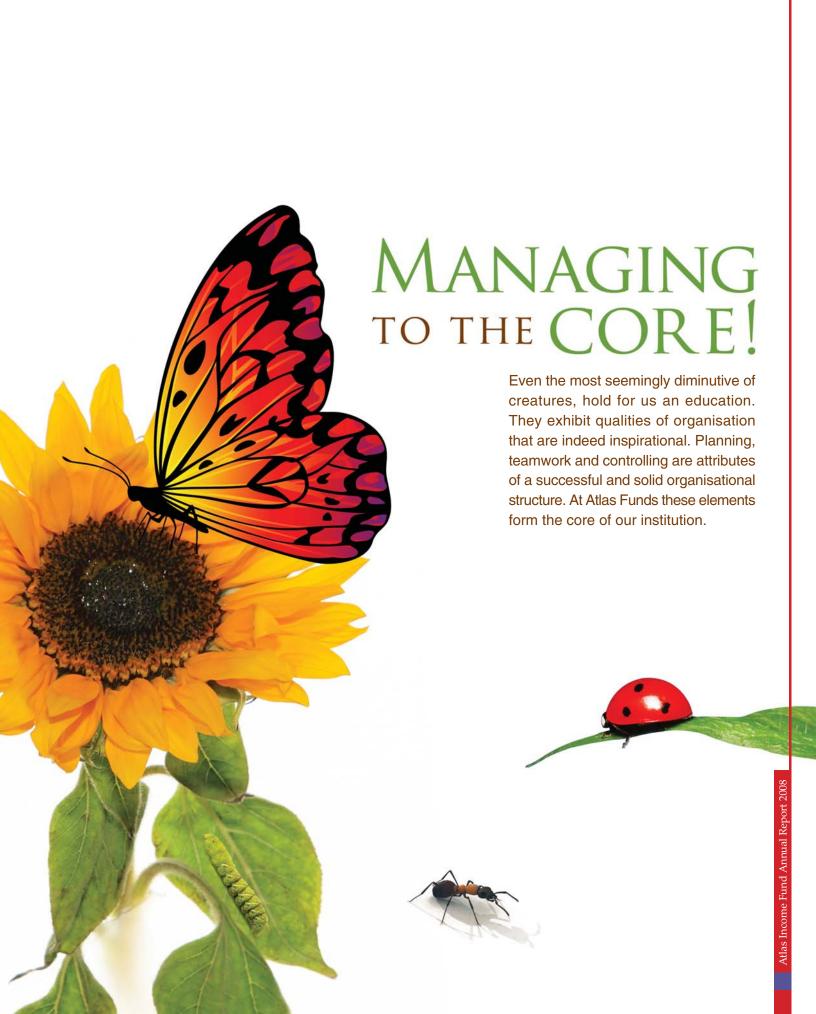

Company Profile

Atlas Asset Management Limited (AAML), an Atlas Group Company was incorporated on August 20, 2002 and is registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission of Pakistan as an asset management company for managing open-ended funds and closedend funds, and as pension fund manager for managing voluntary pension funds. The mutual funds are regulated under the Non-Banking Finance Companies (Establishment and Regulation) Rules, 2003 and the Non-Banking Finance Companies and Notified Entities Regulations, 2007 (the NBFC Regulations). The voluntary pension funds are regulated under the Voluntary Pension System Rules, 2005. AAML manages assets on behalf of retirement funds, welfare organizations, insurance companies, multinational, NBFCs, and individuals. The assets under the management of AAML are over Rs. 6.86 billion as on June 30, 2008.

AAML has a technical collaboration agreement with ING. a global financial institution of Dutch origin, to provide technical support and assistance to AAML in improving their capabilities in fund management, product development and other related business management operations, including training to its staff.

Atlas Funds are well designed and carefully managed mutual funds that facilitate the investment needs of corporations, retirement funds and individual investors. Atlas Funds family includes five mutual funds, four of which are open-ended, Atlas Income Fund, Atlas Stock Market Fund, Atlas Islamic Fund and Atlas Islamic Income Fund (launching shortly) and the fifth is a closed-end fund, Atlas Fund of Funds.

Atlas Pensions is a comprehensive savings product with numerous advantages over existing retirement schemes, in particular the provident fund. Inter alia, the scheme offers individualised asset allocation, portability, unprecedented tax advantages (which can be availed up-front) and an in-built insurance wrap. The title 'Atlas Pensions' represents two pension funds i.e. Atlas Pension Fund (APF) and Atlas Pension Islamic Fund (APIF), established under the Voluntary Pension System Rules, 2005 by Atlas Asset Management Limited (AAML).

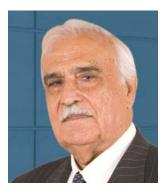

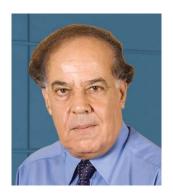
Mr. Frahim Ali Khan Director

Chairman's Review

It is my pleasure to present to you the fifth Annual Report of Atlas Income Fund for the year ended June 30, 2008.

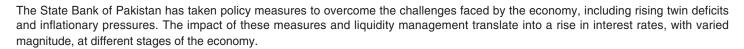
THE ECONOMY

Pakistan's economy has performed quite well despite sharp increase in international oil prices and inflation which have precipitated economic challenges. The global economic slow down emanated from U.S. sub prime mortgage market, which is having spill over effect on emerging market economies. Emerging economies will have to contend with the risks posed by elevated energy and food prices, and the tight global liquidity by taking adequate measures.

Despite these economic challenges, the real GDP growth was 5.8% for FY07-08, as compared to 6.8% for last year. Unlike last year's growth that was relatively broad based, this year's growth has been driven by service sector, which grew by 8.2% against the target of 7.1%. The industry and agriculture sectors, posted a growth of 5.4% and 1.5% respectively.

The inflation rate as measured by CPI stood at 10.3% during the first 10 months of the FY07-08

- higher than 7.9% in the corresponding period last year. The food inflation is estimated at 15%, and non-food at 6.8%, as compared to 10.2% and 6.2% respectively, during the same period last year.





During the year under review the SBP continued with the tight monetary policy stance that began in FY05, by raising the discount rate three times and by increasing cash reserve and statutory liquidity requirements. The SBP raised policy rate by 50 bps to 10% effective from August 1, 2007. The SBP took further monetary tightening measures, firstly in January 2008 and later in May 2008. In January 2008 monetary policy, it raised the discount rate by 50 bps to 10.5%, increased CRR on one year maturity by 100 bps to 8%, while leaving term deposits of over a year zero rated.

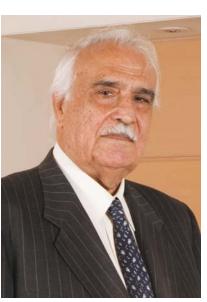


In May 2008, the SBP took interim monetary policy measures due to citing economic challenges at domestic and international front. The interim monetary policy measures include an increase of 150 bps in discount rate, and 100 bps in CRR and SLR to 9% and 19% respectively. The policy also introduced 35% margin requirement for opening of letter of credit for imports, and established floor of 5% on the rate of return on profit and loss sharing and saving accounts.

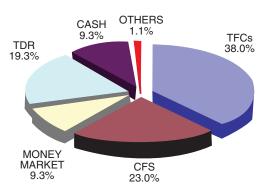
The money market experienced contraction of liquidity as money (M2) supply grew by 9% during the period July 07–May 08, as against the 14% for the corresponding period last year. Furthermore, contraction of liquidity from the market increased towards the end of FY07-08, on account of further interim monetary policy measures taken by the SBP to curb down inflation.

FUND OPERATIONS

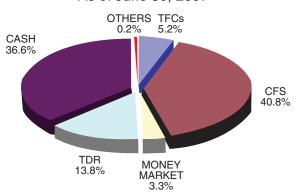
This rising interest rate scenario has had a positive impact on the yield of the Fund and enabled it to earn attractive returns during the period under review. The Net Asset Value per unit of the Fund rose from Rs. 501.47 per unit as on June 30, 2007 to Rs. 523.34 per unit as on June 30, 2008, which includes an interim payout of Rs. 25 per unit (4.8897 bonus units) thus, providing a total return of 9.46% to its investors. The fund's exposure in TFCs stood at 38% as on June 30, 2008. The TFC portfolio comprised of good quality floating rate TFCs. The exposure in CFS and Term Deposit Receipts stood at 23% and 19% respectively at the end of the outgoing financial year.

The Board of Directors has approved a final bonus of Rs. 22.50 per unit (4.50% on the face value of Rs. 500 per unit). An investor holding 100 units as at June 30, 2008 will get 4.4925 units on the ex-bonus price of Rs. 500.84 per unit, the proportionate bonus will apply to actual holdings. Unit holders who have opted for cash payment will receive cash payment accordingly. This is in addition to the Interim Bonus of Rs. 25 per unit (5% on the face value of Rs. 500 per unit), working out to 4.8897 units for every 100 units held by an investor on March 31, 2008, on the ex-bonus price of Rs. 511.28 of that date.

RATINGS UPDATE

The Pakistan Credit Rating Agency Limited (PACRA) has maintained the asset manager rating of "AM3+" to the Company. The rating reflects the Company's strong capacity to manage the risks inherent in asset management and the asset manager meets high investment management industry standards and benchmarks.

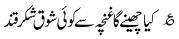
PACRA has assigned a "5 Star" rating to the Fund, and a normal "4 Star" rating. The rating is a composite measure of risk associated with the returns, along with the credit quality of the assets, reflects a superior / good performance relative to its peers, for the long term / normal ratings respectively. The long term star rating is based on performance during the trailing thirty six months period, whereas normal star rating is based on performance during the trailing twelve months.

FUTURE OUTLOOK

As global economy experiences slowdown in medium to short term, with continual rise in global oil and food prices, subsequently causing inflationary pressure and demand contraction, this will likely have its effect on Pakistan's economy. However, corrective measures, some of which have already been taken in FY08-09 budget, besides tight monetary policy instance will help in overcoming these short term economic challenges and achieving sustainable long term economic growth.

The further tightening in monetary policy is aimed at controlling twin deficits and inflation. The aggregate demand represented by strong import demand and rising fiscal deficit is putting inflationary pressure. Under the scenario, the central bank has to strike right balance between growth and inflation as further monetary tightening could hamper demand growth.

The Fund is well equipped to take advantage of changing environment with its focus to seek higher yield while keeping duration low. AIF portfolio comprises of high-quality floating rate term finance certificates, short term bank deposits and CFS transactions thus ensuring liquidity and healthy returns in the coming years.

Directors' Report

The Board of Directors of Atlas Asset Management Limited, the Management Company of Atlas Income Fund (the Fund), take pleasure in presenting the Fifth Annual Report of the Fund along with the audited financial statements and Auditors' Report thereon for the year ended June 30, 2008.

EARNINGS PER UNIT

Earnings per unit for the year ended June 30, 2008 work out to Rs. 54.64 per unit (2007: 51.21 per unit).

FUND SIZE AND INCOME DISTRIBUTION

As at June 30, 2008, the Net Assets of the Fund stood at Rs. 4.15 billion as compared Net Assets of Rs. 3.85 billion as at June 30, 2007. The Board of Directors of the Management Company of the Fund have approved a final bonus of 4.5% (2006: 10%) on the face value of Rs. 500 per unit, which works out to Rs. 22.50 per unit (2006: Rs. 50 per unit). This is in addition to the interim bonus of 5% (2007: NIL) which was approved by the Board of Directors of the Management Company for the nine months ended March 31, 2008, which worked out to Rs. 25 per unit (2007: NIL).

SALE AND REDEMPTION OF UNITS

During the year, 22,873,621 units of the value of Rs. 11.87 billion were issued, while 23,000,571 units of the value of Rs. 11.94 billion were redeemed. As at June 30, 2008, the total number of units outstanding was 7,930,536 valued at Rs. 4.15 billion (2007: 6,988,480 units valued at Rs. 3.85 billion), reflecting a growth of 13.48% in terms of number of units and 7.69% in value.

The Unit holding pattern of the Fund, as required under the Non-Banking Finance Companies & Notified Entities Regulations, 2007, (the NBFC Regulations) is presented in note 24 to the financial statements.

CHAIRMAN'S REVIEW

The review included in the Annual Report deals inter alia with the performance of the Fund for the year and future prospects. The directors endorse the contents of the review.

COMPLIANCE WITH CODE OF CORPORATE GOVERNANCE

The Board of Directors states that:

- a) The financial statements, prepared by the Management Company of the Fund, present fairly its state of affairs, the results of its operations, cash flows and movement in Unit Holders' Funds.
- b) Proper books of account of the Fund have been maintained.
- c) Appropriate accounting policies have been consistently applied in the preparation of the financial statements and accounting estimates are based on reasonable and prudent judgement, with the exception of certain changes made in accounting policies made during the year relating to valuation of, as explained in note 4.1 to the financial statements. The external auditors of the Fund have concurred with such change.
- d) International Financial Reporting Standards, as applicable in Pakistan, have been followed in the preparation of the financial statements and any departure therefrom has been adequately disclosed.
- e) The system of internal control is sound in design and has been effectively implemented and monitored.
- f) There is no doubt about the Fund's ability to continue as a going concern.
- g) There has been no material departure from the best practices of corporate governance, as detailed in the listing regulations.
- h) Key Financial data / performance table is summarized is annexed.
- i) The statement as to the value of investments of provident fund is not applicable in the case of the Fund as such expenses are borne by the Management Company.

RATINGS UPDATE

The Pakistan Credit Rating Agency Limited - PACRA, has maintained an asset manager rating of "AM3+" assigned to the company.

PACRA has assigned a "5 Star" long term rating to the Fund, and a normal '4 star' rating.

The Board comprises of two executive and five non-executive directors. During the year, there were three casual vacancies, and the Board co-opted for new Board members for the remaining term of service, as per the following details:

Ford Rhodes Sidat Hyder & Co., Chartered Accountants, Karachi, as auditors of Atlas Income Fund for the financial year ending June 30, 2009. The Board approved the appointment.

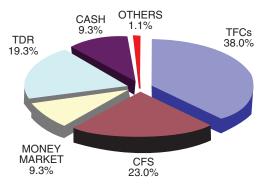
Fund Manager's Report

Atlas Income Fund is an open-ended income fund. The objective of the Fund is to achieve a good rate of current income along with capital preservation and to provide investors with liquidity and the facility to join or leave the fund at their convenience.

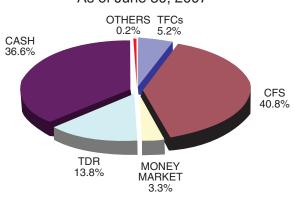
The Fund primarily invests in a diversified portfolio of long, medium and short term fixed income instruments. The Fund's strategy is based on the conviction that economic environment drives long term performance, and that active management of credit risk can produce consistently superior results. Fundamental and market analysis are used to identify overall portfolio, bond market sectors, yield curve and credit positioning to provide high and sustainable rates of return. The Fund employs strategies such as overall portfolio duration and yield curve positioning to deal with market and reinvestment risks.

The State Bank of Pakistan has continued its tight monetary policy stance during the FY08 to overcome the challenges faced by the economy, including rising twin deficits and inflationary pressures. The discount rate was raised by 50 bps during the first half of financial year 2007-08, followed by further increases of 50 bps in January 2008 and 150 bps in late May 2008, along with an increase in CRR and SLR requirements to the level of 9.0% and 19.0% respectively. The further tightening of monetary policy in May, 2008 resulted in sharp increase in KIBOR rates. The One Month KIBOR offer rate increased from 9.39% at the start of year to 13.64% as on June 30, 2008.

During the year under review the Investment Committee held 54 meetings to review investment of the Fund.

Financial Statements

STATEMENT OF COMPLIANCE WITH THE CODE OF CORPORATE GOVERNANCE FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2008

This statement is being presented to comply with the Code of Corporate Governance contained in Regulation No. 43 of Listing Regulations of the Lahore Stock Exchange for the purpose of establishing a framework of good Governance, whereby a listed Company is managed in compliance with the best practice of corporate governance.

Atlas Asset Management Limited (AAML), the Management Company, is not listed and hence, the Code is not applicable to it. However, Atlas Income Fund (the Fund) being listed at the Lahore Stock Exchange, comes under the ambit of the Code. The Fund, being a unit trust scheme, does not have its own Board. The Board of Directors of the Management Company manages the affairs of the Fund and has appointed the Chief Executive Officer (CEO), and Chief Financial Officer (CFO)/Company Secretary and other necessary personnel to manage the affairs of the Fund.

The Management Company has applied the principles contained in the Code in the following manner:

- The Management Company encourages representation of independent non-executive directors. At present the Board consists
 of seven directors including three independent non-executive directors. The Management Company is not listed on any stock
 exchange and therefore does not have minority interest.
- 2. The directors have confirmed that none of them is serving as a director in more than ten listed companies.
- 3. All the resident directors of the Management Company are registered as taxpayers and none of them has defaulted in payment of any loan to a banking company, a DFI or an NBFI or, being a member of a stock exchange, has been declared as a defaulter by that stock exchange.
- 4. Three casual vacancies in the Board occurred during the year, two of which were filled in within the required time frame, with the approval of the Securities and Exchange Commission of Pakistan (SECP), as required under the Non-Banking Finance Companies (Establishment & Regulation) Rules, 2003. The third vacancy was caused by the sad demise of Mr. M. P. Bhandara on 15 June 2008, and the legal formalities of filling in the casual vacancy were in process at the year end.
- **5.** The Management Company has adopted a "Statement of Ethics and Business Practices", which has been distributed to, and acknowledged by all the directors and employees of the Management Company.
- **6.** The Board has developed a vision/mission statement, overall corporate strategy and significant policies for the Fund. A complete record of the particulars along with the dates on which they were approved or amended has been maintained.
- 7. All the powers of the Board have been duly exercised and decisions on material transactions, including appointment and determination of the remuneration and terms and conditions of employment of the CEO, have been taken by the Board.
- 8. The meetings of the Board were presided over by the Chairman and the Board met at least once in every quarter during the period. Written notes of the Board meetings, along with agenda and working papers, were circulated at least seven days before the meetings. The minutes of the meeting were appropriately recorded and circulated.
- 9. No new appointments of Chief Financial Officer, Company Secretary and Chief Internal Auditor were made during the year. The Board has approved the terms of remuneration of the Chief Financial Officer & Company Secretary and the Chief Internal Auditor.
- **10.** The Directors' Report for the year has been prepared in compliance with the requirements of the Code and fully describes the salient matters required to be disclosed.
- 11. The financial statements of the Fund were duly endorsed by CEO and CFO before the approval of the Board.
- **12.** The Directors, CEO and Executives do not hold units other than those disclosed in note 20 to the financial statements "Transactions with Related Parties/Connected Persons".
- 13. The Management Company has complied with the corporate and financial reporting requirements of the Code.
- 14. Directors of the Management Company are aware of their responsibilities and had attended an orientation course in 2007. The Board was updated in respect of the changes in the Non-Banking Finance Companies (Establishment & Regulation) Rules, 2003 and the implementation of the Non-Banking Finance Companies & Notified Entities Regulations, 2007 (the NBFC Regulations), during the year.
- 15. The Board has formed an Audit Committee comprising of three members, all of whom are non-executive directors, including the Chairman of the Committee. Meetings of the Committee were held every quarter, prior to approval of the interim and annual results of the Fund, as required by the Code. The Board has approved the terms of reference of the Audit Committee.

STATEMENT OF COMPLIANCE WITH THE CODE OF CORPORATE GOVERNANCE FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2008

- **16.** The Board has set up an effective internal audit function headed by a full time Chief Internal Auditor who is considered suitably qualified and experienced, and is conversant with the policies and procedures of the Fund.
- 17. The Statutory Auditors of the Fund have confirmed that they have been given a satisfactory rating under the quality control review program of the Institute of Chartered Accountants of Pakistan, that they or any of the partners of the firm, their spouse and minor children do not hold units of the Fund, and that the Firm and all its partners are in compliance with the International Federation of Accountants (IFAC) guidelines on the Code of Ethics as adopted by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of Pakistan.
- 18. The Statutory Auditors or the persons associated with them have not been appointed to provide other services except in accordance with the Listing Regulations and the auditors have confirmed that they have observed IFAC guidelines in this regard.
- 19. We confirm that all other material principles contained in the Code have been complied with.

1. LEGAL STATUS AND NATURE OF BUSINESS

- 1.1 Atlas Income Fund (the Fund) is an open ended mutual fund constituted by a Trust Deed entered into on 20 February 2003 between Atlas Asset Management Limited (AAML) as the establisher and the management company and Muslim Commercial Financial Services (Pvt.) Limited (MCFSL) as the trustee. MCFSL resigned on 11 June 2005 as trustee and Central Depository Company of Pakistan Limited (CDC) was appointed as the trustee with effect from that date. During the year, the Trust Deed was revised through the Second Supplemental Trust Deed dated 29 October 2007. The Offering Document was revised during the year through the 2nd and 3rd Supplemental Offering Documents dated 29 October 2007, and 29 February 2008 respectively, with the approval of the Securities and Exchange Commission of Pakistan (SECP). The investment activities and administration of the Fund are managed by Atlas Asset Management Limited situated at Ground Floor, Federation House, Sharae Firdousi, Clifton, Karachi.
- **1.2** Units of the Fund have been offered for public subscription on a continuous basis from 22 March 2004, and are transferable and redeemable by surrendering them to the Fund. The Fund is listed on Lahore Stock Exchange.
- 1.3 According to the trust deed, the objective of the Fund is to provide investors one window facility to invest in diversified portfolio offering good returns and consistent growth. The Fund aims to deliver this objective mainly by investing in debt securities, Government securities, money market instruments, CFS transactions, reverse repurchase transactions and future transactions. The investment objectives and policy are more fully defined in the Fund's offering document.
- 1.4 During the year, the Fund has revised its pricing mechanism regarding the Offer and Redemption of units, from known pricing to forward pricing with effect from 19 September 2007. Under the forward pricing system, the Offer and Redemption Prices applicable to any sales and redemption received during any business day are calculated on the basis of Net Asset Value as at the close of that business day, plus the provision of sales load, any duties and charges, as applicable in the case of Offer Price, and as reduced by an appropriate provision of duties and charges in the case of Redemption Price. Uptill 18 September 2007, these were calculated on the basis of Net Asset Value of the close of the previous business day.

2. STATEMENT OF COMPLIANCE

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with approved accounting standards as applicable in Pakistan. Approved accounting standards comprise of International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRS) issued by the International Accounting Standards Board (IASB) as are notified under the Companies Ordinance, 1984, the requirements of the Trust Deed, the Non Banking Finance Companies (Establishment and Regulation) Rules, 2003 (the NBFC Rules), the Non Banking Finance Companies and Notified Entities Regulations 2007 (the NBFC Regulations) and directives issued by the SECP. Wherever the requirements of the Trust Deed, the NBFC Rules, the NBFC Regulations or the directives issued by the SECP differ with the requirements of IFRS, the requirements of the Trust Deed, the NBFC Rules, the NBFC Rules, the NBFC Regulations or the requirements of the said directives prevail.

3. BASIS OF MEASUREMENT

These financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention except for investments and derivatives which are accounted for as stated in notes 4.2 and 4.3 below.

4. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The significant accounting policies adopted in the preparation of these financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied during the year except for the changes described in note 4.1 below.

4.1 Changes in accounting policies

During the year, the Fund has changed its accounting policies in respect of valuation of debt securities held by the Fund, consequent upon the implementation of the NBFC Regulations as follows:

4.1.1 The unlisted Term Finance Certificates (TFCs) classified under "Investment at fair value through income statement" are now valued as per the rates provided by the Mutual Fund Association of Pakistan (MUFAP) and where rates from MUFAP are not available, on the basis of average of the rates quoted by brokerage houses. Previously, such TFCs were carried at cost. This change in accounting policy has been accounted for prospectively effective from 01 July 2007 as the effect on the prior period comparative information is immaterial.

Had there been no change in the above accounting policy, the net assets and net income of the Fund for the year would have been lower by Rs.6,000 each.

4.1.2 The listed TFCs classified as held to maturity investment are now valued as per the rates provided by the MUFAP. Previously, such TFCs were carried at amortised cost using effective rate of interest. This change in accounting policy has been accounted for prospectively effective from 01 July 2007 as the effect on the prior period comparative information is immaterial.

Had there been no change in the above accounting policy, the net assets and net income of the Fund for the year would have been lower by Rs.105,000 each.

4.2 Investments

The investments of the Fund, upon initial recognition, are classified as investment at fair value through income statement, held-to-maturity investment or available-for-sale investment, as appropriate.

All investments, are initially measured at fair value plus, in the case of investments not at fair value through income statement, transaction costs that are directly attributable to acquisition.

All regular way purchases / sales of investments are recognised on the trade date, i.e. the date on which the Fund commits to purchase / sell the investment. Regular way purchases / sales of investments require delivery of securities within two days after transaction date as per the stock exchange regulations.

Investments at fair value through income statement

These include held-for-trading investments and such other investments that, upon initial recognition, are designated under this category. Investments are classified as held-for-trading if they are acquired for the purpose of selling in the near term. After initial measurement, such investments are carried at fair value and gains or losses on revaluation are recognised in the income statement.

Held-to-maturity

Investment securities with fixed maturities and fixed or determinable payments are classified as held-to-maturity investments when management has both the intention and ability to hold to maturity. After initial measurement, such investments are carried at amortised cost less any provision for impairment except for in case of debt securities (listed but not regularly traded on a stock exchange) and government securities, which are carried at fair value in accordance with the requirements of the NBFC Regulations.

Available-for-sale

Investments which are not classified in any of the preceding categories are classified as available-for-sale investments. After initial measurement, such investments are measured at fair value with unrealised gain or loss recognised directly in the unit holders' fund until the investment is derecognised or determined to be impaired at which time the cumulative gain or loss previously recognised in unit holders' fund is taken to the income statement.

Fair value of investments is determined as follows:

Debt securities

Debt securities, listed but not traded regularly on a stock exchange, are valued at the average rate notified by MUFAP.

Fair value of unlisted debt securities, other than government securities, is also determined by reference to the average rates notified by MUFAP and where such rates are not so notified, with reference to quotations obtained from the brokerage houses.

Fair value of government securities is determined by reference to the quotations obtained from the PKRV rate sheet on the Reuters page.

4.3 Derivatives

These are measured at fair value. Derivatives with positive fair values (unrealised gains) are included in other assets and derivatives with negative fair values (unrealised losses) are included in other liabilities in the statement of assets and liabilities. The resultant gains and losses are included in the income currently.

4.4 Securities under repurchase / resale agreements

Securities purchased with a corresponding commitment to resell at a specified future date (reverse-repos) are not recognised in the statement of assets and liabilities. Amounts paid under these agreements are included as receivables in respect of reverse repurchase transactions. The difference between purchase and resale price is treated as income from reverse repurchase transactions and accrued over the life of the reverse-repo agreement.

Securities purchased under agreements to resell (Reverse repurchase agreements) are reported not as purchases of the securities, but as receivables and are carried in the statement of assets and liabilities at cost. Securities sold with a simultaneous commitment to repurchase at a specified future date (repos) continue to be recognised in the statement of assets and liabilities and are measured in accordance with accounting policies for investment. The counterparty liabilities for amounts received under these transactions are recorded as liabilities. The difference between sale and repurchase price is treated as borrowing charges and accrued over the life of the repo agreement.

4.5 Issue and redemption of units

Units issued are recorded at the offer price, determined by the management company for the application received by the distribution company / management company during business hours on that day. The offer price represents the Net Asset Value (NAV) per unit as of the close of the business day, plus the allowable sales load and provision of any duties and charges if applicable. The sales load is payable to the distribution company and the management company.

Units redeemed are recorded at the redemption price applicable to units for which the distribution company / management company receives redemption application during business hours of that day. The redemption price shall be equal to NAV as of the close of the business day, less an amount as the management company may consider to be an appropriate provision of duties and charges.

4.6 Revenue recognition

Income on debt securities is recognised using effective interest method at the rate of return implicit in the instrument.

Interest income on bank balances, placements and deposits is recognised on an accrual basis.

Gain or loss on sale of equity securities and derivatives is accounted for in the period in which it arises.

4.7 Expenses

All expenses chargeable to the Fund including remuneration of management company, trustee fees, annual fee and monitoring fee of the SECP are recognised in the income statement on an accrual basis.

4.8 Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the Fund has a present legal or constructive obligation as a result of past events, it is probable that an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation and a reliable estimate of the obligation can be made. Provisions are regularly reviewed and adjusted to reflect the current best estimate.

4.9 Element of income and capital gains in prices of units sold less those in units redeemed

To prevent the dilution of per unit income and distribution of income already paid out on redemption as dividend, an equalisation account called "element of income and capital gains in prices of units sold less those in units redeemed" is created.

The "element of income and capital gains in prices of units sold less those in units redeemed" account is credited with the amount representing net income and capital gains accounted for in net asset value and included in the sale proceeds of units. Upon redemption of units, the "element of income and capital gains in prices of units sold less those in units redeemed" account is debited with the amount representing net income and capital gains accounted for in net asset value and included in the redemption price.

The net "element of income and capital gains in prices of units sold less those in units redeemed" during an accounting period is transferred to the income statement.

4.10 Taxation

The Fund is exempt from taxation under clause 99 of the Part I of the 2nd Schedule of the Income Tax Ordinance, 2001, subject to the condition that not less than 90% of its accounting income excluding realised and unrealised capital gains for the year is distributed amongst the Fund's unit holders. The Fund intends to avail this exemption for current and future periods. Accordingly, no provision is made for current and deferred taxation in these financial statements.

4.11 Financial instruments

All financial assets and financial liabilities are recognised at the time when the Fund becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument. Financial assets are derecognised when the contractual rights to receive cash flows related to the asset expire. Financial liabilities are derecognised when they are extinguished, that is, when the obligation specified in the contract is discharged, cancelled, or expires. Any gain or loss on derecognition of the financial assets and financial liabilities is taken to income currently.

4.12 Offsetting of financial assets and liabilities

Financial assets and financial liabilities are only offset and the net amount reported in the statement of assets and liabilities when there is a legally enforceable right to set off the recognised amount and the Fund intends to either settle on a net basis, or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

4.13 Distribution to unit holders

Distribution to unit holders is recognised upon declaration and approval by the Board of Directors of the management company.

4.14 Net asset value per unit

The net asset value per unit disclosed in the statement of assets and liabilities is calculated by dividing the net assets of the Fund by the number of units in issue at the year end.

4.15 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise bank balances and short term deposits.

ACCOUNTING ESTIMATES AND JUDGEMENTS

The preparation of financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the application of policies and reported amounts of assets and liabilities, income and expenses. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and various other factors that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances, the result of which form the basis of making judgments about carrying values of assets and liabilities. The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis.

Judgements made by management in the application of accounting policies that have significant effect on the financial statements and estimates with a significant risk of material adjustment are explained in the relevant accounting policies / notes in the financial statements.

9.5 Term Finance Facility - Unsecured

Represents outstanding balance of term finance facility after restructuring approved in 2007, as Network Leasing Corporation Limited (NLCL) was unable to make timely payments of principal according to the repayment terms agreed previously. The strategic stake in NLCL has been acquired by new sponsors who have committed in principle to repay the amount due to the Fund based on revised terms and conditions. In accordance with the revised terms and conditions, the outstanding balance of Rs. 100 million has been converted into a term finance facility which is repayable to the Fund in 20 equal installments commencing from September 2008. The restructured facility carries mark-up at 1.5% per annum which is payable to the Fund on a quarterly basis till the principal amount is repaid.

Keeping in view the above mentioned facts, the management has recorded an impairment loss after comparing the expected recoverable amount of the term finance facility with its carrying amount.

9.6 Certificates of investment and musharika

These carry interest rates ranging from 10.65% to 16.00 % (2007: 10.80%) and will mature between July 2008 to October 2008.

9.7 Commercial papers

These carry interest rates ranging from 10.66% to 16.05% and will mature between October 2008 to March 2009.

9.8 Advance against term finance certificate

This represents Pre-IPO placement in TFC of Pakistan Mobile Communication (Private) Limited carrying mark-up at the rate of 12.95% per annum.

21. FINANCIAL RISK MANAGEMENT POLICIES

21.1 Interest rate risk exposure

Interest rate risk is the risk that the value of the financial instrument will fluctuate due to changes in the market interest rates. The financial instruments which are subject to interest rate risk are repriced at intervals of less than one year in accordance with the terms of the instruments. The following table sets out the carrying amount, by maturity, of Fund's financial instruments that are exposed to interest rate risk:

21.2 Market risk

Market risk is the risk that the value of the financial instrument may fluctuate as a result of changes in market interest rates or the market price of securities due to a change in credit rating of the issuer or the instrument, change in market sentiments, speculative activities, supply and demand of securities and liquidity in the market. The Fund manages market risk by monitoring exposure on securities by following the internal risk management policies and investment guidelines approved by the Investment Committee and regulations laid down by the SECP.

21.3 Liquidity risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that an enterprise will encounter difficulty in raising funds to meet commitments and obligations. The management company manages liquidity risk by following internal guidelines of the Investment Committee and by investing in liquid financial assets.

21.4 Credit risk

Credit risk arising from the inability of the counterparties to fulfill their obligations in respect of financial instrument contracts, is generally limited to the principal amount and accrued income thereon. The Fund's policy is to enter into financial instrument contracts by following internal guidelines such as approving counterparties, approving credit, obtaining adequate collateral and transacting through approved brokers.

Concentration of credit risk exists when changes in economic or industry factors similarly affect groups of counterparties whose aggregate credit exposure is significant in relation to the Fund's total credit exposure. Financial assets subject to credit risk amount to Rs.4,164.47 million (2007: 3,867.13 million). The Fund's portfolio of financial instruments is broadly diversified and transactions are entered into with diverse creditworthy counter parties, thereby mitigating any significant concentrations of credit risk.

21.5 Capital management

The Fund's objective when managing unit holder's funds is to safeguard the Fund's ability to continue as a going concern so that it can continue to provide optimum returns to its unit holders and to ensure reasonable safety of capital. The Fund manages its investment portfolio and other assets by monitoring return on net assets and makes adjustments to it in the light of changes in markets' conditions. The capital structure depends on the issuance and redemption of units.

22. FAIR VALUE OF FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS

Fair value is the amount for which an asset could be exchanged, or a liability settled, between knowledgeable willing parties in an arm's length transaction.

Financial assets which are tradable in an open market are revalued at the market prices prevailing on the balance sheet date. The estimated fair value of all other financial assets and liabilities is considered not significantly different from book value.

23. SUBSEQUENT EVENT - DISTRIBUTION TO UNIT HOLDERS PER UNIT

The Board of Directors of management company, in their meeting held on 04 July 2008, approved a distribution of Rs. 22.50 (2007: Rs.50) on the face value of Rs.500 each, i.e. 4.50% (2007: 10%), amounting to Rs. 178,437,067 (2007: Rs.349,423,976).
