REPORT OF THE DIRECTORS' OF THE MANAGEMENT COMPANY

The Board of Directors' of Habib Asset Management Limited (HAML), the management company of First Habib Income Fund (FHIF), is pleased to present the Second Annual Report on the operations of the Fund along with the audited accounts, Reports of the Trustee and Auditors to the Unit Holders for the financial year ended June 30, 2008. This is the first full year of operations of FHIF. Last year's Accounts were only for one month i.e. from June 2, 2007 to June 30, 2007.

Fund's Performance

By the grace of Almighty Allah, FHIF performed well under difficult circumstances and posted an annualized yield of 9.14%. During the period under review the Fund earned a total income of Rs. 270.23 million and after deducting total expenses of Rs. 51.26 million, net profit of Rs. 218.97 million was available for distribution.

The size of the Fund which at the start of the year was Rs. 1.05 billion grew rapidly to reach a promising level of Rs. 2.99 billon when the liquidity crisis struck the market and huge withdrawals took place all over. Owing to the extra ordinary circumstances resulting in the severe credit crunch, FHIF also came under heavy redemption and finally closed with net assets of Rs. 1.91 billion registering an increase of 82% over the preceding year's closing.

Income Distribution

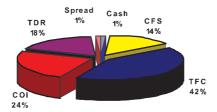
The Board has approved a total distribution of Rs. 9.25 per Unit. Out of total distribution Rs. 7.00 was paid as interim dividend whereas Rs. 2.25 was declared as final dividend.

Investments

Being an Income Fund, the focus of management is always on achieving optimum results of attractive but safe returns and keeping a short to medium-term investment portfolio. The emphasis is on credit quality of the financial instruments in the asset allocation to provide stable long-term returns while minimizing risk. As at June 30, 2008, 64% of portfolio was invested in AAA to AA-, 32% in A+ to A- rated instruments/institutions and 4% in high quality blue chip companies (only CFS and Spread transactions).

Sale and Redemption of Units

During the year, 57,122,435 units worth Rupees 5.9 billion were sold and 49,603,978 units of the value of Rupees 5.1 billion were redeemed. Although the management succeeded to bring in fresh sales of Rs. 5.9 billion, the volatility on the money market front resulted in heavy redemptions. The net sales were therefore only Rs.0.80 billion.

Unit Prices

Unit prices are being announced daily on the basis of the Net Asset Value of the underlying portfolio. The highest and lowest offer/redemption prices during the year as well as the prices prevailing as of June 30, 2008 are disclosed in the performance table.

Unit Holders

As of June 30, 2008, 18, 632,666 units with a value of Rs. 1.906 billion were outstanding (June 30, 2007: 10,293,012 units with a value of Rs. 1.046 billion) with a total number of 336 Unit holders.

Pattern of Unit Holding

Unit-holders' classification as on June 30, 2008 is disclosed in note 25 to the accounts.

Outlook

The year 2008-2009 began with more than its share of uncertainties. The KSE 100 Index, despite gaining support from selected institutions breached the 9500 level and is currently hovering around the floor fixed at 9,144 level with low turnover as foreign and local investors continue to off load their positions. However, with the completion of the entire election process and State Bank of Pakistan's measures to control inflation, the situation may hopefully improve. We also remain positive that Inshallah the return to our investors will be higher than that of the previous year.

Management Company's Rating

The Pakistan Credit Rating Agency Limited (PACRA) has assigned an Asset Manager Rating of AM3-(AM 3 Minus) to Habib Asset Management Limited. The AM3- Asset Manager Rating of HAML demonstrates that the Company meets high investment management industry standards and benchmarks.

Mutual Fund Ranking

The management company is in the process of obtaining the ranking of the Fund as it has just completed its first full year of operations.

Auditors

The Fund's external auditors Messrs KPMG Taseer Hadi & Co., Chartered Accountants, have expressed their willingness to continue as the Fund's auditors for the year ending 30 June 2009. The Board of Directors of the Management Company has re-appointed Messrs KPMG Taseer Hadi & Co., Chartered Accountants as the Fund's auditors for the year ending — June 30, 2009 as recommended by the Audit Committee.

Corporate Governance

The management company has implemented the requirements of the Code of Corporate Governance last year.
 A prescribed statement by the management along with the auditors' report thereon for the year ended June 30, 2008 forms part of this annual report.

2. Statements under clause xix of the Code:

- The financial statements, prepared by the Management Company of FHIF, present fairly the state
 of affairs of the Fund, the result of its operations, cash flows and movement in Unitholders' funds.
- Proper books of account of FHIF have been maintained.
- Appropriate accounting policies have been consistently applied in preparation of financial statements. Accounting estimates are based on reasonable and prudent judgment.
- International Financial Reporting Standards, as applicable in Pakistan, have been followed
 in preparation of financial statements.
- The system of internal control is sound in design and has been effectively implemented and monitored
- There is no doubt upon FHIF's ability to continue as a going concern.
- There has been no material departure from the best practices of Corporate Governance, as detailed in the listing regulations.
- Outstanding statutory payments on account of taxes, if any, have fully disclosed in the accounts.
- The details of Board Meetings held and attended by the directors is disclosed in note 28 to the accounts
- Particulars of all investments and redemptions by the Directors, Chief Executive, Chief Financial Officer, Company Secretary and their spouses and minor children during the period ended June 30, 2008 is provided in note 21 to the accounts.

Commitment

The Management Company is committed towards devoting its entire efforts and resources to improve returns for the investors, while remaining prudent in making investment decisions.

The Board takes this opportunity to thank its valued Unit-holders for their confidence. It would like to place on record its appreciation for the help and guidance provided by the Central Depository Company of Pakistan Limited as Trustee, the Securities and Exchange Commission of Pakistan and the management of Lahore Stock Exchange.

Report of the Trustee pursuant to Regulation 58(f) and Clause 9 of Schedule IV of the Non-Banking Finance Companies and Notified Entities Regulations, 2007

The First Habib Income Fund (Fund), an open-end Mutual Fund was established under a trust deed dated September 6, 2006, executed between Habib Asset Management Limited, as the Management Company and Central Depository Company of Pakistan Limited, as the Trustee.

In our opinion, the Management Company has in all material respects managed the Fund during the year ended June 30, 2008 in accordance with the provisions of the following:

- Limitations imposed on the investment powers of the Management Company under the constitutive documents of the Fund;
- (ii) The pricing, issuance and redemption of units are carried out in accordance with the requirements of the constitutive documents of the Fund; and
- (iii) The Non-Banking Finance Companies (Establishment and Regulations) Rules, 2003, the Non Banking Finance Companies and Notified Entities Regulations, 2007 and the constitutive documents of the Fund.

STATEMENT OF COMPLIANCE WITH THE CODE OF CORPORATE GOVERNANCE FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2008

This statement is being presented by the Board of Directors of Habib Asset Management Limited, the management company of First Habib Income Fund to comply with the Code of Corporate Governance in Chapter XIII of Listing Regulations of the Lahore Stock Exchange for the purpose of establishing a framework of good Governance, whereby a listed Company is managed in compliance with the best practice of corporate governance.

Habib Asset Management Limited (HAML), the Management Company, is not listed and hence, the Code is not applicable to it. However, First Habib Income Fund (FHIF) managed by HAML, is listed on the Lahore Stock Exchange, therefore it comes under the ambit of the Code. The Fund, being a unit trust scheme, does not have its own Board. The Board of Directors of the Management Company manages the affairs of the Fund and has appointed the Chief Executive Officer (CEO), Chief Financial Officer (CFO) and the Company Secretary and other necessary personnel to manage the affairs of the Fund.

The Management Company has applied the principles contained in the Code in the following manner:

- The Management Company encourages representation of independent non-executive directors. At present the Board consists of five directors including three non-executive directors and one independent non executive director.
- 2. The directors have confirmed that none of them is serving as a director in more than ten listed companies.
- 3. All the resident directors of the Management Company are registered as taxpayers and none of them has defaulted in payment of any loan to a banking company, a DFI or an NBFI or, being a member of a stock exchange, has been declared as a defaulter by that stock exchange.
- 4. Casual vacancy occurred once during the year in the Board due to the demise of Mr. Mahmood S Allarakhia. The said vacancy was filed by the appointment of Mr. Mansoor Ali by the Board with the approval of Securities and Exchange Commission of Pakistan.
- 5. The Management Company has adopted a "Code of Business Ethics and Business Practices", which has been acknowledged by all the Directors and employees of the Management Company.
- 6. The Board has developed a vision / mission statement and significant policies for the Fund. A complete record of the particulars along with the dates on which they were approved or amended has been maintained.
- 7. All the powers of the Board have been duly exercised and decisions on material transactions, including appointment and determination of the remuneration and terms and conditions of employment of the CEO, have been taken by the Board. There is no other executive director of the company besides the CEO.
- 8. The meetings of the Board were presided over by the Chairman and, in his absence, by a director elected by the Board for this purpose and the Board met at least once in every quarter during the period. Written notices of the Board meetings, along with agenda and working papers, were circulated at least seven days before the meetings. The minutes of the meetings were appropriately recorded and circulated.
- 9. All the members of the Board are professionally qualified persons with rich experience in financial sector and are well aware of their duties and responsibilities under Memorandum and Articles of HAML and NBFC Rules, 2003 and NBFC Regulations. Therefore, no orientation courses were arranged during the year.
- 10. The Board has approved the appointment of CFO and Company Secretary including their remuneration and terms and conditions of employment as determined by the CEO.

- 11. The Directors' Report for the year has been prepared in compliance with the requirements of the Code and fully describes the salient matters required to be disclosed.
- 12. The financial statements of the Fund were duly endorsed by CEO and CFO before the approval of the Board.
- 13. The Directors, CEO and Executives do not hold units other than those disclosed in note 21 to the financial statements "Transactions with Connected Persons".
- 14. The Management Company has complied with the corporate and financial reporting requirements of the Code.
- 15. The Board has formed an Audit Committee. It comprises of three members, all of whom are non-executive directors including the Chairman of the Committee.
- 16. The meetings of the audit committee were held at least once every quarter prior to approval of the financial statements of the Fund as required by the Code.
- 17. The Management Company has outsourced the internal audit function of the Fund to M/s A. F. Ferguson & Co., Chartered Accountants, Karachi who are considered suitably qualified and experienced for the purpose and are conversant with the policies and procedures of the Fund.
- 18. The Statutory Auditors of the Fund have confirmed that they have been given a satisfactory rating under the quality control review program of the Institute of Chartered Accountants of Pakistan, that they or any of the partners of the firm, their spouse and minor children do not hold units of the Fund and that the Firm and all its partners are in compliance with the International Federation of Accountants (IFAC) guidelines on the Code of Ethics as adopted by the Institute of Chartered Accountant of Pakistan.
- 19. The Statutory Auditors or the persons associated with them have not been appointed to provide other services except in accordance with the Listing Regulations and the auditors have confirmed that they have observed IFAC guidelines in this regard.
- 20. We confirm that all other material principles contained in the Code have been complied with.

Those standards require that we comply with ethical requirements and plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditors' judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

Opinion

In our opinion, the financial statements give a true and fair view of the state of the Fund's affairs as at 30 June 2008, and of its financial performance, cash flows and transactions for the year ended 30 June 2008 in accordance with approved accounting standards as applicable in Pakistan.

Other matters

In our opinion, the financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the relevant provisions of the Trust Deed, Non-Banking Finance Companies (Establishment and Regulation) Rules, 2003 and Non-Banking Finance Companies and Notified Entities Regulations, 2007.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2008

1. LEGAL STATUS AND NATURE OF BUSINESS

First Habib Income Fund (the "Fund") was established under a Trust Deed executed between Habib Asset Management Limited (HAML) as Management Company and Central Depository Company of Pakistan Limited (CDC) as Trustee. The Trust Deed was executed on 6 September 2006 and was approved by the Securities and Exchange Commission of Pakistan (SECP) on 3 August 2006 under Rule 67 of the Non-Banking Finance Companies (Establishment and Regulation) Rules, 2003 (NBFC Rules).

The Management Company of the Fund has been licensed to undertake Asset Management Services as Non Banking Finance Company under the NBFC Rules by the SECP. The registered office of the management company is situated at Imperial Court Building, Dr. Ziauddin Ahmed Road Karachi, Pakistan.

The Fund is an open-ended mutual fund and is listed on the Lahore Stock Exchange. Units are offered for public subscription on a continuous basis. Units are transferable and can be redeemed by surrendering them to the Fund at the option of the unit holder, except for the units issued to core investors which are not redeemable for a period of two years from the date of issue.

The Fund has been formed to provide reasonable rate of return consistent with reasonable concern for safety of principal amount to the unit holders, along with facility to join or leave the fund at their convenience. The management team would seek to enhance returns through active portfolio management using efficiency tools.

2. BASIS OF PREPARATION

2.1 Statement of compliance

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the approved accounting standards as applicable in Pakistan. Approved accounting standards comprise of such International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRS) issued by the International Accounting Standards Board as are notified under the Companies Ordinance, 1984, the requirements of the Trust Deed, the Non Banking Finance Companies (Establishment and Regulation) Rules, 2003 (the NBFC Rules), the Non-Banking Finance Companies and Notified Entities Regulations, 2007 (the NBFC Regulations) and directives issued by the Securities and Exchange Commission of Pakistan (SECP). Wherever, the requirements of the Trust Deed, the NBFC Rules, the NBFC Regulations or directives issued by the SECP differ with the requirements of IFRS, the requirements of the Trust Deed, the NBFC Rules, the NBFC Regulations or the directives issued by the SECP prevail.

2.2 Initial application of a standard or an interpretation

During the year, amendments to International Accounting Standards (IAS) 1, Presentation of Financial Statements relating to capital disclosures became effective and have resulted in an additional disclosure. International Financial Reporting Standard (IFRS) 2 – Share Based Payment, IFRS 3 – Business Combinations, IFRS 5 – Non-current Assets Held for Sale and Discontinued Operations, IFRS 6 – Exploration for and Extraction of Mineral Resources, IFRIC 8 – Scope of IFRS 2 – Share Based Payment and IFRIC 10 – Interim Financial Reporting and Impairment became effective during the year. The application of these standards and interpretations did not have any material effect on the Fund's financial statements.

2.3 New accounting standards and IFRIC interpretations that are not yet effective

The following standards, amendments and interpretations of approved accounting standards, effective for accounting periods beginning on or after 1 July 2008 are either not relevant to the Fund's operations or are not expected to have significant impact on the Fund's financial statements other than certain increased disclosures:

(effective prospectively to business combinations for which the acquisition date is on or after the beginning of the first annual reporting period beginning on or after 1 July 2009).
- IFRS 7 Financial Instruments: Disclosures (effective for annual periods beginning on or after 1 July 2008).
- IFRIC 12 Service Concession Arrangements (effective for annual period beginning on or after 1 January 2008).
- IFRIC 13- Customer Loyalty Programmes (effective for annual period beginning on or after 1 July 2008).
- IFRIC 14 IAS 19- The Limit on Defined Benefit Asset, Minimum Funding Requirements and their interaction (effective for annual period beginning on or after 1 January 2008).
- IFRIC 15- Agreement for the Construction of Real Estate (effective for annual period beginning on or after 1 October 2009).
- IFRIC 16- Hedge of Net Investment in a Foreign Operation (effective for annual period beginning on or after 1 October 2008).

2.4 Basis of measurement

These financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, except that financial assets classified as 'at fair value through profit or loss' and 'available for sale' which are included at fair value.

2.5 Functional and presentation currency

These financial statements are presented in Pak Rupees which is the functional and presentation currency of the Fund and rounded to the nearest thousand rupees.

2.6 Critical accounting estimates and judgments

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with approved accounting standards as applicable in Pakistan requires management to make judgments, estimates and assumptions that affect the application of policies and reported amount of assets and liabilities, income and expenses. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognized in the period in which the estimate is revised if the revision affects only that period, or in the period of its revision and future periods if the revision affects both current and future periods.

In particular, information about significant areas of estimation uncertainty and critical judgements in applying accounting policies that have most significant effect on the amounts recognised in the financial statements are given in note 24 to these financial statements.

3. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The accounting policies set out below have been applied consistently to all periods presented in these financial statements.

3.1 Financial instruments

The Fund classifies its financial instruments in the following categories:

a) Financial instruments at fair value through profit or loss

An instrument is classified at fair value through profit or loss if it is held-for-trading or is designated as such upon initial recognition. Financial instruments are designated at fair value through profit or loss if the Fund manages such investments and makes purchase and sale decisions based on their fair value in accordance with the Fund's documented risk management or investment strategy.

Financial assets which are acquired principally for the purpose of generating profit from short term price fluctuation or are part of the portfolio in which there is recent actual pattern of short term profit taking are classified as held for trading or a derivative.

Financial instruments at fair value through profit or loss are measured at fair value, and changes therein are recognised in Income Statement.

All derivatives in a net receivable position (positive fair value), are reported as financial assets held for trading. All derivatives in a net payable position (negative fair value), are reported as financial liabilities held for trading.

b) Available-for-sale

Available for sale financial assets are non-derivative that are either designated in this category or not classified in any other category.

c) Loans and receivables originated by the enterprise

Loans and receivables are non-derivative financial assets with fixed or determinable payments that are not quoted in an active market, other than those classified by the Fund as fair value through profit or loss or available for sale.

d) Financial liabilities

Financial liabilities, other than those at fair value through profit or loss, are measured at amortised cost using the effective yield method.

Recognition

The Fund recognises financial assets and financial liabilities on the date it becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

All purchases and sales of securities that require delivery within the time frame established by regulation or market convention such as 'T+2' purchases and sales are recognised at the trade date. Trade date is the date on which the Fund commits to purchase or sell the assets.

Financial liabilities are not recognised unless one of the parties has performed its part of the contract or the contract is a derivative contract.

Measurement

Financial instruments are measured initially at fair value (transaction price) plus, in case of a financial instrument not at 'fair value through profit or loss', transaction costs that are directly attributable to the acquisition or issue of the financial instrument. Transaction costs on financial instrument at fair value through profit or loss are expensed out immediately.

Subsequent to initial recognition, financial instruments classified as at 'fair value through profit or loss' and available for sale' are measured at fair value. Gains or losses arising, from changes in the fair value of the financial assets 'at fair value through profit or loss' are recognised in the Income Statement.

Changes in the fair value of financial instruments classified as 'available-for-sale' are recognised in Unit Holders' Fund until derecognised or impaired, when the accumulated adjustments recognised in Unit Holders' Fund are included in the Income Statement.

Fair value measurement principles

The fair value of a security listed on a stock exchange, local or foreign as the case may be, and derivatives is valued at its last sale price on such exchange on the date on which it is valued or if such exchange is not open on such date, then at its last sale price on the next preceding date on which such exchange was open and if no sale is reported for such date the security is valued at an amount neither higher than the closing asked price nor lower than the closing bid price.

Basis of valuation of Term Finance Certificates (TFC's) / Debt Securities

The investment of the Fund in TFCs and other debt securities is valued at the rates, notified by the Mutual Funds Association of Pakistan (MUFAP) .

Impairment

Financial assets not carried at fair value through profit or loss are reviewed at each balance sheet date to determine whether there is any indication of impairment. If such indication exists, the assets recoverable amount is estimated. An impairment loss is recognised whenever the carrying amount of an asset exceeds its recoverable amount. Impairment losses are recognised in the Income Statement.

If in subsequent period the amount of impairment loss decreases, the reduction in impairment loss on financial assets other than the securities classified as 'available-for-sale' are recognised in the income statement. For equity instruments classified as 'available for sale' any reversal in impairment loss is recognised in unit holders fund. For debt instruments classified as 'available for sale', any reversal in impairment loss is recognised in income statement where the increase in fair value of debt instruments can be objectively related to an event occurring after the impairment loss was recognised in income statement.

Derecognition

The Fund derecognises a financial asset when the contractual right to the cash flows from the financial asset expire or it transfers the financial asset and the transfer qualifies for derecgonition in accordance with International Accounting Standard 39: Financial Instruments; Recognition and Measurement.

A financial liability is derecognised when the obligation specified in the contract is discharged, cancelled or expired.

Offsetting of financial instruments

Financial assets and liabilities are offset and the net amount reported in the Statement of Assets and Liabilities when there is a legally enforceable right to set off the recognised amounts and there is an intention to settle on a net basis, or to realise the assets and settle the liabilities simultaneously.

3.2 Securities under resale agreements

Transactions of purchase under resale (reverse-repo) of the securities purchased under continuous funding system, are entered into at contracted rates for specified periods of time. Securities purchased with a corresponding commitment to resell at a specified future date (reverse-repo) are not recognised in the statement of assets and liabilities. Amount paid under these agreements are recognised as receivable against continuous funding system. The difference between purchase and resale price is treated as income from continuous funding system and accrued over the life of the agreement. All Continuous Funding System transactions are accounted for on the settlement date.

3.3 Unit holders' fund

Unit holders' fund representing the units issued by the Fund, is carried at the net assets value representing the investors' right to a residual interest in the Funds' assets.

3.4 Issue and redemption of units

Units issued are recorded at the net assets value, determined by the Management Company for the applications received by the company during business hours on that day. Allotment of units is recorded on acceptance of application and units are issued upon realization of the proceeds in the Fund's bank account.

Units redeemed are recorded at the net assets value redemption price, applicable on units for which the Company receives redemption applications during business hours on that day. Redemption of units is recorded on acceptance of application for redemption.

3.5 Element of income / (loss) and capital gains / (losses) included in prices of units issued less those in units redeemed

An equalisation account called the 'element of income / (loss) and capital gains / (losses) included in prices of units issued less those in units redeemed' is created, in order to prevent the dilution of per unit income and distribution of income already paid out on redemption.

The Fund records the net element of accrued income / (loss) and realised capital gains / (losses) relating to units issued and redeemed during an accounting period in the income statement.

3.6 Net asset value - per unit

The net asset value per unit disclosed in the Statement of Assets and Liabilities is calculated by dividing the net assets of the Fund by the number of units in issue at the year end.

3.7 Taxation

The income of the Fund is exempt from income tax under clause 99 of Part I of the Second Schedule to the Income Tax Ordinance, 2001 subject to the condition that not less than ninety percent of its accounting income of that year, as reduced by capital gains, whether realised or unrealised, is distributed amongst the Fund's unit holders.

The Fund provides for deferred taxation using the balance sheet liability method on all temporary diffrences between the amounts used for financial reporting purposes and amounts used for taxation purposes. In addition, the Fund also records deferred tax assets on unutilised tax losses to the extent that these will be available for set off against future taxable profits.

However, the Fund intends to continue availing the tax exemption in future years by distributing at least ninety percent of its accounting income for the year as reduced by capital gains, whether realised or unrealised, to its unit holders every year. Accordingly, no tax liability or deferred tax has been recognised in these financial statements.

3.8 Revenue recognition

- Gains / (losses) arising on sale of investments are included in the Income Statement on the date at which the transaction takes place.
- Unrealised gains / (losses) arising on revaluation of investments classified as financial assets
 at fair value through profit or loss are included in the Income Statement in the period in
 which they arise.

- Unrealised gains / (losses) arising on the revaluation of derivatives to fair value are taken to the Income Statement in the period in which they arise.
- Income on reverse repurchase transactions, continuous funding system, term finance certificates and government securities is recognised on an accrual basis using the effective interest rate method.
- Profit on bank deposit is recognised on time proportion basis taking in to account effective yield.
- Dividend income is recognised when the right to receive the dividend is established.
- Element of income / (loss) and capital gains / (losses) included in prices of units issued less those in units redeemed is included in the Income Statement on the date of issue and redemption of units.

3.9 Expenses

All expenses including management fee, trustee fee and annual fee of SECP are recognised in the Income Statement on an accrual basis.

3.10 Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the Fund has a present legal or constructive obligation as a result of past events, it is probable that an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation and a reliable estimate of the obligation can be made. Provisions are regularly reviewed and adjusted to reflect the current best estimate.

3.11 Preliminary expenses and floatation costs

Preliminary expenses and floatation costs represent expenditure incurred up to the close of Initial Public Offer (IPO) period of the Fund. These costs are being amortised over a period of five years commencing from 2 June 2007 as per the Trust Deed of the Fund.

3.12 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise of bank balances. Cash equivalents are short term highly liquid investments that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash, are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value, and are held for the purpose of meeting short term cash commitments rather than for investments and other purposes.

3.13 Other assets

Other assets are stated at cost less impairment losses, if any.

3.14 Dividend distributions and appropriations

Dividends declared (including distribution in the form of bonus units) subsequent to the balance sheet date are considered as a non-adjusting event and are recognised in the period in which they are paid.

22. RISK MANAGEMENT POLICIES

The Fund primarily invests in a portfolio of money market investments such as investment-grade debt securities and continuous funding system transactions. Such investments are subject to varying degrees of risk. These risks emanate from various factors that include, but are not limited to:

22.1 Market risk

Market risk is the risk that the value of the financial instrument may fluctuate as a result of changes in market interest rates or market price of securities due to a change in credit rating of the issuer or the instrument, change in market sentiments, speculative activities, supply and demand of securities and liquidity in the market.

The Management Company manages market risk by monitoring exposure on marketable securities by following the internal risk management policies and investment guidelines approved by the Investment Committee and regulations laid down by the Securities and Exchange Commission of Pakistan.

22.2 Credit risk

Credit risk management

Credit risk arises from the inability of the counter parties to fulfill their obligations. The risk is generally limited to principal amounts and accrued interest thereon, if any.

The Fund's policy is to enter into financial contracts in accordance with the internal risk management policies and investment guidelines approved by the Investment Committee. In addition, the risk is managed through assignment of credit limits, obtaining adequate collaterals and by following strict credit evaluation criteria laid down by the management. The Fund does not expect to incur material credit losses on its financial assets.

Concentration of credit risk

Concentration of credit risk exists when changes in economic or industry factors similarly affect groups of counterparties whose aggregate credit exposure is significant in relation to the Fund's total credit exposure. The Fund's portfolio of financial instruments is broadly diversified and transactions are entered into with diverse credit-worthy counterparties thereby mitigating any significant concentration of credit risk.

22.3 Liquidity risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that the Fund may encounter difficulty in raising funds to meet its obligations and commitments. The Fund manages the liquidity risk by monitoring maturities of financial assets and financial liabilities and investing a major portion of the Fund's assets in highly liquid financial assets.

22.4 Capital management

The Fund seeks to maximise current income, consistent with low levels of risk and high liquidity by primarily investing in low duration, liquid investments including money market and other debt instruments as well as fixed income transactions in the capital market, with an aim to continue to provide returns for unit holders and benefits for other stake holders.

The units of the Fund are transferable and can be redeemed by surrendering them to the Fund at the option of the unit holder, except for the units issued to core investors which are not redeemable for a period of two years from the date of issue, as per the NBFC Regulations.

22.5 Market rate of return (MROR) risk

MROR risk is the risk that the value of a financial instrument will fluctuate due to changes in the market interest rates. The Fund manages its investment portfolio in order to reduce the risk of loss in market value of investments as a result of changes in market interest rates. In case the management expects economic uncertainty the portfolio will be restructured so as to comprise of short-term debt securities, money market instruments and continuous funding system transactions.

23. FAIR VALUE OF FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS

The fair value of investments at fair value through profit or loss is based on the closing market prices prevailing at the day-end. The Management Company is of the view that the fair market value of most of the remaining financial assets and liabilities are not significantly different from their carrying values since assets and liabilities are essentially short-term in nature.

24. ACCOUNTING ESTIMATES AND JUDGEMENTS

The Management Company makes estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amount of assets and liabilities within the next financial year. Estimates and judgements are continually evaluated and are based on historical experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

24.1 At fair value through profit or loss

The Management Company has determined fair value of investments calssified as 'at fair value through profit or loss' by using quotations from active market and rates notified by MUFAP. Fair value estimates are made at a specific point in time, based on market conditions and information about the financial instruments. These estimates are subjective in nature and involve uncertainties and matter of judgements (e.g. valuation, interest rates, etc.) and therefore, can not be determined with precision.

24.2 Other assets

Judgement is also involved in assessing the realisability of assets balances.

ANNUAL FUND MANAGER'S REPORT 2008

Introduction:

The First Habib Income Fund, an Open-end Fund, was offered to general public on May 30, 2007 with the objective to achieve the best possible returns for the investors in comparison to other available investment avenues by maintaining a diversified investment with easy entry and exit. The first Net Asset Value (NAV) per unit was announced on June 04, 2007 at Rs. 101.01 after the close of Initial Public Offering (IPO). During the period under review, the Fund has provided the investors with an annual return of 9.14% p.a. and an annualized growth since inception of 10.22% p.a. The benchmark of the Fund is One-Month KIBOR. As there was major increase in KIBOR in the last quarter of the year, the average One-Month KIBOR reach to 10.11% which outperformed the Income Funds Industry's average return of 9.60% p.a.

Yearly Review

The financial year 2007-08 was a year of uncertainties as a consequence of political instability, general & presidential elections, hyper inflation, effects of sub-prime mortgage crises in USA and the ever increasing prices of oil and food items in the international and local markets.

Economy

During the year the Government kept on revising the GDP growth rates from 7.2% p.a. to 6.6% p.a., finally settling at only 5.8% p.a. as against an average growth rate of 7% p.a. during the last five years. The Consumer Price Index (CPI) climbed to 12% p.a. as compared to 7.8% p.a. of last year.

To address the inflationary pressures, the State Bank of Pakistan (SBP) took a number of measures. On 22nd May 2008 SBP raised the discount rate by 150 bps to 12% and Cash Reserve Requirement (CRR) & Statutory Liquidity Requirement (SLR) for banks to 9% & 19% (previously 8% & 18%) respectively. On the other hand, SBP made it mandatory for all the banks to pay a minimum profit of five percent on PLS or saving products.

In conjunction with these monetary measures, the Government decided to further control the rising trend of consumerism in the country by increasing duties and levying charges on various luxury items and consumer goods, including an increase in sales tax by 1% to 16%. The Government also reduced subsidies on POL products and plans to curtail these subsidies in future.

Market Review

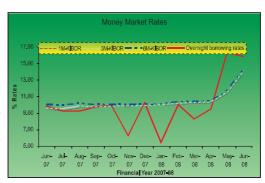
During the year the stock market remained very erratic. The KSE 100 index elevated to an all time high of 15,676 points, and plunged to as low as 11,162.17 points. Events like declaration of emergency, assassination of Ms. Benazir Bhutto and formation of coalition government as a result of general elections were some of the major factors that contributed to this instability. The stock market was also adversely hit by the increase in interest rates by banks. As a result of this situation, the net foreign portfolio investment Special Convertible Rupee accounts (SCRA) for the financial year 2007–08 remained low with cumulative inflow of US \$ 4,449.91 million as against the total outflow of US \$ 4,682.02

million i.e. a net outflow of US \$ 232.11 million out of which US \$ 146.68 million was for the month of June 2008 only.

The announcement of tight monetary policy on May 22, 2008 and the measures taken by the State Bank of Pakistan (SBP) to increase the Discount Rate, Cash Reserve Requirement (CRR) and Statutory Liquidity Requirement (SLR) proved to be very challenging for the Money and Capital Markets. As soon as the Monetary Policy was announced, the overnight call rates jumped to as high as 20.25% on May 23, 2008 and settled at around 15% on 30th June 2008. The 6-months KIBOR rate shot up to 13.33% on May 23, 2008 from 11.40% a day earlier i.e. on May 22, 2008. The KIBOR rates for 1-month and 3-months were no exception and registered a sharp increase of around 2% from a day earlier of the announcement of Monetary Policy.

One, Three and Six months KIBOR finally settled at 13.64%, 13.88% and 14.19% respectively on June 30, 2008. The increase in KIBOR rates directly impacted the Term Deposit Receipt (TDR) and Certificate of Investment (COIs) rates and in the last quarter of the FY 2007-08, transactions were witnessed at around 17% p.a. and 18% p.a. respectively which were the highest of the FY 2007-08. The KSE 100 index reacted negatively on rising interest rate scenario and fell by 21.60% on June 30, 2008 from its highest ever level of 15,676 points on April 18, 2008. As a result the spread transactions also dried out as there was very thin volume in the future market. The average CFS rates went upto 22.98% because of the liquidity crunch in the money market subsequent to the increase in CRR in the last quarter of the year.



The return on Government securities also kept on climbing and almost all the securities witnessed an increase of around 250 bps in their profit rates. The Government borrowed Rs. 654.30 billion through 28 T-Bills and 8 PIBs auctions during the year.

FUND PERFORMANCE:

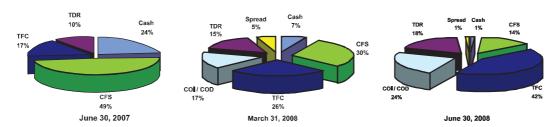
The Fund continued to follow a prudent investment policy, never compromising on the quality of assets. On 30th June 2008, 64% of the portfolio was invested in AAA to AA-, and 32% in A+ to A- rated instruments/ institutions, while 4% of the fund's investment in CFS & Spread transactions was in high quality not rated blue chip Scrips.

The fund size which was Rs. 1,046 million on July 01, 2007 touched an amount of Rs. 2,990 million on April 10, 2008. However, due to the liquidity crunch in the market, the mutual funds industry as a whole was confronted with heavy redemptions in the last quarter of the year. As a result, the Fund's size settled at Rs. 1,907 million on 30th June 2008.



Asset Allocation



Due to the reduction in fund size from the month of April onwards, the share of the TFC in the investment portfolio increased from 26% (on March 31, 2008) to 42% on June 30, 2008. Though the TFC allocation has increased, at the same time this will pave the way for achieving better returns for the Fund. The weighted average return on TFC which stood at 11.84% reached 13.21% on June 30, 2008. The return is expected to further improve as almost all the TFC coupons are expected to be repriced by November 2008 with higher KIBOR. As the political and economic situation stabilizes we expect an overall improvement in the Money Market and Stock Market and as such it will also have positive impact on our fund size and the rate of return.
