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Lahore School of Economics' 9th Convocation: The End of an Academic Year, The Beginning of Another

The main event of Spring 2012 was the 9th Convocation of the Lahore School of Economics. Students, parents and faculty of the Lahore School congregated in large numbers at the Main Campus Burki to celebrate the much awaited graduation on January 14, 2012. The awards function culminated with throwing hats into the air, hooting, clapping and taking pictures and more pictures. They were also followed by many after convocation parties hosted by students and their families to congratulate the students for their hard work, and officially ending a good and fruitful chapter of their lives.

Convocation 2012 was highly discussed amongst the Class of 2011, for months before it even took place. The Convocation started on time at the Shumyla's Garden at the Lahore School's Main Campus. The students, all dressed up in traditional graduation attire, gathered at the campus earlier to catch up with old friends, before the Governor of the Punjab, Mr. Sardar Muhammad Latif Khan Khosa arrived.

The event commenced with Dr. Shahid Amjad Chaudhry's welcome address. The Rector of the Lahore School of Economics began with the highlights of the achievements of the institution in the previous year. As a private sector non-profit degree granting institution chartered by the Government of Punjab, it has matured to an established institution of higher learning in Lahore, with a wide range of academic disciplines at both the undergraduate and post graduate levels.

In his address, the Rector highlighted the research achievements by the faculty and students, and also emphasized the importance of research for its faculty and students.

The 9th Convocation marked a milestone not only for the students and their parents but also for the Lahore School of Economics' list of achievements.





Business Competitions Participated by Students

The Lahore School Nabs a Win at the Inaugural Change Management Competition at LUMS

The Lahore School of Economics' delegation of business students from MBA under the supervision of Prof. Fareed A. Fareedy won the Change Management Simulation competition at the LUMS HR Confluence 2012. The five ambitious and successful students that made Team Prism comprised of Maryem Zafar, Moiz Lodhi, Omair Anwar, Sehrish Saleem and Sheema Atta. Leading business schools all across Pakistan were competing to win the competition which also boasted a prize of Rs. 50,000/. for the winning team.

The intense competition tested students on simulating a change management strategy using a software developed by INSEAD. Two hours were given for the simulation, where the students had to act as management consultants who had to give advice to a top management of a leading telecom company to implement an IT based intranet system. Students were given interactive tools where the responses were measured according to the Awareness, Interest, Trial and Adoption (AITA) Model. The team that convinced the largest number of managers won. The Lahore School team was the only one that hit double digits, managing to convince eleven of the twenty two managers.

The students dubbed it an amazing experience. Dr. Ghufran Ahmad of LUMS lauded the performance of the team and commented that their performance was well above what he had experienced in the graduate programmes at LUMS itself. For the Lahore School of Economics, it is yet another milestone, as students mention it as being one step closer to cementing Lahore School's position as a top business school in Pakistan.

The Lahore School's Team Well Acknowledged at the Third Business Idea Competition for Agri-Business Idea

Under the guidance of Professor Fareed A. Fareedy, a team from the Lahore School of Economics participated in the third edition of Business Idea Competition 2012 on April 6 and 7, 2012 organized by FAST NU, Lahore. The competition comprised of three themes namely, E-Business, Power and Agri-Business. The team from the Lahore School consisted of MBA I students, Ahmed Sajjad, Moin uddin Qureshi, Nasir Azim Ilyas and Saba Tahir, and a BBA student named Zahra Imran Butt.

The Lahore School Team managed to maintain a spot in the final round of the event in Super Six after knocking out thirty other teams from various universities across Pakistan, including LUMS, FAST, University of Agriculture, Faislabad, UET, UMT, Preston University and others.





The team proposed a business idea relating to Agri-business, with the objective of providing service to the Agriculture sector of Pakistan in implementing the Global IFS and Good Agriculture Practices (GAP) standards in Pakistan. In doing so it would have helped enable the industry to earn better prices for their produce in the international market as well as improve the quality of crops.

The students' efforts and their business idea were well acknowledged by both the honorable judges and the event moderators.

Runners Up in the Global Investment Research Challenge

The Lahore School of Economics was declared the runner up in the Global Investment Research Challenge hosted by CFA Institute at Avari Towers, Karachi on January 2, 2012. This elite competition in finance takes

place every year and the Lahore School made its strong mark by securing second position in its very first participation among reputable business schools all over Pakistan. The team comprised of Abdul Wahab (MBA II), Adam Zia (MBA II), Omair Anwar (MBA II), Rafia Pervaiz (MBA II) and Mahnoor Asif (BSc IV). The team's mentor, Dr. Nawazish Mirza, Associate Professor of Finance applauded the team's performance, adding that it was a proud moment for Finance faculty at the Lahore School, and a remarkable achievement for the School.



Through a rigorous process of training, financial modeling, analysis, report writing and finally presenting the project, the team was confident about winning. However, they only fell short by two points. The team also found it a good learning experience, where they were able to put theoretical knowledge from their classrooms into proper real world practice. By taking up a strong position in the competition, the Lahore School team was able to build a strong brand name of the Lahore School of Economics in the financial industry.



IBA Invent – The Entrepreneurial Challenge 2011

Two teams consisting of students from the Lahore School of Economics competed in the Invent –Entrepreneurial Challenge 2011, a prestigious business idea competition hosted by IBA. The aim of the competition was to introduce the best young entrepreneurs to leading investors of the country to ensure that

fresh ideas can take root and nurture into proper profitable businesses of tomorrow. The judges of the competition consisted of top businessmen of Pakistan such as executives from Engro, Fatima Fertilizers Group and Arif Habib Corp. The Guest of Honor for the finals was ex-State Bank Governor, Dr. Ishrat Hussain.

Over 500 teams participated in the competition. The first Lahore School team consisted of Saad Raja, Waqas Arshad, Mahad Raza, Saaimullah Khan and Urva Hassan Zubairi from BSc III, who called themselves Bio-Met Fuels. They posited the idea of bio-gas as an alternative fuel source for industrial electricity generation. Bio-Met Fuels were successful in making the top 50 teams and were awarded Rs. 25,000/ cash prize for their efforts.

The team that won the competition, Laal Fertilizers, was a multiuniversity team comprising of students from the Lahore

Schooland LUMS. The team was led by Saad Khan Durrani BBA IV and Hassan Javaid Ghani, BBA III (Lahore School of Economics), Adeel Khan BSc III and Shahnawaz Khalid BSc III (LUMS). The team proposed utilizing processed slaughterhouse waste and converting it to organic fertilizers. Laal Fertilizers were lauded for its thorough research, extensive knowledge of target market and excellent presentation. They were awarded a prize of Rs. 500,000 for winning the competition and were also approached by keen investors.



GLOBAL MARKET UPDATE By Salaar Farooq

Market Philosophy Talk

Stock index levels and their changes in essence, represent dynamic aggregate "market expectations" of the underlying companies' future prospects. Therefore indices are useful tools in gauging investor sentiments about future, in tracking money flows (i.e. liquidity) within asset classes and across broader markets. As

"expectations" are generated by "human thoughts under uncertainty trying to capture all potential possibilities into the future", these expectations have a tendency to change rather quickly and without notice in the world of markets. In addition let's also not forget, these market expectations are ultimately driven by human cognitive and emotional biases, and thus may result in either under or over reaction to unexpected news, as the world unfolds into reality from one time to the next. Having said that, indeed it is this very "irrational and emotional human behavior", which spices up the tug of war between buyers versus sellers and inevitably makes markets a joy for those participants. After all, for any transaction to even occur (creating open positions), there must be at least two potential alternate and conflicting expected futures.

Explaining expectation is tricky. Even the world of academics is exposed to the tendency of seeking a neat and clean predictive equation usually derived from historical data using tools such as Bell curves which implies an assumption that history will repeat itself; all this is an effort to explain away messy random behavior of such irrational markets through mathematical models and symbols, with neat alpha haircuts, beta trims, and random error sideburns. The irony is that, it is this never ending loop of expected forward "expectations" of market participants which initially creates the possibility of a divergence between actual verses expected outcomes. Please keep in mind; actual outcome does ultimately matter absolutely in a portfolio setting, while expectations are in essence just an imagination of the mind (i.e. not actual reality).

Let's now take a peek at what happened to these indices around the world in the last year between April 2011 and April 2012.

World Market Snapshot

Leading stock market indices were a mixed bag of volatility around the world. The table below shows closing prices as on April 19, 2012. For ease of discussion, the world has been divided into three blocks: West, Middle, and East.

West block market indices dropped significantly from April 2011-2012, with the exception of USA. The Dow Jones Industrials rose +4.7% while NASDAQ ballooned a staggering +28.6%. In sharp contrast, countries in Europe took a massive beating during the same period. Greece, Spain, and Italy took the worst pain in the group falling a jaw dropping -51%, -33%, and -32% respectively. Others were not spared either with Euro, France, and Canada tanking an eye popping -20%, -19%, and -13% in order. UK and Germany were relatively better off with only -4% and -6% losses. It seems quite evident the debt crises in Europe caused uncertainty to spike; US Dollar attracted flows due to perception of it being a safer haven for the world. In

essence therefore, the European crises apparently has helped rather than hindered US markets, at least in the short run. Please note most of this US recovery is weighted towards end 2011 onwards. From April till end 2011, US markets were on a sharp decline and began their optimistic rebound end of 2011 through 2012.

The middle block experienced mixed results. Turkey, India, and UAE were down -12%, -10%, and -5% in order while Saudi was up +14% and Pakistan a whopping +19%. Apparently markets seem to be quite optimistic about Pakistan's economy, at least in relation to 2011.

The East block added another interesting series of market action to the world. Chinese markets fell off a cliff down -21% while others followed closely with Russia -16%, Australia -10%, Korea -8%, and Japan ending flat. However, there were some positive stories in the region as well. Thailand was up with a bang at +28%, followed by Indonesia +10%, and Malaysia +4%.

If a snapshot had been taken end of 2011, the world picture was much worst off compared with current situation of April 2012. Thus, according to markets, the world's future is not so bleak after all! In fact, market recovery this year implies an optimism, which suggests there is light at the end of the tunnel, even though the distance to that light remains quite fuzzy. However, keep in mind, current optimism is based on an assumption of continued positive data being released in the near future. Should this assumption be falsified, markets will have no remorse switching directions immediately and without warning.

Pakistan Market Recap

Pakistan has gone through quite a roller coaster ride in the last 5 years (post boom period). In summer of 2008 before the US Lehman crash, the country was already facing internal turmoil. Government swapped hands unexpectedly, PKR devalued against the dollar (-35%), inflation spiked (+25.3%), stock markets froze (KSE-100 halted at 9200 from a high of 15,676 same year), property bubble crashed, and energy crises kicked into full gear, just to name a few of a series of challenges which followed. However, from a low of 4,929 in 2009, the KSE-100 has staged a strong comeback, on the back of healthy corporate earnings and bullish expectations, reaching a surprising level of 13,799 as of this report. This implies quite an optimistic future for Pakistan as far as market expectations are concerned. Four words may capture the essence of Pakistan markets: Robust, stubborn, optimistic, and highly unpredictable (i.e. volatile). Disclaimer: please enter these markets at your own risk!

Most problems faced within the country are locally generated as a result of persisting contradictions in economic, social, political, and law & order spheres. On the flipside, it must be mentioned that Pakistan as a country is rich in resources and has immense potential for growth. The only missing link is in aligning internal structures (which are out of sync with one another) to reaching full utilization of already available resources.

Competition and comparison, rather than collaboration and cooperation, seems to be the bedrock principle of local culture. Let's not forget, ultimately the human psychology and emotional biases determine significantly the final state of an economy and its markets within the system. Maybe the only change which is







required is to shift perspectives towards the long term (inclusive), rather than the current short term (exclusive) approach used within the framework of Pakistan's local decision making paradigm.

Pakistan's GDP (\$175 billion) in 2011 slowed to a humble 2.4% yoy from 3.76% of previous year. Inflation (although downward trending), is holding at a current 10.8% yoy (March). SBP currently is targeting the short term discount rate at 12.5%, trying to create a balance between growth and inflation, with a focus primarily on price stability. Going forward it remains to be seen how government will try to resolve issues related to increases indebtedness, massive deficits, huge spending, ballooning money supply, increasing energy shortage, persistent inflation, and high system wide inefficiency. Government plays a significant role and has considerable impact in the country's economic management (given the small size of GDP), so let's hope we are in good hands and sensible policy decisions are coming in the future. All in all, optimism remains intact in Pakistan, despite multiple challenges facing the nation. Again only time will confirm how the story unfolds in the coming months. The markets for one have clearly taken a bullish view on Pakistan so far.

Summary

Overall the world markets went through rough patches, volatile rides, and high G-stress maneuvers during the last year (April 2011-2012). However, optimism seems to be returning in the most recent months as demonstrated by market price action and economic indicators. Even though the road to full recovery may be a long one, initial positive conditions seem to be falling into place, although fragile at this point in time. The year 2012 will prove to be an important one in giving clearer direction to the world economy. Europe may turn out to be the weak link, although by no means is it the only one. Let's fasten our harnesses and prepare for a bumpy market ride into the future. Hopefully it will all turn out positive. Yes, there is still hope! But the bottom line question still remains. Are you willing to bet your money on it?

Lengths of the Degrees:

- MSc Economics Programme: 1 Year taught programme
- MS Economics Programme: 1 Year taught programme, followed by a semester for MS research project
- MPhil Economics Programme: 1 Year taught programme, followed by a half year MPhil research thesis

MPhil course offered by Ms. Kate Vyborny

The course offers students the ability to do better empirical research in development economics and improve their ability to understand and read critically other people's research.

Study on School Choice in Rural Punjab Completed

A report on school choice in rural Punjab was prepared for the Open Society Institute by the CREB staff, including Dr. Masooma Habib, Hamna Ahmed and Sahar Amjad. The main emphasis of the report was in answering questions on the factors that parents consider important when deciding between public and private school for their child. Seminar on Quality- Inequality Quandary, Transacting Learning Relevance & Teacher Education in South Asia

(I) Dr. Masooma Habib was a panelist in the Regional Seminar Quality - Inequality Quandary - Transacting Learning Relevance& Teacher Education in South Asia held on 4-5 April 2012 at Pearl Continental, Lahore. The seminar was hosted by the South Asian Forum for Education Development (SAFED), Idara-e-Taleem-o-Aagahi (ITA) and the Education Testing Service (ETS) Princeton. The objectives of the seminar were to contextualize the challenges of curriculum/learning relevance and inequality reflected in learning outcomes and assessment studies, explore good practices and policies for bridging the inequality gaps through contemporary approaches of 'what works', build communities of practice for research, sharing resources and ideas for transformative models of learning and to explore innovative financing options for addressing the quality-inequality gaps to meet MDG's, EFA goals and post 2015 challenges. Dr. Masooma offered her comments and analysis under session 6 on Education financing for bridging the inequality gap.

(ii) Dr. Tayyaba Tamim presented a paper "Language in Education: A Three Dimensional Comparative Analysis of Private and Government Schools in Pakistan at the strategic Regional Seminar by South Asian Forum for Education Development(SAFED), Idara-e-Taleem-o-Aghai (ITA) and the Education Testing Services (ETS) Princeton, at Pearl Continental, Lahore. The seminar aimed at providing intelligent solutions that will improve the quality of education for sustainable access in the region. It served as a platform for policy dialogues on key themes to inform provincial, national and global conversations that influence strategic directions for bridging the quality challenges and inequality gap. Workshop on Human Opportunity by the World Bank

Dr. Naved Hamid was a panelist at the joint seminar by Beaconhouse National University and the World Bank *on Human Opportunity and Decentralization of Social Services in Pakistan* on 28th January 2012 at Avari Hotel, Lahore. The objectives of the seminar were to share with a well-informed audience the World Bank findings on Pakistan's progress in coverage and equity in access to basic human – health and education – opportunities, as summarized by the analysis of the human opportunity index (HOI) at the provincial and district levels, and to better understand the prospects offered by decentralization of health and education to improve service delivery from the efficiency, equity and governance perspectives. Dr. Naved offered his comments and analysis on the dialogue under the second technical session, which covered the topic area of the Human Opportunity Index.




Book Exhibition



Centre for Policy and Environment

The routine at the Centre for Policy and Environment currently involves research seminars, extension lectures and field trips beyond the normal routine of teaching during the semester and research throughout the year. Following are the activities that took place during the Spring Semester of 2012.

Teaching

MPhil Research Projects

The senior MPhil students continued their work on the following research projects:

- Climate Change: Two students (Abid Ali Chohan and Isbah Hameed) are working on two separate projects relating to Clean Development Mechanism (CDM) as Pakistan's industries try to develop energy efficiencies and decrease their emissions under the Kyoto Protocol (1997).
- **Energy Group**: Two students are working on environmental issues and feasibility of alternative energy sources, biogas (Sadia Imran) and solar energy (Zenab Naseem).
- **E-Waste**: Sidrah Inayat Khan is working on the environmental impact and disposal path of electronic gadgets, a new category of hazardous waste which requires disposal and recycling on an increasing scale.
- **Media's Role in Environment**: Media plays a most important role in informing and mobilizing public on environmental issues. Ms. Sara Ali is looking at how major newspapers deal with environment in Pakistan and the awareness and interest of media personnel involved in this sector.
- **Design of Integrated Management System (IMS) for Industry**: Maryam Yasin is designing an IMS for a major industrial concern as well as looking into problems associated with it.
- Pathan/Afghan Migration, Livelihoods and Social Change in Walled City, Lahore: The historic
 walled city of Lahore is an abode to around 160,000 people in an area of one square mile. It has existed in
 some form for over a thousand years. Ms. Rabia Nadir is looking at how the recent wave of
 Pathan/Afghan migration as well as national and global change is affecting the local livelihoods and
 society.
- Milk Production in Peri-Urban Lahore: Pakistan is the fourth largest milk producer in the world. More
 than 95 percent of this production is carried out in the informal sector by small farmers and peri-urban
 based gawalas. Mr. Mubarak Nasir takes a look at the issues, trends and conflicts related to this
 economic sector which generates millions of jobs.

CPE Extension Lecture Series

CPE invited a number of eminent speakers to deliver talks to its students:

- **Dr. Ahsan Rana on Genetically Modified (GM) Seeds**: Dr. Rana discussed the environmental implications of a biotechnology breakthrough on January 31, 2012.
- Atiyab Sultan: Ms. Sultan who teaches Development Economics at the Lahore University of Management Sciences (LUMS) addressed the environmental sciences students on the environmentdevelopment debate, on February 12, 2012. She discussed a hypothesis by the well-known economist Jaffery Sachs on the climatic control of development.
- Rabia Nadir: Ms. Nadir who teaches at the Lahore School gave a talk on the built space in the Walled City of Lahore on March 1, 2012.
- Dr. Ahsan Rana on Intellectual Property Rights (IPRs): IPRs are a controversial issue. Dr. Rana argued that while IPRs are promoted to incentivize innovation, it is also a fact that no single institution can take credit as all knowledge is built incrementally on preexisting knowledge and with help of the larger society. Dr. Rana also gave yet another talk, this time on food security on March 20, 2012. He discussed the ideas of Malthus, Amertya Sen and Boserup on food security and presented data on food production in Pakistan between 1961 and 2006.
- Arif Hassan: On March 9, 2012, students attended a talk by the renowned architect planner Mr. Arif Hassan at the Centre for Policy and Governance, Forman Christian College University. Mr. Hassan discussed at length issues related to social change and urbanization through the lens of Karachi.
- **Prof. Anwar Syed on the Turmoil in Balochistan**: In his talk Prof. Syed traced the history of Balochistan from the British period. He emphasized that Balochistan was not a settled area even under the British rule. Although army operations are being carried out repeatedly in Balochistan, the professor argued that the real need for a solution to this province is to understand the problem historically and treat it politically.
- Kamil Khan Mumtaz on Modernity and Tradition: Leading architect and planner Mr. Kamil Khan Mumtaz delivered four lectures on the conflict between modernity and tradition in determining the direction and philosophy of development. At the end of the series he led the class to a visit to a traditional house designed by him on Bedian Road.
- Alexander Kuhne: Mr. Kuhne who is a volunteer German at the Roshni School and an agricultural scientist by profession discussed issues related to organic food production. At the end he took the class for a visit to the Lahore School's agricultural farm.
- Imrana Tiwana on Struggle to Save Lahore: Ms. Tiwana, an environmentalist and President of Lahore Bachao Tehrik described the recent developmental trends threatening Lahore's natural and cultural heritage. She traced the plan to widen the canal-side road in Lahore and the struggle to save the canal-side heritage of Lahore. This eventually led to a court battle and the passing of a historic judgment on the issue by the Supreme Court of Pakistan. Many concerned institutions including the Environment Centre of the Lahore School of Economics presented their position before the special Commission constituted by the Supreme Court of Pakistan.





• US Professors: Three distinguished guest scholars, Dr. Will Glover, Dr. Farina Mir and Dr. Preeti Chopra addressed a seminar about their work and current research at the Centre for Policy and Environment on Friday, March 30. Dr. Glover is an Associate Professor at the University of Michigan jointly appointed in the Architectural Program and the Department of History. He is the author of "Making Lahore Modern". Dr. Chopra is an Associate Professor in the Department of Language and Cultures of Asia at the University of Wisconsin at Madison and has written a book, "A Joint Enterprise: Indian Elites and the Making of British Bombay". Dr. Mir too is an Associate Professor at the University of Michigan and has written a book, "Social Space of Language", on the Punjabi Language.

Field Trips

Walled City Lahore: The students made three visits to the historic Walled City to know the life and specifically the health conditions of the residents.

Soan Valley: On February 1 and 2, 2012, on the World Wetland Days, the students visited three major lakes located in the Salt Range. They stayed overnight at Kalar Kahar and looked at the agriculture, health and life of the people of Soan Valley apart from studying the ecology of wetlands.

Khuda Ki Basti and Al-Ansar Model City: The urbanization students visited two low cost housing schemes on March 12, 2012, "Khuda Ki Basti" and "Al Ansar Model City" at the outskirts of Lahore at Kala Shah Kaku. A non-governmental organization has taken the lead to provide 4.5 marla non-transferable plots for Rs. 120,000/- each on cash and installments. The condition for residents is to move in within 90 days of purchase. Most people lived onsite while building their homes incrementally. A close-knit community was developed with educational facilities and high security for children.

Bhera: On February 13, 2012, the Environment students visited the historic twin cities of *Bhera* and *Namak-Miani*. They compared the plan, architecture and life of the Walled City at Bhera with that of the Walled City of Lahore.

Trip to DHA Lahore: In order to compare and contrast the low cost housing schemes, the old city of Lahore and Bhera with modern urban planning, students made a trip to the Defence Housing Authority on March 19, 2012. They also interviewed a DHA estate agent. They discovered that modern living was low density, high consumption and dependent on motorized transport.

House on Traditional Style: A visit to an under-construction house on Bedian Road was led by eminent architect Kamil Khan Mumtaz. The house was built on traditional style in bricks, without using cement and steel.







Balakot Muzaffarabad Study: Students of Urbanization course went on a three day trip (April 8 – 10, 2012) to Balakot Muzaffarabad, the site of the 2005 Earthquake, which had damaged and destroyed these cities. The objective was to study the post-earthquake reconstruction. The following findings were also discovered:

- People were grateful for the post-earthquake relief by Pakistani citizens and international agencies especially Middle Eastern countries and Turkey. The relief effort had promoted unity among regions.
- There was not much to show for the \$6 billion of loans contracted by the state for reconstruction except

 (a) each affected household had been given Rs. 100,000 to 175,000 for reconstruction and repair, (b)
 debris had been cleared and some roads had been partially repaired.
- The state had miserably failed at planning and reconstruction. Many were still living in makeshift shelter homes. The promised new cities had yet to materialize.
- The plan to avoid rebuilding on the most dangerous 'Red Zone' area could not be implemented because the state had failed to provide an alternative in terms of housing and livelihood.
- Long range planning by state had been replaced by project implementation by NGOs.
- The cataclysmic jolt has pushed people further into money relations, higher levels of consumption, modernity and individualism.

















Centre for Mathematics and Statistical Sciences

The Centre for Mathematics and Statistical Sciences was initiated in January 2006 as the Centre for Statistics with the objective to streamline teaching of Statistics and setting up a resource centre for helping post graduate students in their research work. The successful functioning of the centre provided a strong foundation for extending it to the field of Mathematics. At the Lahore School, courses in Mathematics and Statistics are being taught at all levels. In accordance to the HEC directions, course curricula are designed and implemented to standardize teaching resources for the instructors.

Courses from the Centre for Mathematics and Statistics are included in the following degrees:

- B.Sc. (Hons) with Major in Economics and Minors in Mathematics & Statistics
- BBA (Hons) with Major in Finance and Minors in Mathematics & Statistics

The Centre also manages courses in Business Computing and MIS.

Presently, Prof. Dr. Rana Abdul Wajid is the Director of the Centre for Mathematics and Statistical Sciences. Dr. Rehana Naz, Associate Professor in Mathematics, looks after courses in Mathematics. Dr. Syeda Rabab Mudakkar joined the centre as Assistant Professor last year.

Achievements

Since its inception, the Centre has introduced new courses such as Statistical Quality Management, Mathematical Economics I and Mathematical Economics II, Optimization, Differential Equations, Linear Algebra, Probability and Statistical Inference and Time Series Analysis and Forecasting. The subjects of Statistics and Mathematics have now been introduced as minor at undergraduate levels. There are eight courses from Mathematics and Statistics in this area. The Centre has collected primary data for the theses of Ph. D students and for the researchers at CREB and CPE.

The Centre has already completed around fifteen projects with the faculty members and the two research Centres. In seven projects, primary data was collected from Lahore and some other areas while other projects were mainly relying on secondary source of micro data. The center provided extensive support for processing and analyzing data and for interpreting the results.

Ms. Azmat Nafees, Assistant Professor of Statistics at the Lahore School of Economics left for New Zealand for her PhD in Statistics. She has also completed her MPhil in Management.


It has been actively involved in organizing the faculty training workshops and subsequent co-ordination efforts. It also prepares the evaluation/timings section of the year end Performance Appraisals for the faculty members.

Faculty Development Workshops 2012

A series of workshops were conducted under the auspices of Dr. Tariq Husain, former Director World Bank. The Senior Deputy Registrar Academics, Ms. Romana Noor, Deputy Registrar Quality Assurance, Amberin Tanvir and Assistant Registrar Quality Assurance, Mamoona Nazeer prepared and co ordinated the organization of the workshop.

The first workshop was the Vision, Mission and Values workshop held on February 1, at the Mehmood Chaudhry Library. The workshop audience comprised of 21 faculty members, the Deans of the Disciplines, the Rector Dr. Shahid Amjad Chaudhry, Dr. Tariq Husain and a few members of the alumni. A Vision and Mission handout was given out and read out by Dr. Tariq Husain. The audience broke up into groups and discussed the various aspects of the handout content. Each group came up with their version of the Vision statement. All groups made their presentations and a consolidated Mission statement was developed, signed and endorsed by the participants.

The second workshop was held on February 29th and March 7th. This Professional Development workshop comprised of 2 sessions. Session one was held on the 29th of February which was a presentation session on lesson planning and aids to learning. It started with an introduction on professional development by the Rector Dr. Shahid Amjad Chaudhry followed by presentations by the Deans of the Disciplines on their strategies on lesson planning and learning facilitation. The session was followed by practical presentations on the 1st of March by faculty members on a specific topic. The faculty members along with the Teaching Associates (prospective faculty members) presented and were evaluated by a panel comprising of the Dean







of the Discipline and a senior faculty member. The panel created a real life class room situation by questioning the faculty members, and in turn sharing their comments regarding their teaching style and improvements to be made.

A third workshop was held for the Administrative Staff. This Values to behaviours workshop discussed desirable values and consequent behaviours which needed to be fostered in the Administrative staff.

In addition to these workshops, the lecture sessions of some of our senior faculty members have to be videotaped and will be shown to junior faculty to develop and foster exemplary teaching style of instruction.








Workshop (Values to Behaviour)




The website of the Career Development Office has been deployed on the LAN. The aim of the website is to link the students with the office at all times. The employers can post the job and internship opportunities directly to the students.


Financial Assistance Office

Scholarships and Financial Assistance

The Lahore School of Economics offers generous financial assistance and scholarships to a large number of undergraduate, graduate and post graduate students. The Lahore School's aim is to provide maximum assistance to deserving students in order to enable them to achieve their goals without experiencing financial hurdles which could deter them from succeeding or make them leave their studies due to financial burdens. The School already offers financial assistance based on need and merit or a combination of waiver of tuition fee along with work compensation in the form of student TA-ships. It also provides 25% additional special scholarship for students with single or divorced parents. Following are graphs that depict the types of scholarships that the current student body are availing, which also includes the year wise depiction:

With a student body of over three thousand students, almost 30% students are studying on some form of scholarship.





New Scholarships

In lieu of the new PhD programmes starting at the Lahore School, a Major Merit Scholarship is now being offered for graduates who are admitted to the PhD programmes in Business and Economics. It is a 100% Merit Scholarship for the first term of the programme, which will continue for subsequent terms provided that the students maintain a CGPA of 3.0 at the end of each semester.

International Collaborations

The Lahore School of Economics' Financial Assistance Office maintains healthy collaborations with three other universities abroad for student and faculty exchange programmes and joint research collaborations. Overall, the day was celebrated in high spirits, with the girls at the Lahore School enjoying the day to the fullest.


Asia Cup Fever at the Lahore School

Undergraduate Programme Office

The Undergraduate Programme Office for I & II year functions with the combined efforts of a team of seven people. The total student body of the first year is around seven hundred and twenty six students while the second year comprises of six hundred and forty four students.

In the Winter Semester, 2011, eight students secured a CGPA of 4.0 from the first year programme. Forty three students received need based scholarships and eight students got merit scholarships. For the second year students, two students maintained their CGPA of 4.0. Seventy three were awarded need based scholarships, and five were awarded merit based scholarships.
