Statement Under Section 160 of The Companies Ordinance, 1984

1. Remuneration of Chief Executive

The Board of Directors in their meeting held on April 02, 1996, appointed Dr. Mahmood Ahmad as the Chief Executive of the Company on the terms and conditions as specified in the Company's letter dated April 03, 1996 issued to the members in accordance with section 218 of the Companies Ordinance 1984.

The Board has at its meeting held on September 30, 1997 resolved to revise the annual remuneration of Dr. Mahmood Ahmad effective from April 27, 1997 from Rs. 720,000 to Rs. 840,000 and thereafter 15% increase for next year. This was advised to the members through Company's letter dated October 06, 1997 as required by section 218 of the Companies Ordinance, 1984.

Other benefits as set out in the Company's letter dated October 06, 1997 referred to above will remain unchanged.

Approval of above is sought from the General body of the Shareholders.

Resolution as per Section 164(1) of the Companies Ordinance 1984

"Resolved that the revision in annual remuneration of Dr. Mahmood Ahmad, Chief Executive as specified in the Company's letter dated October 06, 1997 issued to the members in accordance with section 218 of the Companies Ordinance, 1984 be and is hereby approved".

2. Investment in Associated Company

Berger Paints Pakistan Limited in order to acquire latest technology for production and application of road marking paints and allied products signed a Memorandum of Understanding with DPI Sendirian Berhad of Malaysia to form a Private Limited Company to undertake manufacturing, selling and contracts for application of road marking paints, traffic signs and traffic safety products.

The initial capital of the Company will be Rs. 10 million in the following ratio:

Berger : 51% DPI : 49%

RESOLUTIONS AS PER SECTION 164(1) OF THE COMPANIES ORDINANCE 1984

"RESOLVED that this body approves the action taken by the Board of Directors of BERGER for obtaining technology in road marking paints and in allied products, formation and incorporation of a Private Limited Company".

"FURTHER RESOLVED that the Board of Directors be and are hereby authorised to make investment in the said Company not exceeding Rs. 5.1 million".

"FURTHER RESOLVED that the Directors be and are hereby authorised to take all steps necessary for implementing these RESOLUTIONS".

3. Issuance of Bonus Shares

The Board of Directors in their meeting held on September 30, 1997 has recommended issuance of bonus shares in the ratio of 1:10 which is required to be approved by the general body of shareholders.

Resolution as per Section 164(1) of the Companies Ordinance 1984

"RESOLVED that a sum of Rs. 2,803,086 out of the profits available for appropriation be capitalised for issuing fully paid shares of Rs. 10 each as bonus shares to be allotted to those share-holders whose names appear in the register on November 03, 1997 in the proportion of one share for every ten shares held. The said bonus shares shall rank

pari-passu with the existing shares of the Company".

"FURTHER, RESOLVED that bonus shares entitlement in fractions be sold by the Directors on the Karachi Stock Exchange and the proceeds be distributed to Shareholders in accordance with their entitlements".

"FURTHER, RESOLVED that for the purpose of giving effect to the foregoing, the Directors be and are hereby authorised to give such directions as they deem fit to settle any question or any difficulty that may arise in the distribution of the said bonus shares or in payment of the sale proceeds of fractions".

Chairman's Review

I am pleased in presenting my report on the Company's performance for the year ended June 30, 1997.

Trading Results:

The market remained uncertain and static during the year 1996-97 because of the changes in the Government and the general election held in February, 1997. The economic reform policies and incentives to stimulate the economy by the new Government were announced towards the last quarter. We hopefully look forward to the upturn in the market in the coming years. However, despite the adverse market conditions your Company has achieved a growth of 7% in turnover compared to last year, primarily by improving the product mix and concentrating on profitable segments of the trade. The profit after tax for the year was Rs. 22.41 million and your Board is pleased to recommend a dividend of Re. 1/- per share in cash and bonus shares in the ratio of one share for every ten shares (10%).

J&N Pakistan Limited, wholly owned subsidiary company at Mirpur, performed satisfactorily and contributed in the profit by way of dividend to the Company.

Excise Duty:

In view of delay in the refund of Rs. 18 million from Excise Department on account of excise duty paid on thinners, the Company has filed during the year an execution application with the High Court of Sindh.

General:

Re-instatement of fixed capacity tax system on unorganised sector for levy of Excise duty and Sales tax has again adversely affected the organised sector as they are paying these taxes on actual basis. We expect the Government will take action to ensure uniformity in this sector.

Industrial relations remained satisfactory during the year.

Future Outlook:

The construction of highways and road development programmes undertaken by the Government have created an opportunity for developing road marking paints and their

application. Your Company has signed a Memorandum of Understanding with DPI Sendirian Berhad of Malaysia for acquiring the technology and technique of its application. For this purpose a Joint Venture Company is being established in which your Company will be holding 51% shares. This is in keeping with our objectives of improving and acquiring latest technology to enhance our share in the market.

I take this opportunity to record my deep sense of appreciation for the efforts put in by the staff at all levels during the year.

Notes to and forming part of the Accounts for the year ended June 30, 1997

1. INTRODUCTION

- 1.1 The Company was incorporated in Pakistan on March 25, 1950 as a limited company and was subsequently converted into a public limited company. The Company's shares are quoted on the Karachi and Islamabad stock exchanges. The Company is engaged in manufacturing of paints, varnishes and other related items.
- 1.2 The option available to Companies to adopt a calendar year as income year under the provisions of the Income Tax Ordinance, 1979 was withdrawn through the Finance Act, 1995. Consequently, the Company is now required to adopt the financial year (i.e. July to June) as its income year for tax purposes. In view of the above the Company has changed its accounting year end from December to June effective June 30, 1996. As a consequence of this change these accounts have been prepared for the year ended June 30, 1997, whereas the corr6spondin[1 figures are for the eighteen months period ended June 30, 1996.

2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

2.1 Accounting convention

These accounts have been prepared under the .historical cost convention except that certain fixed assets have been included at a revaluation as referred to in note 2.4 below.

2.2 Staff retirement benefits

(a) Gratuity

The Company operates a funded gratuity scheme in respect of all permanent employees and payments to the fund are made in accordance with the Income Tax Rules, 1982. The last actuarial valuation was carried out as of December 31, 1996 on the basis of the 'Attained Age Method'. As of December 31, 1996, the liability for past services was Rs. 6.492 million against which the market value of the fund's assets was Rs. 5.963 million. The International Accounting Standard No. 19 'Retirement Benefit Costs' requires that the deficit should be spread over the working lives of existing members. Accordingly, the actuary has recommended that contributions at the current rate of 5.25% of the annual basic payroll should be made in the future which will be sufficient to absorb the deficit. The principal actuarial assumptions used in the valuation of the scheme as of December 31, 1996 by the actuary are:

- · Expected rate of growth in future salaries: 8% per annum
- · Expected rate of return on fund: 10% per annum

(b) Pension

The Company has established a pension fund scheme for all executives. Contributions are payable to the fund on a monthly basis $b\sim$ /the company and employees respectively at rates of 5% and 2% of basic salaries of the employees which rates are in excess of the minimum contribution rates recommended by the actuary of 1% and 2.5% respectively. The last actuarial valuation of this fund was carried out as of December 31,

1994 on the basis of the 'aggregate method'. As of December 31, 1994 the liability for past services was Rs. 2.749 million against which the market value of the fund's assets was Rs. 7.679 million. The principal actuarial assumptions used in the valuation of the scheme as of December 31, 1994 by the actuary are:

- · Expected rate of growth in future salaries: 8% per annum
- · Expected rate of return on fund: 10% per annum

2.3 Taxation

Current

Provision for current taxation is based on taxable income at the current rates of taxation after taking into account tax credit and tax rebates available, if any, or minimum tax at 0.5% of turnover, whichever is higher.

Deferred

The Company accounts for-deferred taxation on all material timing differences using the liability method.

2.4 Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Leasehold land, buildings thereon and plant and machinery as at March 31, 1988 have been revalued by an independent valuer as of that date and are shown at net revalued amounts, additions subsequent to that date are stated at cost. All other assets including capital work-in-progress are stated at cost.

Depreciation is charged to income applying the straight-line method whereby the cost of an asset is written off over its estimated useful life. A full year's depreciation is charged on additions, while no depreciation is charged on items disposed off during the year. Freehold land is stated at cost. Leasehold land is amortised over the period of the lease. Maintenance and normal repairs are charged to income as and when incurred. Major renewals and improvements are capitalised and the assets so replaced, if any, are retired. Profit or loss on disposal of assets is recognised in income currently.

2.5 Fixed assets acquired on finance leases

Consistent with prior periods the company accounts for fixed assets acquired under finance leases by recording the asset and the related liability. These amounts are determined on the basis of discounted value of minimum lease payments. Financial charges are allocated to the accounting period in a manner so as to provide a constant periodic rate of charge on the outstanding liability. Depreciation is charged to income applying the straight line method at the rates stated in note 13(a) below.

2.6 Stores

Stores are valued at actual cost.

2.7 Stocks

Stocks of raw and packing materials, except those in transit, and semi-processed and finished goods are valued at the lower of average cost and net realisable value. Average cost in relation to finished goods represents prime cost and appropriate portion of manufacturing expenses, and excise duty paid thereon. Semi-processed goods are valued at direct materials cost only.

Items in transit are stated at cost comprising invoice values plus other charges paid thereon.

Net realisable value is determined on the basis of estimated selling price of the product in the ordinary course of business less costs necessarily to be incurred for its sale. :~!

2.8 Trade debts

Debts considered irrecoverable are written off and provision is made against those considered doubtful of recovery.

2.9 Investments

Investments are stated at cost.

2.10 Foreign currency translations

Assets and liabilities in foreign currencies are translated into rupees at the rates of exchange which approximate to those prevailing at the balance sheet date. Exchange gains and losses are included in income currently.

2.11 Revenue recognition

Sales are recorded when goods are despatched and invoiced.

Income from investments is accounted for in accordance with the rules under which such investments are made.

Notes to and forming part of the Accounts

for the year ended June 30, 1997

1. INTRODUCTION

- 1.1 The Company is incorporated in Pakistan as a public limited company. The Company is principally engaged in the manufacture and sale of decorative paints. The Company's manufacturing facilities are located in Mirpur, Azad Kashmir.
- 1.2 The option available to Companies to adopt a calendar year as income year under the provisions of the Income Tax Ordinance, 1979 was withdrawn through the Finance Act, 1995. Consequently, the Company is now required to adopt the financial year (i.e. July to June) as its income year for tax purposes. In view of the above the Company has changed its accounting year end from December to June effective June 30, 1996. As a consequence of this change these accounts have been prepared for the year ended June 30, 1997, whereas the corresponding figures are for the eighteen months period ended June 30, 1996.

2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

2.1 Accounting convention

These accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

2.2 Taxation

The Company is exempt from tax under clause 118(c) of the second schedule to the Income Tax Ordinance, 1979 for a period of eight years from February 4, 1993 i.e. the date of commencement of its business. The Company, however, makes provisions for minimum tax at 0.5% of turnover, as required under section 80D of the Income Tax Ordinance, 1979.

2.3 Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Operating fixed assets are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation except for capital work in progress which is stated at cost.

Depreciation is charged to income applying the straight line method whereby the cost of an asset is written off over its estimated useful life considering the circumstances in which the company is operating. A full year's depreciation is charged on additions, while no depreciation is charged on items disposed of during the year.

Maintenance and normal repairs are charged to income. as and when incurred.

Major renewals and improvements are capitalised and the assets so replaced, if any, are retired. Profit or loss on disposal of assets, except that arising on sale and leaseback transactions which result in finance leases, is recognised in income currently.

2.4 Fixed assets acquired on finance leases

Consistent with prior periods the Company accounts for fixed assets acquired under finance leases by recording the asset and the related liability. These amounts are determined on the basis of discounted value of minimum lease payments. Financial charges are allocated to the accounting period in a manner so as to provide a constant periodic rate of charge on the outstanding liability. Depreciation is charged to income applying the straight line method at the rates stated in note 10 below.

2.5 Stores

Stores are valued at actual cost.

2.6 Stocks

Raw and packing materials, except for goods in transit, semi-processed items and finished goods are valued at the lower of average cost and net realisable value. Average cost in relation to finished goods represents prime cost and appropriate proportion of manufacturing expenses. Semi-processed goods are valued at direct materials cost only.

Goods in transit are stated at cost comprising invoice values plus other charges paid thereon.

Net realisable value is determined on the basis of estimated selling price of the product in the ordinary course of business less costs necessarily to be incurred for its sale.

2.7 Foreign currency translations

Assets and liabilities in foreign currencies are either translated into rupees at the rates of exchange which approximate to those prevailing at the balance sheet date or at the forward contract rate. Exchange gains and losses are included in income currently.

2.8 Revenue recognition

Sales are recorded when goods are despatched and invoiced.

20. TAXATION

The Company having its registered office in Pakistan has been allowed exemption from income tax under clauses 118C of Part-1 of the Second Schedule to the Income Tax Ordinance, 1979 (Ordinance) by the Pakistan income tax authorities. However the Company has discharged its liability under section 80D of the Ordinance in Pakistan for the assessment years 1994-95, 1995-96 and 1996-97. The Supreme Court of Pakistan in its decision dated June 4, 1997 has interalia held that the provisions of section 80D of the Ordinance should not be applicable where the 'Protection of Economic Reforms Act, 1992' is applicable. The aforementioned clause 115C was inserted through SRO 1283(1) dated December 31, 1990 which is protected under the provisions of the 'Protection of Economic Reforms Act, 1992'. Accordingly the Company has now requested the Pakistan income tax authorities to rectify the assessment orders passed for the assessment years 1994-95, 1995-96 and 1996-97 by granting exemption from the provisions of section 80D of the Ordinance and thereby allowing refunds for the income tax paid for those assessment years.

As the production facilities of the Company are situated in Mirpur, Azad Jammu and Kashmir (AJK), the Company has also filed its returns of income for the assessment years 1994-95, 1995-96 and 1996-97 with the AJK income tax authorities claiming exemption under clause 115C of Part 1 of the Second Schedule to the Income Tax Ordinance, 1979 as a non-resident and therefore minimum tax @ 0.5% of turnover

under section 80D of the Ordinance was not paid in AJK. The Deputy Commissioner of Income Tax (DCIT) of Mirpur Circle, AJK has allowed exemption under the aforementioned clause 118C but has treated the Company as a resident in AJK and levied minimum tax @ 0.5% of turnover amounting to Rs. 0.540 million for the assessment year 1994-95 which has been paid by the' Company. The assessment proceedings for the assessment years 1995-96 and 1996-97 are, at present, in process.

The Company contends that it is not liable to pay any income tax to the Pakistan assessing authorities in view of the exemption available under section 118C of the Ordinance and because the Supreme Court of Pakistan has now ruled through its decision of June 4, 1997 that the provisions of section 80D of the Ordinance are not applicable where the manufacturing entity is established under the concessions granted through the 'Protection of Economic Reforms Act, 1992'.

However the Company continues to make a provision for tax @ 0.5% of its turnover under section 80D of the Ordinance.
