006 developed a programme through which research ideas, published papers or whatever ready to describe potential invention is evaluated for patentability. In case an invention is determined to be patentable, the inventor will be encouraged to file for an international patent.

- During this financial year, 30 applications/requests were entertained, 13 cases were filed at United States Patent and Trademark Office, USA.
- 07 filed cases were granted patent rights by USPTO, USA.
- US\$65,000/- paid to Pharmaceutical Scientist Inc. USA on account of filing patent applications.

Access to Scientific Instrumentation

In view of the high cost of acquiring and recurring maintenance of scientific equipment, HEC has initiated this programme which encourages sharing of scientific instrumentation facilities with students researchers/scholars. This initiative would enable the scientific community/scholars to have access to sophisticated equipment, and the use of the equipment would also serve as a source of funding for the institutions which make their instruments available to researchers.




Establishment of Business Incubation Centres (BICs) at Public Sector Universities

Business Incubation is a business support process that accelerates the development of start-up companies by providing new entrepreneurs with an array of targeted resources and support services. Incubators support university graduates and students to be entrepreneurs and provide them jobs. BIC team with their management skills and mentoring/consultancy from university faculty as well as from business mentors help young entrepreneurs to refine their ideas and products and launch successful ventures. This project supports establishment of BICs in Public Sector Universities by provision of setup cost and allied expenses.

During 2014-15, five new Business Incubation Centres were established at University of Gujrat, Gomal University D. I. Khan, University of Azad Jammu & Kashmir, NED University of Engineering and Technology Karachi and Karakoram Intl University Gilgit. Under HEC-ILO collaborative programme for capacity building of Business development Services staff, a training of trainers of 14 partner

Universities/Organisations, with the ILO foreign expert, was conducted at FJWU Resource Centre Murree. Another two day session was arranged with the capital provider like First Women Bank, Akhuwat Foundation and Prime Minister Youth Loan programms for meeting the financial needs of startups.





University Faculty Start-up Research Grant Programme

The Start-up Research Grant Programme (SRGP) is designed to assist the fresh PhD holders to establish research facilities upon joining higher education institutions as faculty members. The programme enables the newly appointed PhD faculty to setup basic research infrastructure for starting research activities without any delay. It helps to engage both the faculty and students in research through provision of financial assistance and basic lab/experimental facilities. During 2014-15, 300 research projects with the funding of Rs. 150 million have been granted under this project.

HEC Library

HEC Library is meeting information needs of all HEC employees, researchers, scholars, faculty members and students of Islamabad and vicinity by providing access to both digital and printed content. By using an integrated library management software Koha, and User friendly Online Public

Access Catalogue (OPAC), fully automated library is also accessible through LAN server for help of the user to search library material. Library also encourages reference queries by its front desk services.

PAK-US Science and Technology Cooperation Programme

The Pakistan-US Science and Technology Cooperation Programme is being implemented on the US side by the National Academies of Sciences and on the Pakistan side by Higher Education Commission. Both sides contribute funds to support the programme and conduct parallel peer review processes under which all grant proposals are evaluated. The basic goal of the programme is to improve the quality of research and to practically implement research based strategies in market for the well-being of ordinary people. To facilitate the purpose, this programme offers grants to U.S. and Pakistani researchers to collaborate on projects that facilitate capacity building in science, technology, and research at Pakistani universities and institutes.

So far, seven phases of the programme have been launched under which a very good number of quality research proposals have received funding.



Social Integration Outreach Programme

This specific programme is designed to encourage universities /HEl's to integrate their research and teaching activities with the local market through community engagement. Through this programme HEls/Universities will provide a platform to the local community in their periphery for the identification of problems and presentation of their solutions.

Each year, HEC selects a specific theme and floats a call for proposals. During the first year of its execution (Fiscal Year 2014-15), the theme was 'Health & Hygiene (awareness on Hepatitis, Dengue, Polio & Tuberculosis & Energy Saving)', in response to which total fifty-two projects were submitted, out of which 19 projects were approved for the execution period of 03 months. The total cost of the approved projects for the Fiscal Year 2014-15 is Rs. 7.31 Million, with equal contribution from the relevant host universities.

Knowledge Economy Partnership

The Higher Education Commission of Pakistan and the British Council initiated this bilateral cooperation programme during the Fiscal Year 2014-15. The objective of this programme is to

reinforce existing cooperation between HEC and the British Council in the field of higher education and research.

Under this programme, 14 collaborative research projects each for execution period of three years have been awarded after a thorough review process. During the current Fiscal Year, 1st year installment, amounting to Rs. 24.44 Million has been released.

HEC-BC Researcher Links Programme

During the Fiscal Year 2014-15, the 'HEC-BC Research Links Programme', was approved under an agreement between Higher Education Commission and the British Council. The purpose of the programme is to bring together the academic community for utilising common ground. This initiative also provides a platform for early career researchers.


This programme comprises of thematic workshops and travel grants to be co-funded by Higher Education Commission and British Council. Under this programme, a proposal of five workshops has been approved, and for the completion of this activity a total amount of Rs. 11.516 Million have been released by HEC.

Quality Assurance Agency

Quality Assurance Agency (QAA)

To ensure the academic quality at Higher Education Institutes (HEIs), Quality Assurance Agency operates in two domains of Internal Quality Assurance (IQA) and External Quality Assurance (EQA). Under the domain of Internal Quality Insurance, QAA-HEC not only enables HEIs to assess their academic programmes/institutes themselves, but also prepares them for external evaluation. On the other hand, the basic aim of External Quality Assurance (EQA) is to reinforce the objectives of IQA. The working of this section includes both Institute Level Review and Programme Level Review.

The Institute Level Review is a group of activities that covers evaluation of an HEI from all aspects including quality and governance. For the purpose, the section plans and administers the activities with respect to Institutes' Performance Evaluation (IPE) against 11 defined standards of IPE, after every five years. A panel nominated by QAA-HEC conducts visits and collects data from the focused HEIs in the form of the University Portfolio Report [UPR]. On the basis of the collected data, section evaluates HEIs against the defined standards and reports.



For the Programme Level Review, separate sections for undergraduate, MS/MPhil and PhD level programmes work to ensure compliance of HEC's minimum criteria for these programmes and enhance their quality to make them internationally compatible. This section ensures that all the undergraduate level programmes of HEIs are accredited by their respective Accreditation Councils. For the purpose, this section administers activities related to establishment of new Accreditation Councils, coordinates with the existing councils, assesses the performance of Accreditation Councils and take initiatives for their capacity building. Also, it plans and supervises activities related to conducting periodic review visits (after three years) of all DAIs that are offering postgraduate level programmes, as per the defined review process. It is pertinent to mention here that the process of evaluation is performed comprehensively and on occasional basis. Following is the overview of different sections working under the umbrella of Quality Assurance Agency (QAA).

A. Internal Quality Assurance

The Quality Assurance Agency strategised its Internal Quality Assurance Policy (IQA) in 2006. Under this policy, HEIs are required to establish a separate section/department within the organisation, which is directly reporting to the Vice Chancellor. Formerly, these sections/departments were called Quality Enhancement Cells (QEC). Later on, these cells were renamed as Quality Assurance Directorates (QAD). The basic aim of Internal Quality Assurance is to make certain the establishment of Quality Assurance Directorates (QAD) and the implementation of IQA mechanism in all HEC recognised HEIs of Pakistan. This is done by administrating the activities related to the formation of Quality Enhancement Cells (QEC) and monitoring the process of IQA. Several periodic Progress Review Meetings and Monitoring Visits are conducted. Though Quality Assurance Cells/Directorates work under the administrative control of Vice Chancellors, QAA-HEC gives the operational guidelines in the form of Self-Assessment Manual and other parameters as mentioned in score card.

The quality of IQA in an HEI is measured quantitatively by using a score card. In the beginning, assessment was done biannually. Since assessment year 2013-14, it is done on annual basis. Each year, the assessment period starts from 1st July and ends on 30th June of the next year. The assessment is rated in terms of percentage and reflected in the form of four quality levels/grades i.e. W, X, Y, Z. A good IQA mechanism is an HEI infers that it is ready for external evaluations by QAA-HEC, Accreditation Councils or any third party.

Furthermore, quantitative assessment of 116 QECs was also completed. On the basis of the results, a descriptive analysis against all the parameters of Score Cards was completed for the guidance of stakeholders.

The salient indicators are given below:

- I. Number of HEIs undertaken for Quantitative Assessment till June 2015: 116
- ii. Out of 110 HEIs assessed quantitatively, 73% fall within satisfactory range of W & X.

d. Reviewing and Updating the IQA Criteria and Standards in the Light of Implementation Feedback:

I. Due to the lack of staff, the IQA criteria and standards could not be reviewed. However, the procedures for recording/maintaining data with respect to Self-Assessment at HEIs and data flow from HEIs to QAA-HEC were upgraded and records were maintained accordingly. Efforts aimed at incorporating and strengthening IQA mechanism in HEIs facilitate the process of External Quality Assurance (EQA). Due to the awareness created through IQA activities, HEIs fulfil the criteria and EQA teams come up with least observations when they visit HEIs for Programme or Institute Level Reviews.

Though IQA strategy has been very useful in assuring and enhancing the standard of education in Pakistan, it could be useless without any external check. Therefore, to re-ensure the national objectivity, QAA-HEC also conducts external reviews at both Institute and Programme Levels.

B. External Quality Assurance

The Quality Assurance Agency, Higher Education Commission, Pakistan (QAA-HEC) terms all those activities which are performed to ensure national objectivity of quality education occasionally through external teams as "External Quality Assurance (EQA)". Although, EQA is a planned external mechanism and is conducted on both Institute and Programme Level, it is not as continuous as IQA. QAA-HEC establishes Programme Accreditation Councils to conduct extensive job of assuring quality standards at Programme Level. Also, QAA-HEC undertakes responsibility to build and enhance accreditation capacity of these councils.

B.1 Programme Accreditation Councils

The Programme Accreditation Councils are set up as an accreditation authority to periodically evaluate, scrutinise and monitor the quality standards followed and offered in different Degree Awarding Institutions (DAIs) and their affiliated colleges.

The Higher Education Commission established five Programme Accreditation Councils in the areas of Agriculture, Business, Computing, Teacher and Technology Education. The prime objective of these councils is to standardise the quality of programmes which are being offered by universities. HEC is also establishing two more Accreditation Councils in the areas of Life Sciences and Allied Health Sciences.

Before the inception of HEC, nine accreditation councils were established under a parliamentary act namely; Pakistan Council for Architects and Town Planners (PCATP), Pakistan Bar Council (PBC), Pakistan Engineering Council (PEC), Pakistan Medical and Dental Council (PM&DC), Pakistan Nursing Council (PNC), Pakistan Veterinary Medical Council (PVMC), National Council for Tibb (NCT), Pharmacy Council of Pakistan (PCP) and National Council for Homeopathy (NCH).

HEC Funds Workshops/Trainings of Programme Evaluators: QAA-HEC conducted 11 workshops of Pakistan Engineering Council (PEC), National Accreditation Council for Teacher Education (NACTE), National Business Education Accreditation Council (NBEAC), National Agriculture Education Accreditation Council (NAEAC), National Computing Education Accreditation Council (NCEAC) and Pakistan Council of Architects and Town Planners (PCATP) in collaboration with the respective councils at Islamabad. Each workshop was conducted for a duration of three days. The objective of these workshops was to train maximum of 30 selected assessors/evaluators representing different universities across the country and enhance their skills to undertake accreditation inspection according to the set criteria of the respective council.

PEC conducted a three day training workshop for their Programme Evaluators on March 3-5, 2015. Dr. Kai Sang Lock from Singapore was Resource Person and hundred evaluators got training through the workshop.

Parent Alert: QAA publishes a "Parent Alert" in all major newspapers before the start of new admissions in all leading newspapers of Pakistan, twice a year. The Alert advises the parents and students to take admission in those Institutions and Programmes that are accredited by the respective councils. Similarly, Programme Accreditation Councils also publicise list of accredited programmes in leading newspapers for the awareness of public at large.

Signing Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with Programme Accreditation Councils:

HEC signed MoU with Pakistan Engineering Council on 15th May, 2015. Mostly, these Accreditation Councils have been mandated to accredit academic programmes of graduate level (16 years of education). QAA HEC, itself reviews all the post graduate level programmes. The detailed report is as follows:

B.2 MS/MPhil and Equivalent Programme Review

The QAA-HEC has the mandate to ensure and enhance quality of higher education by devising viable strategies. Considering the importance of implementing External Quality Assurance Mechanism, QAA-HEC has established Accreditation Councils for the quality assurance of undergraduate qualification in different disciplines and initiated PhD Programme Review Process for quality assurance of doctoral qualifications.

Due to mushroom growth of Degree Awarding Institutions (DAIs) and increasing demand of higher qualification, almost all the DAIs and their Constituent/Affiliated Institutions have started MS/MPhil, and equivalent programmes. Since, Quality Assurance Mechanism has not been developed, these degrees are being awarded without passing through any External Quality Assurance Mechanism.

Considering the importance of this issue, QAA-HEC, on the directives of Chairman HEC, developed a process to review the MS/MPhil and Equivalent Degree Programmes in December, 2014. The MS/MPhil and Equivalent Programme Review Process is being designed, based upon the successfully implemented PhD Programme Review Process.

The MS/MPhil and Equivalent Degree Programme Review Process of four universities was completed up to June 2015 on the basis of data provided by DAIs, in which 43 MS/MPhil and Equivalent Programmes were reviewed by the MS/MPhil and Equivalent Programme Review Committees. The Committees, after reviewing the date, instructed DAIs to stop further intake in 26 programmes for non-adherence of minimum quality criteria defined by HEC.

B.3 PhD Programme Review

HEC took an initiative of starting PhD Progress Review Process to ensure the quality of Doctorate Level Education. The PhD Review Committee has so far completed three cycles to assess the programmes at PhD level in 2005, 2007 and 2012 throughout the institutions of the country.

Considering the importance of External Quality Assurance Mechanism for PhD Programmes, QAA-HEC revised the entire review process. The fourth cycle of the PhD Programme Review visits is in process. The newly designed checklist has been circulated to all the DAIs that are offering PhD Programmes for gathering data pertaining to PhD scholars.

The PhD Programme Review process of 225 PhD programmes of 31 universities was completed till June, 2015 on the basis of data provided by DAIs. The Review Committee instructed institutions to stop further intake in 31 PhD programmes and halted proceedings of 11 PhD Programmes that were not meeting the minimum criteria laid down by HEC.

Later, the Review Committee revisited some of these universities and withdrew the bar on further intake from programmes that fulfilled the HEC criteria. Core functions in any organization cannot perform well unless surrounding environment created by the support activities is fertile. Similarly, even an excellent Internal Quality Assurance cannot produce the desired results unless it is reinforced. The Institutional Performance Evaluation is that reinforcing function, which is performed by QAA-HEC. It is an umbrella activity that assures the conducive ability of a university / HEI in favour of its core functions. The detailed introduction and progress done during the reporting year follows:

B.4 Institutional Performance Evaluation (IPE)

B.4.1 Introduction

HEC has taken a significant initiative of performance based Institutional recognition and started with primary step of outlining the Performance Evaluation Standards for the HEIs to be used for the purpose. A total of 11 standards are defined and each one of these articulates a specific dimension of the institutional quality. Thus, all the 11 standards are equally important to be met by the HEIs to achieve the recognition status as a certification to quality provision in higher education. B.4.2 Objective

Quality has remained at the top of the agenda in all HEC Medium Term Development Frameworks. The goal has ultimately been to develop and implement high standards of quality across all university activities in order to make it compatible with the rest of the world. Compliance to these standards will not only improve the overall system of governance and quality of the teaching but also it will make tremendous contribution in the student learning experience as a whole.

B.4.3. Achievements

During this fiscal Year 2014-15, as many as 11 Higher Education Institutions (HEIs) have been evaluated by QAA. Beside these IPE review visits, several review visits of HEIs have been made during this fiscal year in order to review the Governance and Quality system and structure of these institutions as part of IPE.

Academics

Academics

The Academics Division of Higher Education Commission establishes and supports programmes aimed at encouraging a learning culture in higher education institutions of Pakistan. It assists researchers and academicians in bridging the gap in academia and R&D sector of the country through:

- Promotion of research
- Faculty development
- International collaboration
- Extracurricular activities
- Curriculum Revision & Circulation

1) Promotion of Research

A. Development of Social Sciences in Pakistan:

Social Sciences Section was established in FY 2005-06 under the aegis of Academics Division, HEC. The section was vested with a responsibility to foster research and innovation in Social Sciences fields and mobilise necessary knowledge to address indigenous social issues for socio-economic development of the country. Since its inception, the Social Sciences Section embarked upon an agenda of initiating plans for social transformation by building knowledge and expertise on key social and cultural issues and encouraging Social Scientists and researchers in carrying out meaningful research for national benefit. These objectives are achieved through a diverse array of initiatives. A snapshot of the initiatives is presented as under:

i. Recognition of Research Journals (Social Sciences, Arts, Humanities and Business Education):

Social Sciences Section is shouldered with a responsibility of providing a springboard for promotion of Social Sciences research journals across the disciplines of Social Sciences, Arts & Humanities and Business Education. In this connection, the section deals with cases relating to evaluation, recognition, funding and upgradation of research journals. A total of **131** National Research Journals have been recognised and funded since 2005-2006.

vi. Annual Social Sciences Conference:

An International Social Sciences Conference is held annually by the Social Sciences Section with an aim to promote research culture in Pakistan. Three International Social Sciences Conferences were organised in the 2011, 2013 and 2015 respectively.

B. Thematic Research Grant Programme

Thematic Research Grant Programme (TRGP) was initiated through Social Sciences & Humanities Research Council of Pakistan (SSHRCP), Higher Education Commission in 2009 to address the prevailing issues of the country. Seasoned scholars from academia having an enriched research background apply for this grants under various themes pertaining to Social Sciences and Humanities disciplines. HEC provides research grants up to a maximum of Rs. 10 million against research projects. Grants are awarded for a period of one year in two biannual installments. Details of the projects awarded and grants allocated to the TRGP projects are as under:

i. Impact of HEC's Social Sciences Development Initiative:

The HEC's Social Sciences initiative of supporting the local research journals has provided a viable platform to the seasoned as well as budding researchers of Pakistan to publish their quality research work which is well geared to the issues of the of Pakistani society. The verification of publications of faculty for BPS/TTS appointments has furthered the objective of HEC for ensuring meritocracy. Cost free research Training workshops, TRGP grants are building the research capacity of both the PhD students as well as faculty. The Editors training workshops is also developing the skills of editors in modern methodologies of editing. The International Social Science Conferences on the themes of national interest and concern has provided a forum for the social scientists to extrapolate and deliberate upon those issues with the aim to identify potential solutions.

C. Institutional Strengthening and Up-gradation of Laboratories and Libraries:

The objective of this programme is to support and strengthen higher education institutions by giving grants up to one million (maximum) for up-gradation of their laboratories and libraries through purchase of small to medium sized scientific equipment, library material, consumables and glassware etc. A total of 30 proposals were funded in different universities of country during 2014-15. i. Civil Awards:

The nominations for the Civil Awards were invited on the prescribed proforma from all public and private sector universities/ DAIs. Nominations received from the different universities/DAIs were consolidated and placed under following categories.

- a. Social Sciences, Humanities and Business Education.
- b. Arts, Design and Architecture
- c. Natural, Basic and Applied Sciences including Engineering, Medicines, Agriculture etc.
- d. University Managerial and Administrative Personnel (including Vice Chancellors, Registrars, Controller of Examinations, Directors etc.)

After detailed consideration and keeping in view the excellent contribution and outstanding position in the relevant field, the Committee recommended 18 academicians for various Civil Awards to Cabinet Division under the categories from which the most of the HEC nominees were selected for the Civil Award 2015 and will be awarded on August 14, 2015.

ii. Best University Teacher Awards:

The Best University Teacher Award Scheme was commenced with the aim to recognise the relentless efforts of Faculty Members of Universities. The HEC's project "Best University Teachers Award" under which every year, outstanding university teachers are conferred upon an award comprising a cash prize of Rs. 100,000/- each and a certificate for their outstanding contribution.

For the year 2012-2013, the ceremony was held on December 23, 2014. Mian Riaz Hussain Pirzada Federal Minister for Inter Provisional Coordination was the Chief Guest on this occasion. HEC conferred 45 awards upon teachers from public and private sector universities.

vi. Foreign Students Admission

Academics Division encourages and facilitates admissions of foreign students as well as Pakistanorigin dual nationality holders settled abroad in universities/ DAIs of Pakistan. It also aims at creating goodwill of our country with foreign world and to earn foreign exchange for country.

a) Admission of foreign students in the discipline of MBBS, BDS Pharm-D and Engineering under Self Finance Scheme (Professional Stream)

The Higher Education Commission is processing the admission of foreign students under Self Finance Scheme against reserved seats in the disciplines of MBBS, BDS, Pharm-D and Engineering in different universities of Pakistan. Under professional stream in the year 2013-14, placements were made against 365 seats available for MBBS, BDS, Pharm-D and Engineering Disciplines.

b) Admission of Foreign Students (General Stream)

Under the General Stream, foreign students apply for admission directly to the desired universities/institutions. The HEC issues NOC/endorses the admission in order to confirm the authenticity of university/ institution and to facilitate the foreign students in getting study visa. About 1650 NOCs were issued to foreign nationals under General Stream during 2014-15.

4) Extra-curricular Activities

I. All Pakistan Inter-university Declamation Contest for Award of "Allama Iqbal Shield"

The Higher Education Commission organises All Pakistan Inter-University Declamation Contest for Award of "Allama Iqbal Shield" as a regular annual activity to:

- Promote national integration, communication skills and critical thinking among the students.
- Encourage tolerance, non-violence, and respect for others point of view.
- Enhance understanding of socio-economic and political issues among students of various regions of Pakistan.
- Divert energies of students towards healthy activities and creative thinking.

The contest is first organised at the universities level wherein students from all the departments of all public and private universities and constituent colleges take part. Second round is organised at regional level in Karachi, Lahore, Quetta, Peshawar and Islamabad (for Federal, AJK, FATA/ Gilgit-Baltistan, Universities).

During the year 2014-15, final round of 17th All Pakistan Inter-University Declamation Contest for Award of Allama Iqbal Shield held on May 27, 2015. Justice (R) Nasira Javaid Iqbal was the chief guest on the occasion. Cash prizes and Allama Iqbal Shield to the winners of Inter-University Declamation Contest.

Mr. Khushal Khan from National Defence University, Islamabad won the Shield in English Contest and Shehzadi Kanwal won the Shield for Federal Urdu University Karachi. They both bagged first prizes comprising a cash of Rs.60,000/- for their achievement.

5) Curriculum Revision/Adoption and Implementation

The curriculum, with varying definitions, is said to be a plan of the teaching-learning process that students of an academic programme are required to undergo. It includes objectives and learning outcomes, course contents, scheme of studies, teaching methodologies and methods of assessment of learning. Since knowledge in all disciplines and fields is expanding at a fast pace and new disciplines are also emerging; it is imperative that curricula be developed and revised accordingly.

University Grants Commission (UGC) was designated as the competent authority to develop, review and revise curricula beyond Class-XII vide Section 3, Sub-Section 2 (ii), Act of Parliament No. X of 1976 titled "Supervision of Curricula and Textbooks and Maintenance of Standard of Education". With the repeal of UGC Act, the same function was assigned to HEC under its Ordinance 2002, Section 10, Sub-Section 1 (v).

During the year, 13 curricula of various disciplines were revised/ developed by the respective NCRCs:

i. Circulation of Developed curricula for implementation

The circulation of developed curricula to universities and DAIs of Pakistan for adoption is also a major part of Curriculum Division mandate. Purposefully developed Questionnaire is used to collect the data about implementation status of each curriculum which is distributed along with printed curricula. Following curricula were circulated to universities/Degree Awarding Institutes for implementation: During the year 2014-15 about 13 curricula were circulated to more than 150 private/ public sector universities/DAIs for adoption and implementation.

Planning and Development

Planning and Development Division

The Planning and Development Division (P&D), HEC is responsible for identifying, studying and evaluating policies, procedures, priorities and proposals in planning or in the development of innovative educational programmes. P&D coordinates with ministries in connection with planning, designing, developing and proposing special projects and studies for nationwide application. It participates in review and recommendation of planning and development projects for funds for developing innovative projects and evaluating data for possible use in planning and development. The main objectives of all these activities are: strengthening of infrastructure in the higher education institutions, improving access to education and developing research facilities.

During the year 2014-15, there were 193 (138 on-going and 55 new un-approved) projects. The proposals (PC-Is) of 38 projects were submitted to Planning Commission for approval, out of which, 37 projects (including 5 revised projects) were approved by the respective forums Executive Committee of the National Economic Council (ECNEC) and Central Development Working Party (CDWP) in various meetings.



AIT, Thailand Advanced Training for FPDP Alumni (LI)


A Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) was signed between HEC and AIT Extension to train MT-FPDP alumni selected by HEC and equip them to further conduct training sessions in their respective HEIs. As a reward, alumni get the advanced training in AIT Thailand titled Ensuring Training Effectiveness.

As per MoU, every year up to three batches consisting of 25 participants will be sent to AIT Extension for this training. In this fiscal year, the sixth batch completed its training from March 21 to April 10, 2015 certifying 24 MT FPDP Alumni.

- Over all 145 Master Trainers and HEC Officers completed their trainings in six batches.
- The basic aim of this programme was to train these MTs in further advanced areas/modules like: HRD and Organization, Needs Analysis/Assessment (NA), Training Design and Methods, Leadership and Teambuilding, Training Evaluation and Monitoring, Quality Assurance and Result-based Management (RBM) etc. so that they can successfully arrange, plan and conduct training and continuous professional development activities for their HEI's faculty and management.
- The participants of this training programme were alumni of Master Trainers-Faculty Professional Development Programme (MT-FPDP), who were already HEC Certified Trainers. This specific training will help them to become effective training managers and they will serve as liaison to coordinate training activities between HEC and their respective HEIs.
- During the course, the trainees got the opportunity to get in-depth skill enhancement orientation from world renowned experts which in return added value for each of the Master Trainer.
- During the training session, participants were divided into six groups according to their
 preferences. Division of participants into different areas was based on the training areas which
 were covered during the training. Each group worked on its respective area throughout the
 training and presented on the final day. The presentations were evaluated by the external
 evaluators.
- The final course evaluation was conducted under the supervision of the HEC and AIT representatives. It is important to mention that throughout the training the AIT staff got the online evaluation pro forma filled by the participants, which was a good exercise.

Pictorial View (6th AIT Batch)






Continuous Professional Development Seminars/Workshops

Since its inception, the ELTR project is working with dynamism to renovate and improvise the standards of English Language Teaching to bring them at par with academically advanced countries. The project accommodates the English Language Teaching faculty of public sector Higher Education Institutes across the country. The ELTR encompasses fecund components for capacity building of ELT faculty like Indigenous Scholarships and Continuous Professional Development (CPD) courses. The scope of this project is not restricted to it; this project will strengthen the English departments of public sector varsities. Establishment of Self Access Centre (SAC) is another exclusive initiative. Further, to nurture research, the project provides funding for new ELT Research Journals and for ELT based Research Projects. The ELTR provides a robust platform of Conferences and Seminars to English fraternity for sharing and presenting their work for ELT reforms.

The phase-II of the project was launched with the mission to transfigure and reform English language teaching genre across the country. The year 2014-15 remained productive and vibrant in terms of inculcating new teaching techniques to ELT faculty through various activities. The project brush up few mechanisms and policies to streamline English fraternity in a more systematic way and to facilitate native English faculty with international trainings through International donor agencies like British Council and US Embassy, Pakistan. The Indigenous Scholarships, CPD courses and new Research Journals remained among the most focused areas. The year of 2014-15 set new ELT dimensions to enrich and enhance English language teaching and research.

ELTR Core Functions

ELTR phase-II was initiated in 2004 with deep-seated concepts and set far-reaching objectives to meet the International standards. The National Committee on English (NCE) constituted in 2003 was strategically revised in Phase II. Dr. Saeeda Asadullah was selected as the chair of NCE. The committee supported cause of ELT reforms and rendered outstanding support to the project in policy making in all key areas of ELT.

- In the year 2014-15, the 6th NCE meeting was organised on October 31, 2014. The committee shortlisted the candidates for the award of ELT Indigenous scholarship.
- The members of committee after a detailed deliberation recorded their reservations for few universities where candidates who applied for scholarships were enrolled. The committee recommended to check the status of universities and their English departments from Attestation and Accreditation and Quality Assurance divisions of HEC before finalising the award. Further, the committee shortlisted the universities for the award of seed money to launch new ELT Research Journals. ELTR and US Embassy, Pakistan discussed the upcoming International Resource Persons training to conduct as a joint venture.



Performance of the ELTR Project during the year 2014-15

To bring about a substantial transformation in English teaching, ELTR Phase-II is working more meritoriously towards bridging the gap between the faculty of English language and literature. On the other hand, both streams are strategically grouped together in the continuous professional development courses.

Indigenous Scholarships for ELT Community

During year 2014-15, the project awarded 27 Indigenous Scholarships to English faculty of HEIs across Pakistan. Currently, 58 of the ELTR indigenous scholars are pursuing their Masters and M. Phil Degrees in linguistics and other language based programs. Ninety eight scholars have completed their degrees. The project awarded 129 scholarships till the date against the target of 150.

Continuous Professional Development (CPD) Programmes

During the year 2014-15, one week course on "Computer Assisted Language Learning (CALL)" was organised at Mehran University of Engineering and Technology, Jamshoro (MUET) on September, 08-12, 2014. Twenty two participants of various HEIs of Sindh participated in this course to get exposure of latest classroom technology.





International Resource Person (IRP) Trainings

English Language Teaching Reforms (ELTR) in Phase II joined hands with US Embassy, Pakistan and British Council Pakistan to organise collaborated training courses by foreign trainers. The aim was to provide International exposure to indigenous English faculty. The participants are jointly certified by these donor partners and the HEC. This year like the previous years, remained sparkling in terms of organizing IRP courses for indigenous ELT faculty.

Two consecutive International Resource Person workshops were organised in collaboration with US Embassy, Pakistan on "Teaching English as Foreign Language (TEFL)" at HEC Regional Center, Lahore from December 08-19, 2014. Dr. Ana Lado was the Resource Person. As many as 47 English teachers from different colleges and universities across Pakistan were certified in these workshops.



Self Access Centres (SACs)

In Phase II, the ELTR Project envisioned to strengthen the English departments and research centres of the universities by providing funding to establish Self Access Centres. The major objective behind this vision is to upgrade and elevate the English language proficiency of faculty of English and other disciplines in Humanities and Social Sciences as well. SACs serve as "HUBs" of IT learning. It facilitates to integrate technology in regular teaching and learning process. The ELTR Project in the Fiscal Year 2013-14 awarded funding to the University of Poonch, Rawalakot to establish SAC. In the year 2014-15, the centre made completely functional. It was equipped with 25 latest computers and updated software. With this award of SAC the project has accomplished its target of establishing 4 SACs in public sector universities.

National/International Seminars/Conferences


The project provides funding to organise ELT based seminars/conferences. The objective is to provide a resilient platform to English Language Teachers to upgrade their teaching skills and techniques as per global standards for the enhancement and improvement of research culture in Pakistan.


One day international seminar on "Action Research in ELT" was organised on September 09, 2014 at Lahore College for Women University, Lahore (LCWU). Prof. Dr. Anne Burns, University of New South Wales Sydney facilitated this seminar and highlighted the need of Action Research in Education. The seminar explored concepts and processes of action research and what it can offer teachers and teacher educators who want to conduct investigations in relation to their own practice. Participants took a closer look at developing an action research focus, deciding on classroom interventions and collecting and analysing data to inform decisions about further practice. The role and purpose of reflection in action research was also highlighted.

Information Technology

Information Technology

The Higher Education Commission is implementing new strategies for meeting the rising demand for higher education and growth challenges. It has embraced the digital revolution of information and communication technology and is successfully utilising it for dissemination of higher education, increasing productivity, workability and promoting innovation.

HEC aims to ensure a comprehensive information and communication technology plan for implementation so as to develop a knowledge-based society in Pakistan while providing means and resources to higher education institutions for strengthening computing and telecommunications infrastructure.

IT division has proved vital in transforming HEC into a vibrant institution by maintaining its forte of providing consultancy services extended technical assistance and support to a number of higher education institutions across Pakistan. There have been significant developments and accomplishments in various services offered by HEC through IT division to the higher education institutions across Pakistan.

Pakistan Education and Research Network (PERN) being at the forefront expanded its footprints across the country and has grown by 11.11% in 2014-15 to provide high-speed connectivity to higher education institutions. The network performance has improved by increasing data transfer rate over 17.65% as bandwidth has increased from 8.8 Gigabits per second (Gbps) to 10.5 Gbps, whereas overall network service availability surpasses the barrier of 99.9%.


The research and collaborative activities in the field of higher energy physics, telemedicine, and network technologies brought true value as per the spirit of PERN. Video conferencing facility is one of the tremendous applications of PERN, which has enabled institutions, scientists and researchers to communicate live from distant locations.


Helping higher education institutions with the technology upgrades have been at its peak. Apart from the technology up gradation routine, PERN team introduced virtual desktop interface as a cloud application which is a cost-effective technique and a long-term IT solution.

IT division provided extensive support to the IT infrastructure and day-to-day services offered at HEC Secretariat and the Regional Centres. The online services of degree attestation and equivalence services, online scholarship services and HEIs ranking offered by HEC underwent major developments to provide feature-rich experience to the public. The division also helped HEIs to grow and execute of IT-based services to offer excellent experience to learners, academicians, technologists and researchers to be at par with their peers in the developed world.

Pakistan Education & Research Network

Since its inception, Pakistan Education and Research Network (PERN) has been offering a reliable, stable state-of-the-art communications network for research and collaboration in areas like grid computing, high energy physics, telemedicine, and video conferencing. These network based services are not only available within the country, but they are also helpful in the research and education connectivity with other National Research and Education Networks of the world and their consortia to serve the academic and research community globally. The educational and research activities of PERN are diversified ranging from network technologies and physical sciences to medical and health sciences.





High Energy Physics

PERN being a member of Trans-Eurasia Information Network has helped high-energy physicists of Pakistan to access Large Hadron Collider (LHC) data of CERN, Geneva by providing high speed connectivity. The participation of National Centre for Physics (NCP), Quaid-i-Azam University, in the global collaboration was also made possible with the PERN connectivity to NCP which provides international link of 155 megabits per second. A large number of students and researchers are using this data for educational and research purposes.

Telemedicine

Telemedicine is an IT-based approach to provide clinical healthcare at a distance. Telemedicine activities have been amongst the fortes of PERN and in the recent past, PERN has successfully pledged advanced telemedicine activities in collaboration with Society of Surgeons of Pakistan while connecting "Holy Family Hospital Rawalpindi" – first teaching hospital on PERN. PERN being a member of Asia-Pacific Advanced Network and Trans Eurasia (TEIN) has been able to bridge higher education institutions in Pakistan with Seoul National University, Korea and Kyushu University, Japan for live surgeries and telemedicine workshops.



Eduroam

PERN has successfully deployed test bed of Eduroam which is an international wireless Internet access service developed for the research and education community at selected HEIs. This service has been tested and made operational at foreign universities as well. PERN users can access the wireless internet at all Eduraom enabled sites nationally and internationally.



College Network of Pakistan

The degree and postgraduate colleges operating under Higher Education Departments of Provincial Governments have been provided high speed network connectivity so as to form the College Network of Pakistan (CNP). The pilot phase of the project has been initiated with the concept to provide primitive communication links and internet services to selected 26 colleges across the province of Punjab to uplift the quality of education. The network connectivity will be extended to other colleges across the province in near future. The Higher Education Commission is providing services on highly subsidised rates especially designed for colleges.

National Video Conferencing Network


HEC, while supporting the mandate to develop e-Academia, established the national video conferencing network for higher education sector and provided world-class purpose-built video conferencing facility at all the public sector universities across Pakistan. Video conferencing has proven to be a cost-effective solution to higher education in Pakistan. It has emerged as an effective tool to enhance student-teacher interactions; bridge the gap of good faculty; and meet the shortage of faculty members at the universities located at far-flung areas.

Virtual Education Project, Pakistan

The distance learning programme is the key factor in educational globalisation. Virtual Education Programme of Pakistan (VEPP) meets the standards in distance learning programme. Through this programme, eminent professors/scholars both foreign and local are invited to deliver domain specific series of lectures. These lectures' credit hours as defined by the professor and assessed by VEPP are considered against course work requirements of MS and PhD programmes. The project also includes skill development courses/ modules and




lectures on the cutting-edge technologies/research in various advanced fields. The Higher Education Commission has sought assistance from HEJ International Centre of Chemistry and Biological Sciences, HEJ Institute, University of Karachi to execute the Virtual Education Project, Pakistan.

HEC - Microsoft Education Alliance

The Higher Education Commission signed a Strategic Education Alliance Agreement with Microsoft Corporation which gives higher education institutions in Pakistan full access to the latest licensed software from Microsoft, not only for all servers operating in the universities but also for the desktops and laptops of faculty and staff. The HEC Microsoft Education Alliances encourages instructors to improve the overall performance of education and research at the higher education institutions. Under the programme, free software access is available to more than a million students.



The Unified Communications (UC) solution as introduced by HEC for the higher education institutions is a research and knowledge centric service that takes advantage of Pakistan Education and Research Network. The solution which includes email services, office communicator desktop video conferencing, SIP soft telephony, and SharePoint Portal services is based on the private cloud technology. The services are offered to the faculty and staff of all HEIs and selected colleges across the country while enabling HEIs to benefit from Software-as-a-Service model of cloud computing.

ICT Services at HEC Offices

HEC has established technically advanced and outstanding ICT infrastructure at its Secretariat in Islamabad as well as at its regional offices in Peshawar, Lahore, Quetta, and Karachi. ICT services are offered to employees, visitors, delegates, and general public. The ICT infrastructure and services have gone through rigorous evolution process over past one decade. Since then ICT services at HEC Secretariat and its Regional Centres are being managed and enhanced HEC's own recurring budget. In this regard upgradation of the Network Management System, installation of hardware and provision of machines to ensure smooth ICT services for official business of HEC is being materialised.



Hosted Data Centres and Private Cloud Facilities for HEIs

The Higher Education Commission as part of its overall strategy of strengthening existing National ICT infrastructure has established National Data Centres in Islamabad and Regional Data Centres in Karachi, Lahore and Peshawar, for providing hosted and managed services to Higher Education Institutions of Pakistan.

In addition, the HEIs are being offered Cloud Computing facility from these Data Centres and plans have been put in place to offer Internet Data Centre (IDC) and Virtual Desktop Interface (VDI) to all HEIs. HEC has realised that the Internet Data Centres provide the most cost-effective solution for hosting services while retaining autonomy and individuality in a managed environment. For this purpose, the current practices in IT of Cloud Computing are also being encouraged and offered to HEIs which will further optimise the usage of scarce hardware resources on-demand and on applications' need basis, resulting a substantial savings of public funds.

Sports Division

Sports Division

Pakistan University Sports Board (PUSB) has been working with an aim to encourage and promote games and sports in Pakistani universities. It plans and executes various sports activities in order to offer opportunities of social contact and understanding amongst university students and evoke the interest of students in recreation and sports. Organising inter-university sports is a flagship activity of Sports Division, wherein 35 intervarsity events are organised in one calendar year for men including seven events at zonal level. Universities have been divided into nine zones across Pakistan for representation of student players at grass root level. Likewise, 25 intervarsity sports events are organised for female students. The student players are awarded trophies, cash prizes and certificates of distinction as well as coloured certificates upon showing outstanding merit and performance. HEC-selected teams and players participate at national, international and regional championships. The players who win medals at national and international level are granted prize money and scholarships.

PUSB/ Sports Division strongly advises universities regarding regular sports activities round the year instead of holding sports weeks. Competitive sports is meant only for professionals, however, recreational sports should be essential for students at tertiary level to inculcate a sportsman spirit and broaden their mind. HEC is also providing funds to HEIs for development of infrastructure related with sports grounds, courts, equipment and gears, etc.

a. Organising Intervarsity Sports Championships

Organising intervarsity sports championships is a regular feature of PUSB. As many as 23 men and 12 women events were held in FY 2014-15. University of Central Punjab Lahore secured overall 1st position in category of men events with 3406 points and University of the Punjab Lahore got 1971 points in the events of women category. Top three university Directors (Sports) and their staff in overall intervarsity sports position ranking were awarded cash prize of Rs. 3,00,000.00 Rs. 2,00,000.00 and Rs. 1,00,000.00 as per below ranking grid:

b. Participation in National Sports Activities



c. Participation in International Sports Activities

PUSB is a recognised member of International Sports Associations and provides international sports exposure to student players of Pakistan by giving them opportunity to participate in the international sports event. International University Sports Federation (FISU) organises the sports events for students worldwide, whereas, Asian University Sports Federation (AUSF) oversees the sports at continent level. HEC national teams of different games participate in events organised by said federations. In this connection, PUSB 12-member contingent participated in 8th World University Squash Championship held at Chennai on September 1-7, 2014 under the auspices of International University Sports Federation during FY 2014-2015. Pakistani team performed well but could not get place at the podium. PUSB top player (Mr. Saqib Yousaf) finished the event with fourth position after defeating from Eddie Charlton (GBR) by 7-11, 11-7, 11-5, 11-8.


Prize Money and Sports Scholarships for National and International Student Players

Students winning medals at national and international sports championships are entitled to receive prize money and scholarships whereas team officials are only awarded prize money. Amount of prize money and scholarships varies from medal to medal and individual to team event. In 2014-15, 112 players and officials received prize money of Rs. 1.485 million and 196 student players received sports scholarships of Rs. 11.544 million. Scholarships are awarded on the basis of performance report and study period maximum for one year.

Sports Scholarships 2010-11 to 2014-15




d. Funding of Sports Activities
